Reynolds is ready

Liberals, NDP, Tories still to name candidates; local to run for minor party

The Member of Parliament for West Vancouver-Sunshine Coast has already knocking on doors as Prime Minister Jean Chretien dropped the election writ Sunday.

Canadian Alliance MP John Reynolds, who is seeking reelection, anticipated the Nov. 27 election call in an interview last week.

Reynolds said the election call three and a half years into the Liberals' mandate was "strictly from Mr. Chretien."

"His motivation is that he wants to try and win three elections in a row and he knows that if he waits until spring he won't be leader of the party," said Reynolds, who started knocking campaigning Sunday.

Although the Canadian Alliance Party is presently trailing the Liberals by a wide margin in the polls, Reynolds said he is optimistic about his party's chances.

"Right now, the polls have us at 25-26 per cent; that puts us within striking distance," said Reynolds.

Reynolds, who is also the campaign co-chair for the Canadian Alliance in B.C., opened his West Vancouver constituency office Thursday.

He plans to open an office in

Squamish during the campaign.

As for those trying to unseat Reynolds, the three other major parties had yet to declare a candidate at press time.

As of Wednesday, three people had entered the race for the Liberal candidacy: riding president Pat Camozzi, Phil Boname, who lost by nearly 3,000 votes to Reynolds in the 1997 election, and Ian McKay.

The New Democratic Party is scheduled to select a candidate on Nov. 9; however, a spokesman at party headquarters in Vancouver said last week if the election was called on Sunday, all ridings would have candidates selected by Oct. 29.

David March, press secretary for the Progressive Conservatives in B.C., said the party will be nominating its candidate for the riding in the next two weeks.

Garibaldi Highlands resident Marc Bombois is running for the Canadian Action Party (CAP), created in 1998 and led by former Liberal cabinet minister Paul Hellyer.

CHIPS to discuss public debate with GBA

If CHIPS decides to accept GBA Logging Ltd.'s challenge to a public debate, they'll want a formal debate, moderator included, says the group's president, Ian Sutherland.

Citizens for a Healthy, Innovative and Prosperous Squamish will meet as a group, and issue a decision this week, Sutherland said. Although he was named specifically in the challenge, he said it is not his decision alone.

GBA issued the challenge as

part of a full-page advertisement it placed in The Chief last week, responding to an ad placed by Ted Prior, who opposes the facility's replacing GBA's dry land log sort south of the downtown.

"Instead of having a continual 'we say this, they say that,' in the public interest we

should have a public debate," GBA president Greg Richmond said Thursday.

"They could have easily just have picked up the phone," Sutherland said.

Richmond said no time, place or format had yet been considered. He is waiting for CHIPS to call back.

A moderator, or a moderator and a panel, should be part of the debate, Sutherland said.

They would also make sure council would be made aware of the debate, and hope they would attend.

GBA survey ruffles feathers

Rumours and questions surround GBA Logging Ltd. canvass of local businesses to support its proposed wood chip handling facility on the Cattermole Slough.

Some members of the community are convinced a blacklist exists, and those who do not actively support the controversial facility will be boycotted by forestry workers.

But GBA says the company is merely trying to gauge support for its upcoming rezoning application.

GBA has applied to rezone its land from light industry to general industry, after a court decision last month quashed the development permit Squamish council granted to GBA.

Recently, GBA has begun faxing out a form to local businesses, asking if they do or do not approve of the facility as proposed, or if they would like more information.

This is in addition to the petition GBA has been circu-

lating around town.

"A petition is something you show to people and they make up their own mind to sign it," Ian Sutherland, the president of Citizens for a Healthy, Innovative and Prosperous Squamish (CHIPS), said Wednesday. "The message they're giving to business people is we'll remember who signed it and who didn't."

"We're trying to gauge where our support lies in the community," GBA president Greg Richmond said.

"I think it's wise, given we're going to go through a public process, to know what percentage of the population supports us."

There haven't been any hostile responses to the petition, Richmond said. While some refuse to sign, most are willing to make up their minds after the public information meeting to be held in November as part of the rezoning process.

However, Richmond said over a thousand signatures have been collected.

"[The fax form] is for our own uses. We just want to know who our supporters are," he said.

He denied it's a way of identifying businesses for a boycott, saying he has no idea where that rumour comes from.

"There is no blacklist."

"I don't really know if there's a blacklist, but I suspect, just the way the thing's worded, it's either you're with us or against us," said Peder Orum of On Sight Equipment.

He returned his fax to GBA with the "not approve" box checked off, and questions on what the information will be used for, and if GBA is placing his company on a blacklist.

In visits by The Chief to Cleveland Avenue businesses last week, several merchants reported being pressured to sign, saying the person pushing the petition made it out to be an issue of supporting forestry.

"I felt really threatened by the things he was saying,"

said one owner, who spoke on condition of anonymity. "Basically saying they would n't shop in this store if I was n't wildly in favour of a chip facility at the end of the street."

Most said a copy of the fax form was dropped off, with a request to fax it back to GBA. Those who were approached with the petition had differing reactions.

"The petition was presented in an amiable, friendly, respectful manner," said Adriana Howe, who works at Cleveland Avenue.

There was no suggestion of declining to sign — which, what she did — would have consequences, she said.

Another merchant, who asked her name be withheld, said she had been approached by both GBA and CHIPS, and felt pressured to sign by both. "I think it's unfair," she said. "You can't make a stand in business, we need our dollars from everybody."

"We can't alienate ourselves from half of the community,"

School district mum on suspensions

The Howe Sound School District is refusing to say what suspensions or expulsions, if any, were handed out to two female students involved in a pair of beatings.

The two, 15 and 17, went before the board of school trustees' disciplinary committee because the most a school can hand out is a five-day suspension.

The two have also been criminally charged in relation to the Sept. 21 and 22 incidents.

The committee is composed of board chair Amy Shoup, trustees Don Ross and Constance Rulka, Superintendent Linda Rossler and the vice-principal of the students' school, in this case Stephen Jupe of Howe Sound Secondary.

"We're not at liberty to discuss student issues," Shoup said, mentioning the possibility of being sued as one reason.

Confusion over Garibaldi Village application

Mall developers Canadian Destination Properties Ltd. (CDP) and the District of Squamish are disagreeing over whether or not a rezoning application is in. CDP proposes to build a mall, anchored by a Canadian Tire outlet, with upper story condominiums at the corner of Mamquam Road and Hwy. 99.

After an application was postponed several times, the opening date for the Canadian Tire was moved from spring to fall 2001.

Robert Weston, CDP vice-president of development, said Friday plans required for a rezoning were submitted Wednesday.

The district, however, indicated the plans were reduced in size, not accompanied by an application form, landscape or phasing plans, subdivision application, and were not provided in six sets, which the district requires.

Squamish's past in the courtroom

Former classmates, police testify in trial for 1964 murder

Old wounds were opened in a courtroom in Vancouver Oct. 12 — wounds that have taken 36 years to begin to heal.

Squamish resident George Byron Blue, 51, is charged with the first-degree murder of Judy Howey in 1964, when he was 15 years old and she was 12.

The first degree murder trial has been ongoing in Vancouver Supreme Court for two weeks now and the jury of six men and six women have heard witness testimony of former classmates, RCMP officers who identified clothes removed from Judy's body at autopsy, and boxes of old notes and case files from police officers that have either since retired or died.

On Friday, a piece of evidence that was said to be key at the start of the trial by Crown prosecutor Allan Flanz, a videotape dating back to 1964 in which Blue is heard detailing a fight he had with Judy over "a sexual thing" before she was killed, was introduced to the court.

The secretly taped video conversation the court heard had poor audio quality and the court had to use transcripts in order to follow along.

In the tape, Blue told an undercover police officer during a meeting in 1998 that he had met Judy on a trail behind Mamquam Elementary School (MES) the afternoon that she went missing.

Blue told the officer the two had a fight and that he hit her at least once on the head with a log.

He also said he may have ripped her blouse.

The details around the undercover operations by police or anything that

could identify the officer have been banned from being published by Justice Deborah Satanove.

Satanove has also banned the publication of any of the scenarios and plots that the RCMP used to get Blue to admit to the murder.

Since the opening day of trial, Richard Fowler, Blue's lawyer, has never questioned the veracity of the videotape or Blue's confession.

Fowler contends that Blue told police only information that was already public knowledge and in some cases gave false information.

Fowler has also told the jury to examine the circumstances of the confession and the timeline in the Crown's theory.

In the tape played Friday, Blue told the officer he had gotten a ride home from Howe Sound Secondary School by a couple who have since died.

In testimony early last week, Flanz revealed to the court that the couple, Charles and Bertha Ardeil, identified Blue at the high school after they told police they had given a youth a ride to the elementary school.

Blue denied ever getting a ride to police.

The tape then goes on to describe how Blue met Judy on the trail behind the school and that they had a fight, which was described as a "struggle" and that he may have ripped her blouse or dress.

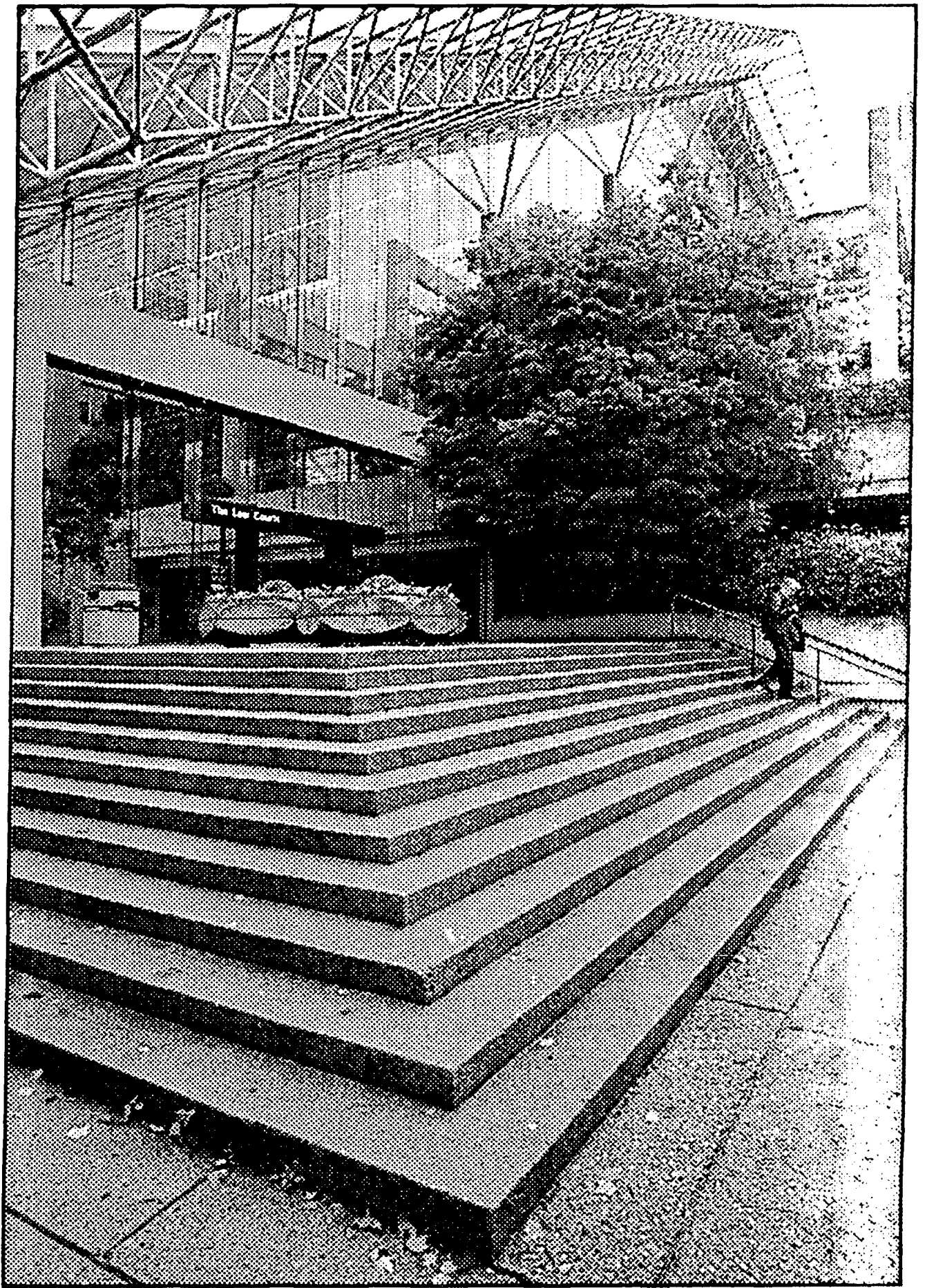
Afterwards, he told the undercover officer he panicked and dragged her body off the right-of-way into an area overgrown with bushes.

Judy was killed after school May 29, 1964 while walking home in Garibaldi Estates from MES.

She stayed after school to help a teacher put away library books the day she died and left for home between 3:45 p.m. and 4 p.m.

When Judy didn't get home by 6 p.m. her parents became worried and went to the school.

A massive search was launched by

police and more than 75 volunteers and her body was found two hours later under some boards and logs on one of the foot paths south of the main trail.

Blue was interviewed by police four times between 1973 and 1992 but no charges were laid until 1998.

The trial is slated to continue until Nov. 3.

Interfor security crews claim Elaho protesters threatened them

Security crews for International Forest Products (Interfor) say they were threatened by protesters building a tripod in the Elaho Valley early yesterday morning.

Squamish RCMP said shortly after 1 a.m. an Interfor security patrol came across a group of 10 to 12 protesters building a tripod on the roadway at Mile 36 of the Squamish Valley Road.

Security crews told police that when they approached

the blockade, their lead vehicle was surrounded by protesters "making threatening gestures with shovels and hammers," then covered with a tarp while two security officers were inside. "While tarped, an unknown number of protesters began walking

and jumping on the truck," said Staff Sgt. Cliff Doherty.

Police arrived on the scene around 2:20 a.m. to find a lone male suspended above the roadway in a 20-foot tripod. He was placed under arrest for mischief and intimidation for blocking the road

and was brought down by officers standing on top of a large watering truck shortly before 8 a.m.

Doherty said police are reviewing video footage of the incident for evidence of criminal offences by other protesters.

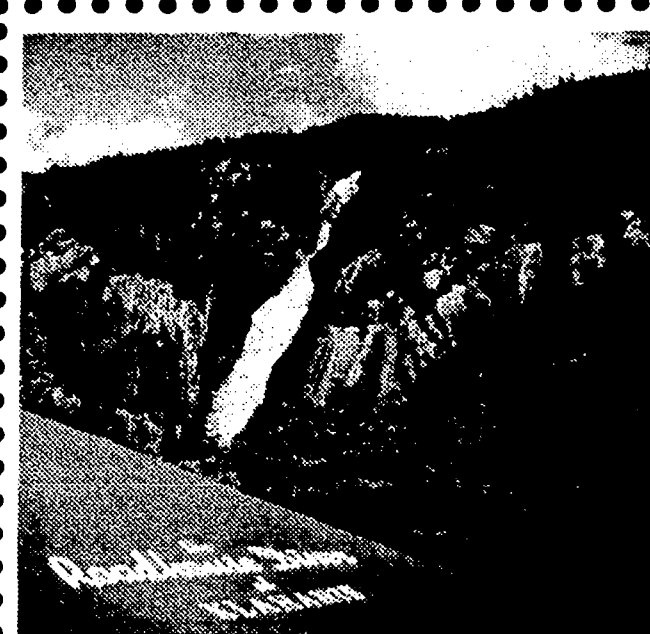

Doctors end action

Local surgeon seeks visa to practice in United States

Doctors resumed full duties at Squamish General Hospital last week, satisfied with the Ministry of Health's (MOH) attempts to persuade the corridor's general surgeon to stay—even if they were unsuccessful.

"We felt there was enough of a concrete proposal there that we could accept that, even if Dr. Patterson couldn't," Dr. Glenn Stelzl, president of staff at SGH said Wednesday.

"We've withdrawn our withdrawal."

Squamish physicians began job action Oct. 10, withdrawing from committee and administrative work. Medical services were not

affected. They took this action specifically to address the issue of retaining Dr. Robert Patterson, the only full-time general surgeon in the Sea to Sky corridor.

In the year since Patterson relocated from Ontario to Squamish he's made less than a third of what the average general surgeon makes.

Patterson rejected the last offer from the MOH, saying it would pay \$75,000-\$100,000 less than the B.C. average of \$300,000 for a general surgeon.

After three U.S. hospitals offered him positions with better remuneration and medical support, Patterson is now looking into obtaining a work visa.

"As Dr. Patterson has stressed, the monetary side is not the main thing for him," Stelzl said.

The Sea to Sky Community Health Council is not pursuing the ministry to make Patterson another offer, according to chief executive

officer Brian Kines.

Squamish doctors will hold off on any further job action in relation to the provincial issues of on-call pay and specialist retention.

Those issues are being addressed through mediation between the ministry and the B.C. Medical Association, scheduled to finish Nov. 15.

Even if Squamish is unable to retain Patterson, Stelzl said he hopes the mediation will provide packages to attract another surgeon, perhaps one in his first few years of practice.

"I'm hoping people like him, in his position, will be specifically addressed," Stelzl said.

"It's my hope they'll resolve this issue of retaining specialists in rural areas at a provincial level," said Kines.

What step local doctors will take next depends on what comes out of the negotiations.

"It's all kind of on hold right now," said Stelzl.

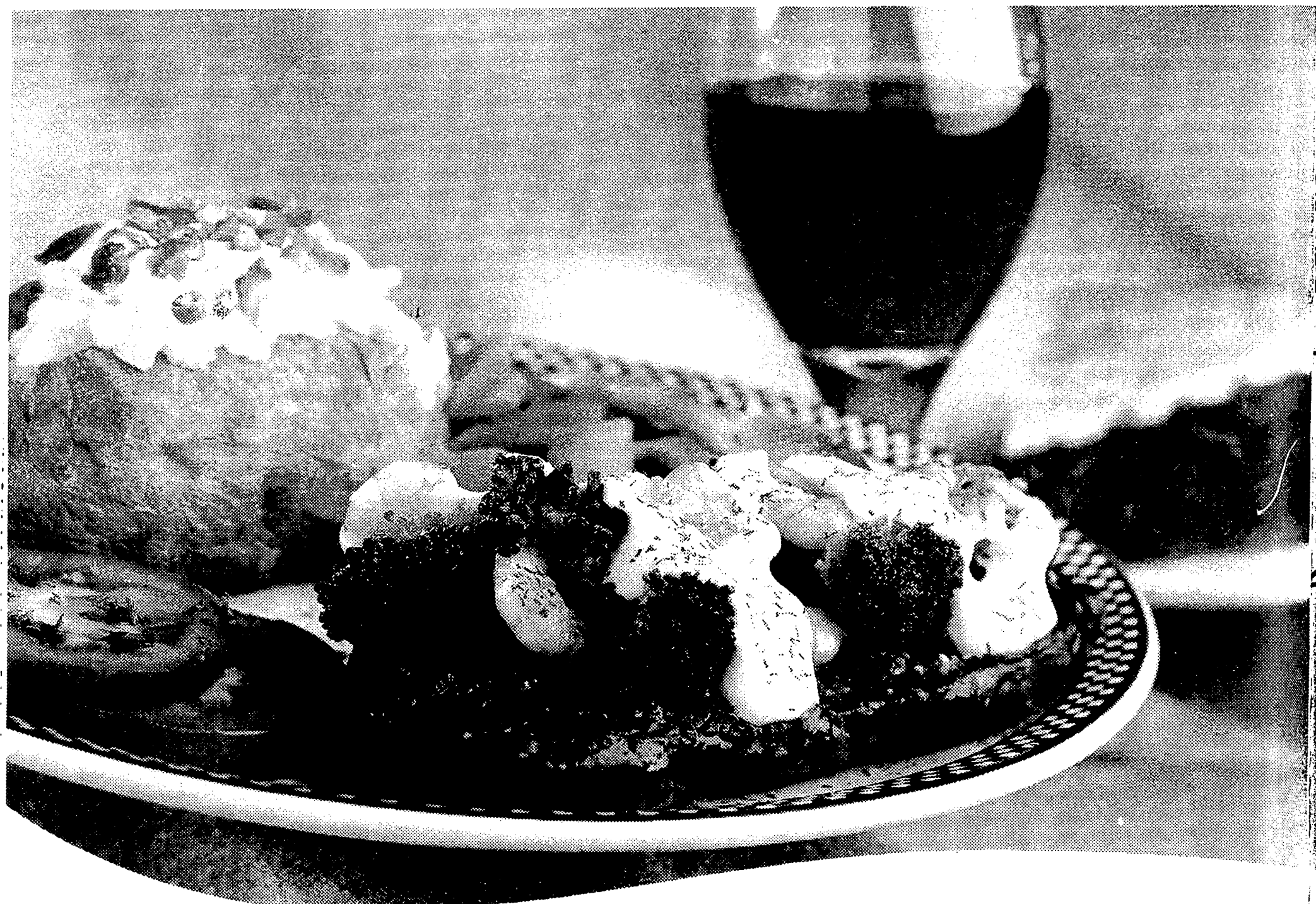

FOE brings slide show to town

Environmental group rents Rainforest Cafe for discussion

Environmental protesters are coming back to Squamish — but this time they're heading downtown, not to the Elaho. A slide show, video and discussion night on B.C.'s rainforests is coming to Squamish tomorrow (Oct. 24) at The Rainforest Grill 'N Go Cafe. Environmentalists rented a boardroom at The Rainforest for the evening, which will include speakers from Forest Action Network (FAN), Friends of the Elaho (FOE) and the Melvin Creek blockade.

Jonah Fertig, a member of

FAN, said Wednesday topics will include the Elaho Valley, native sovereignty and territorial claims, the Great Bear Rainforest on B.C.'s mid-coast and the impact of logging.

"We'll also be talking about eco-forestry and the alternatives to Interfor and the corporate paradigm we see in forestry today," Fertig said. "We'll be talking to some folks from the Squamish Nation hopefully they'll be able to come out."

Thirty to 50 people are expected.

Fertig expects Squamish will greet the gathering with mixed feelings. Organizers want to see locals attend, but worry fear of community disapproval might keep them away.

Whether forestry workers might stage a protest isn't really a concern, he added.

"If that's what people are interested in doing against us, I'm not going to try to silence [them]," he said. "You're not going to see angry environmentalists beating up loggers."

Joanne Luscombe, owner of The Rainforest Grill 'N Go, said her customers' political views are not her concern.

"Everyone has a choice in what they say," she said.

"I shouldn't have any concerns. I haven't done anything wrong. That's something the people at the municipality will have to deal with, the police and everything, if there's acts of violence."

Her establishment has a laid-back atmosphere conducive to discussion and space for it, Luscombe said.

"We're not just a little restaurant, we have a whole lot of room here."

"If people want come talk

and stop fighting like children, this is a good place to come."

Police report no incidents at the Elaho Convergence, held Oct. 14-15 at the camp of protesters at Mile 36.5 near the joining of the Squamish and Elaho rivers.

Police noted some activities, but are confident the decision to step up their random patrols to a 24-hour presence made for a quiet couple of days, S/Sgt. Cliff Doherty, the Squamish RCMP detachment commander, said Oct. 17.

"There was not a large influx, we're guesstimating 12-15, perhaps as high as 20, but not the volume that was expected," said Doherty.

Fertig said about 60 people attended the convergence.

A Halloween celebration is planned for Saturday (Oct. 28), also at the protest camp.

Non-profit housing group to take project to council

The Squamish Non-Profit Housing Association (SNPHA) is finally taking its years of work before Squamish council.

The group voted to go public at its annual general meeting Oct. 16 at the Elks Hall. The project, which would

see hundreds of bungalow-style manufactured homes set up on Crown land in the Cheekye Fan, has been on hold pending a solution to the Cheekye Flood Terrain Hazard Zone.

SNPHA project manager Wil Croxall told the group that the provincial government is ready to move on diking the Fan, which must take

place before any development can go forward, this winter.

The houses would cost under \$60,000, plus land rent and management charges. There would be sections for senior citizens as well as first-time home-buyers.

Council's mandate for airport development, which is also held up by the hazard zone, means there should be

municipal support for the project now, Croxall said.

"We haven't worked with the new council on it yet."

No Name grow op busted

Squamish RCMP are crediting Block Watch for helping them uncover a marijuana growing operation early Saturday morning.

RCMP received a 911 call from a resident along No Name Road just after 3 a.m. that a flashlight was seen glowing in the living room of the home.

When police arrived they entered the home to determine if a break-in had occurred and stumbled on the grow operation.

Police secured a search warrant and began their investigation just after 6 a.m. on Saturday.

"The residents along No Name Road a few months back really got into our new Problem Oriented Policing (POP) program," said Const. Dan Seward Saturday afternoon outside the No Name Road home.

"There has been less activity in the area and in the neighbourhood along the dike and now a call from a concerned resident helped us to find this operation. It just goes to show you what types of results you can get when you get the efforts of a few people in the community."

Police seized about 90 marijuana plants ranging in size from eight to 10 inches, several pounds of processed marijuana and associated equipment including fans, hoses and timer boxes.

A 29-year-old man from Squamish was arrested by police and charges are pending. He will make his first court appearance in December.

A 46-year-old Squamish man will make his first court appearance Dec. 12 facing charges of production of a controlled substance.

The charges stem from a marijuana growing operation that RCMP and Squamish Fire Rescue crews uncovered after a house fire Oct. 3 on

Sixth Avenue and Victoria Street.

Seward said police arrested the suspect, who was renting the home from another Squamish man, in a bar about a week ago.

The man has been released from police custody on a promise to appear in Squamish provincial court.

Elaho protester skips court

A B.C.-wide arrest warrant was issued Oct. 17 after the occupant of a tripod erected on the logging road in the Elaho Valley failed to appear in Squamish provincial court. Jason Pyper, referred to as Captain Jaybird by Friends of the Elaho (FOE), is charged with mischief and intimidation by obstructing a highway in relation to a blockade protest Aug. 28 against logging of old growth forest in the upper Elaho.

Police arrested 16 other people when they broke up that blockade, but released them without charges.

The same day, the trial of four protesters over another, much more elaborate road blockade on the Lava Creek bridge in late July in the upper Elaho was set for Aug. 13-17, 2001.

The blockade involved two tree-sitting platforms connect-

Virgint said it appears renters were working on three

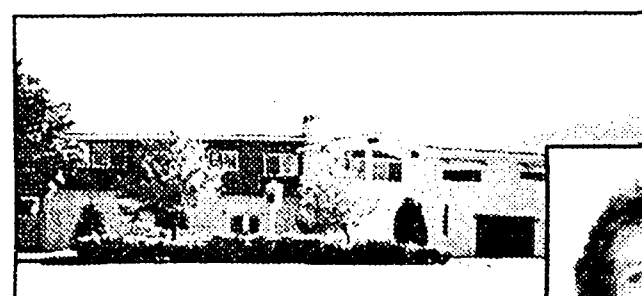
cars in the garage when the fire started. All three cars along with tools and other equipment that was in the garage were all destroyed.

Parent pays for student arson

In a pre-Halloween object lesson, a parent has paid \$10,000 for a fire his son set at Garibaldi Highlands Elementary last year.

The money was recovered by the Howe Sound School District, through their insurers, the district announced Oct. 16.

"We wanted to have it out there ... before Halloween," board of school trustees Amy Shoup said Wednesday.

Around 5 p.m. on March 29, 1999 two Squamish Fire rescue pumpers responded to fire on the exterior southeast wall of the school gym. Firefighters were able to extinguish the flames using dry-chemical extinguishers and contain the fire to the one wall, but also had to cut into the gym wall from the interior to make sure the flames didn't spread through the roof.

The damage was originally estimated at \$50,000, but it turned out the roof was undamaged and use of the gym was interrupted only intermittently by the repairs over six weeks.

"It went really quick," said Rick Hume, director of facilities. "I was quite pleased with the insurance company."

The repairs actually cost about \$12,000, secretary-treasurer Nancy Edwards said. The insurance company has not said yet if the incident will affect the district's premiums, but Edwards considers it unlikely.

The perpetrator, a high school student, was caught after the RCMP investigated and spoke to several witnesses. He confessed, at which point the school district asked their insurers to pursue the single father.

The teen is believed to have since left Squamish.

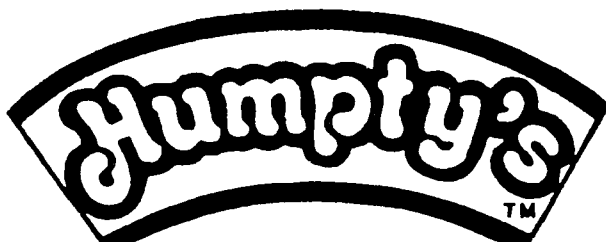
Shoup said she hopes the case will prompt parents to have a serious talk with their children about where they'll be and what they'll be doing during the vandalism-prone night of Oct. 31.

"If we know who does vandalism to our property or our schools, we will seek restitution," she said.

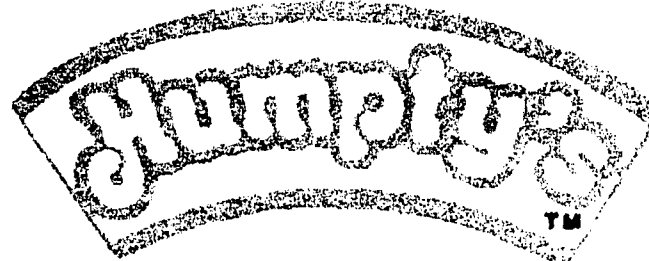
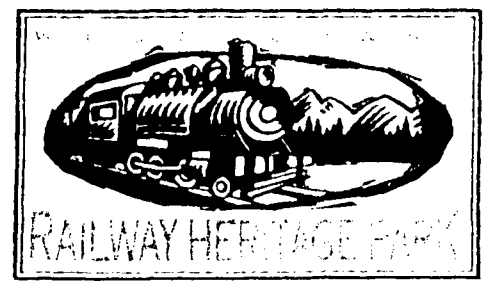

Survey says...

Blacklists and boycotts. That's what the seemingly interminable debate between GBA Logging Ltd. and Citizens for a Healthy, Innovative, Prosperous Squamish (CHIPS) is coming to now.

As with so many debates, the focus is beginning to shift from the subject at hand — which has been argued to death since March — to the tactics of the debate itself.

GBA is seeking support in the run-up to next month's anticipated public meeting on its rezoning application for its Cattermole Slough site by circulating a petition and faxing local businesses asking if they support or oppose the chip facility.

But CHIPS and some downtown merchants are complaining that GBA's fax-out amounts to the creation of a blacklist against businesses who don't support the chip facility, and that people are feeling pressured into signing the petition or pleading neutrality for fear of inviting a boycott by the local forest industry — still a powerful force in this town, as the recently-released D.E. Park survey indicates.

Whose explanation do you believe? It depends largely on which side you support. If you support the chip facility, it's a survey. If you oppose it, it's pressure tactics.

Whichever side you're on, you must admit a survey is a completely legitimate activity — GBA is going into a public hearing on a controversial rezoning head-to-head against a prominent group of citizens. While CHIPS has been loud and effective in its campaign, there is no clear indication of how much support either side has. Short of a referendum on the issue, doing a survey is the best way of trying to gauge what the "silent majority" really thinks.

But for GBA to conduct the survey themselves opens them up to the charges currently being leveled by CHIPS; that the pressure is on and the black book is open. It would be poor politics indeed for CHIPS and its supporters not to make as much hay out of this issue as they can. GBA is perfectly within its rights to solicit support — and to take the risks of garnering negative publicity in the attempt.

An independent survey of local businesses and residents — one that is beyond reproach, commissioned by neither side — is what's really needed for council to make the right decision here. GBA's survey results will be attacked on all fronts. Both sides will stack the upcoming public meeting with bodies and rhetoric. The issue is so polarized that no outcome this council comes up with will be acceptable — unless they have some facts to back up their opinions.

Council was able to launch \$8,000 for MarkTrend to survey the community on our shopping habits. Isn't the future direction of downtown south worth at least as much?

He's coming down with election fever

If you're a political junkie like me, you're in your glory. If you're not...well, you may want to take a long vacation right about now.

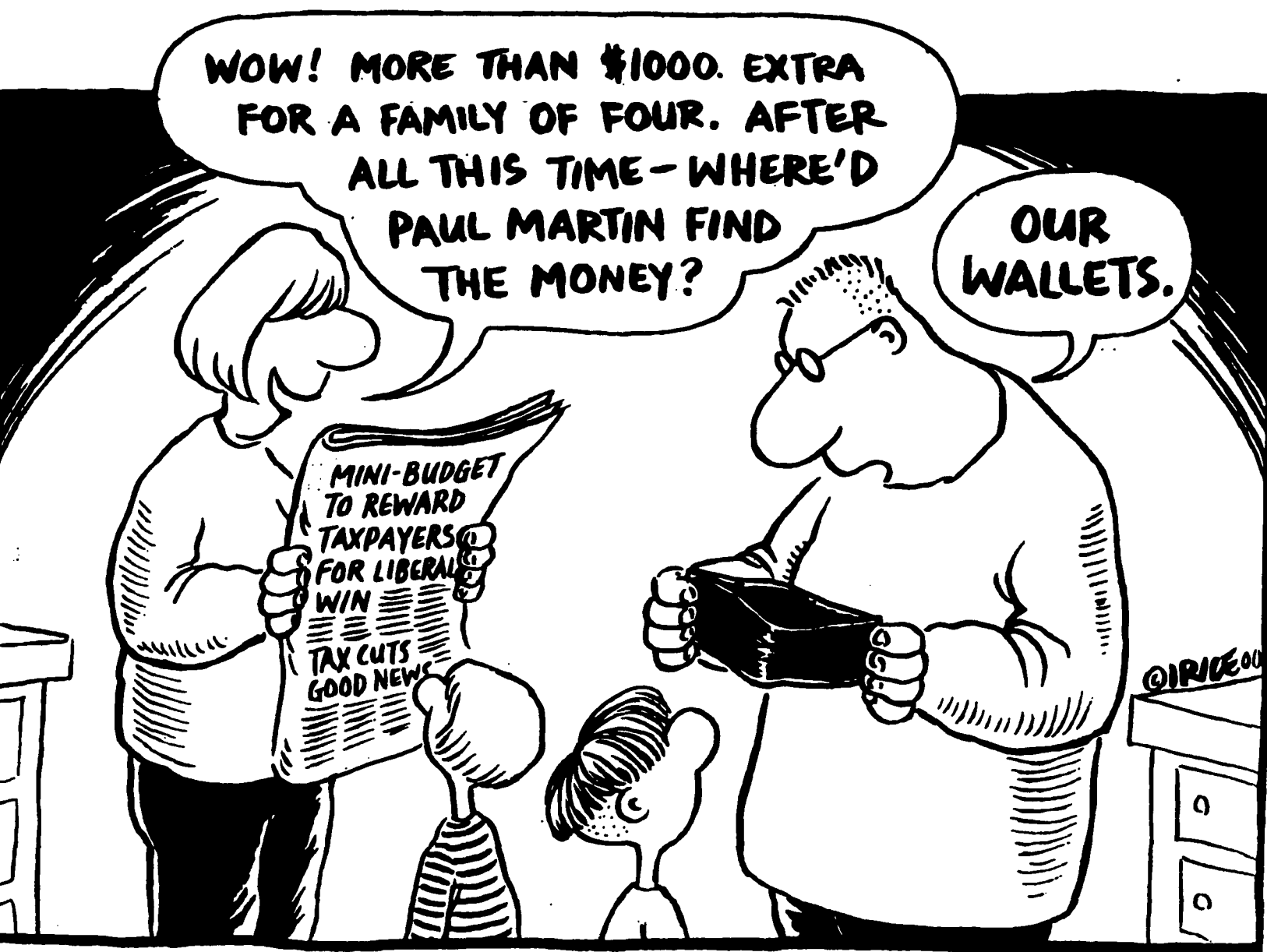
For the next six weeks your TVs, radios and newspapers will be flooded with campaign, campaign, and more campaign, since Jean Chretien dropped the writ Sunday.

minority government situation with the possibility of getting a working coalition with — yes — the Tories.

Let the games begin.

several years as well as the "mini-budget" the government just delivered are only the latest examples of the Liberals' magic formula for staying in power: co-opt the best ideas of your opponents and paint them as extremists for the rest of their ideas.

CHIPS' hard work goes unanswered

I have spend six very long months of energy, first discovering the proposed wood chip storage facility then educating myself on the proposal. I gathered this information on my own time, along the way educating many citizens about the issues and trying to convince council to read the information available and make an educated decision for the whole community. Our hard work went unanswered.

Next, we spend \$25,000 in legal costs, not including the district's \$20,000 which I as a taxpayer pay. Why? So the Supreme Court of B.C. can inform me of something I already know.

The concerns of the community were met by the following rationale before litigation. Councillor Lalli asked not once but three times "Does the zoning fit?", insinuating if it fits, then legally he has no option but to pass the project. Using that same concept you based your decision on then,

you now do not have the option to rezone. Councillor Lalli, you did not control the power to change the zoning six months ago when you felt it was correct. Now you must abide by the same argument or lose faith in the public arena. There are no new rules.

Councillor King, your reasoning had sound merits that you needed a judge to decide between the two different opinions put in front of you. The judge did decide.

Councillor Bass, your position on forestry jobs is straightforward. Hopefully you will be able to come to a decision for the whole of Squamish, not for the few.

Councillor Magee, the judge felt the location was wrong for several reasons. Changing the zoning may be a legal avenue; however, it does not address the concerns of the citizens of Squamish. The Squamish 2000 Plan has been welcomed by the community. Mr. Richmond's project will be the death of that vision.

Councillor Smith and Councillor Kahlon, I applaud your diligence for standing by the community, speaking during council in what I would consider a hostile environment. Please continue to fight for the community.

Mayor Lonsdale, all recent studies relating to forestry have been denounced. Then you spend taxpayers' money for your own study on forestry. So, is it a surprise when you first statement is that the judge is wrong, followed by accusations that the planning department erred in creating the zoning? My personal feeling is that you kept this project from the previous council, for two to three months letter writing and getting the dredging pushed through the environmental stages. You did not take the initiative to share with new councillors in office and have put them between a rock and a hard place. Now is the time to work and find a proper location for this project, taking the

proper channels and time as necessary.

Mr. Richmond, your innuendoes that the people that are assaulting your project are the same people assaulting the working forest adjacent to Squamish is an outrage. This project is not about forestry jobs and industry. This is about your pet project and the destruction it will do to Squamish. It is not us against forestry, it is about location. Currently these jobs your claim to create are being filled by workers who work out of North Vancouver, so in fact you're not making new ones, you're claiming existing jobs.

I made a visit to the site at Fibreco in North Vancouver where Canfor is currently doing business. Fibreco is located deep in a heavy industry location. The nearest residential are is approximately half a mile away. Complaints are registered when wind speeds exceed 8 km-h and smaller particles become airborne. Fibreco does use a

method of watering as chips move along the escalators. Dust complaints are directly related to the wind direction of the day. Complaints of the dust come from other industrial sites in the vicinity. Residential complaints focus on noise issues relating to the shunting of cars at night —

residential sites that are half a mile away. Residential sites are the neighbours at Mr. Richmond's location. I'm asking all councillors and the planning department to visit this facility as due diligence before considering rezoning.

All-weather fields on track for November opening

Squamish's new all-weather fields should be ready by early November.

Jim Greenwood, director of operations for the District of Squamish, confirmed Friday that construction work on the fields is on schedule, with poor weather being the only cause for delay.

"The electrical is being done and is nearing completion," Greenwood said. "The field lights are ready, we're just waiting for the wet weather to slow down a bit so we don't tear up the surface too much."

Next week, contractors hope to start putting down the gravel and following that the rock dust surface should be ready to be put down in place.

"We're shooting for late October or early November right now," he said.

"We're still not as far along as we'd like to be, but they're doing not to badly."

As for the slo-pitch fields, the outfield fence is almost complete and the field should be ready for playing next spring as time is needed for the new grass to grow and mature.

Brennan Park to stay open on certain holidays

Council approved new holiday openings for the pool and ice arena at Brennan Park Recreation Centre Oct. 3.

The pool will be open for three hours a day on Remembrance Day (Nov. 11), Boxing Day (Dec. 26) and Good Friday (April 13), with admission at \$2 per adult or child, or \$6 for a family.

The arena will be open Remembrance Day to public skates only if user groups are not interested in renting it, while Boxing Day will have both the pool and the arena open for a combined admission charge.

Letter home from Vietnam

Editor's note: Brandon Biln is an 18-year-old from Squamish on a Canada World Youth exchange to Vietnam. The following letter is compiled from Brandon Biln's letters and recent phone calls home to Squamish.

**Van Diem Village
Van Ha Commune
Hanoi District, Vietnam**

Hello everyone,

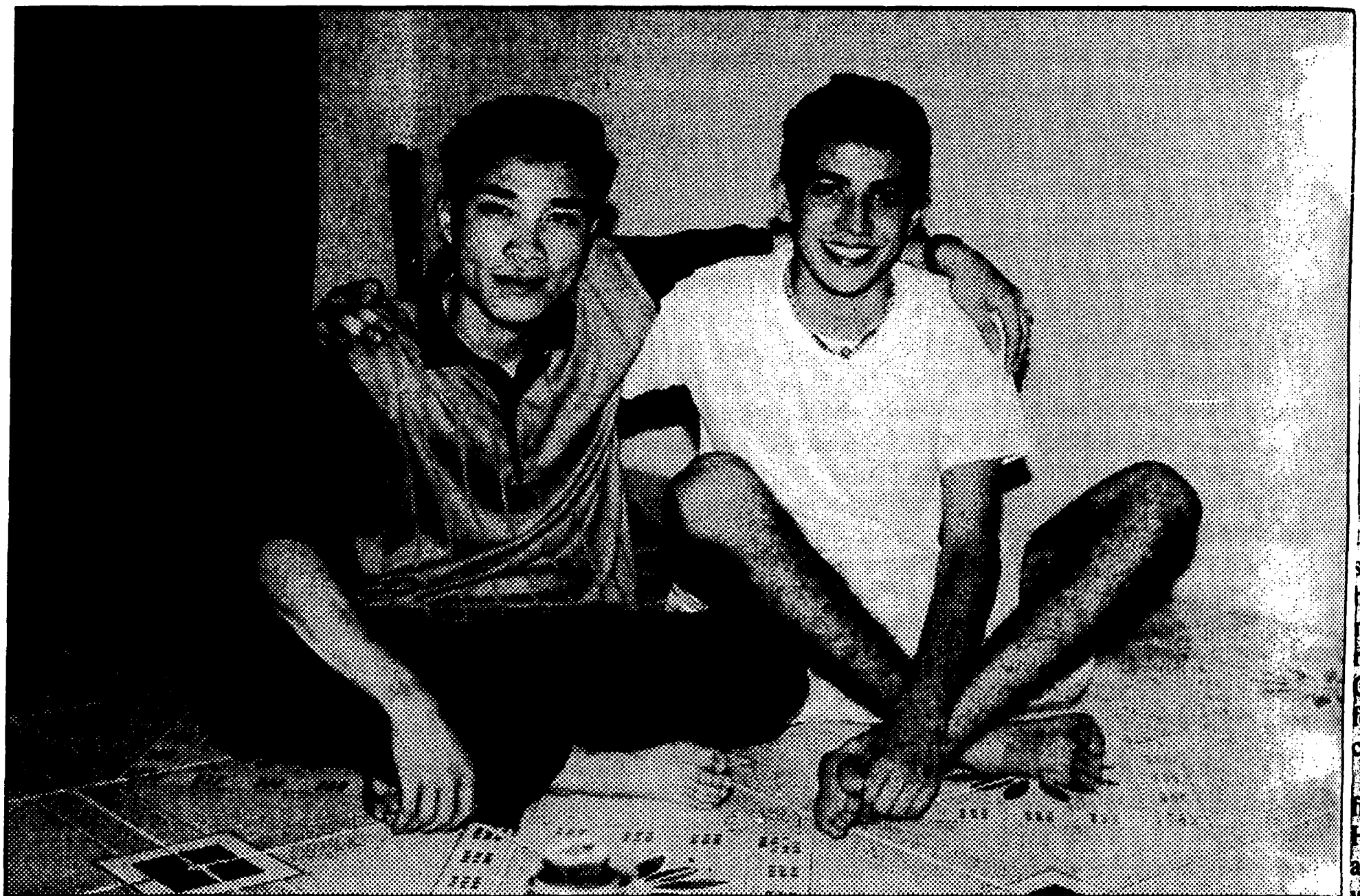
Greetings from Vietnam! I miss everyone and my home but I am doing well and having a good time. After leaving Squamish on Aug. 16 for Toronto, I spent five days billeted at a church camp in Paris Ontario being orientated with the seven other Canadians on the Canada/Vietnam (Canada World Youth) exchange. They are a great group of four girls and three boys from across Canada all between 19 and 22.

One of the first things we learned was that because of heavier than normal monsoons, the Red River flooded out the area around our host city, Bat Trang, and we were now going to Van Ha, an agricultural/woodworking area 40 km north of Hanoi. We left Canada on Aug. 22, taking a midnight Cathay Pacific flight that refueled in Anchorage and over-nighted in Hong Kong.

The heat was very extreme when we arrived in Hanoi and I must have sweated for a week straight. Our partners are between 23 and 26 years old and from all over Vietnam. My counterpart is 23-year-old Cuong from the south and I get along well with him. It was frustrating at first because of the language as very few people speak English or French like they do in the southern part. My host family has a phone but I can't get through because I can't get an English-speaking operator although I've picked up a bit of Vietnamese now. There are a few English-speaking locals in town and also an old neighbour who speaks French so I spend some time with him walking and talking about the war — he knows a lot.

The weather here is in the monsoon season now with rain every day and terrific storms. Most of central Vietnam is experiencing the worst floods in 50 years and we have all donated funds for their aid. There is blinding forked lightning all around every day and nearly constant thunder when it rains.

I'm staying with the Ngyuen family in the Van Diem village of 1,200, about five kilometres from four other

villages that make up Van Ha. This entire region of Vietnam is the Red River delta and quite flat. There are rice fields all around, a few trees along the roads and an occasional clump of trees — it certainly isn't a jungle like I pictured. Van Diem is the affluent area of Van Ha with better water and a bit more peaceful than the other four villages. There isn't much in the way of amenities here but there is a very small corner store where I get snacks occasionally. There are no restaurants in the village but a market is about 15 kilometres away.

My family's house, at five stories high, is the tallest in the village but all houses are tall and very narrow. I'm probably living in the best house — we have a terrific view and a regular flush toilet and shower — most of the rest have to squat over pits! Cuong and I share the house with Mr. & Mrs. Ngyuen who are in their 30s, Grandpa & Grandma, and the Ngyuens' son who is nine. My family is great and the people here are very friendly. Some of the village kids swarm us at times and bean us with slingshots for fun — we get back at them though. Most families here are involved in woodworking making

furniture or carvings out of hardwoods for export, all by hand. My family has a small shop in the back for woodworking and also have a retail shop in China.

Most days I usually get up a little after 6 and have breakfast at 7. Lunch is usually at noon, dinner at about 7 p.m. and typically, we all sit on the floor. We had a hard time getting used to the strange food and eating rice morning, noon and night. At first I missed our food, especially cereals, juice and milk.

The water here is not that good so all of us have had minor stomach problems but we are doing well now. I'm getting used to the food and think I'm actually gaining weight, although I don't always know what I'm eating. I've had duck's blood, pig's blood with nuts, pig's heart, duck's feet, potatoes now and of course, rice with every meal. I usually have four bowls in a day and have become a master at using chopsticks.

Hanoi is less than an hour away but difficult to get to so we only get there every couple of weeks for special occasions. Usually Matt and I take a small rickety bus in for shopping, banking or to use a phone that is hard to find and usually has a long line-up.

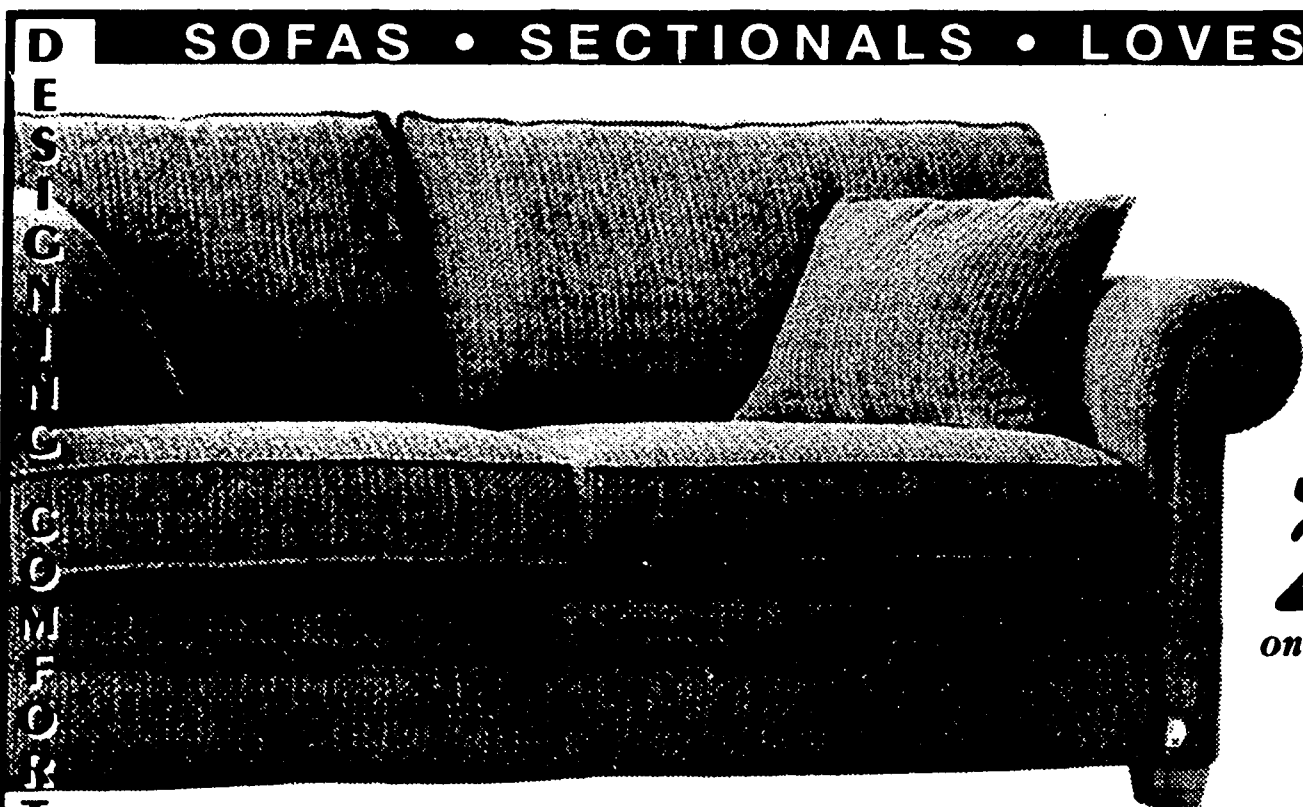
Hanoi is a nice city with lots of lakes, green space and temples but also polluted. There is garbage in the streets, thousands of bikes and scooters, and horns constantly blowing. The city's old quarter is neat with interesting little shops.

Things are cheap here — beer is only 15 cents per bottle. I took out 650,000 dong (US\$50) from the Bank of ANZ last week, which should last me until Christmas.

I want to thank everyone who helped me make this trip possible. I miss my family, my friends, and my home but I am having a great time. We are often tired and hungry because of the heat and physical work but all of us are enjoying it immensely and realize what an experience this is.

It's difficult for us to contact Canada because of no e-mail and poor phone service. It's easier and cheaper to call from Canada (\$1.37 per minute anytime) so please phone me at 011-84-4882-5144 and remember to add 14 hours to your time. The best time to call me is between 9 p.m. and 10 p.m. (7 a.m. and 8 a.m. your time). I'll be back to Ontario in December and back home in late March. See you then.

"I wish to thank you all for your efforts, time and work on behalf of the residents."

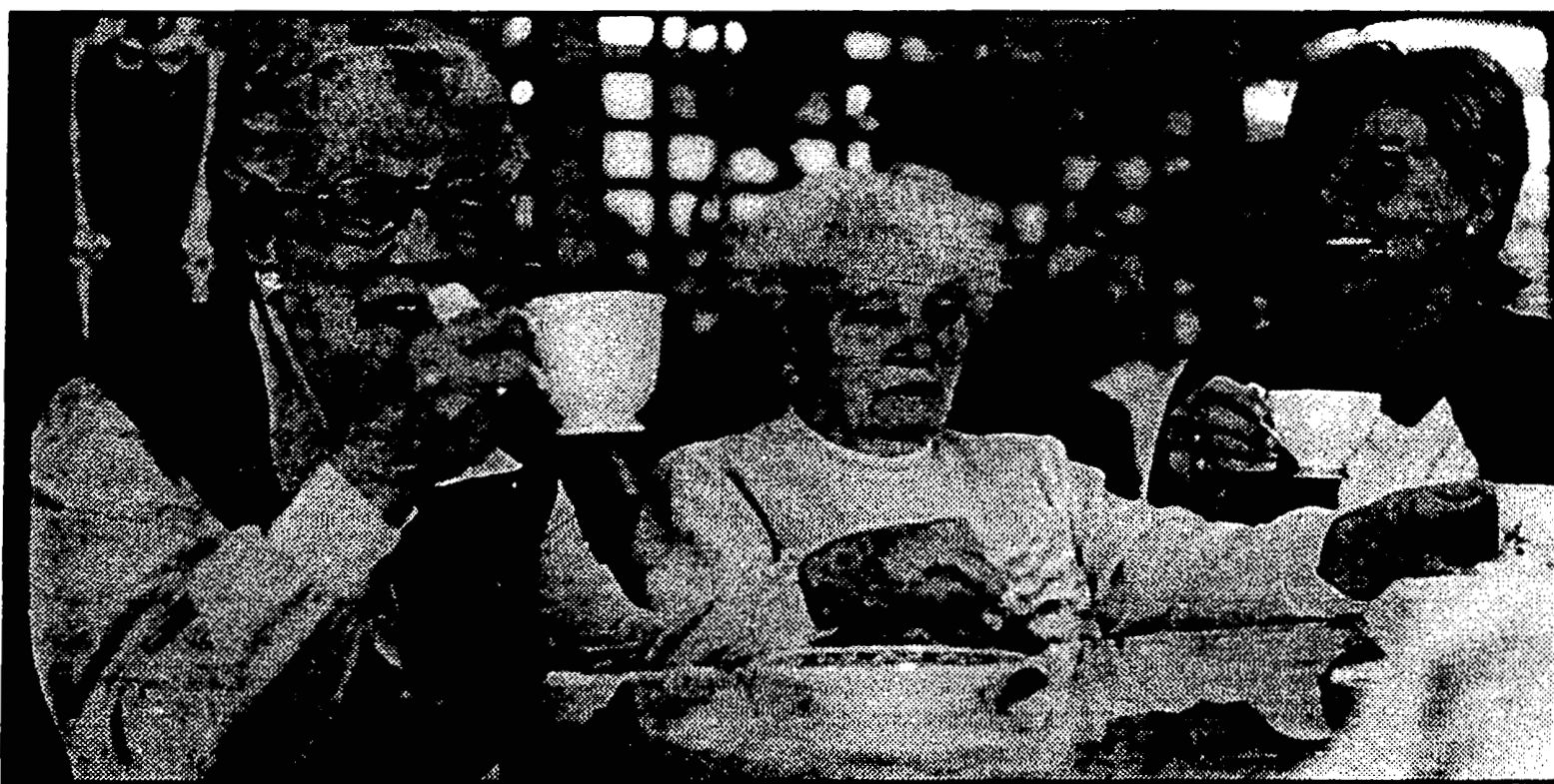

Jenna Galley and Jeanne Wilson provided the goals while Ashley Hogg played a strong game at midfield.

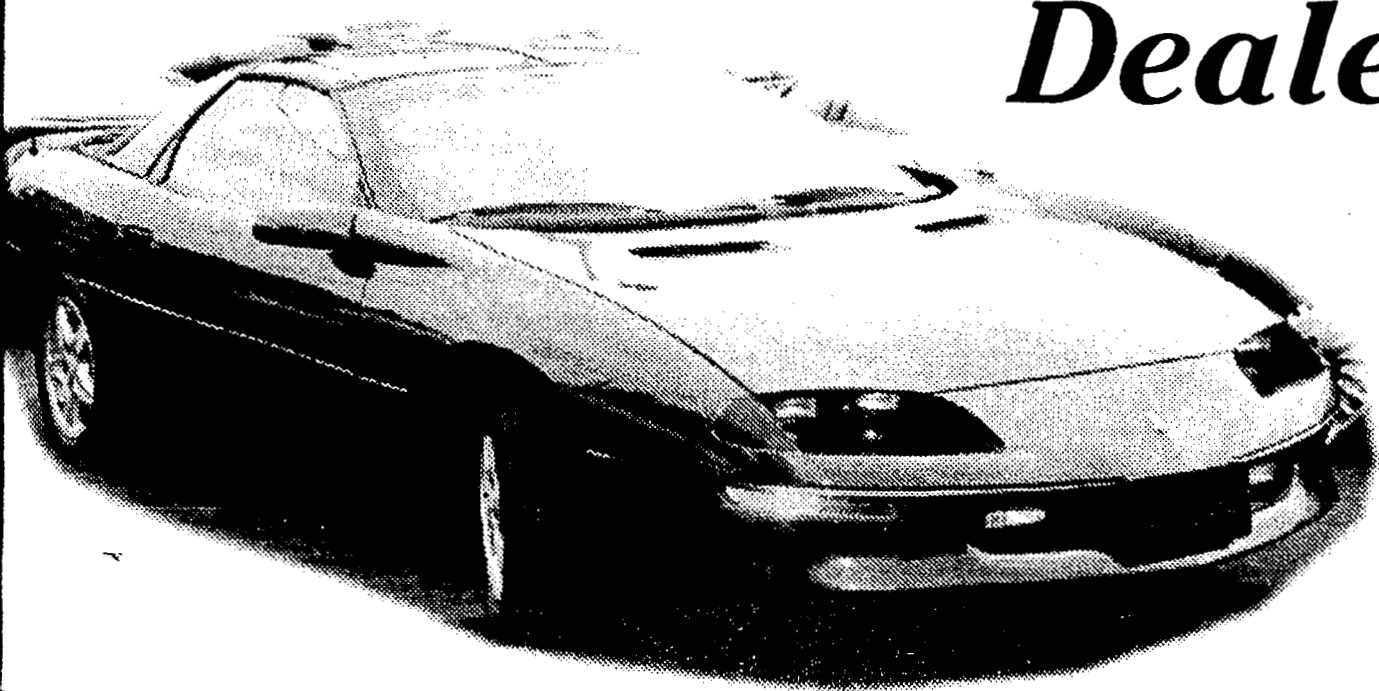
The Squamish Scorpions U12 boys' soccer team played at home and beat West Vancouver 1-0 in a physical game against a much bigger team on Saturday.
