Forestry worth \$137M: study

"Forestry feeds my family" is more than a bumper sticker slogan, according to a economic study commissioned by the District of Squamish. The forest industry in the Squamish Forest District (SFD) provides over 2,600 jobs and \$137 million to the Sea to Sky corridor each year, according to the study by D.E. Park and Associates which The Chief received Friday.

Squamish council receives the report for information at today's committee of the whole meeting. The study consultants will appear before council next week (Oct. 17) to discuss their findings.

The study calculates overall economic impact from the effects of the forest industry on other sectors, including spending by the forest industry and employees, capital spending and transportation forest products.

According to the report, direct forest industry jobs account for 24 per cent of employment in Squamish — 46 per cent of all jobs when indirect and what the study calls "induced jobs" are included.

In Pemberton, direct forest industry jobs make up 37 per cent of employment — 60 per cent including indirect and induced jobs, the report says.

Total forest sector employment in the Squamish Forest District according to the report is 1,580, including logging, forestry and silviculture (742), sawmilling and value-added processing (464) and the pulp mill at Woodfibre (374).

Also included in the report's employment estimates are forestry-related transportation jobs, including Squamish Terminals and half of BC Rail's workers in Squamish.

"Any significant threat to the forest industry in the district would be a serious concern with respect to the overall economy of the region," the report summary states.

Squamish council commissioned the report in August in response to a study commissioned by the Whistler looking at the economic impact of a proposed national park in Tree Farm Licence 38.

That study claimed that preservation and tourism of the area would create between 365 and 400 new jobs, with earnings of up to \$17.7 million in wages and up to \$63.7 million in visitor spend-

ing. The study pegged forestry job losses at between 125 and 150 direct jobs and about 80 indirect jobs worth about \$10.1 million in wages.

Squamish Mayor Corinne Lonsdale has publicly criticized that study for underestimating the importance of the forest industry. She was unavailable for comment over the long weekend.

House fire uncovers grow op

One of Squamish's oldest homes went up in flames Oct. 3, taking with it years of memories — and a marijuana growing operation.

Squamish Fire Rescue crews were called to the house at Sixth Avenue and Victoria Street just before 8 p.m.

When crews arrived, fire was showing through the roof and windows facing Victoria Street.

Three companies and about 24 firefighters attacked the blaze for more than two hours.

After the fire was put out, Squamish RCMP and fire investigators then found the grow operation in a room in the upstairs portion of the house.

Nobody was at home at the time of the fire, but the home was being rented out by a Squamish owner.

"We are suspecting that what's contributed to the fire conditions is the potential for the grow operation," said fire chief Ray Saurette, Wednesday.

"People who are renting need to be diligent about doing checkups on their facilities to ensure these types of operations don't get started. Here is the effect of what we suspect was the cause of the fire — an illegal operation."

Police executed a search warrant on Wednesday and started their investigation into the grow operation.

Part of the grow operation had been damaged by the fire, but police were able to seize approximately 100 marijuana plants from the home.

During the search, two officers became ill at the scene. It is suspected that they were exposed to toxic gases and carbon monoxide as a result of the fire. Both officers were checked at Squamish General

Hospital and later released.

"Look at this nice house. This is the sort of thing Mr. Rogers would live in," said Const. Dan Seward.

"It's sad to see it go this way, but I think it sends out a pretty clear message. If you do have people that are going to rent your property, it's good to keep an eye on what they are doing."

Insurance companies are now taking a different view of landlords who don't check on their properties, Saurette noted.

That was little comfort to the home owner of this house, who was on hand Wednesday but not allowed into the house as investigators searched through the debris.

"I thought I had some good renters. Now I don't know if I'll be able to pay my mortgage," said the owner of the house, who declined to give his name.

The cause of the fire and the grow operation are both still under investigation.

A Visitor Information Centre Counsellor day in the life

I arrive at work, turn off the alarm, open the windows and unlock the outside public bathrooms. I take out the visitor information flag and sandwich board sign, plus my step stool as I need a little help to put the flag in the special pole in front of our building. I then turn the sign in the window to "Open" for the day.

When visitors come into the Chamber of Commerce/ Visitor Info Centre I am asked many questions such as "I'm here for 30 minutes, 1 hour, 1 day, or longer — what can I do?" I always ask the visitor open-ended questions: "What are your interests? Are you looking for shopping or native arts and culture?" I offer visitors our Chamber member map, pointing out several locations that could be of interest. These include gift shops, art galleries, restaurants, tours, The BC Museum of Mining, or the West Coast Railway Heritage Park. Community visitor guides, publications and brochures are handed out as resources for more detailed information.

"Are you interested in any particular type of outdoor recreation activity?" Perhaps a short walk around the Squamish Estuary, as it is within walking distance of the information centre. We also have rafting, biking, hiking, rock climbing, kayaking, horseback riding, etc. Several times a day we answer many questions about Garibaldi Park and hiking in the area. Quite often visitors are not wearing appropriate foot wear and are not prepared for back country hiking. Many visitors believe Garibaldi Park is a city park much like Stanley Park! We make available the most current Garibaldi trail report and the Garibaldi park map. I use a variety of maps and visitor guides of the area. I also suggest points of interests such as Shannon Falls, The Chief, Alice Lake, and Brandywine Falls, etc., just to name a few. These points of interest are usually 5 - 30 minute walks from Hwy. 99.

Visitors who are on their way to Whistler want to know points of interests along the way, how long it will take to get to Whistler, information on Whistler itself,

activities they have and often request a map. As with other Visitor Info Centres, we also carry extensive information on most B.C. communities. If we do not have what they require, we try to track it down or direct them to where they can get the correct information.

Visitors from the Royal Hudson and Harbour Cruises boat tours ask many questions. These ranging from: Where do they go to board the Harbour Cruise boat? Where do they board the Railway Park bus? and What restaurants are close by? The boat and train tours are in Squamish for 1 1/2 or 2 hours.

Combining visitors from the boat/train day trip with people off the highway, the Visitor Info Centre can have anywhere from 50-250 visitors in day. Before the Royal Hudson Tour arrives from North Vancouver (we call it train day), I help visitors with their requests, plus I try to catch up on my other duties. I answer phone enquiries as well as e-mail requests. If the office is really busy with visitors and there is a phone inquiry, we will take their name & number and get back to them as soon as possible. I mail relocation and tourism packages all over the world to visitors who enquire about Squamish. I fax replies & requests to other Visitor Info Centres regarding our visitor guides or any other community information that is required.

I'm also constantly stocking and updating brochures and flyers to keep information as accurate as possible. Brochure racks must be kept tidy and visually appealing at all times. This is a daily process.

I record on a daily basis a variety of statistics, broken down into the weekly, monthly, and yearly statistics. This is part of our contract with Tourism BC. The statistics consists of the main headings of: Administration, Visitor Origin, Nights in Community, Information requested and Community Specific Information.

At the end of the day I close all the windows, lock the public bathrooms, bring in the visitor information sign, plus the two-metre-long flag with my ever present step stool. I turn the "Open" sign to "Closed" and have things ready for the next day of greeting visitors.

Info Centre gets Grand Slam

The Squamish Visitor Information Centre scored 97 per cent on its second Quality Service Evaluation for 2000. Squamish already received a 95 per cent rating earlier this June. This is the fourth consecutive time that the Info Centre has received an over 90 per cent rating from Tourism BC.

In 1999 the score was 99 per cent followed by 93 per cent later that year. Squamish was recognized by Tourism BC as one of only six centres in BC to score an average of 98.5 per cent for an evaluation in 1999.

Each summer, Tourism BC conducts Quality Service Evaluations on the 114 official Visitor Info Centre in BC. The scores ranged from 54 per cent to 99 per cent with an average of 87 per cent. Each of the Centres are "shopped" twice between May and September by a mystery visitor. The visitor evaluates everything from the accessibility of the building, to the quality and nature of the service provided. VICs can receive a maximum score of 175 points.

The Chamber of Commerce has a contract with Tourism BC and the District of Squamish, under a fee for service agreement, to run the Visitor Information Centre. The office will be open Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. - 5 p.m. and on the weekends and holidays from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. until May 2001.

Vandals run wild in Elaho

Five bridges spiked, \$50,000 in damage to equipment

In what appears to be the Sea to Sky corridor's largest incident of property crime this year, vandals spiked five bridges and trashed two pieces of equipment in Tree Farm Licence 38 overnight between Oct. 2 and Oct. 3.

The vandalism took place between Mile 22 and Mile 37 of the Upper Squamish Valley logging road, and was discovered before 5 a.m. by an Elaho Logging Ltd. manager driving out to work.

Most believe the vandalism is linked to the conflict over logging of the upper Elaho Valley, which has been the target of a multitude of protests.

"It's getting pretty frightening," International Forest Products (Interfor)'s south coast general manager, Keith Rush, said Friday. "These guys mean business. Although we're the target, with the bridge spiking they don't seem to care who gets hurt."

Over 200 20-centimetre (eight-inch) spikes were pounded into the timber bridges, the heads cut off with bolt cutters. Football-sized rocks and boulders were placed near and on the bridges.

Rush pointed out logging roads are public-use, and at speed a blown tire could send a vehicle over the bridges' low railings into the river.

Between repairs to a road grader and a log loader, plus renting a replacement loader,

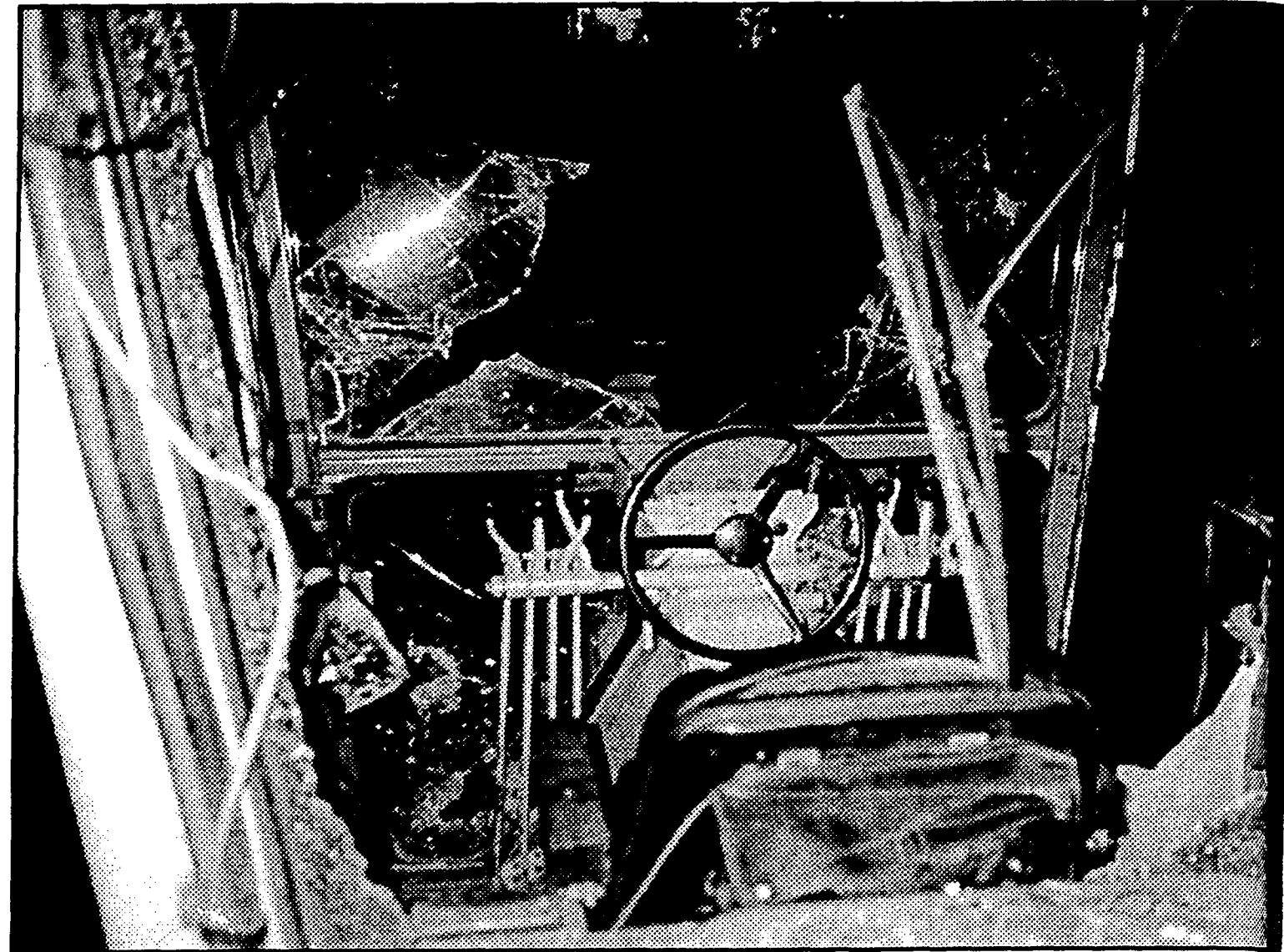

the vandalism is estimated to cost about \$50,000.

"The road grader was extensively damaged. Every last piece of glass was broken, any piece of electrical wire was cut, anything they could get their bolt cutters around they cut," Rush said.

"It was pretty sad to see."

The loader was less damaged, likely because of the steel cage surrounding the cabin. However, all hydraulic and fuel lines were cut, the engine attacked and gravel poured into all fluid tanks, which could destroy the loader's hydraulic system.

In addition, a water tower was knocked over and dragged into the middle of the road.

Squamish RCMP spoke with protesters camped at Mile 36.5, who said they had

no knowledge of the vandalism, Squamish RCMP detachment commander S/Sgt. Cliff Doherty said Oct. 3.

"While the investigators encountered persons of interest, they were unable to locate any firm suspects," he said.

Doherty said Friday the RCMP will not re-establish the 24-hour presence they maintained at Lava Creek in the upper Elaho for several weeks this summer, but will continue with random patrols.

Rush said Interfor will request the RCMP return to full-time monitoring.

"Every time they go away, something really [terrible] happens," he said.

Shortly after the RCMP withdrew from Lava Creek in late August a grapple yarder was tampered with, in such a manner a chest-sized steel

wheel was sent flying with enough force to kill. Less than two weeks later the bridge over the Squamish River in the Elaho Valley was spiked.

No arrests have been made in either case.

"I can see it hurts Interfor's business. It also hurts what we're trying to do," Joe Foy, campaign director for the Western Canada Wilderness Committee (WCWC), said Thursday.

"If any member of the public has information on the individual or individuals responsible for this, we have a \$5,000 reward for that person," Foy said of WCWC's standing reward for information on eco-terrorism.

"It might be eco-terrorism but we don't know that," he said, adding if it is "I'd be the first one to turn the key to lock them away."

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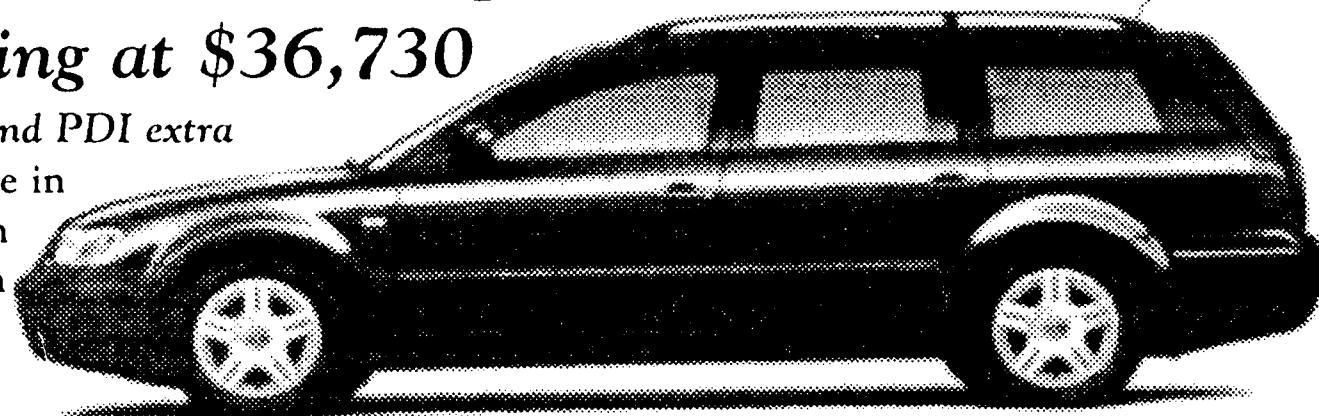

Evidence presented in Byron Blue trial

Evidence will be presented this week in Vancouver as the first-degree murder trial for Squamish resident Byron Blue enters its fourth week.

The trial started Sept. 18 in Vancouver Supreme Court and for the past three weeks lawyers for the defence and Crown have been presenting a number of pre-trial items to the court.

A publication ban on any details of the case is still in effect.

Blue's lawyer Richard Fowler said Friday once they start in front of the jury, the publication ban will be lifted, although a ban will remain on any details pertaining to the undercover operations that were conducted by police.

Blue is facing first-degree murder charges in connection to the death of 12-year-old Judy Howey in May of 1964.

Blue was arrested March 11, 1998 by Squamish RCMP and has spent more than two years in custody going through court appearances and pre-trial hearings.

Hydro pays grants in lieu of taxes

Anti-fluoride speakers dominate

Doctors, dentists decline to debate speakers against fluoridation

What was to be a question-and-answer session on the issue of fluoridation of Squamish's water instead turned into a series of speeches on the evils of fluoride.

The District of Squamish set up a public information meeting Oct. 3 to provide voters with more information prior to them heading to the polls Saturday (Oct. 14).

The idea was for a person from each side of the fluoride debate to give a presentation, then take questions from the audience. Instead, three people stood and attacked fluoridation on medical, social and constitutional grounds.

Dr. Lori Vanzella, one of the dentists and doctors who asked Squamish council to add fluoridation to the already-planned airport referendum, spoke first.

He laid out the 70-year history of fluoride as a tool in the prevention of dental decay, the thousands of studies done on it and its endorsement by medical organizations the world over.

"It benefits the entire community, and those benefits are not dependent on economic circumstances or access to dental care," he said.

He was followed by Jack Fowler, a local health food store owner opposed to fluoride.

It had been expected Len Greenall, a director of the Burnaby-based Health Action Network Society (HANS), would speak, but he decided otherwise.

Fowler argued because people are uninformed about fluoride they should vote no, that it was an intrusion on personal choice and fluoride being added to water supplies is toxic waste.

He quoted extensively from one doctor, a researcher at the University of Toronto. Vanzella later noted the only study that doctor has published in the medical world promoted fluoridation, before he changed his views.

"Dr. Lineback suggests doctors who promoted fluoridation may one day be held liable for damage caused by fluorosis," Fowler said.

He also argued costs, saying

HANS told him the estimated \$90-\$150,000 installation estimates are too low, and don't include storage.

In fact, those numbers were obtained by the district and include storage; the equipment to add fluoride only is estimated at \$30,000.

Fowler was followed by three audience members, all of whom spoke against fluoride.

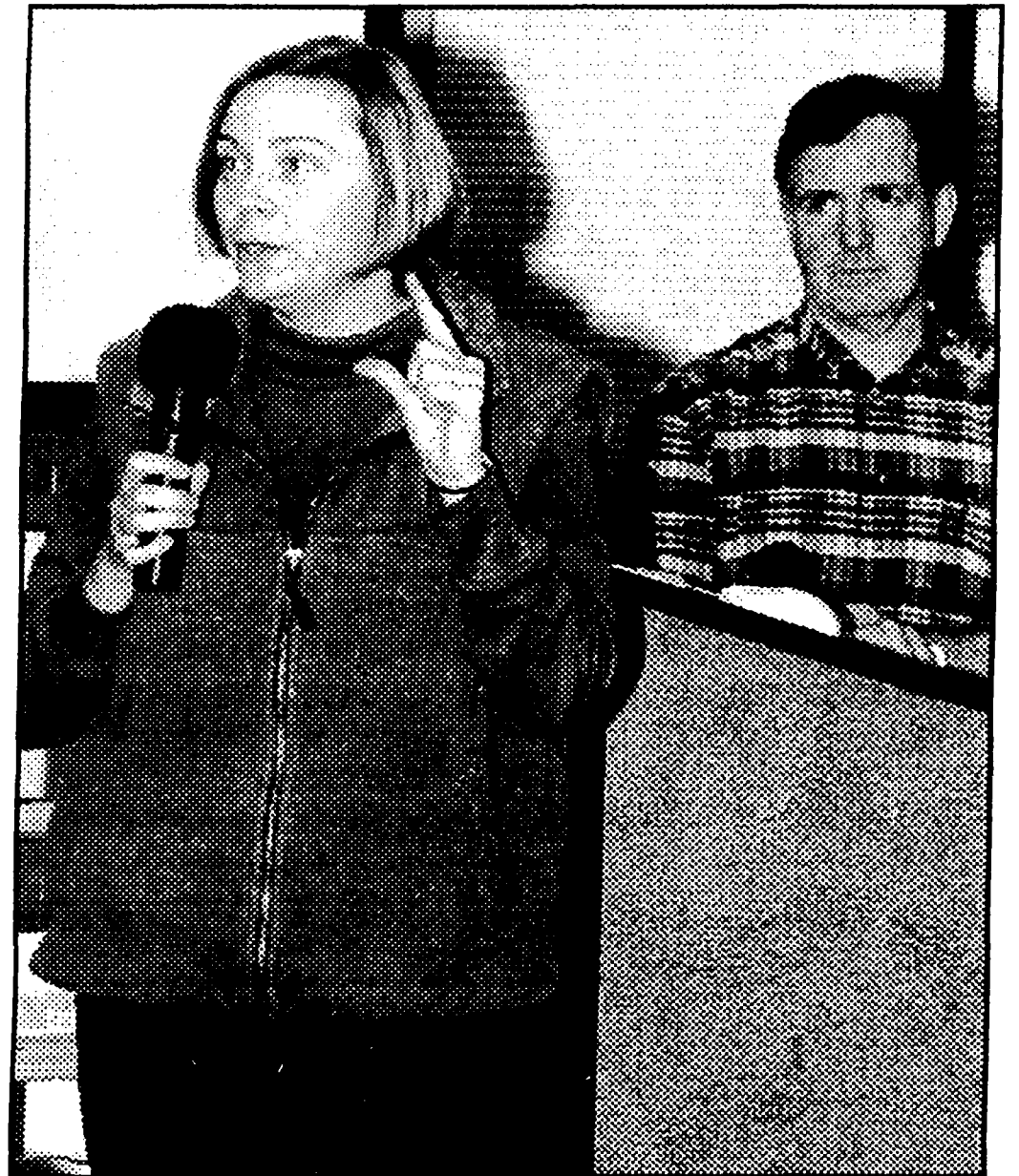
Among the points made was that most of the fluoride will actually never be consumed and is a waste, and that it would be more economical for the district to offer free fluoride supplements to parents.

There was also mention, several times, that despite B.C. having the lowest percentage of the population drinking fluoridated water, it is also the province with the least tooth decay.

(The Chief has been unable to confirm this claim, as the last time dental decay was subject to a provincial study was in 1981.)

None of the physicians in the room responded to the various statements made by anti-fluoridationists.

"We learned a few years ago that to get into a debate it is a no-win situation," Vanzella

said Friday.

"I wish people had asked questions ... we had the research and the answers right there."

"The lack of questions is bad, because people have to be interested," said Fowler.

Both, however, encouraged people to seek more information. Fowler recommended the Internet several times, while Vanzella cautioned anything can be put on the Internet without verification of its factuality.

Airport information meeting a tame affair

A public information meeting on airport development Oct. 3 did not go as expected.

Hundreds of people did not show up, angry opinions were not expressed at high volume and loads of anti-development questions were not thrown at district administrator Grant McRadu.

Instead, a generous estimate puts attendance at under 100, with only a few asking questions, though some were noticeably pointed.

The District of Squamish held the meeting to provide residents with information

before they vote Oct. 14 on a referendum on permitting 10 long-term leases for airport businesses.

McRadu and the Squamish Flying Club's John Hurford tag-teamed a presentation on the airport, touching on its history but concentrating on its current state and governing regulations.

The airport's resource zoning and Official Community Plan designation as "other — airport" permit current operations and proposed uses.

However, under the Cheeky Fan Terrain Hazard and Land Use Study Design Policy the environment ministry requires an

assessment before it will approve subdividing the land for lease purposes.

Asked what form that protection would take, McRadu said the ministry wants a study to determine that.

To make it easier to construct facilities the district wants to see those restrictions relaxed, from a dike to perhaps an early-warning system.

"The maximum amount of debris that's going to come down there is eight to 12 inches of mud," said McRadu. "And that's from the ministry."

While this would be a problem for residential areas, it would not be a major concern

for hangers and the like.

"We want to be able to go to them [Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks] and say our community is behind this, under certain conditions," McRadu said of doing the referendum.

"If they say no, our question to them will be 'Why did you give us the land for an airport?'"

"We do have lease requests from a number of people, and that's what lead to this referendum," said McRadu. "There are 40 businesses that operate at that airport. That's 40 businesses we have no control over."

By leasing land to business-

es, the district could not only tax them, but require sewer and water service be brought in as facilities are developed, McRadu said. The leases could also be worded to restrict certain activities, e.g. flights after midnight.

Asked whether the district believes there is no economic benefit from the eagles, which opponents fear will be harmed by airport development, Hurford replied: "Right now we have no leases, therefore we have no way to ensure they adhere to our regulations."

For instance, the district cannot require operators follow flight paths created in 1998 to avoid disturbing the eagles.

Chip rhetoric heats up council

Mayor Corinne Lonsdale refused a public call to resign Oct. 3 as the rhetoric over the wood chip handling facility grows more heated.

Ian Sutherland, president of Citizens for a Healthy, Innovative and Prosperous Squamish (CHIPS), appeared before council to ask the district to cover the cost of lobby group's successful fight against the development permit granted for the facility.

CHIPS spent \$20,000 in a successful bid to have the permit quashed by a B.C. Supreme Court judge, who ruled the chip handling was a general industrial use not permitted by the site's light industrial zoning.

If council agreed, Sutherland said the money would be donated to a local charity or earmarked for downtown revitalization works.

"If anybody takes an honest and hard look at what happened on May 2, council and the district as a whole had an opportunity to look back and take a couple weeks," he said.

He pointed out a motion from Coun. Shelley Smith to defer the permit, so the zoning issue could be clarified, was defeated 4-3 by Lonsdale and councillors Cheryle Bass, Paul Lalli and Wendy Magee.

However, council unanimously supported Lalli's motion to not pay CHIPS' legal costs.

The decision drew applause from half the crowded chamber; Sutherland's speech had

drawn applause from the rest.

As proponents GBA Logging Ltd. submitted a rezoning application for the dry land log sort on the Cattermole Slough last week, council also permitted speakers on the issue at their meeting — but only one on each side.

Stephen Shard, co-owner of the Howe Sound Inn and Brewing Company, represented those opposing the facility's location near the downtown. He was careful, though, to state he did not represent CHIPS.

"It appears there is a movement to blacklist the Brew Pub because we are perceived as anti-logging, because we oppose the location of the proposed wood chip facility," said Shard, who spent most of his 20 minutes attacking the idea that the chip facility dispute is about forestry rather than geography.

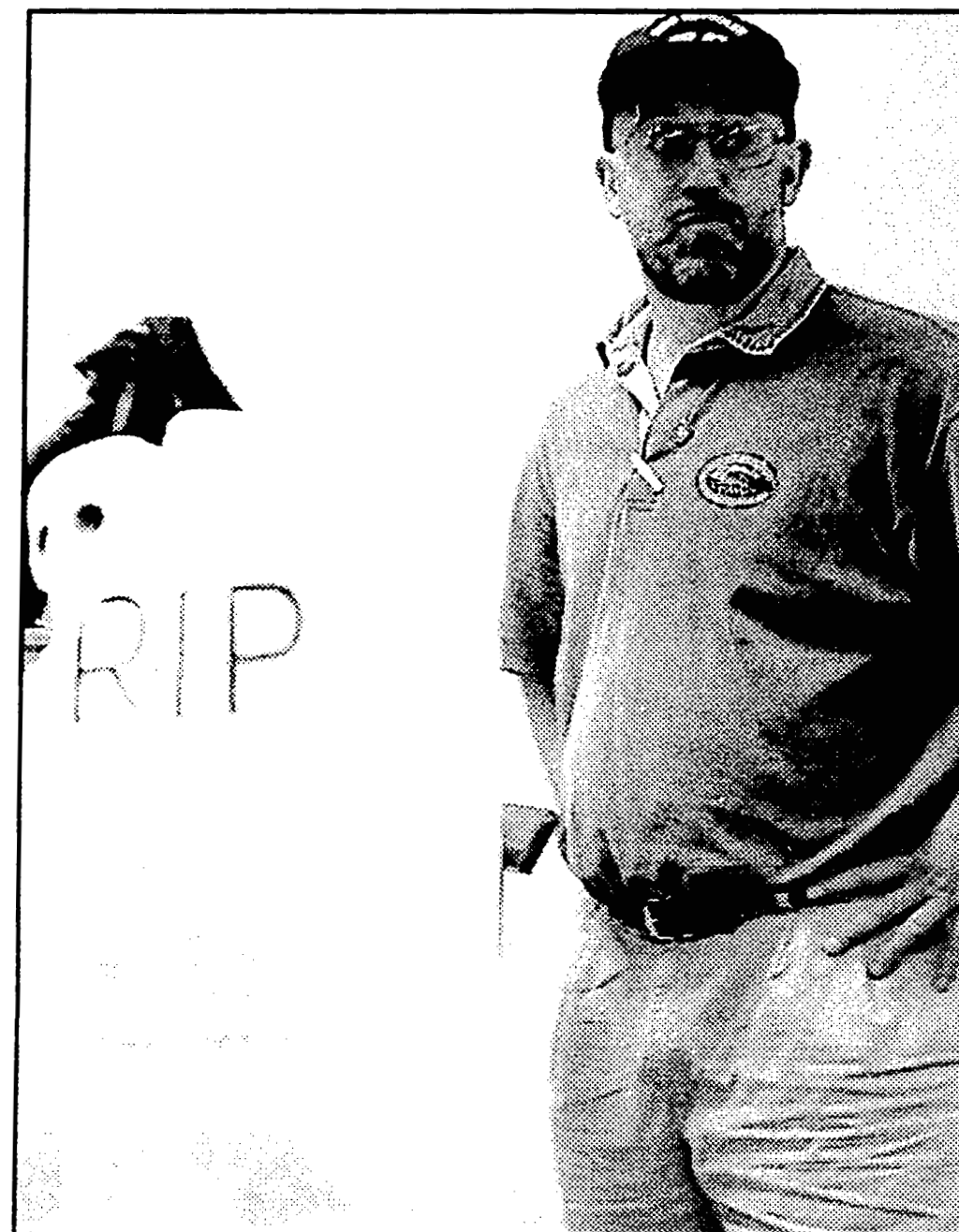
"CHIPS supporters are likened to the chimpanzees who hung themselves in the trees in the Elaho [Valley]," Shard said. "That isn't fair."

"Greg, good luck with your rezoning application. May the town win."

He then offered Lonsdale a broken power head for a built-in vacuum cleaner, describing it as rigid and difficult to alter once installed.

When Lonsdale asked him to explain himself in plain English, Shard said: "I do believe it's time for you to move on, mayor. I believe enough damage has been done over the last year, and very little progress."

"I don't want to disappoint

any of you ... but I have no intention of resigning," Lonsdale replied.

Shard and Lonsdale each drew applause, again from separate groups.

GBA president Greg Richmond also spoke, though he noted he was without the props Shard used in his presentation.

Richmond expounded on the site's location in an industrialized area and the need to support the forest industry.

"Do we not have an [Official

Community Plan] that says south of Vancouver Street is industrial?" he asked. "Is the downtown adjacent to Interfor's dry sort? We're trying to ensure the forest industry survives in Squamish. If we fall here, we start falling everywhere," Richmond said.

Different story from witnesses to school fights

Students dispute allegations as three go to school board

Three students go before the Howe Sound School District's suspension hearing committee today (Oct. 10) for their parts in a pair of fights last month — one on school property — that caused a 16-year-old Howe Sound Secondary School student to be taken to hospital.

But some students are coming forward to dispute the version of events that the victim's father presented last week.

The student's father told The Chief last week that his daughter was surrounded at the school parking lot by a group of girls, two of whom punched her, dragged her to the ground and began to kick and punch her.

But a pair of students who say they were at the incident but not involved, came to The Chief Thursday claiming the girl started the incident herself, coming out of her car and going towards the girls. They claim she tried to slap the girl, then punched another before being pulled off her and pinned to the ground.

Nobody would have touched her if she hadn't come over to us," said one of the witnesses, who asked not

to be named.

Another student who called The Chief Tuesday also claimed the victim was the first to throw a punch after trying to slap one girl and having a can of pop dumped on her.

In the second incident at an outdoor party in Brackendale Sept. 22, the girl who was punched confronted the victim at the party and punched her before being pulled off, the girls said Thursday.

The girls say the victim got up and drove away under her own power and was not in danger of her life.

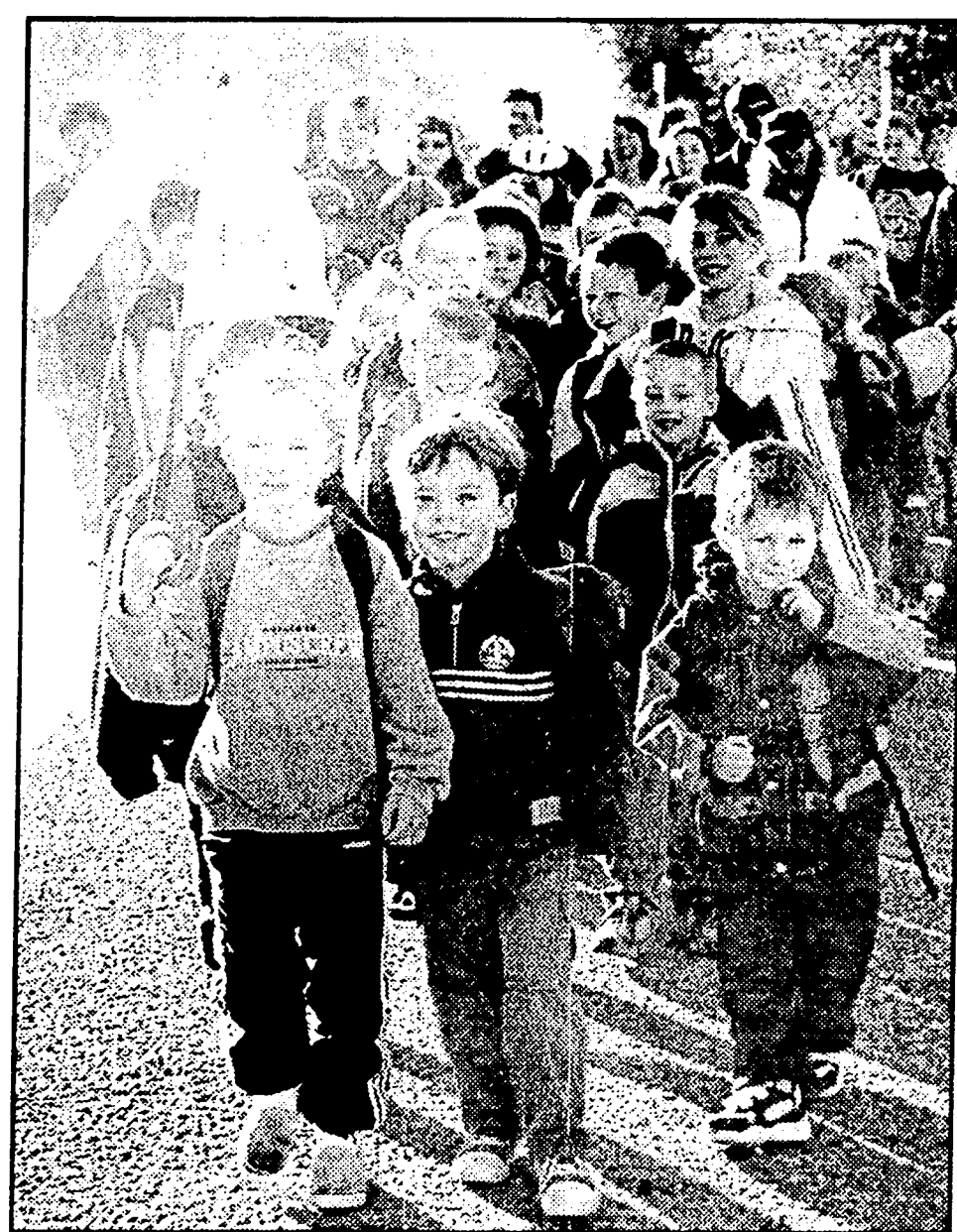
The student's father also alleged that a fellow student "contracted" an attack against his daughter — a charge that the student, another Grade 12 girl, denies.

Howe Sound Secondary vice-principal Stephen Jupe, who investigated the schoolyard incident, declined to comment on any aspects of the incidents until investigations by the school district and the police are complete.

"We're pretty clear on what we feel about violence," he said. "Our intent is to keep this a safe and secure place for students."

A group of school staff are planning to go to a workshop on bullying at the University of British Columbia on the school's next professional development day, Jupe added.

Two girls ages 15 and 17 are also facing criminal charges of assault after the incidents.

Protesters charge RCMP with assault

An RCMP inspector now faces aggravated assault charges, even as the four protesters whose lives he is accused of endangering await their next court appearance.

Inspector Bud Mercer, a member of the Surrey RCMP and head of the Aerial Extraction Team, is being charged with four counts of aggravated assault.

His first court appearance is Nov. 28 in Squamish provincial court.

The charges stem from a tree-sitting protest July 26-Aug. 2 over the Lava Creek gorge in the upper Elaho Valley. Four protesters occupied two trees on platforms that would supposedly fall if a

wire connecting them to a truck blocking the bridge was cut. "He [Mercer] admits aside from pulling on the ropes to see if they had tension on them, the only information he had was prior information from Cpl. Steve Leclair," said protesters' lawyer Robert Moore-Stewart.

Protesters say when Mercer cut the lines without issuing a warning, causing the platforms to drop several feet, only luck allowed them to grab onto branches and not fall out of the trees into the gorge.

The charges were privately brought by Dennis Zarelli, one of the tree-sitters, and signed Sept. 26 by Squamish justice of the peace Leanne Dunbar, paving the way for

Mercer to be charged by the Crown if it so chooses.

The tree-sitters' case was put back again Sept. 26, with their next appearance Oct. 10.

Five of the six protesters convicted Sept. 14 of criminal contempt of court for protests last year in the Elaho have launched appeals of their sentences. This includes Betty Krawczyk and Barney Kern,

who received a record one-year jail term. They have appeals in the works but are not seeking release, as their release terms would include a prohibition on travelling into the Elaho. The other three were released pending their appeals; Reasha Wolfe was sentenced to three months, while Jason Paine and Christopher Nolan were given two months.

Crash kills Squamish woman, closes Hwy. 99

Hwy. 99 claimed another life Wednesday night in a two-car collision at Brew Creek Road.

24-year-old Lisa Louise Psychonick of Squamish died at the scene after the white Ford Escort she was driving crossed over into the north-bound lane of traffic and collided head-on with a green Ford pick-up.

The driver and passenger of the Ford sustained non-life threatening injuries and were transported to the Whistler Medical Centre, police said.

The highway was closed for more than three hours while police and emergency-crews cleared the scene.

Cpl. Joe Schofield of the Squamish RCMP Highway Control said drugs and alcohol were not factors in the accident. "We can guess on what the cause is, but we probably will never know," Schofield said, adding that an autopsy and a toxicology report will likely be done. "We're still taking witness statements and from what we understand it happened very quickly."

Wednesday's accident was the third fatal accident in the area to Sky Corridor in two months.

Three charges have been laid against a Squamish man in connection to a hit and run involving a motorcycle on Sept. 20.

Daniel Gordon Morrice has been charged with one count of impaired driving, one count of driving over .08 and one count of failing to remain at scene of an accident.

Morrice appeared in Squamish provincial court on Sept. 26 to face the charges and has been released on an undertaking to not operate a motor vehicle.

The incident took place just after 8 p.m. on Sept. 20 on Cleveland Avenue. At the scene, police credited witness for providing quick and accurate information on the location of the vehicle as it was found driving on the dike along Government Road.

Police are investigating a break-in enter that occurred at the Squamish Elementary School between Sept. 30 and Oct. 1. Taken from inside a classroom were various school supplies and a monocular device for the blind.

The monocular device is similar to binoculars and was used to assist a blind student in seeing the blackboard and is valued at \$250, police said.

In addition to the break-in, vandals spray painted graffiti on the outside wall of the school. Police have no suspects, but are asking the public to contact the detachment at 898-9611.

RCMP would like to dispel a number of rumours that have surfaced in the community about a number of alleged

sexual attacks. Cpl. Don Orthner said police are not looking for a sexual predator as has been reported by people in the community.

Police investigated a report of a man with binoculars under the Mamquam overpass looking at students from Mamquam Elementary School on Sept. 19 and a second incident involving another man on the overpass trying to lure kids to him on Oct. 3.

"The first incident, turned out to be a transient type of fellow from Vancouver, who we checked out, released and have not seen him since," Orthner said.

"The second incident was reported too late to us and we have not seen the suspect since. We want to ensure the community that there is not a predator out there."

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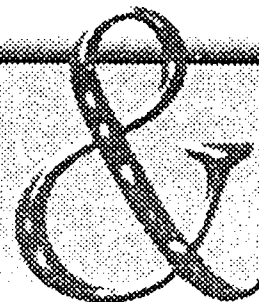
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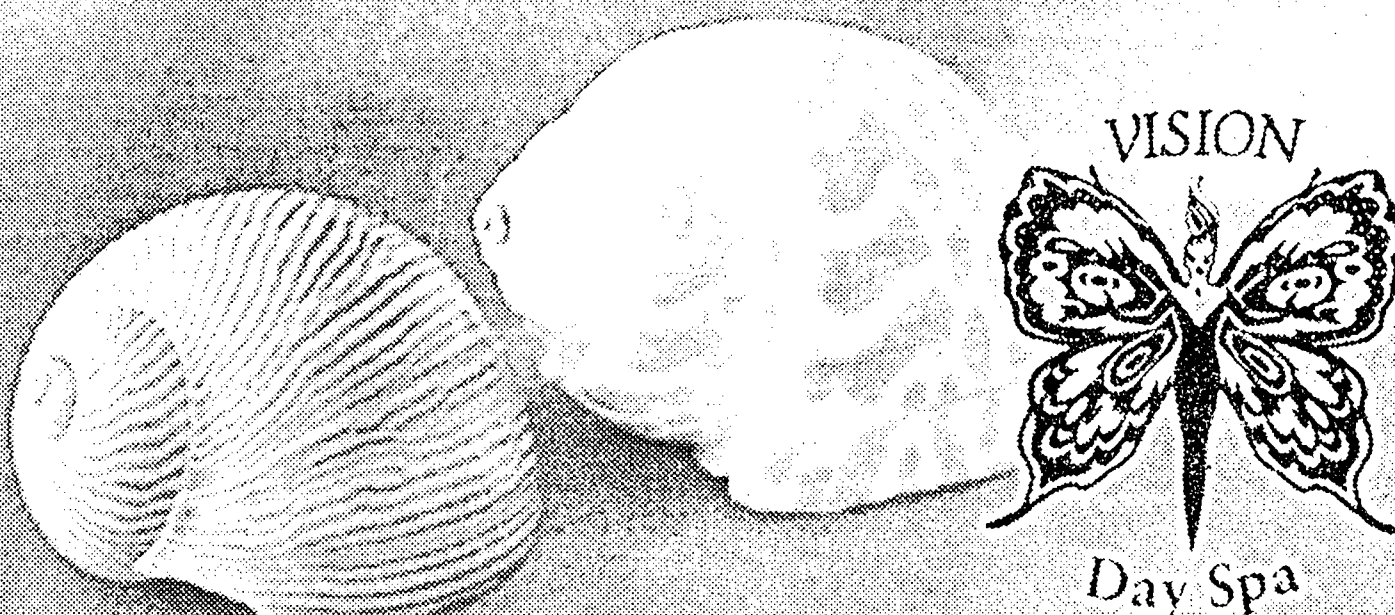


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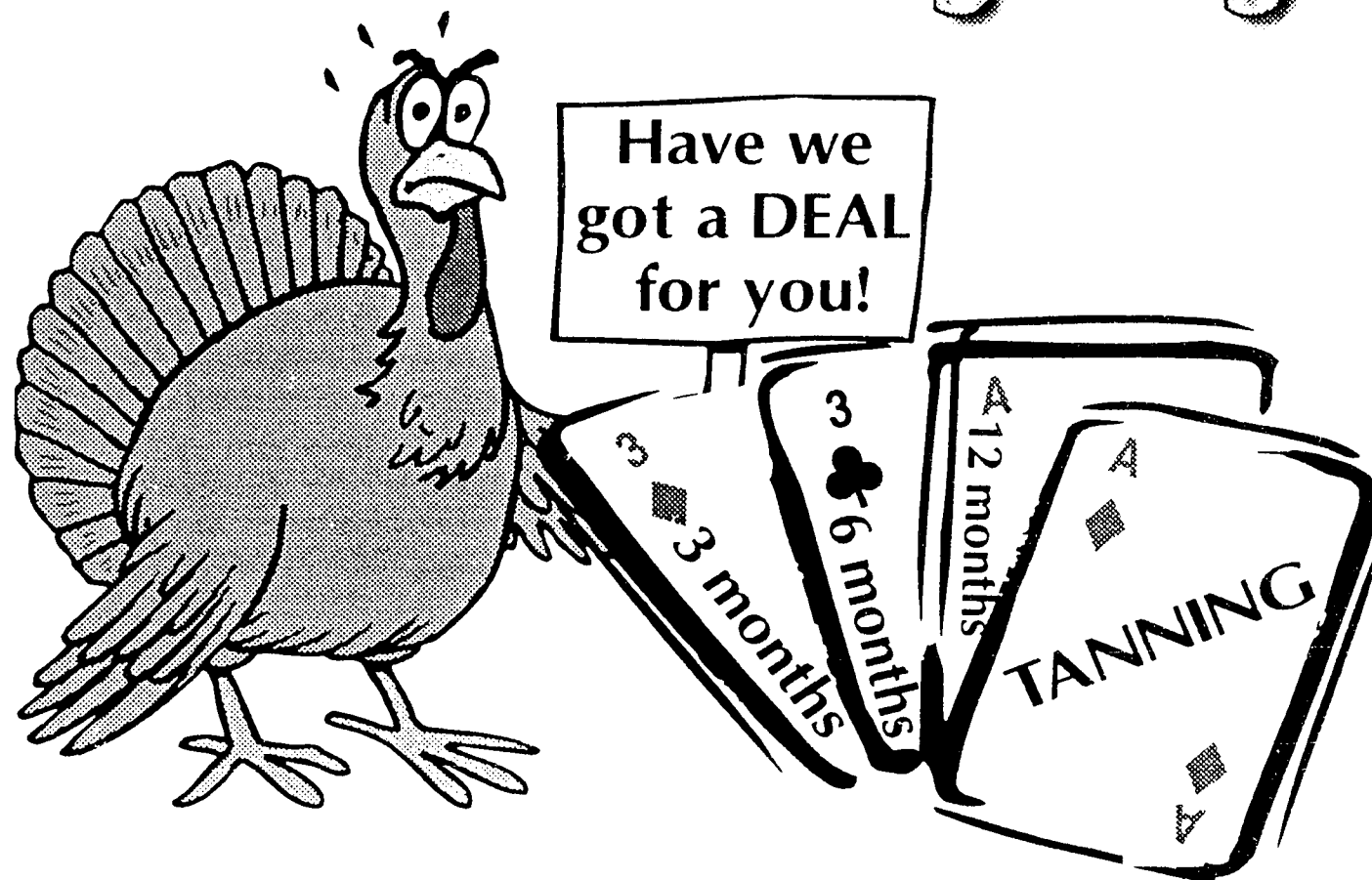

District staff take strike vote

Municipal staff voted 98 per cent in favour of a strike vote Wednesday, The Chief has learned, but both sides say negotiations are continuing.

"We're just in the process of negotiations," Allen said. "They're continuing on."

While the process is slow, the approach of negotiating on what's in the best interest of the district has the bargaining moving forward, said District Administrator Grant McRadu. "This is just normal process in bargaining."

McRadu characterized the discussions as amiable.

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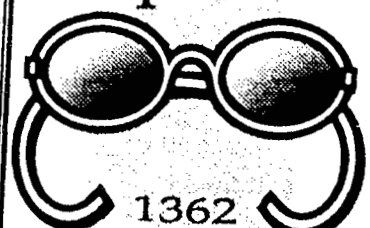

Mormon missionaries land in Squamish

A pair of Mormon missionaries will be spending a few months in Squamish — but they'll be doing much more than knocking on doors. Elders Doug Taylor and Christopher Barber arrived in Squamish from the B.C. interior last month. The two missionaries from the Church of Jesus Christ Latter-Day Saints (LDS), both from the U.S., are spending two years in B.C. before continuing their college education.

"It's a unique opportunity to serve full-time in the ministry," said Taylor, who returns to Brigham Young University in Utah after the mission work. The two are among 60,000 LDS missionaries around the world.

Their trip is self-financed, although local members provide social support to the pair.

While their primary mission is to teach about the church, including door-to-door work, they'll be doing plenty of volunteer work while they're here including stop-smoking courses, working in the Squamish Soup Kitchen and offering free genealogical research.

They'll also be working especially on strengthening families.

"We teach about our church, of course, but we also build up families," said Taylor.

"If you strengthen families, you strengthen society."

Squamish is a unique experience for the pair, because the LDS community is not as built up as it is in other communities.

The local LDS branch has about 80 members in the Sea to Sky corridor.

The LDS, who have the largest genealogical research site in the world, will have a display at the local branch on Ross Road Oct. 21.

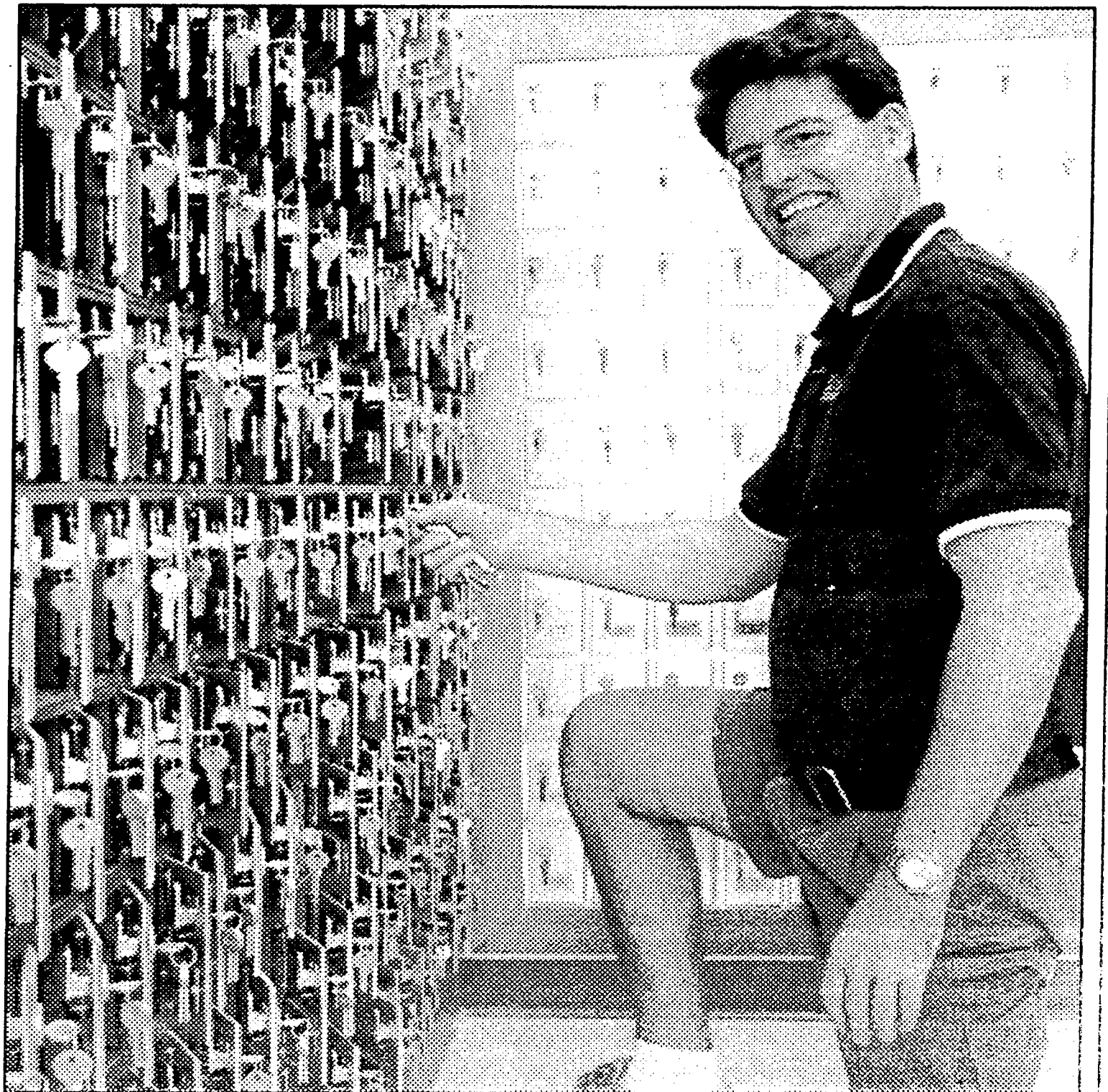
tine and flamenco guitar virtuoso Juan de Marias, who has just returned from Spain."

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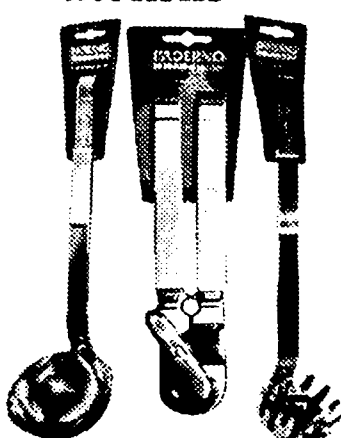
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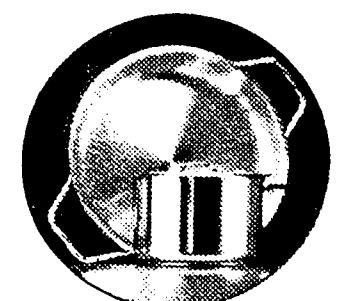

We know that Squamish's citizens care when we have to abandon the regular design and turn this page over to them to express their views — as we're doing today.

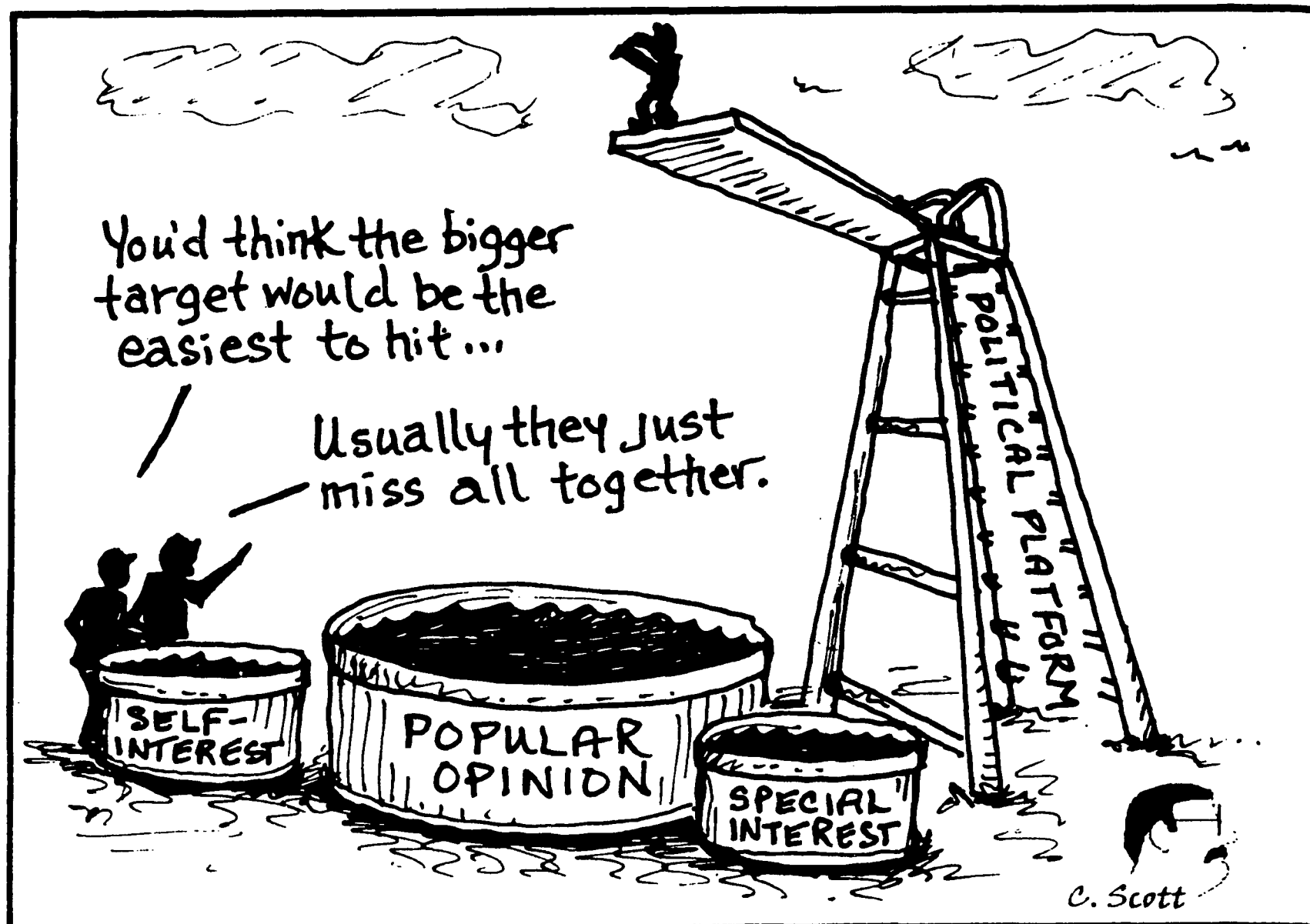
But as we head towards Saturday's vote, we have to ask: will a minority speak on behalf of the majority at the ballot box?

It's ironic that voter turnout is highest for federal and provincial elections, yet lower for municipal elections — the level of government that affects us the most on a day-to-day basis and the level of government most responsive to the voters.

Yet the turnout always lags behind — and in mid-term votes such as this one, it tends to drop through the floor.

In the general election last November, 59.5 per cent of voters came out to cast ballots. But in the last three mid-term elections — all of them byelections for councillor — turnout has ranged from a high of 41 per cent in 1995 to a pathetic 27 per cent in 1998.

Yet whether 10 per cent or 100 per cent of the population comes to the polls, the result will stand. The absent are always wrong. Whether you're for or against fluoridation or airport expansion, make sure you have your say this Saturday at Brennan Park Recreation Centre.

After attending the airport referendum open house last Tuesday, I left wondering why our council continues to pursue airport development. All the information I have received in my many years of involvement points to one thing. The present day airport site is questionable at best for long-term development. Some of the documentation that supports this conclusion is as follows:

The Cheeky Hazard Area Strategy Plan limits development at this site.

The 1995 Council commissioned the Accuratus Engineering Airport Development Plan which determined the following:

Page 6: Noise assessment: "May have an undesirable impact on their community."

Page 14: "Land uses which attract large number of birds can increase risk of bird strikes with aircraft." The Eagle Reserve is within 800 metres.

Page 16: "The most significant conflict of this policy is the landfill operated by the District of Squamish, which is within one kilometre of the airport."

In his letter to council, RJ Henry of the Ministry of the Environment wrote the following: "In summary I do not feel that Accuratus Engineering's report has adequately taken into account the hazards at the airport site and the impacts of these hazards on the possible expansion of the airport."

The Transport Canada document, TP 1247E "Land Uses in the Vicinity of Airports," recommends that landfills and migrating bird refuges not be allowed within 8 kilometres and 2 kilometres of an airport, respectively. Both the Squamish landfill and the Eagle Reserve are within one kilometre.

In the last 10 years three fixed winged aircraft have crashed shortly after take-off at the Squamish Airport, with one helicopter making an emergency landing at the nearby school yard.

Is it fair to risk the safety of our children in nearby schools? Should we compromise the quality of life and safety of the residents of Brackendale and the people of First Nations?

On Oct. 14 help the local politicians find the right answer and vote No.

I must agree with Mr. Davis' first statement, a referendum is about choices and weighing the facts should be done by all. According to Mr. Davis this initiative is about the industrialization of airport lands. My understanding should the referendum pass, is that most of the activity (industry) at the airport would be airport related businesses such as maintenance facilities for existing users, and ones that depend on air traffic for distribution of their products or services. Mr. Davis seems to think that council must know exactly who the users will be before they zone the property for development. Private enterprise doesn't have that crystal ball, so how does he think council would have the ability to do this? He speaks of the business park and the difficulties with it. Yes they exist, and will continue to do so. The park has changed from the original concept. Council could have stuck with the original idea and been very rigid in their thinking, but you must ask yourself would it be in the community's best interest to have the park sit half unsold with the debt being carried by the homeowner? The airport should be allowed

to develop in a normal business manner with the proper zoning in place.

The eagles — this red herring has been trotted out as the flag to rally around. Am I against eagles and the business they bring to the community? NO, certainly not. I cannot quote the number of eagles at the airport in their annual count, but I think it was very low, perhaps none. Does Mr. Davis think that if the vote is yes, planes would swoop down and drive the eagles away? It seems that in other towns around the province: Comox, Castlegar, and many small towns on the coast that air traffic and eagles co-exist quite well. So how are the eagles at risk? At the terminals I watch eagles sit on our light and Hydro poles undisturbed as large lift trucks and other equipment operate nearby. When one travels to Richmond, you see eagles; when you take the ferry to Victoria, you see eagles. The eagles are increasing all over the province and so is air traffic. Should I conclude that the increase in eagles is due to increased air traffic? NO and I do not believe this debate is about eagles, living monuments or having it all. This debate or referendum is about using an existing facility as part of the economic link for the orderly growth of our community versus not-in-my-backyard.

There is revenue to be gained from the airport with development and management of this community facility. As it exists there are transient commercial users making use of our facilities free of charge. With management they would be contributing even more to the revenue of our community. Some transient airport users are contributing to the local economy already. I don't know how many of you have noticed the Helifor trucks at local motels and in the local shopping plazas throughout the summer contributing to our local economy. Questioning coverage of motorcycles, eco-tourism

Editor,

I ride a motorcycle and so I was saddened to read of a fatal accident of another motorcyclist on Government Road at Eagle Run a while back. According to the article the motorcycle being operated southbound on Government Road ran into a pick-up truck that was being driven eastbound on Eagle Run. The article failed to mention if there was an at-fault driver and if there were any charges laid.

A drive by the location failed to reveal any skid marks by the southbound motorcyclist indicating that likely that motorcycle was not being operated at an excessive speed. Nor

were any skid marks visible which could have been caused by the truck.

Sometimes motorcyclists are involved in accidents and when the police investigate they find the other driver just "failed to see the motorcycle," which results in a collision. Failing to see the motorcyclist is certainly not a reason for not laying appropriate charges against the at-fault driver. The motorcycle was obviously there on the roadway and could be 'seen'. What may have happened is the at-fault driver sees the motorcycle but because the driver has an attitude of looking for other cars or trucks psychologically

does not see the motorcycle or the motorcycle does not get recorded in the other driver's mind.

If such were the case in this accident and charges were laid against the at-fault driver, I am wondering why The Chief has not revealed such information to its reading public. If charges were laid in this incident at a later date then one would think a follow-up article would have appeared to put an ending to the original article.

A while back on a Vancouver radio station which was later repeated on the local radio station there was a comment about the tourist industry being 28 per cent of the local econ-

omy whereas the logging industry only accounted for seven per cent of the local economy. I watched to see if such an article would appear in The Chief but have not seen one to date. The radio comment stated the information was available from the B.C. government's Internet location.

My questions to The Chief and its editor are: are we the public only receiving newspaper articles that have been edited by The Chief as to what is newsworthy to the people of this location? Or are the reporters of The Chief so poorly supervised that they fail to do follow-up investigations? Is The Chief only reporting

articles which they think are beneficial to the municipality and ignoring any stories that would be detrimental about the logging industry?

Surely I must be mistaken in my thinking as I was of the opinion that newspapers had a self-imposed obligation to print the news without bias or fear otherwise one would not bother to read a newspaper at least for its reporting of the news.

I would urge our government to recognize the far-reaching consequences of ineffective or inadequate action and do whatever is legally necessary to stop this assault on our basic values. I would also urge government to view this as a collective problem that we must all share the cost of, rather than just expecting those directly affected to bear the full financial burden.

Squamish seemed to tie the score at 2-2 on a corner kick, but the goal was called back on a penalty.

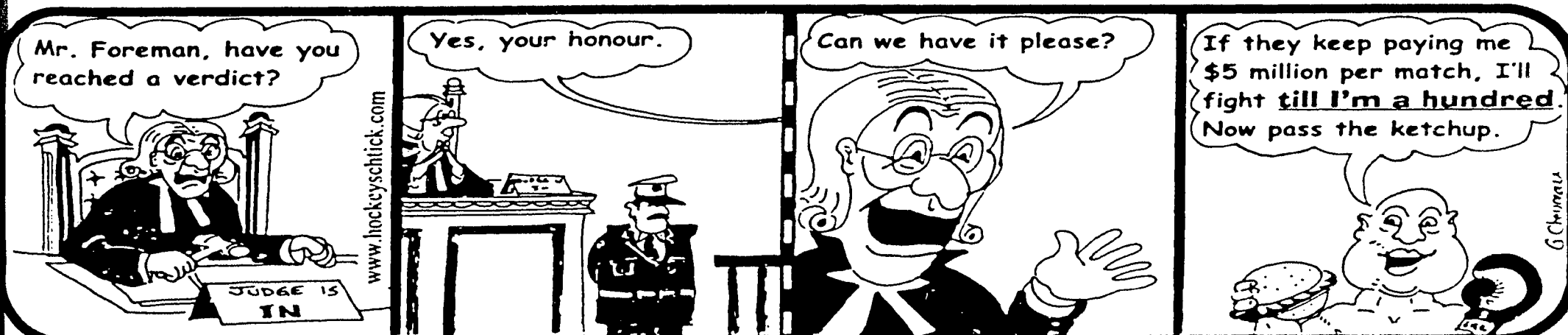
Squamish did eventually tie the score on the penalty kick as Steve Bir found the back of the net.

Hockey Schtick: Off-Season

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SETTING THE RECORD STRAIGHT

The proposed wood chip facility at the south end of downtown Squamish will compromise the vision of downtown development. In addition, due to increased rail traffic along Loggers Lane, waterfront development will likely not occur in the foreseeable future. GBA has applied for rezoning which would open the doors to heavy industry in Downtown. We ask you to read this information with an open mind and consider the implications to Squamish's future. The following is a response to misinformation distributed and published by GBA.

GBA: "The site has been used for industrial purposes for at least 30 years and will continue in the future whether as a chip facility or another business. It will continue to be industrial as written in the Official Community Plan".

Response: Misinformation on the part of GBA. The site is zoned light industrial, which means that it has significantly less impacts than heavy industrial use. These impacts relate to air-borne particulate, overhead lighting, odours, and general aesthetics. The Supreme Court of B.C. ruled that GBA's proposed use is heavy industrial, and not light industrial.

GBA: "The GBA proposed site is not situated in the downtown core where waterfront walkways are proposed..."

Response: Misinformation on the part of GBA. We have been planning waterfront walkways in this area since 1996! We have spent over \$200,000 on planning, infrastructure and materials, including \$45,000 of riprap on site. The project is intended to be completed by March 2001. The walkway is only 120 feet away from GBA's proposed heavy industrial site.

GBA: "GBA has always intended to build a woodchip transfer facility."

Response: Fine, but not on that site! GBA wanted to be on a site further south that was zoned for heavy industry. Because that land deal fell through, they chose a light industrial parcel next to our mixed use zone.

GBA: "The Development Permit was proposed to the municipality and was passed with a majority of council."

Response: Actually the District councillors split 3:3 on this issue. Mayor Corinne Lonsdale cast the deciding vote in favour of the woodchip facility. Her vision of Squamish's future is a Canadian Tire on the highway, a WalMart in the industrial park and a chip plant in the downtown core! We believe her vision is at odds with the wishes and desires of the people of Squamish - a vision that she never made clear to the voting public in last year's municipal election!

GBA: "The tax base collected from this facility for the municipality will be significantly higher than from this site at its present use."

Response: Of course it will have a greater benefit than its present use as a non-conforming grand-fathered log sort zoned light industrial. However, the if this land were used for other light industrial uses such as light warehousing, ship-building and high tech development, more taxes would be raised from these uses. We believe that the introduction of the wood chip facility would result in a Large Net Tax Loss to the district.

GBA: "The Chamber of Commerce has put their support towards this project."

Response: More misinformation. This is what the Chamber actually said on October 2nd, 2000: "Motion that the Chamber of Commerce Serving Squamish, Britannia Beach and Furry Creek supports the efforts to bring industry and jobs to the community. However, the Chamber does have concerns that re-zoning of the area to heavy industry may seriously jeopardize the vision of the Squamish Plan 2000." CARRIED

GBA: "Wood chips are of a density that they typically will not become airborne once placed in a chip pile."

Response: The winds in Squamish will cause a problem. Here's what the experts say: "We don't have much problem with a 5 knot wind, but with a 15 knot wind we do have a problem." - President of Fibreco in North Vancouver, which runs a wood chip reload facility.

"There will be particulate on adjoining properties. Usually these facilities are built further away from residential areas." - Graham Veal, Airborne Contamination Branch, BC Ministry of Environment.

GBA: Re: Increase in rail car traffic through the downtown area. "The chip trains are already traveling past the main rail crossing in Squamish and are going to a North Vancouver chip handling facility."

Response: The trains on the main line are not a problem. The trains going down loggers Lane are a problem. In 1984 the consulting engineering company HA Simons studied the issue of log and chip handling in Squamish. This is what the professionals said: "The downtown location would be the least expensive location. But due to added industrial traffic down Loggers Lane, it would impede any commercial development on the waterfront." Why hasn't Council addressed this issue?

GBA: "The esthetics of this area from the downtown core will improve significantly."

Response: Tell this to Dave and Steve at the Howe Sound Inn and Brewing Company; tell this to Peter Legere who's constructing a 4-story mixed use building with 4 apartments and work spaces due to be completed by Christmas that will be 250 feet away from noise, fallout, 60 foot gantry and overhead cranes, with lights and two shifts a day; tell this to Ted Prior and Dave McRae, who have been planning their mixed use development with 32 studios and apartments, 15 shops and workspaces and waterfront walk connecting the downtown to the estuary in a very important loop trail; tell this to Scott and Michelle from Squamish Tae Kwan Do who have all their permits in place for a new 6000 square foot studio with living space for their family; tell that to Ralph Link who bought a house next to the brewpub with dreams of a mixed use building; tell that to Clasina Van Bommel who had the vision to buy the lot north of the brewpub for an ecotourism facility; tell that to our David Silk and Dan Tatham who have a budding new high tech business wanting to expand in this community; and tell this to all the store owners in the downtown core who can't help but get red-faced when they understand what is being compromised through this project; go tell this to all the owners and residents in Marina Estates!

What the Squamish District Planner Said!

"The applicant has suggested that the proposed facility will have no or very negligible amount of inhaleable particulates. Staff believes that there will be some dust generated by the proposed facility."

"The chips are to be transported by train to the GBA site. The trains will pass close to the Marina Estates Residential Complex on the existing rail line. Consideration must be given to the comfort and quality of life of these residents."

"The cars carrying chips must be covered to contain the chip dust, but the District cannot impose this requirement. It would be in the best interest of the Community to enter into a dialogue with BC Rail and create a strategic plan to relocate its Downtown Industrial Rail Trackage."

What the Economic Development Office Said!

"The concerns raised by the community and coverage by the press represent potential truths in that "perception is reality". If large investors are brought to the position that this facility will compromise their investment, economic diversification/development in the downtown core will be greatly threatened."

What the Official Community Plan Proposes!

The OCP states that live-work developments and residential uses should be encouraged in the Downtown South area.

We the People of Downtown South moved here with a vision. The estuary, the waterfront, mountains, the best view of all of Squamish, and not least, the most potential in the region. We are a like-minded people with a dream. This woodchip reload facility is not in that dream. Most of the newcomers to this community share this dream. Numerous studies over the past 20 years have also shared in this dream - the 1983 Mamquam Study, the 1984 HA Simons Study, the 1991 Mamquam Blind Channel Study, and the Downtown Development Plan 2000. We must not kill this dream for 7 jobs, increased industrial traffic down Loggers Lane, 60 foot cranes, and noise, site and particulate pollution.

Get Site B up and running and solve our industrial and tourism logjam - please!

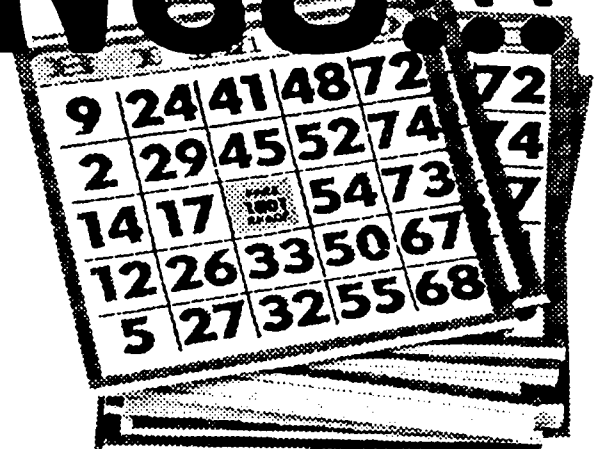

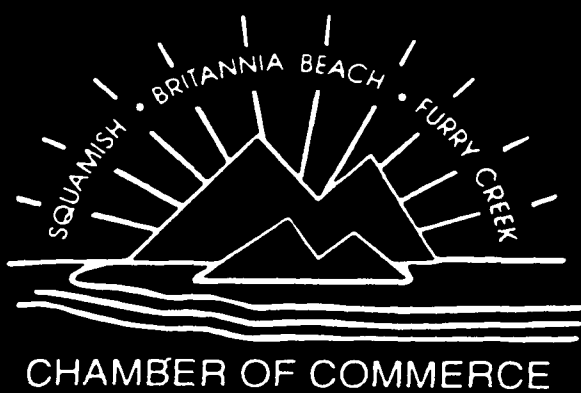

When the Chamber of Commerce was invited to become one of the partners in the Squamish-Sackville Community Leaders Partnership Program exchange 2000, I was selected to participate as one of the six delegates to represent Squamish. Our delegation also included Donna Billy (First Nations), Jeff Dawson (Community Futures), Rick King and Paul Lalli (District of Squamish) and Natalie Wall (young entrepreneur).

The Sackville delegation included: Virgil Hammock (professor of fine arts and Town of Sackville Councillor) Al Smith (Waterfowl Park Advisory Committee), Rob Summerby-Murray (professor of geography), Pierre Malloy (young entrepreneur and a reporter), Chris Ward (Chamber of Commerce President), and Barbara Campbell (Town of Sackville).

Sackville was chosen from the list of communities in Canada because they had many common elements that we hoped we could learn from, including a university, an estuary and a location on the highway close to a large city.

We were treated exceptionally well for four days by the hosts in Sackville, New Brunswick. The incredible Maritime hospitality and beauty was something I had heard of, but to experience it first hand was truly fabulous.

Initially, I had thoughts of "the grass is always greener on the other side." However, once I got into the nuts and bolts under the surface, I found our communities had a lot of similarities.

Sackville is dealing a lot with down-loading from the provincial government. They have a lack of high-way signage to draw from the 15,000 cars that pass them by en route to Moncton and polarization from people

resistant to change.

The developing of the Sackville Estuary (Waterfowl Park) initially had tremendous negative feedback. In spite of this, they persevered and today it attracts many visitors, especially to view the 2 million sand-pipers that frequent the park every August. When it was decided that the Visitor Information Centre, currently located next to the University, was to be re-located next to the highway, there also was a lot of neg-

ative feed-back. They are in the process of relocating and time will tell if this is a smart move.

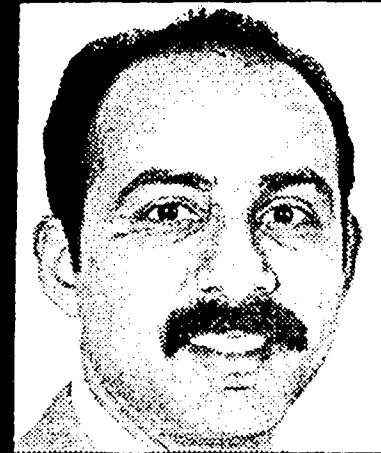
I was able to visit Mount Allison University, which is 161 years old (and was the first university in the commonwealth to grant a degree to a woman). It is a liberal arts university, which has over 2,250 full time students.

I am now extremely enthusiastic about the private university coming to Squamish. Based on the Sackville experience, some of the benefits to the community could be a high arts and culture presence to the community, possible sharing of recreation infrastructures — library, pool, gym, art gallery, etc. Sackville even uses the student dormitories and convocation room to attract convention business during the summer. There is a great relationships between the merchants and the students. I noticed "Welcome Back Students" signs in the windows of many of the store fronts.

Sackville has a huge active volunteer base, given that the population of the community is only 5,400, including the students. The community has made a big commitment to tourism, especially when the traditional manufacturing foundries closed in the early 1990s and left 200-plus people unemployed. I hope Squamish can learn early on from inspiration, rather than from desperation.

I got a lot more out of the community exchange than I had initially anticipated. I hope that the knowledge and experience gained from all the participants will help build a strong bridge with our new sister city. I would like to thank the businesses in our community who were extremely generous in assisting and providing gifts. As well, thank you to all the people in our community who extended their hands in friendship to welcome our Sackville friends.

Lastly, I would like to encourage everyone to take the time to get out and vote at the District of Squamish referendum on Saturday, Oct. 14.

- (ii) all other use 1 space per 46.5m² (500 sq ft) of gross floor area notwithstanding Section 36.9(b):
- (iii) the minimum parking stall width is 2.43 m (8 feet) for 90° parking
- (iv) the minimum parking stall length is 5.48 m (18 feet) for 90° parking
- (v) tandem parking is permitted notwithstanding Section 37.4
- (vi) no off-street loading is required
- (vii) parking of commercial and industrial vehicles adjacent to residential properties shall be permitted

2. The District of Squamish Zoning Bylaw No. 1342, 1995, Amendment Bylaw (Downtown Parking) No. 1620, 2000 reduces the parking requirements for the downtown area.

If you are not on the list of electors, you may register at the time of voting by completing the required application form available at the voting place. To register must meet the following qualifications:

- 18 years of age or older
- Canadian citizen
- resident of BC for at least six months immediately preceding voting day
- resident of OR registered owner of real property in the District of Squamish for at least 30 days immediately preceding voting day, and not otherwise disqualified by law from voting.

Resident electors will also be required to produce 2 pieces of identification (at least one with a signature) to prove residency and identity.

Non-resident property electors must produce a non-resident property elector certificate and 2 pieces of identification (at least one with a signature) to prove identity. Non-resident property elector certificates can be obtained from the Chief Election Officer at the municipal hall prior to voting or at the voting place.

HELP FOR PERSONS NEEDING ASSISTANCE

Persons needing assistance to mark their ballot due to a physical disability or difficulties with reading or writing may:

- bring a person to assist or ask for help from an election official. Before a person helps a voter mark a ballot, they must make a solemn declaration before the Presiding Election Official;
- bring a translator to read the ballot and instructions for voting. The translator must make a solemn declaration before the Presiding Election Official.

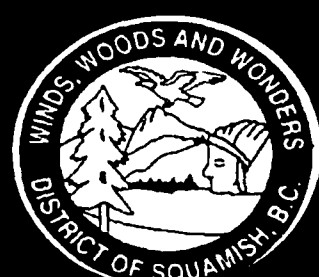

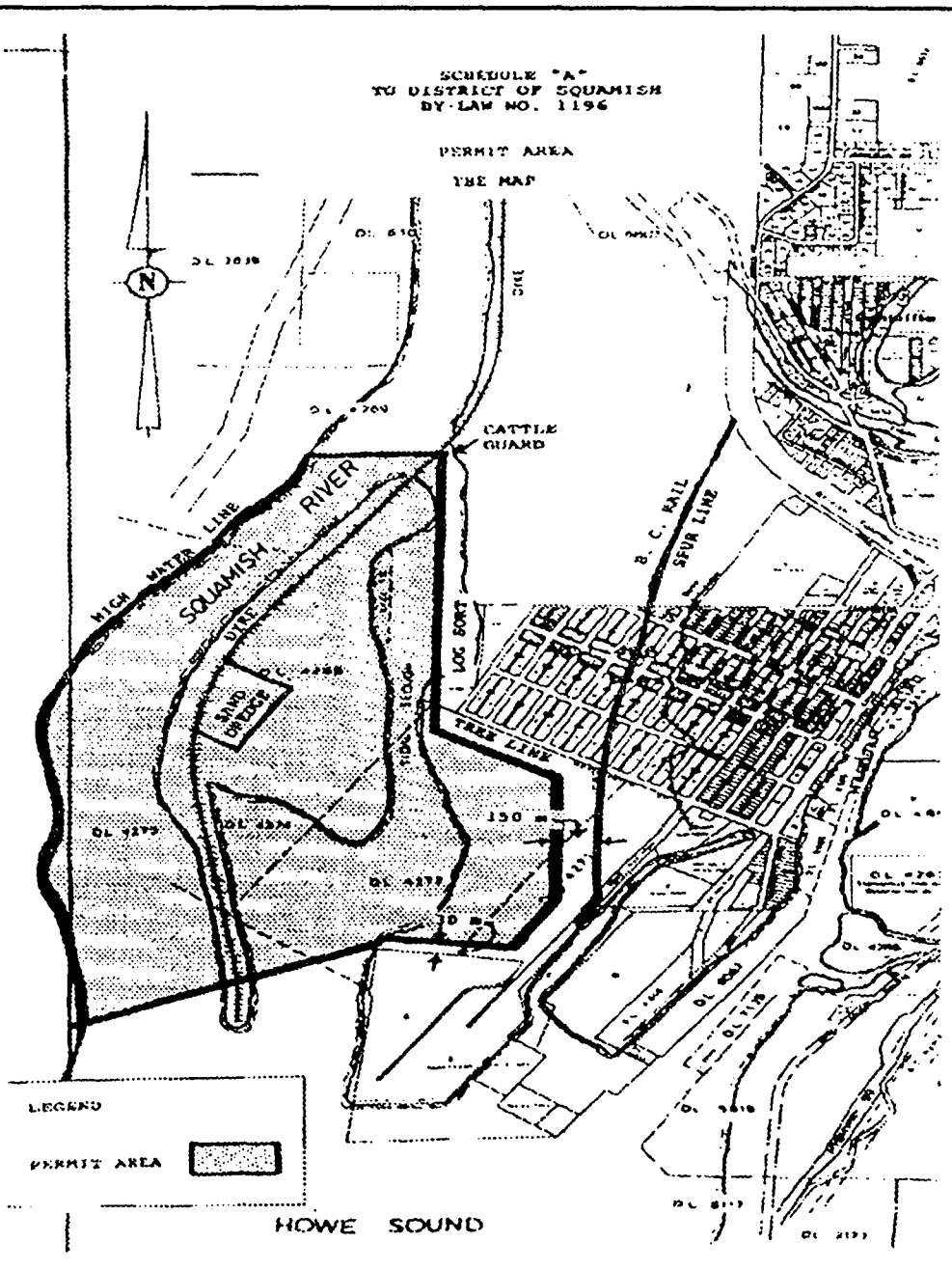

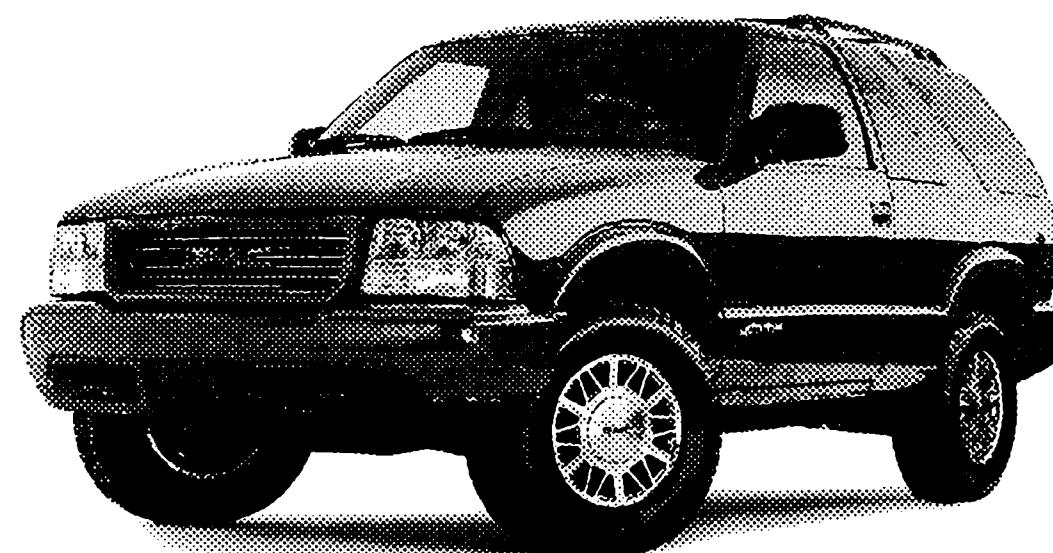
