Yes to airport, no to fluoride

Twenty-five per cent turnout for Saturday's vote

Squamish voters said yes to airport development and no to fluoride in their ranking water in municipal referendums Saturday.

Fifty-seven per cent voted yes to an "operator opinion" question on airport development, while 61 per cent voted against fluoridation.

Just over 2,100 voters cast ballots — 25 per cent of eligible voters.

While the fluoride referendum is legally binding — a 50 per cent yes vote would have added fluoride to the water supply — the airport vote is not. The District of Squamish held the vote to get community support to take to the provincial government, which must approve any subdivisions in the Peckye Fan Terrain Hazard zone, including the airport lands.

While the issue has been a factor in the last two general elections, Saturday's vote was the first time voters have had a direct say on the airport. "I'm pleased that it's resolved, and I'm pleased with the result," Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said Monday.

For the past two elections and before I've been saying we needed to go to referendum on this one. This could have been resolved four years ago, and that's the pity of the whole thing."

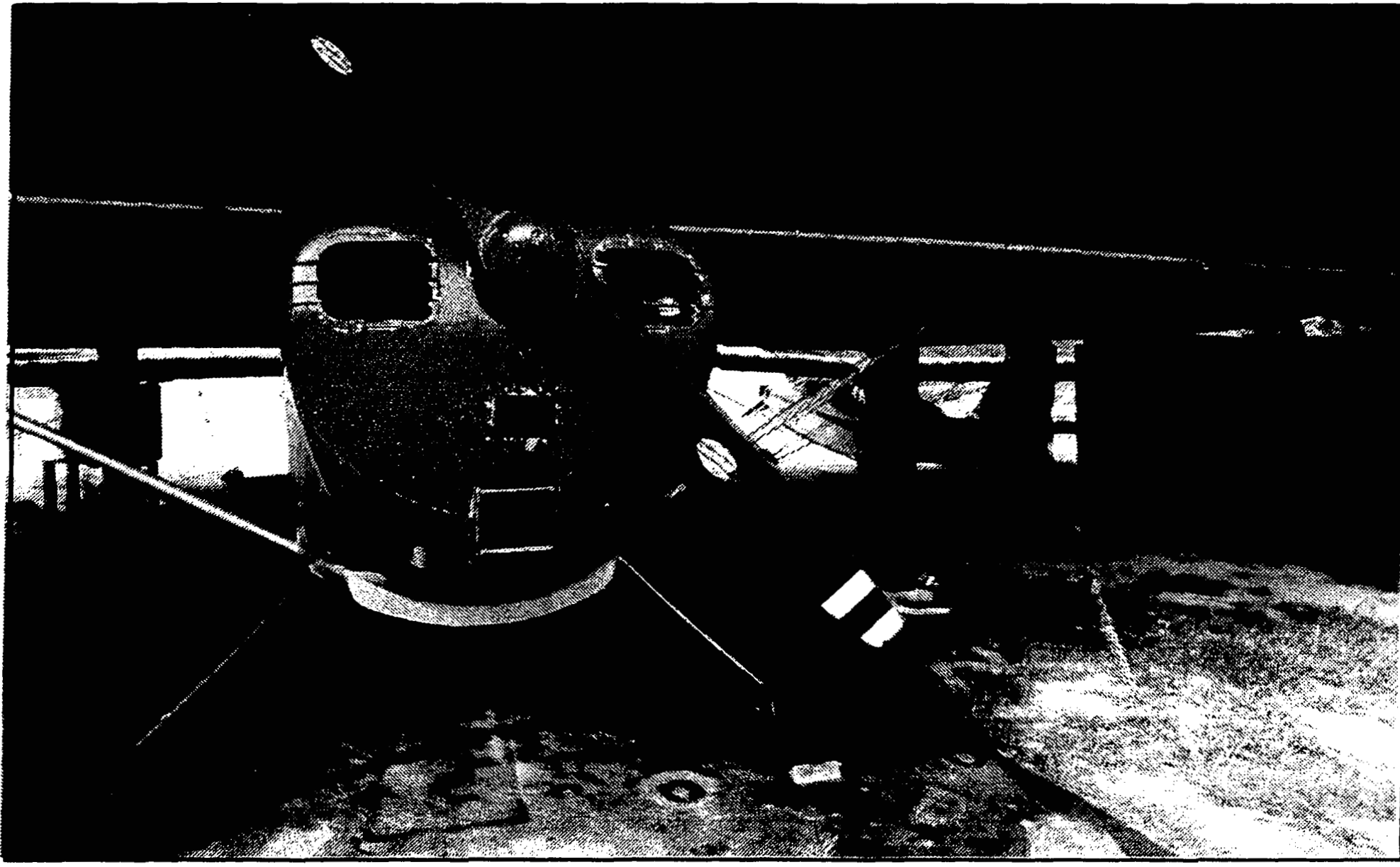
Lonsdale was also pleased with the turnout, calling it high for a mid-term election.

"We were hoping to get at least 20 per cent out, and I believe with both issues there that people with strong opinions did come out," she said.

All current councillors pledged they would support a referendum in the last election, Lonsdale pointed out.

"We've fulfilled that commitment." Local companies using the airport were also pleased.

Now that the council has the backing of the town, they have something to take to the provincial government,"

said Jennell Saindon of Black Tusk Helicopters, which operates at the airport.

"It shows that the people in Squamish are paying attention to what's going on."

Long-time Brackendale residents who worked against the vote were disappointed with the result.

"It's a sad day for the eagles, it's a sad day for the flyers because of bird strikes and it's a sad day for Brackendale," said Thor Froslev, one of the most vocal critics of airport expansion over the years.

Froslev was unhappy both with the turnout and the referendum question

and campaign. "You know it's slanted," he said. "They set it up. It's got to be slanted."

Froslev said anti-airport proponents will be doing their own lobbying to the Ministry of Environment, which would approve subdivisions for leases at the airport. "We've got our pipelines happening," he said.

But Lonsdale isn't worried. "There's been a lot of lobbying Victoria over the last several years," she said. "I believe that Victoria probably felt that [opposition] was the community sentiment. Quite frankly we now know that it isn't."

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One dead in Valleycliffe domestic dispute

Violent spousal assault led in the death of a 45-year-old Squamish man early Monday morning in Valleycliffe.

Shortly before 4 a.m., Squamish RCMP responded

to several 911 calls reporting a disturbance and a fight at a Valleycliffe residence.

Officers at the scene found a mother and her two teenage children had fled from their home after a disagreement between the woman and her husband had turned violent.

"The man had attacked his

wife with a large knife and cut her on the hand," said Sgt. Gary Brine. "When the daughter tried to intervene she was also cut on the hand."

The mother and her children were able to get out of the house, but as they fled they heard a single gunshot, Brine said.

Police set up around the house and unsuccessfully attempted to reach the man by telephone and when police eventually got inside the home, they found that the man had died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

The mother and daughter were treated at Squamish

General Hospital for non-life threatening injuries and released.

The son was not injured and all three are recovering with other family members.

Squamish RCMP and the B.C. Coroner's Service are still investigating the incident.

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

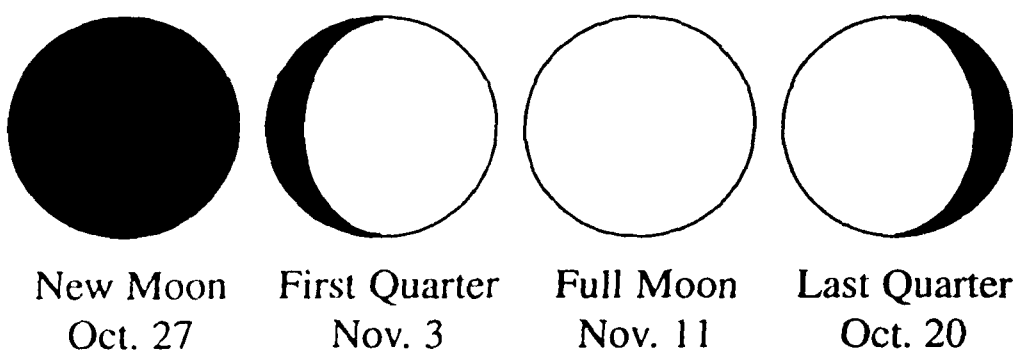

 I honestly don't believe the community adjacent to the airport should be concerned. In fact they should be relieved, because in fact we will have more control, and 'we' means the community." Lonsdale emphasized that the airport vote won't lead to large-scale expansion. "We are not talking about putting one more piece of aircraft in the air," she said.

"We're talking about enabling the likes of Mike Saindon to build a repair facility out there. We're talking about having some control out there. We're not trying to get up some scheduled flights. We're not looking at that at all."

"The eagles are very important to all of us. I don't believe we should be doing something that will have a negative impact on the environment."

The fluoride campaign pitted all of Squamish's doctors and dentists against a crew of community activists with the backing of the B.C. Health Action Network Society (HANS).

"Obviously I'm relieved," said Jack Fowler, who spearheaded the anti-fluoridation effort.

"I was really worried about if it went in. You can't filter that stuff out."

Fowler credited HANS for its assistance with information in the campaign. "That's probably what brought over more people than anybody."

Fowler said he was "very intimidated" going against the opinion of Squamish's entire medical community, but emphasized it was not an anti-medical issue.

"Once you implant some of the negative things in people's minds it's pretty difficult to dislodge that."

"It had to be an issue of choice," he said.

"I think people are more informed these days and convinced that the medical profession doesn't have all the answers."

"People are becoming more aware and making more choices for themselves."

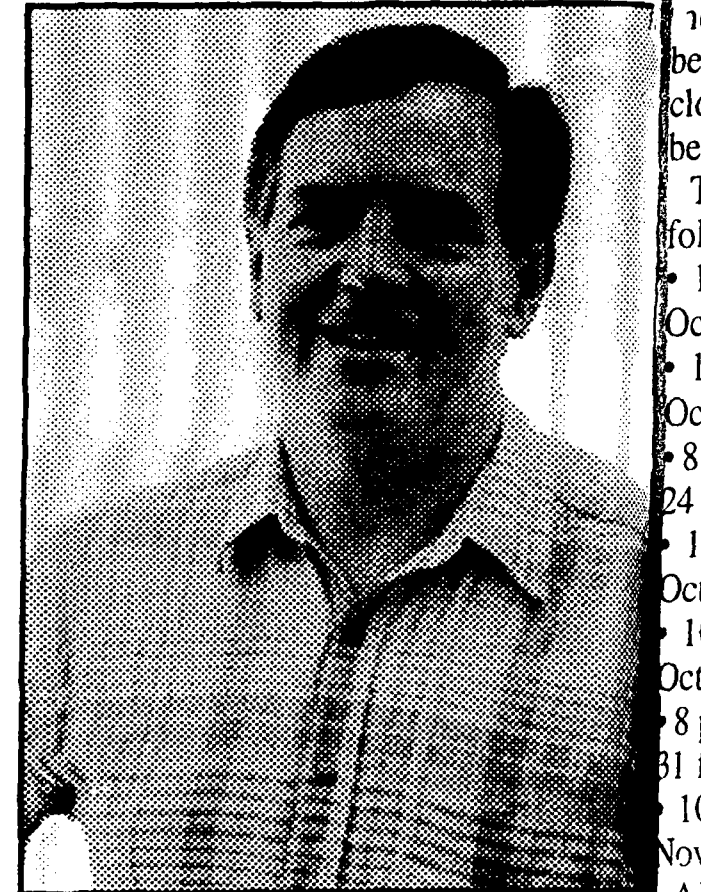
"If people want it, they can just put it in. That's been the basis of the campaign and the message. There's questions about it's safety, so don't put it in."

Dr. Lori Vanzella, who helped lead a campaign by local doctors and dentists to add the fluoridation question to the ballot, said Sunday he was disappointed but "not overly surprised" by the vote against fluoride.

"Once you implant some of the negative things in people's minds it's pretty difficult to dislodge that," he said.

The appearance of information about Dr. Hardy Limeback, a leading pro-fluoride researcher who recently changed his views and now opposed fluoridation, probably swayed the vote, Vanzella admitted.

Vanzella said doctors likely won't

push for another vote on fluoride in the future. "It's a very difficult thing to have passed because of the stigma of fluoridation and the anti-fluoride movement," he said.



"They're very organized. You can't argue with them and trying to get into a debate with them makes no sense because you can bring in all the research you want and it makes no difference."

Vanzella said he expects Squamish will continue to see elevated tooth decay, and will still recommend fluoride supplements to patients when necessary.

"The problem is you don't see everybody," he said.

Doctors escalate job action

Surgeon refuses government offer; doctors withdrawing medical services

Squamish's only full-time general surgeon refused the province's latest offer on Friday, and is now seeking a visa to take a job south of the border.

As a result, doctors held to their Oct. 15 deadline and will escalate their job action at Squamish General Hospital to include withdrawing some medical services.

"They offered me a contract last week that was sort of dribs and drabs of money," Dr. Robert Patterson said Saturday. "I aspire to be average. This

contract comes in well below average. And it requires me to do well above average [duties]."

Depending on how the contract's various clauses are added up, it will pay him \$75,000 to \$100,000 less than the B.C. average of \$300,000 for a general surgeon.

Out of this amount, a surgeon must cover his expenses; Patterson says he has spent approximately \$100,000 running his practice since arriving here in October 1999.

At this point Patterson is looking into obtaining a visa; one of the three U.S. hospitals he received offers from agreed to hire him subject to an approved visa.

Patterson must apply for the visa in October, though it may take up to four months for it to be processed.

"I'm still open to a better offer," he said. "We haven't made that decision yet, we'll only know when we have the

visa in hand and are crossing the border.

"The problem is not a lack of support from the community," Patterson added. He commended the efforts of Brian Kines, the chief executive officer of the Sea to Sky Community Health Council, though they have mostly proven futile in the face of the Ministry of Health.

Squamish doctors have been careful to point out their withdrawal of services is purely concerned with retaining Patterson, not the province-wide issues of recruitment and retention, on-call pay and general health care funding.

"For other issues we're awaiting the outcome of negotiations between the BCMA [B.C. Medical Association] and the government," said Dr. Glen Stelzl, president of Squamish's medical staff.

The BCMA and the Ministry of

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Highway crews may strike

Road maintenance on the Sea to Sky Highway could grind to a halt unless Capilano Highway Services comes to a deal with its unionized workers.

The B.C. Government and Service Employees Union (BCGEU) members who work with Capilano Highway Service Ltd. voted 95 per cent in favour of taking strike action if necessary last week.

The approximately 100 highways maintenance workers affected have been working without a contract since last November.

"The union bargaining committee is pleased with the overwhelming show of membership support for its position as demonstrated by this vote," said Lloyd Glibbery, BCGEU negotiator.

"The employer's wage offer is insufficient. Further, the employer's refusal to address job security and health and welfare benefits are unacceptable."

The main issues in dispute are wages, benefits and job security.

A mediator has been appointed in an effort to

bring a resolution to the dispute. "We are hopeful that the parties will be able to resolve our issues through the mediation process," Glibbery added.

According to the BCGEU, Cap Highways is offering only a zero per cent wage increase in the first year, followed by a 1.5 per cent increase in the second and third years of the contract term.

The union also claims Cap Highways is asking for concessions in various areas of the agreement, including hours of work and time off.

"We're at the preliminary stages of the collective bargaining process and part of that process is mediation," said Steve Drummond of Capilano Highways Friday.

"We hope the process of mediation will also get results and there will be no disruptions to the traveling public."

Capilano Highways services the Sea to Sky Highway to Squamish and Whistler and north of Pemberton and the Howe Sound/North Shore area, including the Cassiar Connector and the Ironworkers' Memorial and Lion's Gate bridges.

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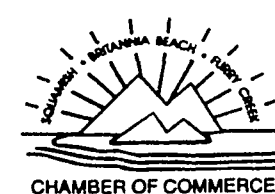

Forestry-tourism workshop on the way

Squamish study on economic impact of forestry goes to council tonight

The study on the importance of forestry to the Sea to Sky corridor will get its big public debut tonight (Oct. 17) at council, along with discussion of a forestry-tourism workshop.

The study by D.E. Park and Associates was received by councillors at a committee meeting Oct. 10, but without discussion.

Pemberton and Whistler councils and the Squamish-Hoquet Regional District have also received the study, and will have the Ministry of Forests (MOF), local members of Commerce, Community Futures Development Corporation of Howe Sound, Council of Tourism Associations (COTA), MP John Reynolds, MLA Ted Nebbeling, Soo Coalition for Sustainable Forests and Association of Whistler Area Residents for Environment.

Peter Ackhurst of D.E. Park and Associates will publicly

present it tonight. Squamish council commissioned the \$17,000 study in reaction to One Whistler's study of the idea to create a 500,000-hectare national park.

"It's something that has no [direct] impact," Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said Friday. "It's not a work plan or a process."

A task force formed in Squamish to combat attacks on forestry (e.g. environmental protests or market campaigns) was part of the drive to do the study, Lonsdale said.

"We have to be able to demonstrate the value of the forest industry to Squamish," she said. They extended the study to cover the entire corridor for a little more money, she added.

Soo Coalition treasurer Larry McLennan said Thursday their board of directors meet tomorrow and will likely discuss the study.

"I'm not sure there's anybody sitting on a large fence that will be swayed one way or the other," he said of the study's impact. It won't affect the environmentalist drive to preserve the area, he added.

The Soo Coalition will examine the study for the kind of flaws found in the One Whistler study, said McLennan, which discredited

it among those familiar with forestry. "If there's a problem it's better for us to point it out," he said.

Tourism Whistler president Suzanne Denbak, who helped spearhead the One Whistler study, could not be reached for comment by press time.

The forestry and national park studies seem contradictory on the economic impact of forestry. Unfortunately, comparison is difficult as most of the forest employment figures in the One Whistler study refer only to the Soo Timber Supply Area, not the entire Squamish Forest District (SFD).

The forestry study says the SFD provides over 2,600 jobs and \$137 million to the Sea to Sky corridor each year.

Direct forest industry jobs account for 24 per cent of employment in Squamish and 46 per cent of all jobs when indirect and induced — jobs created by the spending of forest workers — employment is included.

The One Whistler study, on the other hand, uses BC Statistics to peg forestry as providing 14 per cent of Squamish's basic income, versus tourism's 26 per cent.

That both tourism and forestry are important to the corridor is indisputable, Lonsdale said.

The workshop tentatively planned for early November aims to bring the two together to encourage forming relationships.

"There's lots the forest industry can do to make the tourism experience easier, and vice versa," said Lonsdale.

One may not know how to best facilitate the other's operations, which leads to conflicts, she said.

On the list so far are local governments, forestry and tourism businesses, MOF, COTA, local Chambers of Commerce, Tourism Whistler, Community Futures, Forest Renewal BC and the Forest Alliance of B.C.

Open Burning Restriction Lifted

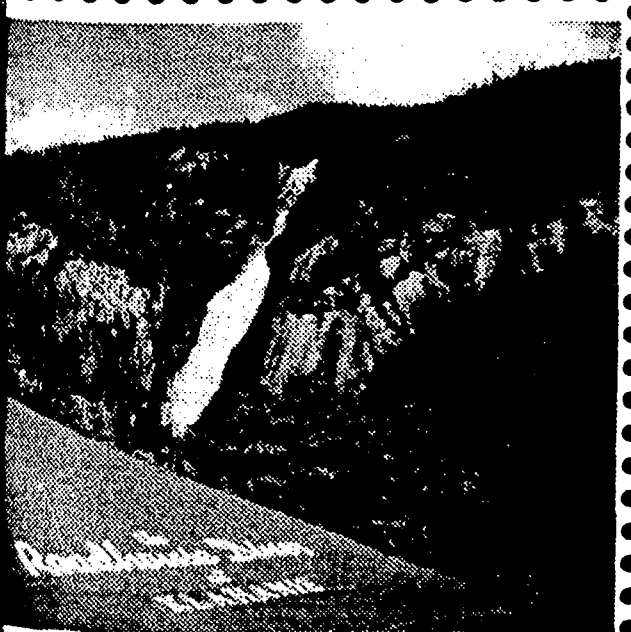
The lighting, fuelling or use of open burning to dispose of paper, cardboard, slash, lumber, brush, grass, yard, agricultural materials or other debris is now permitted in the South Island, Campbell River, Sunshine Coast, Squamish and Chilliwack Forest Districts.

These types of fires are defined in section 23 of the *Forest Fire Prevention and Suppression Regulation* (B.C. Reg. 169/95).

Open burning is permitted on land not covered by local government burning bylaws. Where local municipal or regional bylaws are in place governing the use of open fire or smoke management, please contact those authorities.

Fires larger than a typical backyard burning pile require a burn reference number. This can be obtained by calling 1-888-797-1717.

Robber gets two years

A North Vancouver man will spend two years in jail for a string of robberies last month in Squamish.

Morten Beck Nielsen, was convicted Oct. 3 of three counts of robbery, one count of disguise with intent to commit an indictable offence and one count of possession of a prohibited firearm.

Nielsen received a sentence of two years in jail and a mandatory 10 years firearms prohibition.

Nielsen robbed Save-On Foods, the Sea to Sky Beer and Wine store at the Best Western Sea to Sky Hotel, the Ocean Port Hotel Beer and Wine store and the Husky gas station, before being caught by police with help from local citizens on Sept. 13 in

the Husky robbery.

Charges are pending against a Squamish man after police busted another marijuana growing operation.

Squamish RCMP executed a search warrant at a home on Government Road on Oct. 5.

Approximately 20 marijuana plants were seized at the scene and the man is facing cultivation of a controlled substance charges.

Police are still investigating.

Three youths got a lesson they soon won't forget on the streets of Squamish Thursday morning.

Police received a report of three youths walking between Brackendale Secondary School and Brackendale Elementary School Thursday morning carrying a handgun.

Police located the youths and found them with a cap gun that closely resembled a police-issue 9 mm.

"These kids were very lucky no shots were fired or they weren't taken down with gun play," said Const. M.L.B. Gilarowski. "From a distance you could not tell whether it was fake — it looked real to our officers."

No charges were laid

against the trio, but the gun was seized by police and the youths were warned and released.

Police are investigating a pair of daytime break-ins at homes on Park Crescent and Arrowhead Way on Oct. 6.

Entry was gained to one home by forcing the back door open. An orange Kona mountain bike valued at \$850 was stolen.

Anyone with information regarding these incidents is asked to call Squamish RCMP at 898-9611.

A Squamish man is facing charges of assaulting a police officer, escaping lawful custody and uttering threats after an altercation with police Oct. 7.

Police found the intoxicated man nearby a bar late in the evening and arrested the suspect for being drunk in a public place.

The man tried to escape from police custody briefly, but was apprehended and taken back to the detachment.

Between Oct. 7 and Oct. 10 police received reports of several thefts from vehicles around the community.

Some vehicles were parked in recreation sites, while oth-

ers were parked in the downtown area.

Various items ranging from cash, wallets, credit cards and identification to clothes, cameras, cell phones and personal items were taken from the vehicles, some of which were left unlocked by their owners.

Police are once again reminding the public to ensure that they don't leave any valuables in their car and make sure to secure the vehicle when it is left unattended.

The conservation office and RCMP are still investigating an incident in the Upper Squamish area on Oct. 7.

A conservation officer in the area on patrol found a man in possession of a restricted firearm. RCMP were called and arrested the man and seized the firearm. He is facing a number of firearms related charges.

Police are requesting assistance from the public in locating a stolen Toro 835 riding lawn mower.

The mower was stolen from a yard of a Government Road home on Oct. 8. Anyone with information is asked to call Squamish RCMP.

Fires set at motel

Squamish Fire Rescue is on the lookout for a suspected arsonist after quelling two minor fires at the Cozy Motel on Scott Crescent Oct. 2.

Fire crews were called to the motel after a report of a brush fire, but they instead found two small set fires — one on the staircase and a second a few feet away from the motel. "The risk of the fire spreading and damage to the building is what concerns us," said fire chief Ray Saurette. "These were small attempts, but everything has a potential to get bigger in size if not detected early enough."

Fire officials have yet to find the suspects involved.

Another fire bug was experimenting in the Judd Road area on Oct. 4, this time with a gas can.

Saurette said crews were called to a report of a gas can on fire in the middle of the road. When crews arrived they found the remnants of a fire, but the gas can was gone.

"A rope was left and it looks like someone put a rope into the can and used that to start the fire," Saurette said.

Council to kick in for Hallowe'en fireworks

Council will pay up to \$2,500 for Hallowe'en fireworks if the community antes up an equal amount — despite cutting fireworks from the budget earlier this year.

In previous years, the district bought \$5,000 worth of fireworks for the Hallowe'en festivities at Brennan Park, while the show was put on by volunteers. The pyrotechnic team volunteers, who were also members of Squamish Fire Rescue, pay for their own training and certification.

Council dropped the show from its budget this spring; as a result, pyrotechnic team leader Rob Nicholls began to canvass businesses.

Coun. Rick King brought the issue up at council's meeting Oct. 3, saying as the community had donated \$1,500, council should put in at least \$1,000 from their contingency fund. "If they don't raise enough money — they need \$4-5,000 — all the money would be returned," King said.

"A thousand dollars doesn't buy a lot of fireworks," said Coun. Wendy Magee. "If you don't have \$5,000, you don't have much of a show."

On her suggestion, King's motion was altered so the district would match the total dollar amount raised by the community, up to \$2,500, to bring the total up to \$5,000.

Thus, if the community raises \$2,000 the district will contribute \$2,000; if \$4,000 is raised the district will contribute \$1,000. The motion carried with Coun. Shelley Smith opposed.

Smith's motion to limit the contribution to \$2,000 failed with Mayor Corinne Lonsdale and councillors Cheryle Bass, King, and Magee opposed.

"I'd rather see a spectacular show the community's going to ooh and ahh, rather than say 'That's it?'" said Magee.

Nicholls said Wednesday about \$2,000 had been raised.

The pyrotechnic teams plans to ask the firefighters association members to adopt the fireworks as an annual program for 2001, which they would fund-raise for during the year, he added.

There had been some confusion in the community over who is doing the fund-raising this year, however. Neither the fire department or the firefighters association are directly involved.

"It's not that we don't endorse it, there's some legal issues," Fire Chief Ray Saurette said Thursday.

Twenty-five years ago, Keith Broad wrote a bedtime story for his kids.

Now he's sharing it with the world.

Broad, a Garibaldi Highlands resident, has published what he calls "the longest bedtime story ever written" — Peregrine's Christmas Adventure.

It's a bedtime story "mini-series" in 12 chapters about Peregrine Pottotot, the youngest mouse in a family of eight who live in the belfry of St. Christopher's Church.

Home support workers may sit down for a cup of tea with their clients, but they're not simply relaxing, said Donna, the Stevensons' worker. They'll discuss how a person is feeling and what their condition is, constantly assessing their health.

The spin is in

The best thing about numbers is how easily they can be made to say just about anything you'd like them to. Statistics are a matter of interpretation, not science.

Take, for instance, Squamish and Whistler's duelling studies on forestry in the Sea to Sky corridor. One Whistler's study, examining the economic impact of a national park in Tree Farm Licence 38, concludes that shutting down logging in favour of preservation would mean the end of about 220 jobs, compared to up to 730 that would be created in tourism.

Last week Squamish council's counter-study — let's not kid ourselves, that's what it is; this study wouldn't have happened without Whistler's — comes right back with a very different number: 2,600 jobs dependent on forestry in the Squamish/Whistler/Pemberton area.

And somewhere in between, as ever, is the truth. The trouble is we're hard pressed to know where.

The Tourism Whistler study obviously low-balled the economic influence of forestry in the Sea to Sky corridor. That's hardly a surprise, since the group that commissioned it — One Whistler, a blend of groups including the Resort Municipality of Whistler and Tourism Whistler — are up to their eyeballs in tourism. Its expansion and forestry's demise in the Sea to Sky corridor would only build the Whistler juggernaut.

Squamish's study goes right to the other extreme, counting 2,600 forestry-dependent jobs in the corridor — not only direct industry jobs such as logging, sawmilling, the pulp mills and transportation, but also a host of indirect and "induced" jobs — 814 in Squamish alone worth \$29 million in wages.

The 2,400-job gap between studies is huge, but somewhat misleading. One Whistler's study looked strictly at the impact of shutting down logging in TFL 38, while Squamish's study looks at forestry employment in the entire Squamish Forest District, a much larger area which also takes into account employment at Woodfibre's pulp mill.

The fact that the Squamish study calculates indirect employment also makes a huge difference — but again, they're legitimate numbers for the purposes of the study and the methodology used to generate them is sound. Forest industry jobs tend to create a higher economic impact on their communities because of their higher wages.

But here's where the spin sets in. You would think Squamish's proximity to Vancouver must surely have some counter-effect — not every single dollar made in forestry is spent in Squamish — and that the multiplier rates would be adjusted to account fairly for this fact.

And they are — the other way. According to BC Stats' study on local area economic dependencies and impact ratios (cited in the Squamish study and available on the internet at www.bcstats.gov.bc.ca), the employment multiplier for forestry and logging jobs is 1.40, 1.32 for solid wood products and 1.72 for pulp.

Yet the Squamish study abandons those numbers in favour of ones from the Soo Timber Supply Area's Timber Supply Review, which cranks up those same multipliers to 1.60, 1.49 and 1.98 each.

It doesn't sound like much — until you apply the numbers to the study. It means a difference of 31 per cent — 325 jobs — in the indirect/induced employment category.

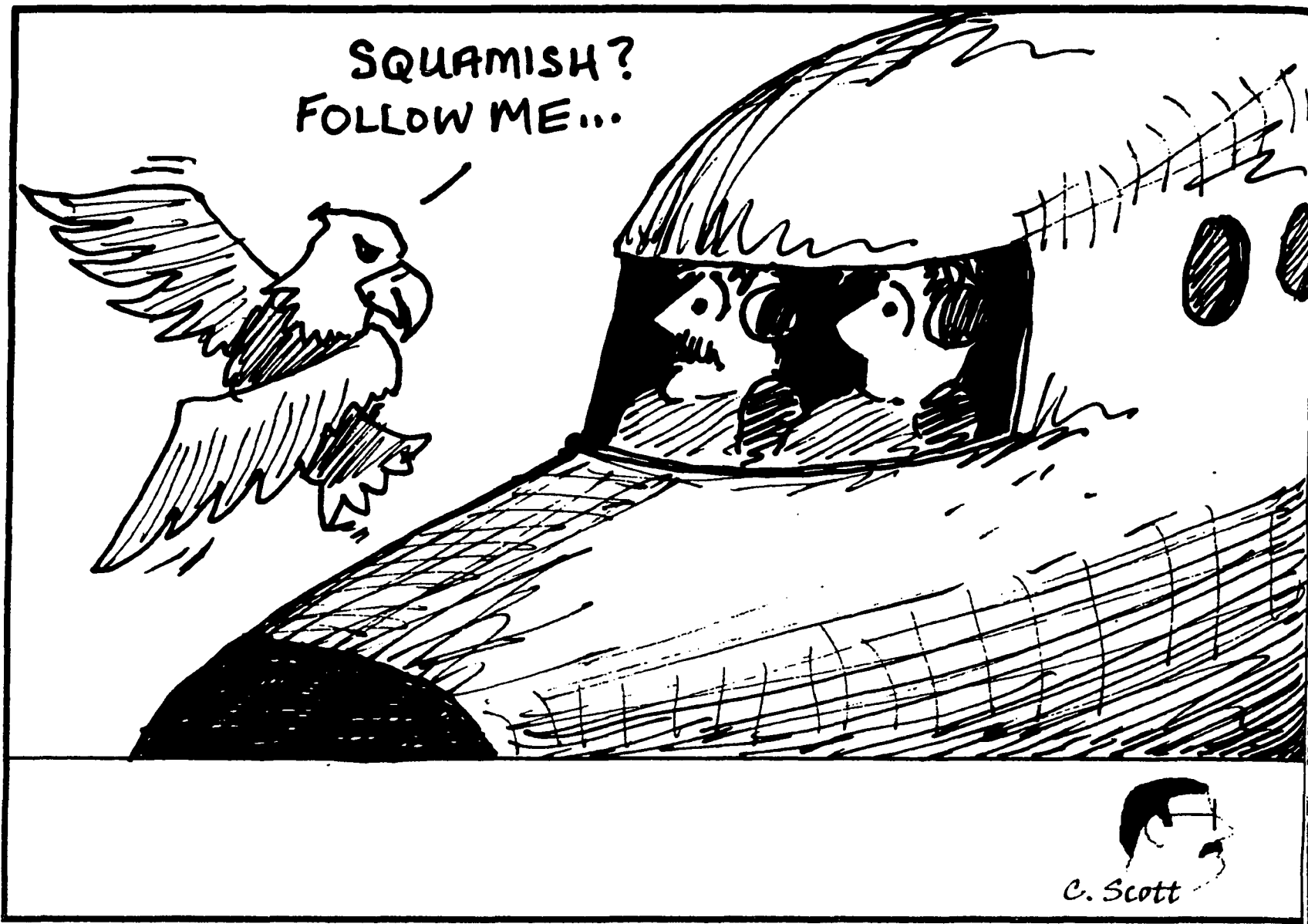
That's the type of action that will cause people to dismiss the study as little more than a number-juggling exercise. The dyed-in-the-wool environmentalists weren't listening to begin with, and Whistler council — one of the groups Squamish was supposedly trying to make a point to with this study — said as soon as the study began that they knew what results would come from it.

That means the role of this study was to be a voice of reason to the moderates and the media, to paint the preservationist side as biased. It should have tread as conservatively as possible in its calculations.

It didn't.

As a result, the survey is considered just as biased as the One Whistler study, and the media impact from it has been barely a ripple compared to the splash One Whistler made with its study and its sexier conclusions. That makes this entire exercise a \$17,000 sermon to the choir.

And that's a shame, because it could have been so much more.

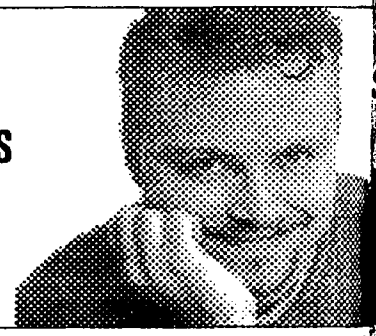
I'm not proud of the fact by any means. This is the first time since I came of voting age that I have

No downside to chip plan

Editor,
I am 100 per cent behind the chip handling facility. It provides good jobs, it is a very clean industry. It will be an asset to the community. There isn't a downside.
The south end of town has always been industrial. Like all communities and cities, the water is a working highway. Some areas have the luxury of much greater access to the ocean. We unfortunately have very limited access. Therefore the south end will always be industrial. There are a lot of industries out there that will carry a much larger town side than the chip handling facility. We should be welcoming this facility with open arms.
I am having a hard time understanding this CHIPS group. Help me out here if I

am wrong. The three major concerns that seem to come up the most are: noise, visual and air quality.
From what I have read, all concerns have been answered. This facility will be quieter than the dry land sort that has been acceptable in that location for years. Power saws will be replaced by much quieter conveyer belts.
Based on an article in The Chief, GBA is required to put up a considerable sum of money (\$97,575) as a security deposit to ensure that adequate landscaping will be done. There will be an earthen berm (a berm or dike) with ground cover (probably grass) and a mix of evergreen and alder trees planted along the top of the northern border and the waterfront.
As far as the air pollution is

concerned, it is my understanding that the working surface will be covered in blacktop, the chips are pre-screened, the conveyer belts are covered, and there will be an anti-particle mesh erected on the north border. Needless to say air pollution is not an issue. It will once again be a much cleaner work place than what exists now.
I have also read that CHIPS is concerned that this facility will have a negative effect on downtown business. Once again, untrue.
As far as hurting the business in the downtown core, tourists are totally unaware of what is going on at the south end at this time and that won't change. The amount of rail traffic will be much less than the current traffic. So the effects here will also be in a

positive nature.
So the way I see it, GBA and the District of Squamish have gone to great lengths to rectify all of the concerns brought forward by CHIPS and any concerned citizens.

I am writing to you once again over the issue of the proposed woodchip reloading facility and its long-term effect on the future of Squamish.
I have been listening intently to, Council, Oct. 3, and the arguments brought forward by opponents and protagonists of the new facility. At one point Mr. Lalli stated in the discussion over Mr. Sutherland's application to reimburse CHIPS for their legal expense that a reimbursement would likely cause a precedent for future lawsuits against the municipality of Squamish. Has it ever crossed your mind that thus you would be setting a precedent for other heavy industry to follow, the precedent you told the public in your last meeting was to be avoided?
Wasn't it you, Mayor Lonsdale, who according to the media a few months ago wrote a letter of concern to BC Rail over their intentions in conjunction with the woodchip facility to expand the tracks between Mamquam Lane and Logger's Lane all the way from the south end of Cattermole Slough to Victoria Street?
Do you recognize you will be triggering more unsightly tracks and train traffic into downtown Squamish providing transportation for the heavy industry whereas you explicitly stated in last council's meeting the tracks have got to be moved?
Don't you agree with me

that the people of Squamish — most of them your loyal taxpayers — have deserved better than having to look at heavy industry facilities, rail road tracks, and shunting sites next to their downtown core when there could be a people-friendly and inviting waterfront development instead that locals and out-of-town visitors would love to come to? Isn't it time that local families and their kids are given a chance to enjoy themselves in their own downtown on the weekends rather than having to go to Vancouver or Whistler for some entertainment?
Your decision is a pivotal point in the development of Squamish one way or the other: leaving the zoning as is will attract other businesses and merchants to the area making way for the long renewal and beautification of this town. Change the zoning to heavy industrial and you will be turning the wheel of time in reverse.
Pandora's box is waiting for you to be opened, but the blame will be entirely yours.

- A collar and leash. For a comfortable collar fit, allow a space of two fingers between the collar and neck and remember to check the fit as your puppy grows.

- A name tag with your pet's name and your phone number.

- A crate that will accommodate your dog's adult size. This will serve as a comfort place, and will aid in house training.

Supplies and equipment needed:

- A good quality commercial dry "puppy" food fed in three daily meals.
- Stainless steel "non-tip"

Pet-safe your house

- Hide or cover electrical cords and cover outlet plugs.
- Store household chemicals out of reach.
- Some house plants are poisonous so keep them out of reach.

The first days at home

- Before bringing him into the house, take him to the place in the yard where you expect him to go to the bathroom.

If he goes there, praise

him, if not, take him into the house.

- Take him into the room where his crate is and allow him to become familiar with the space.

Put bedding and a chew toy in the crate and leave it open to allow him to go in and out at will. If he soils the bedding, don't punish him, remove and wash the bedding.

- Spend time with the puppy. This will help him

recognize the pack behaviour and you as the pack leader.

Special puppy concerns

- Don't treat a puppy like an adult dog. Treat him like an infant, with patience, lots of supervision and gentleness.

- Don't bring a puppy home while on vacation so you can spend more time with him. He should be acclimatized to your normal daily routine.

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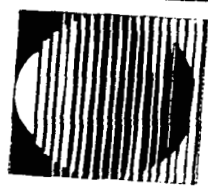

Last Monday, the Pee Wees rolled to a 26-0 win over Deep Cove.

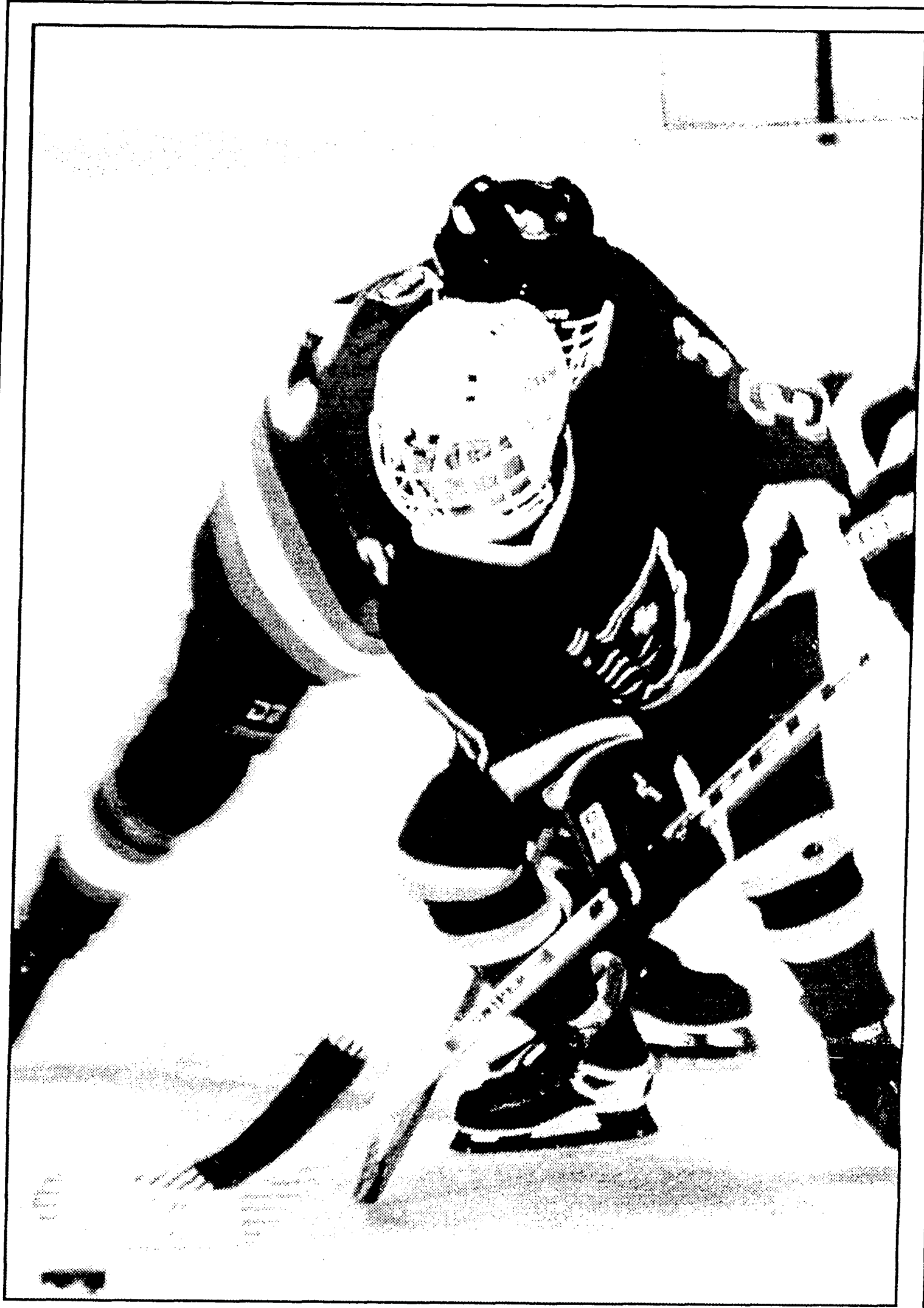
Daniel Reoch and Scott Shillito were keys in the big home win.

Senan Joseph, Josh Joseph and Greg Joseph Jr. made it 4-0 before

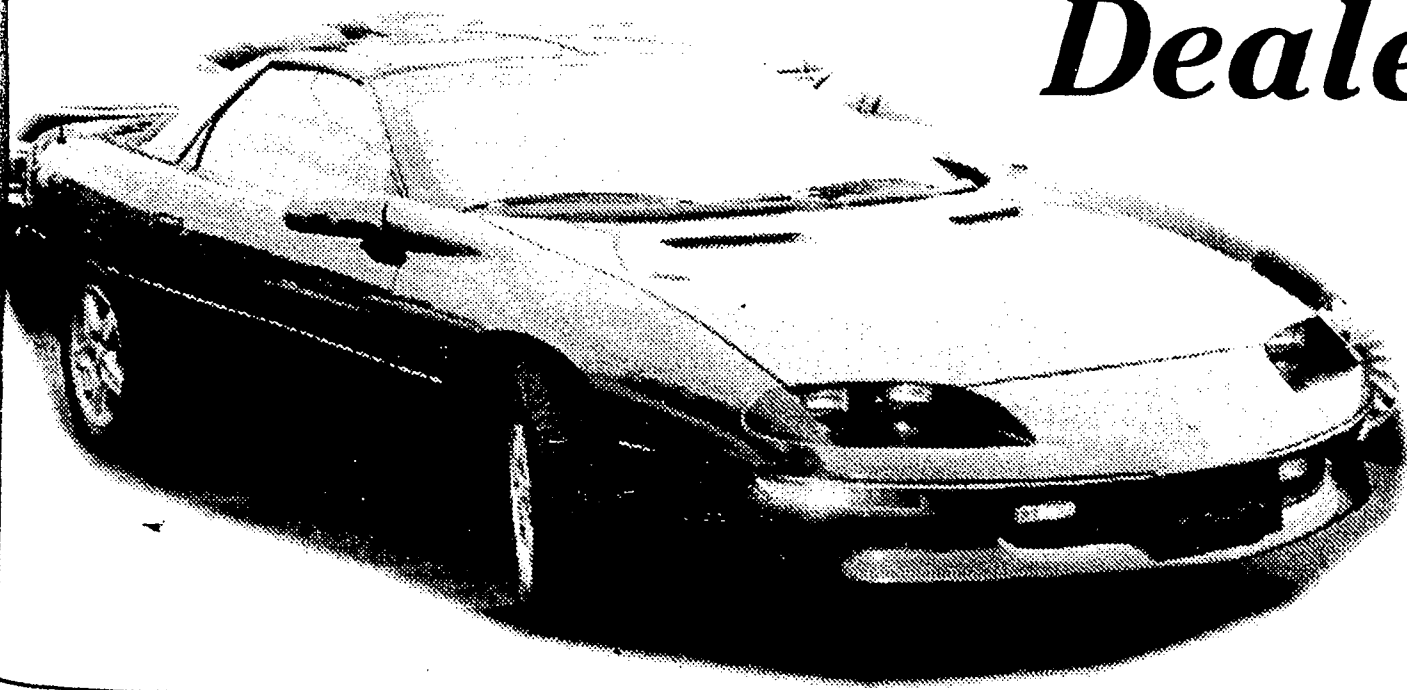
Cliffside's Mike Fieldhouse cut the lead by one at half-time.

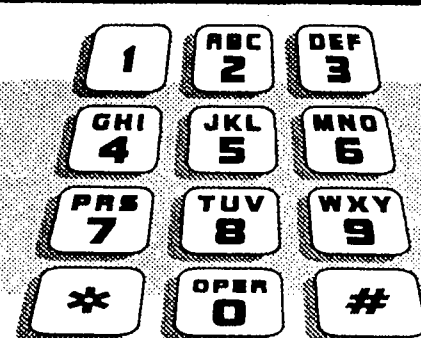

Response to "Setting the Record Straight"

We at GBA Logging Ltd. feel obligated to respond to the full page ad signed by Ted Prior and published in the Chief on page B2 October 10, 2000. We apologize to the public of Squamish for the constant barrage which they have been subjected to regarding our proposed Chip Transfer Facility. I urge you, however, to read on so that you may be better informed on the facts with regards to our proposal.

If you have any concerns about any of the following or questions in general please call the office @ 892-2360 and we will meet with you to discuss your concerns. We had intended to repudiate setting the record straight point by point. Instead, however, we have decided to be more pro-active as opposed to reactive.

Firstly, we stand by every word that we said in our information ad previously printed in the paper. We did however, make one mistake in saying the majority of council had supported us. We were awarded our original development permit with a 4-3 vote, the swing vote being the Mayor. Other than the oversight of the "politically correct" term used for expressing HOW our permit was passed, everything we printed is as we see it, the truth, period. We feel that word-twisting and posturing only serves to cloud the issue. We therefore are dedicated to sticking to the facts, only!

FACT ONE: Our development permit was overturned in BC Supreme Court on a zoning issue ONLY. It was not overturned on the basis of any potentially hazardous or aesthetic effects to Squamish. His decision was based on whether we qualified as warehousing or storage. In the judge's decision he decided we did not qualify as warehousing, therefore we did not fit I-1 zoning. Following is a quote from Mr. Justice Burnyeat's closing arguments.

"Despite the heavy investment of time and money GBA has made relating to this property, the substantial benefit which may well be available to the local economy because of the uses contemplated by GBA and despite the potential that the uses contemplated by GBA may well be preferable to the log sorting use which was previously undertaken on the property, the resolution of the council of the District of Squamish passed on May 2, 2000 must be quashed as the uses and facilities contemplated by the Development Permit Application of GBA Logging Ltd. do not comply with the zoning bylaw No. 1342."

The judges decision leaves council with the opportunity to re-zone our land to suit our project, if they so choose. This is the stage we now find ourselves at the present.

FACT FIVE: Site B, proposed by CHIPS as an alternative site, is at this time mostly under tidal water. It is years away from completion. It also has many regulatory and environmental hurdles to go through, as well as securing funding for the project. The only site in Squamish available to us that is suitable and available is the one which we presently have.

FACT SIX: We have never been opposed to tourism or any other business located near our site. The perceived industrial and tourism "logjam" that we have in Squamish, has been created by our opponents and their associates. The developers in this area purchased their property by an existing industrial area, zoned for both heavy and light industry.

FACT SEVEN: Our proposed project in **NOT** located adjacent to the Howe Sound Inn. The dryland sort next door to that pub is run by Triack Resources Ltd. At our public information meeting we will be providing tours to our site to explain its location within the industrial area. We would invite anyone interested in seeing the actual site to attend or to contact us at any time & we will walk you through the operation. Our site is not 120 feet from the walkways proposed for DOWNTOWN as described in Squamish 2000, it may be close to a proposed walkway within a PRIVATE development.

FACT EIGHT: We have designed our facility to accept trains from the tracks as they exist now and if they are relocated to enter from the back way. We would ask CHIPS to show us any form of documentation which STATES that we will impede the track relocation process.

FACT TWO: Our site will create 5-7 full time, on-site jobs AND 7 full time jobs (rail, tug etc.) off-site jobs PER SHIFT. This does not include suppliers, and other businesses which will feel ongoing benefit from our facility and local startup construction business. These jobs will be good paying jobs and will be year round.

FACT THREE: We will have cranes on-site for the construction phase ONLY. Once the initial construction of our facility is complete there will NOT be "60 foot cranes" at our facility.

FACT FOUR: Our facility is VERY different when compared to Fibreco in North Vancouver. Fibreco "throws" their chips into deep sea ships. These chips are projected through the air onto the ships, thus the concern of winds, dust particles etc. Chips at our facility are pre-screened, eliminating small air-borne particles. We will be installing a variety of measures such as "water misting systems", telescoping drop trunks and enclosed conveyor system which will ensure that we can control our product. Our facility has been designed by Engineers, whom are also "experts" in their field.

In conclusion we would like to ask some open questions directed at the author(s) of Setting the Record Straight.

Why did you invest \$200,000 since 1996 in infrastructure and material when you KNEW that we were operating, at the time, a high volume dryland sort adjacent to your proposed plans? Was the previous dryland sort more compatible with your plans? Why did you not approach us and ask us what our long range plans were prior to investing by an industrial area?

We have talked to the municipal government, and they informed us that at this time, no municipal money is slated to construct a private walkway near our site. We would ask whom is proposing this walkway, who is paying for it and whose land will it be on?

Why in your advertisement do you at one point state we will run two shifts per day yet diminish the importance of jobs available by stating we will only be creating 7 jobs? Why do you contradict yourself?

Why do you continually refer to our site as being in the downtown, when we are on Industrial land, as per the OCP, south of Vancouver Street?

Do you feel a Ship Yard which you suggested for our site in not heavy industry?

We invite anyone interested in hearing and learning about our proposed facility to attend our public information meeting. Expert spokespeople, backed with documentation, will be speaking at our public meeting on all "misinformation" CHIPS has accused us of to set the record straight. (Date TBA)
