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Councillors interested in alternate chip location

G.B.A. rejected CanOxy site last year

An alternative location will likely split council over the controversial wood chip facility as the rezoning bylaw for the Cattermole Slough goes to first and second readings today (Dec. 19).

On May 2, council voted 4-3 to grant G.B.A. Logging a development permit on the zoning issue was clouded by legal opinions. That permit was subsequently quashed in court.

Now a potential split is due to the possibility of finding a site almost a kilometre north of the downtown.

Only about a third of the Nexxon Inc. (formerly Canadian Occidental Petroleum) site is contaminated. The rest is of such interest on the open market that Nexxon hired Equitas Development Corporation to evaluate the various options.

Probably 40 to 50 per cent of that site [six to eight hectares] is available to develop today," Equitas president Rick Bell said Friday.

Howe Sound Pulp and Paper, the Port Mellon pulp mill that will be the facility's main customer, did approach Nexxon last year.

The remediation plan was then in place, said Tom Galimberti, an environmental consultant to Nexxon, and so the company could not make any commitments.

Nexxon's lease with landowner BCR Properties specifies chemical manufacturing, he noted, but that is under discussion.

"It may be possible to accommodate the wood chip handling facility," Galimberti said.

"We had some preliminary discussions and the proponent was ... disinterested," said Bell. "There wasn't really a high level of interest by G.B.A."

"We've looked at all the other sites in town," G.B.A. president Greg Richmond said Friday.

He rejected the Nexxon site as a possibility, saying the remediation works means the site is not yet "free and clear."

"That kind of talk is coming from the people working against us," Richmond said.

G.B.A. has faced fierce opposition from downtown developers and the lobby group Citizens for a Healthy, Innovative and Prosperous Squamish (CHIPS) over the location.

While offering support for the idea, critics say the location subjects the downtown to air, visual and noise pollution, pointing to assessments that say the facility would hurt land values and stall investment.

G.B.A. refutes those charges, saying its design will ensure the facility will not impact nearby residential and commercial properties, and point to their own land assessment as proof.

The facility was to be operational late this summer. A court challenge of the development permit by CHIPS was successful. This prompted G.B.A. to apply to rezone the site from light industry to a new zoning that would permit the wood chip facility.

"This issue has gone on for some time now and it's time to put it to rest," Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said Friday. She said there has been no information on the Nexxon site as an alternative presented to council, and even if it was it's not the district's responsibility.

was targeted twice last weekend.

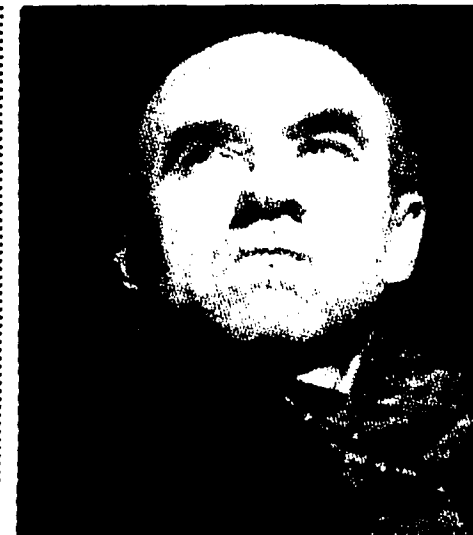
Squamish Fire Rescue crews made their way to the display just before 7 a.m. last Sunday after fire ripped through the wooden structure which housed the manger.

During the response to the fire, it was noted that the figures set up within the structure were missing from the display and RCMP are investigating whether the figures were stolen prior to the fire.

Early estimates to repair and replace the components of the

display were set at \$1,000, but the District is unable to repair and replace the nativity scene for the remainder of the holiday season.

"It's unfortunate that we have people out there that would do something like this," said Mayor Corinne Lonsdale. "However, I do believe that someone anonymously has taken it upon themselves to replace it. I think that is just wonderful and it shows that the Christmas spirit is alive and well."

On council's agenda this week

Upcoming issues for the Dec. 19 meeting of council at 7 p.m. in council chambers at Municipal Hall:

Council will vote on first and second readings of Official Community Plan No. 1536, 1998 Amendment Bylaw (Development Permit No. 8 Guidelines) No. 1630, 2000 AND Zoning Bylaw No. 1342, 1995 Amendment Bylaw (G.B.A. No. 1641, 2000 to rezone G.B.A. Logging Ltd.'s land on Cattermole Slough for a wood chip reload facility. "Companies relocate projects, municipalities don't."

Lonsdale said council's decision on rezoning is specific to the proposed site and whether it is appropriate for the facility. "I'm really concerned we're not looking at the big picture," she said, referring to the 1998 Official Community Plan's industrial designation for the area.

G.B.A. and downtown developers need to get on with thinking how they can be neighbours, she added.

"Let the process proceed and I'll make my decision at the end of the day," Coun. Paul Lalli said Saturday.

It's his long-standing policy to support business and job creation, he said.

He was approached about the Nexxon site by community members and Equitas, Lalli said. As he understands it, there are still remediation and lease issues to be worked out.

Asked whether the availabil-

ity of the Nexxon site would have any bearing on his vote today, Lalli replied: "As far as I'm concerned, deal with every application on its merits and go from there."

"Someone mentioned it [Nexxon] to me, but I haven't heard it was going anywhere," Coun. Rick King told The Chief Friday, adding he has not been approached to support a relocation.

Neither has Coun. Raj Kahlon, who said he heard about Nexxon from other councillors. However, he expressed a high level of enthusiasm for the possibility.

"If that can be worked out it would be wonderful," he said. "We have a large community concern about the current location."

Kahlon said he would look into the idea in depth after the busy holiday season, noting first and second reading are fairly preliminary.

A public hearing, then two more votes by council are

required for rezoning after today's vote if it passes.

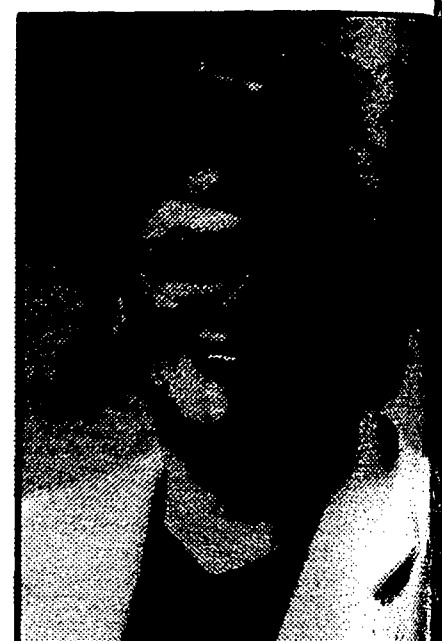
"It's a solution," Coun. Shelley Smith said of the Nexxon possibility. "If it goes ahead where it is, there would be a lot of people in this community who would be very upset. I would like to see the chip facility somewhere, but not where they want it."

However, her vote isn't affected by the existence of a viable alternative, Smith said.

"We're backing ourselves into a corner by making it more expensive in the future to move the [Loggers Lane rail] track," she said.

Any crossing of the Cattermole Slough would have to be a swing or lift bridge, to accommodate the barges the chips are shipped out on, while a simple bailey bridge would be sufficient otherwise.

If the facility were at the point of the estuary on the Nexxon site, barges would barely enter the slough.

That the operation has been defined as heavy industry in the area is meant for the industry is another problem, Smith said.

She promised to keep an open mind between today's vote and the next council meeting. Without a special meeting that should happen Jan. 10.

Councillors Cheryle and Wendy Magee could be reached by press time.

At \$0.98 per sticker, the total cost will be just over \$500, paid from the economic development budget. The bumper stickers will be available at Municipal Hall.

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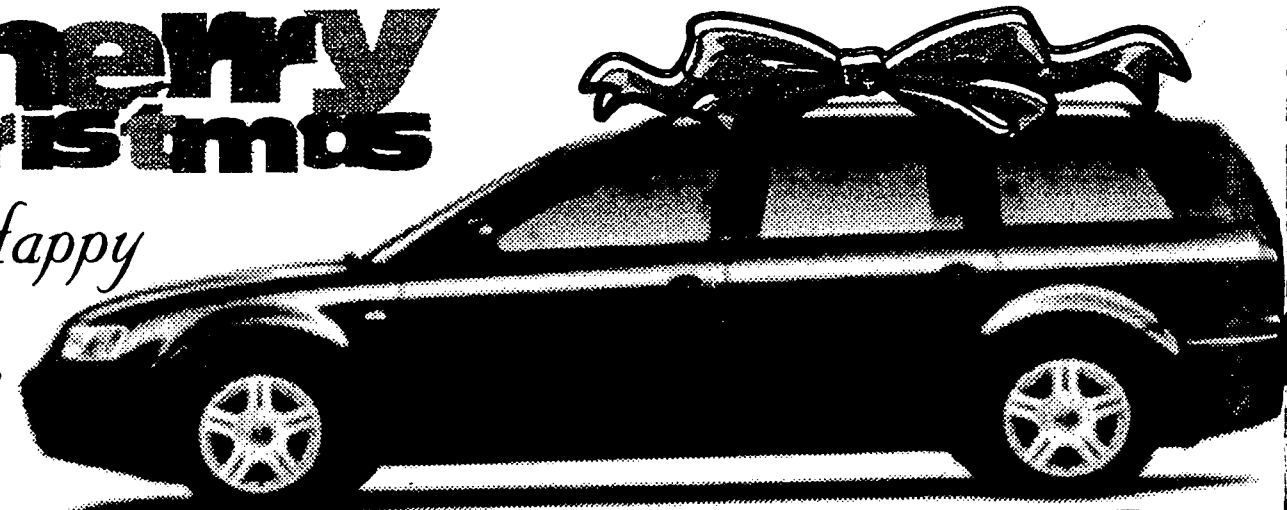


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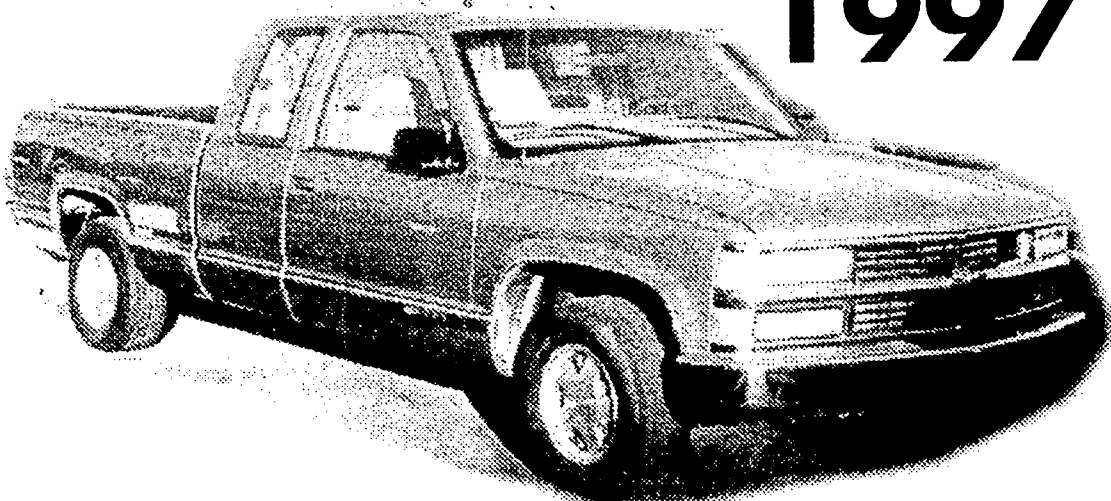
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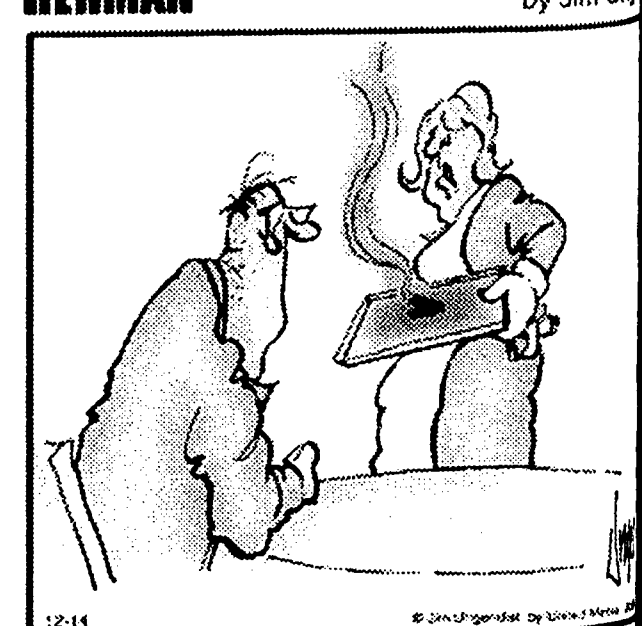


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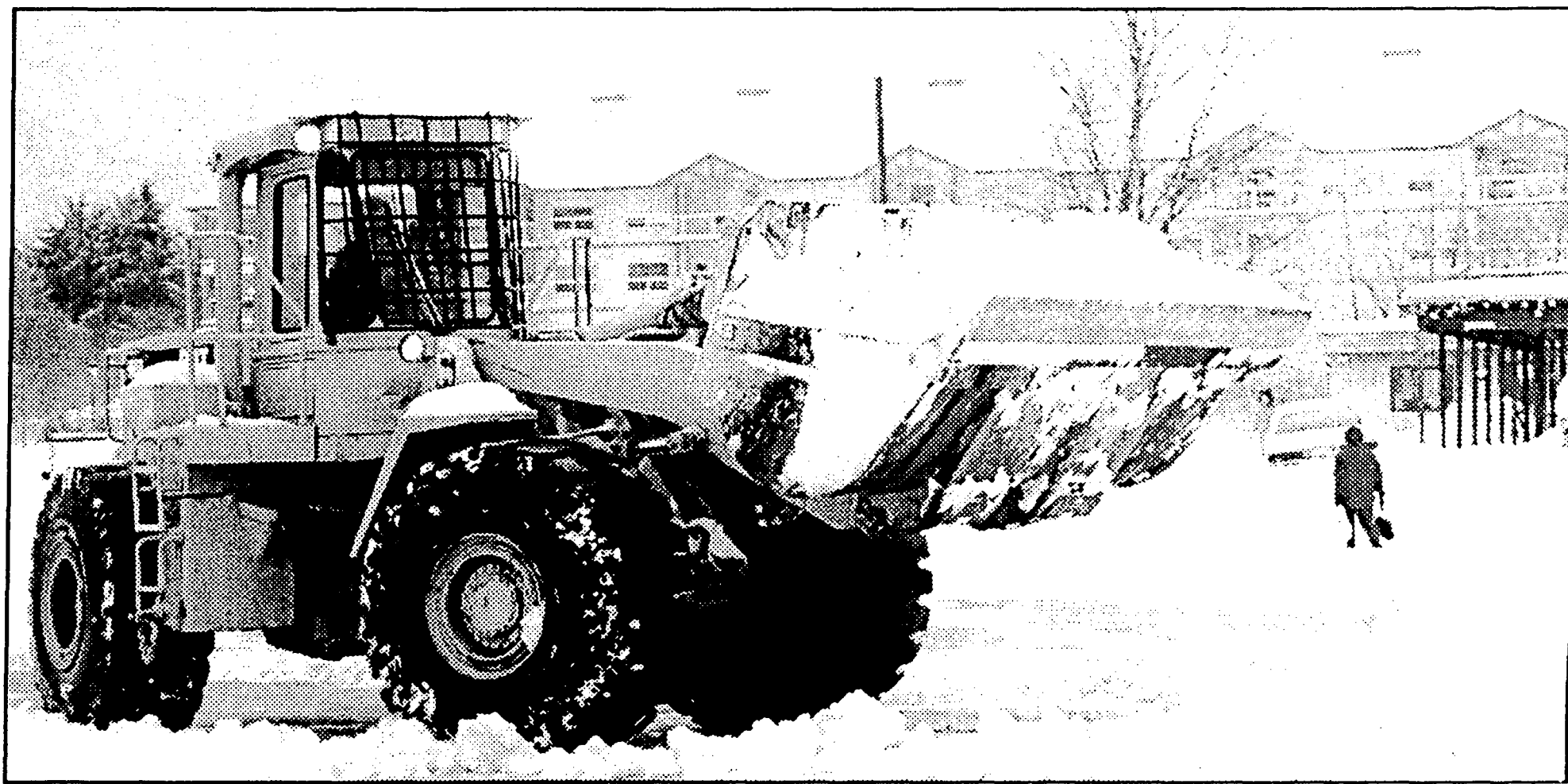

Squamish snowed in

Snow shovelling was no small feat this weekend as Squamish received more than 12 cm of snow, high winds and freezing rain from Thursday to Sunday.

Squamish RCMP, Capilano Highways and District of Squamish crews have been going at break-neck speeds trying to keep Hwy. 99 and the roads in Squamish clear for travel.

"Although we responded to a large number of motor vehicle accidents over the past few days due to the weather conditions, we didn't have any serious injuries," said Sgt. Gary Brine. "People showed common sense by either staying off the roads or travelling more cautiously."

"I think a lot of it was due to the tremendous job by our District staff and Cap Highways. They all just

worked their butts off to keep the roads going."

Hwy. 99 was closed between Alice Lake and the salt sheds for about two hours on Saturday.

District crews worked around the clock on Friday, Saturday and Sunday to keep up with the snow. Their efforts were hampered early Saturday morning when their grader went down, however.

"The grader is a big part of our force," said Maurice Wutzke, roads and drainage supervisor for the District. "We've had a loader out cleaning the intersections to widen

them as much as we can, but it's been hard with the heavy snow and ice."

Wutzke said they've had a few complaints. "People just have to be patient and let us do our work," he said.

Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said Monday she and some councillors have been receiving complaints from residents about snow removal, particularly plows with their blades up.

She pointed out those trucks are often using their underbody plows to break up ice on the roads.

"I think they're concerned that the trucks are speeding by and not doing anything," Lonsdale said.

Yuck!
There are few other words to describe the last week of weather that Mother Nature dropped on Squamish, but it looks like the worst is over — at least for a few days.

A system rolled through the coastal sections of the province from the Interior on Thursday, bringing with it snow, high winds and then freezing rain on Saturday.

According to Environment Canada meteorologist Gregg Walters, Squamish received about 3.6 cm of snow from Thursday to Friday night and another 8.8 cm of snow from early Saturday through Sunday.

"It probably looks a lot more to most people out there," Walters said on Monday. "It's not uncommon to get these types of conditions in December. When ever you get a cold ridge of high pressure from the Interior; it's got to go somewhere and most likely it will push into the coastal areas and bring snow conditions to Squamish."

As for this week, Walters expects a return to normal with higher temperatures during the daytime bringing with it a little rain or wet snow at the higher elevations, but it's still going to be cold at night. "For the most part, I see a pretty good dry stretch for the middle of the week and then possibly another system on the weekend," he said.

"The first day of winter is Dec. 21 officially for us at 5:37 a.m., but for some it seems like it's already here."

With the wet wintry conditions,

Publisher trades Squamish for Hawaii

The Chief's publisher is leaving Squamish for the sunny shores of Hawaii.

Penny Graham announced last week she has accepted a position with the Honolulu Star-Bulletin, a 66,000-circulation daily newspaper in Hawaii's largest city.

She starts work in Hawaii on Feb. 1, but her last day at The Chief will be this Thursday (Dec. 21) as she prepares for the move to the United States.

"I'm having the mother of

all garage sales," she said last week.

The Star-Bulletin was purchased earlier this year by B.C. newspaper magnate David Black, who owns about 80 community newspapers in B.C., Alberta and Washington State.

Graham came to Squamish in August 1996 as publisher of The Chief from Revelstoke, where she co-founded and published the Revelstoke Times-Review and served as group publisher of Westmount Press, a chain of 23 community newspapers in B.C. and

Alberta. From 1998 until this year she also served as publisher of the Whistler Question and group publisher for Madison Publishing, The Chief's parent company.

Graham guided The Chief through a re-design in 1997 and changes of ownership in 1998 and 1999. During her time as publisher the paper won several provincial and national awards for ad design, special sections and general excellence.

Graham has been a two-time president of the B.C. and Yukon Community

Newspapers Association and also served as a director of the Canadian Community Newspapers Association.

In Squamish, she served on the board of the Community Futures Development Corporation of Howe Sound for four years and was a member of the Squamish Rotary Club.

"I'm pleased with the work we've done in Squamish and I'm looking forward to new challenges," Graham said.

"I'll be staying in touch with all of my friends in Squamish and keeping tabs on the town

Woman charged in fatal collision

A 40-year-old woman from the United States will be back in court Jan. 10 to answer to three charges following the death of a Mayne Island man on Hwy. 99 Nov. 10.

Carolyn Keyes made a brief appearance in Squamish provincial court Dec. 12 and the case has been held over until the new year.

Keyes has been charged with impaired driving causing death, failing to operate a vehicle while impaired and refusing to provide a breath sample.

Kevin Piertzac, 41, died when his vehicle was struck by Keyes' vehicle.

Police are still investigating a second fatal accident on Hwy. 99 that took the life of a 24-year-old Leila

Lezani on Dec. 1.

In all five vehicles were involved and seven people were taken to area hospitals. Police are still asking for witness information and anyone with information is urged to call Const. Marcocque at 898-9611.

Commercials donated to District

Community cares at Christmas

CCC to help more than 200 families again this season

Community Christmas Care (CCC) volunteers are busy today at the depot on Progress Way, packing hampers for distribution tomorrow.

Some 225-275 families will receive hampers this year, CCC co-chairman John Stephens said Wednesday.

"Delivery will take place between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. on the Wednesday and people who are receiving should be home or have made arrangements otherwise," he noted.

The hampers contain non-perishable food items, toys and grocery gift certificates, as well as fresh oranges and hams.

"They're substantial hampers," said Stephens.

The program has benefited from group efforts, he said, noting churches, schools, businesses and community organizations have all contributed.

CCC itself is co-ordinated by the Squamish Ministerial Association, noted Stephens, rector of St. John's Anglican Church.

"It's a real community effort ... and it really does generate a huge mountain of food," said Stephens. "It's an incredible statement on the compassion of this community."

Of a target of \$30,000, some \$18,000 in cash and an unspecified amount of food and toys has been raised so far, which is about the same as prior years.

"We bring in as much food as we can and distribute it as much as possible."

Stephens noted some groups want to, in effect, adopt a family by preparing a hamper tailored to their situation.

CCC encourages donating to the program instead, in the interest of preserving privacy.

The program had received 220 applications for hampers by Wednesday, a number likely to grow before distribution day.

It is, however, down slightly from last year.

"We've never had a problem with having enough people to help," said Stephens. "We usually have too many, which is a nice problem to have."

Even before the hampers are packed, CCC volunteers turn their thoughts to next year.

The program is now accepting donations for the 2001 holiday season.

Fibre optic link a go for next year

Task force gets commitment from Telus; Bell Nexxia and Savage Telecom still interested

Squamish will be the first place to get fibre-optic cable from Telus in 2001, locals say, but company representatives are refusing comment until they get an official media release.

A reporter from The Chief was in the room Wednesday when downtown developer Ted Prior received a phone call from Telus' Blair Grabinsky.

Prior said Grabinsky told him: "Break out the champagne and crackers. You're in."

This move up to first in 2001 from sometime in 2007 can be attributed to the work of a local task force established to bring high-speed data connections to Squamish quickly.

Telus had told the group if they could find 12 users by Friday who wanted T1 fibre-optic lines and were willing to

pay the \$1,600 per month cost installation would begin in 2001.

On Dec. 12, three days ahead of the deadline, the group sent Telus a list of 16 users who require high-speed access. Several are interested in multiple lines.

Grabinsky said Friday he could offer no comments until he had an approved media release, but he confirmed Monday that Telus will be expanding services in the Squamish area in 2001 with an ATM point of presence.

"All of a sudden we have a new resource," said a jubilant Prior.

To aid its investment, Telus would market Squamish as a wired community attractive to businesses that need the access, but prefer Squamish's atmosphere to that of the city.

Such a connection would reduce the number of people who have to commute to Vancouver to work, as they could work from home or a local office.

Apart from spurring more development, it would cut down on the out-of-town shopping, said Dan Tatham of ByCast Media Systems.

His company employs several former commuters.

However, ByCast currently

has only one T1 link, at high cost. This lack of access makes it difficult to convince their Vancouver-based partners of the viability of a Squamish office.

At the task force's regular Friday meeting, members discussed the Telus decision, as well as interest from Bell Nexxia and Savage Telecom — Mountain Internet's parent company — in bringing in high-speed access.

Prior said he was told once the decision is made, even other companies coming in won't stop Telus from installing cable.

Savage Telecom is interested in creating a wireless network for high-speed data communication.

While the installation cost would be the same as fibre-optic, with only transmission towers needed the network would be more expandable and offer greater bandwidth.

While a T1 line offers transmission of 1.5 megabytes per second, the microwave connection would run at 10 megabytes per second.

"They'll get the stability of redundancy," said Mountain Internet's Rob Bowkett.

"The redundancy will attract the higher-tech guys," said Tatham.

Less room to rent

Rental vacancy rates down by more than 50 per cent from last year

Squamish has the second-tightest rental market in its region, but is still over-supplied, according to the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

The CMHC recently released the results of its yearly national survey of rental markets, done in October.

Squamish's vacancy rate divided to 5.8 per cent from 12.6 per cent in 1999, putting it second in the Sunshine Coast/Vancouver Island region to metro Victoria's 1.8 per cent.

Average rents climbed 1.1 per cent, about half the inflation rate. This compares to a drop in average rents in 1999 of 0.7 per cent.

"It's small, but it's one of the few communities around B.C. that has actually seen an increase in rent," Peggy Prill, CMHC Victoria market analyst, said Dec. 12. "Rent increases have been really small in recent years because the market's been over-supplied in Squamish, and still is despite having the second-lowest vacancy rate."

However, one-bedroom apartments have a vacancy rate of just 3.3 per cent, close to a balanced market.

Locally, a bachelor pad rents for an average \$428 per

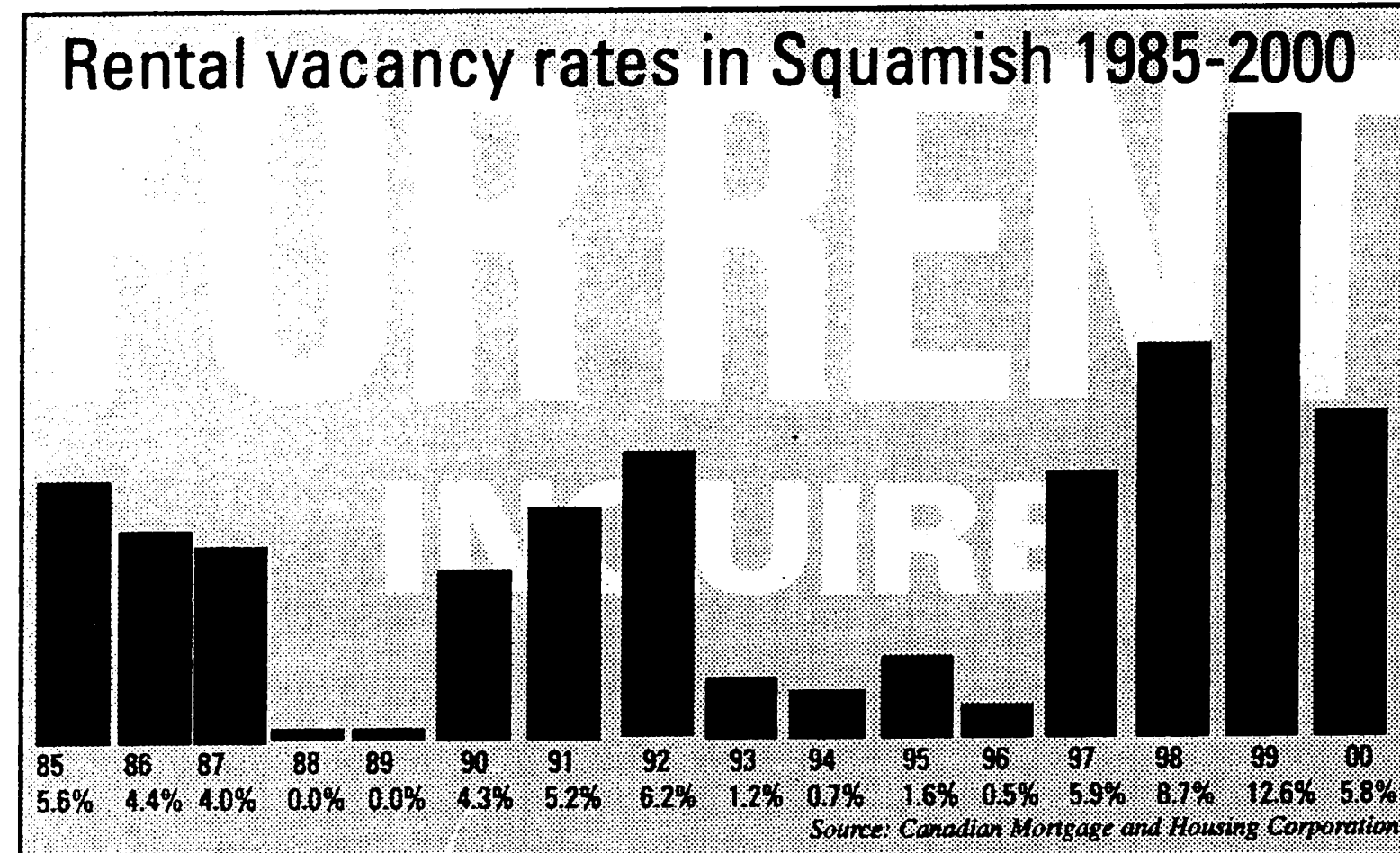

month, a one-bedroom apartment \$533, a two-bedroom for \$605, and three bedrooms and up rent for an average \$649.

Rents in similarly-sized Powell River dropped 5.6 per cent over the last year while the vacancy rate dropped slightly to 20.6 per cent.

Bachelor apartments there average \$314 per month, one-bedroom \$422, two-bedroom \$487, and three bedrooms and up \$541.

"The market there is quite a bit more over-supplied than Squamish," Prill said.

The entire area is over-supplied due to a housing boom in the early 1990s that was soon followed by a depressed economy, which prompted B.C. residents to move to other provinces.

Information on rental markets in Whistler and

Pemberton was not available, as the CMHC does not survey communities with such small permanent populations.

Whistler, with its seasonal fluctuations, is an unusual situation, Prill noted, as the bulk of rental units employee-housing are either subsidized or rent-controlled.

The Whistler Housing Authority tracks rental rates using advertisements for rentals in local newspapers. Tim Wake of the WHA said in an interview Wednesday that the rental market tightened up in August, a full month earlier than last year.

For the last three weeks there have been five or fewer suite-for-rent ads in all of Whistler, Wake said.

The WHA rents 130 units of its own, which are rarely empty, even in summer, he

added. "It was definitely a landlord's market in winter and a renter's market in the summer...that's changing," Wake said.

The spillover to other communities has also increased, especially since the introduction of transit service between Whistler and Pemberton this fall.

The WHA's benchmark rental rate is \$1.25 per square foot per month which works out to \$1,250 per month for a 1,000-square foot two-bedroom apartment in the middle to low-end market.

"We're certainly hearing stories about much higher, up to double that benchmark," said Wake.

Fake currency circulating

During the busy Christmas season RCMP are asking local merchants to be extra careful after a counterfeit \$100 bill was passed last week.

The bill was discovered by a bank in Squamish on Dec. 9 after the business left it in their bank deposit.

The bill had been passed a few days prior to being discovered.

"We are asking the business community to be vigilant in dealing with larger denominations of \$50 and \$100 bills," said Const. Dan Seward. "The Christmas period is a busier than usual time where store clerks are inundated with customers and are more vulnerable to counterfeit and fraud." The \$100 Canadian bill that surfaced in this case had a serial number of AJB6119736.

Police have no suspects and continue to investigate.

Police and Squamish Fire rescue are still investigating a small fire at Valleycliffe Elementary School last week. On Dec. 5 burn marks on the side of the school and a broken window were discovered and reported to police.

Police suspect arson was the cause of the vandalism and

have a possible suspect from witness information.

Assault charges are pending against a Squamish man after an alleged assault of a common-law spouse.

The altercation took place at the couple's joint home on Dec. 5. Police said some physical actions took place, but there were no serious injuries.

Two small children witnessed the incident and the Ministry of Children and Families were contacted and are assisting police in their investigation.

Police are looking for suspects after a Honda XL25 motorcycle was stolen in Valleycliffe.

The theft occurred sometime between Nov. 29 and Dec. 6 and the motorcycle was chained to a pole on Westway Avenue. The motorcycle is currently uninsured and was a 1982, red 250cc.

Police are still investigating.

RCMP are looking for the owner of a gray Pathfinder after an alleged hit-and-run accident at the Squamish Husky gas station.

On Dec. 7 a complainant called police after a Pathfinder with a tire mounted on the rear backed into her

vehicle.

Approximately \$2,000 damage was done to the victim's vehicle.

A witness did see the incident, but was unable to get the suspect's licence plate prior to the driver taking off.

Police are still investigating.

Vandals were at it again Dec. 9 at Brennan Park Recreation Centre.

The concession stand at the arena was vandalized overnight and two windows were smashed, but no entry was gained by the suspects.

Roughly \$150 damage was done. Police have no suspects or witnesses.

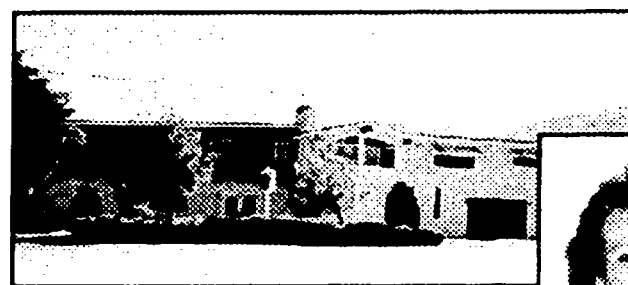
A Squamish man and two other suspects will be in Squamish provincial court on May 29, 2000 to answer to sexual assault charges.

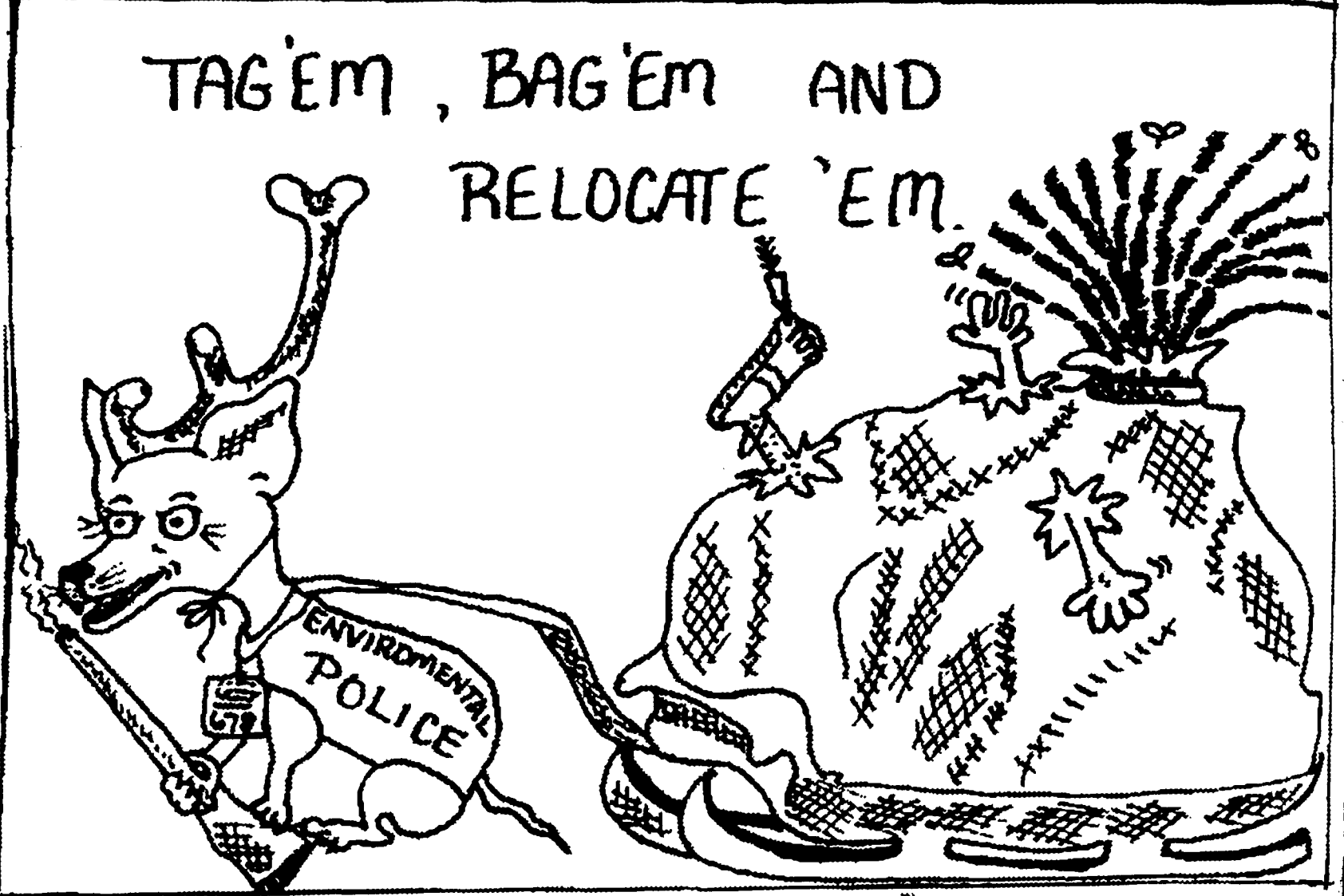
While looking through The Chief's book of Christmas carols, I came across the infamous holiday story, "The night before Christmas".

for all Canadians about responsible firearm ownership

An update on licensing

The law requires that firearm owners be licensed by January 1, 2001.

1.7 million Canadians have already complied with the licensing requirements of the *Firearms Act*.

And recently, Canadians have sent in their firearms licence applications in record numbers. To meet this overwhelming demand, temporary licences are now being issued to eligible firearm owners.

Public safety remains the cornerstone of the firearms program. For example, temporary licences are only being issued to those who are successfully screened against Canadian Police Information Centre (CPIC) databases. And, like current licence holders, those with temporary firearms licences will be continuously screened against police databases. Firearms licences will be issued only to those found eligible after further screening.

These public safety checks conform to the *Firearms Act* and keep firearms away from those who should not have them.

Temporary licences will be issued to eligible firearm owners who applied in the fall. Temporary licence holders are not permitted to acquire firearms. However, they will be in legal possession of their firearms and they will be able to purchase ammunition as of January 1, 2001. Temporary licences are only valid until June 30, 2001 or until those eligible receive their 5-year licence.

Hostel proposed near Rose Park

A proposal for a new youth hostel east of Hwy. 99 and south of Rose Park could mean greater business in the downtown, and relieve the district of paying for facilities for the park.

Gordon Addison of the Squamish Youth Hostel and Ed Vernon, a local developer who owns the subject property, are working together to build a 40-dormitory bed, six-room hostel on the banks of the Mamquam Blind Channel.

"The compatibility is excellent," said Addison. "On one

side we can provide facilities for the park, on the other the people at the hostel have a huge back yard."

Though details — including cost — are still sketchy, the new hostel would be several times larger than the current building on Buckley Avenue, which can house about a dozen people.

In prior years the province stopped plans for a motel on the commercially-zoned site because they intended to upgrade Hwy. 99 to four lanes, said Vernon. Now, the Ministry of Transportation and Highways says it can't afford to buy the land.

The usable area is too small for a hotel due to environmental setbacks from the channel, he added, but accommodates a hostel.

The proximity to downtown, rock-climbing areas, and

mountain bike and hiking trails all play into the location's potential. The hostel would offer users of Rose Park washroom facilities, parking and the necessary road extension, which is otherwise a municipal responsibility.

"We have the zoning, we have the financing, we own the land," said Vernon. "We're ready to go."

Addison and Vernon spoke with council Dec. 12, who

recommended they apply for a development permit so formal discussions can begin.

"We're not about to draw something until people say 'Wow, we like it,'" Vernon said, but he promised it would be of the same quality as Marina Estates, which he developed. "It'll be built by local people, you can quote me on that."

"Building from scratch is something I'm pretty excited about," said Addison. "Most youth hostels are converted from other buildings."

"Between the recreation Squamish has to offer and the facilities the hostel will offer, we should draw people from across Canada."

Marketing has been limited by the current hostel's size, Addison said. Many university clubs, for instance, are too large to be accommodated.

Competition with local hotels isn't a problem, he added, citing the hostel's projected \$18/night fee.

"The people who come and stay do spend quite a bit of money [on food, clothing and equipment] while they're in town," Addison said.

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Reserve house fire ruled accidental

Squamish Fire Rescue have ruled last Monday's fire on the Stawamus Reserve to be accidental.

After a three-day investigation involving Fire Rescue, the BC Coroner's Office, Office of the Fire Commissioner, the BC Gas Branch and an arson dog from

Surrey, the cause has been ruled undetermined and the investigation has ended.

"It was a pretty intensive investigation by our standards," said Fire Chief Ray Saurette. "We concluded that it was an accidental fire."

Saurette downplayed rumors that a gas line was left on

overnight and then in the morning a lighter was used, causing the fire to start.

"If that were the case the home would have exploded and that did not happen," Saurette said.

An elderly man died in the fire that started in the home on Dec. 11 just before 7 a.m.

behind Totem Hall.

The man's name still has not been released by Squamish RCMP as some next of kin still have to be notified.

Representatives from the Squamish Nation did not return phone calls as of press time to comment further on the incident.

School board drops corporate sponsorship committees

With several trustees agreeing corporate sponsorship in the Howe Sound schools is currently a non-issue, plans to create three committees to revise sponsorship guidelines have been dropped.

Instead, Trustee Betty Connell will review the existing policy and bring forward a report in April.

The decision was made Wednesday at the Howe Sound School District board trustees meeting.

It was prompted by a submission from then-vice-chairman (now board chair) Andrea Janyk.

At a Nov. 8 committee of the whole meeting, school stakeholders had an opportunity to comment on corporate

sponsorship and what, if any, changes needed to be made to policy governing its presence in local schools.

"There's not a lot of disconnection with the current policy," Janyk said of the comments made Nov. 8.

The principals estimated business involvement in schools generates about \$100,000 a year — equal to a little less than one per cent of the total district budget.

She also noted district administrators, parents and teachers worked hard to put forward a position paper, and it would be inappropriate to ask them to replicate that work in committees.

That there was to be a committee in each of the district's major municipalities was another complication.

"I definitely got the feeling in Whistler that there wasn't a need for a sub-committee, that the policy is adequate," said Trustee Alix Nicoll.

The major concern is not community partners, but large corporations becoming an inappropriate presence in schools. All of the groups at the Nov. 8 meeting expressed a desire to keep students from becoming a captive advertising audience.

The motion to drop the committee idea was carried with Trustee Judy Bourhis opposed.

Nicoll's motion to revisit the policy and possibly revise or tighten the standards set out was approved. Connell, who originally raised the issue in October, will review the material already submitted and solicit further input prior to her April report.

Interested parties have until March to submit comments.

Janyk beats Shoup for school board chair

Briefs from the Dec. 13 meeting of the board of trustees for Howe Sound School District (No. 48)

Trustee Andre Janyk won the election for board chair over Amy Shoup, but nobody wanted Janyk's former position of vice-chair.

Trustees Judy Bourhis and Don Ross were both nominated beforehand for the chairmanship, but declined to let their names stand.

All seven trustees refused to be nominated for vice-chair, forcing the board to postpone the issue to the January meeting.

When asked, all of the trustees except Bourhis declined to be nominated. Bourhis equivocated, suggesting instead the position be rotated every three months similar to Squamish council's acting mayor.

Shoup objected, saying she felt it was necessary to have an appointed vice-chair.

"It [policies manual] says you shall elect a vice-chair, but if nobody's willing to let their name stand then I don't think you have any choice but to postpone it to the next meeting," said secretary-treasurer Nancy Edwards.

The five oldest Squamish schools will share approximately \$40,000 worth of non-structural seismic upgrades after the district received funding for the project from the province.

The upgrades will include things like anti-shatter film on windows, restraints for light fixtures and tie-downs for furniture, director of facil-

ities Rick Hume told the board.

The five elementary schools involved are Garibaldi Highlands, Mamquam, Squamish, Stawamus and Valleycliffe.

Squamish's other schools are all new or recently renovated and comply with the latest seismic codes.

Mamquam Elementary School will have a new name come this spring after the board approved a change to recognize the school's bilingual curriculum.

École Mamquam School will now appear on all stationary and the outside sign, though that particular change-over may have to wait a few months.

Principal Jeff Larcombe said Thursday the school wants to install a new sign, but Hume indicated the change would be made this spring when weather permits painting.

The school's interior signs were recently made bilingual.

Statistics Canada received belated consent from the board to include Howe Sound in its National Longitudinal Survey of Children and Youth.

The survey follows a sample of Canadian children from infancy to adulthood, collecting information every two years.

This includes interviewing the children, their parents, teachers and principals.

Statistics Canada asked for consent by Dec. 1 to conduct interviews with Howe Sound teachers and principals; the parents of subject students give their consent first, however.

The province-wide goal for 2000 is \$1.45 million and the campaign runs through January.

Kahlon was part of a group of 15 people from the Lower Mainland, four from Lions Clubs, working for the Third World Eye Care Society (TWECS).

The Society makes annual trips to Third World Countries, setting up free clinics for residents. Participants pay their own airfare and are billeted at the local clinic — in this case, a hospital run by Catholics from Toronto.

In Colcapirhua, a town of 3,500 in the province of Cochabamba, the group worked 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. for two straight weeks with two

days off. Treating more than 3,500 people at a makeshift clinic and in a local prison. They also handed out more than 2,700 pairs of glasses, both prescription and sunglasses, collected from all over the Lower Mainland, including Squamish.

"There were lineups around the block every day," Kahlon said.

Kahlon's main task was to do initial diagnosis of patients entering the clinic, checking medical histories and administering preliminary vision tests.

Kahlon doesn't speak Spanish, but quickly learned enough — "about 20 words" — to do most of his clinic work without an interpreter.

Many of the clinic's patients were elder Kechva — the native population — many of whom had huge cataracts impairing their vision due to overexposure to the sun.

Helping the elders and young people to see — one nine-year-old Kechva boy they treated was nearly blind from cataracts — was a highlight of the trip for Kahlon.

"They come with a three-

or four-foot world, and after you help they have a 50- or 60-foot world," he said.

"You see a brightness in their eyes. It's just amazing."

The saddest part of the trip for Kahlon was the last day. With a lineup a quarter-mile long, the group knew they

wouldn't be able to treat everybody, so they started picking the poorest people from the line for priority treatment.

Even then, there were so many that some of those in desperate need of eye care couldn't be helped.

"That was a little disturbing," Kahlon said.

But he's still proud of the group's effort, and hopes to make another trip with the Society in the future.

"We can't solve all the problems of the world, but it's a good start."

Rotarians bring Christmas cheer to Guatemala

Ueli Liechti and Owen Carney helped Santa out a bit early this year bringing Christmas gifts to the people of Guatemala.

Liechti and Carney arrived back in Squamish Dec. 11 after spending 10 days starting work on a new medical clinic that will service about 70 villages.

Earlier this year Liechti spent five weeks in Guatemala as part of a \$25,000 Rotary International project organized by north-western Rotary Clubs, including the Squamish club of which both are members.

Fellow Rotarian Greg

Gardner was also supposed to be on the trip, but he injured his leg and was unable to make the trip.

The 11-day trip was quite the experience for the pair, with a number of unexpected happenings.

The main goal of the trip was to find land for the medical clinic, which they did — 250 acres on a high plateau that will cost around \$70,000 US.

An access road of about 7 km must also be constructed and Liechti estimates that will cost about \$100,000.

Fund-raising efforts have already begun as the pair have approached private individuals in the community and Rotary Clubs all over

North America.

"We met our target for the trip, now we have to get the funding going," Liechti said.

"Obviously it's going to be a long term project, but we're in this for the long haul."

Even though construction on the clinic has yet to start, a group of five doctors from Portland, Maine have com-

mitted five years of medical service once the clinic is operational.

"These people came through other Rotary clubs and Internet messages," Liechti said. "This is just huge because not only do they bring experience, but they will also train the locals in proper medical care."

While scouting for the land during the trip, Liechti and Carney checked out a housing project which was under construction.

The government was supposed to build a road, but didn't, so Carney and Liechti decided to pitch in.

"We knew they had to get the homes in, so we decided that we had to fly them in,"

Liechti said. "Owen has raised about \$15,000 locally to pay for the flying time and we'll be helping out to complete that project."

The pair also threw a Christmas party while in Guatemala, pitching in and cooking lunch while handing out 150 blankets and three television sets.

"Greg paid for all the blankets. It was a shame that he couldn't make it," Liechti said.

"Every time we go down there, there is a need that we don't anticipate. These people need a lot of help."

"What we've done so far is fantastic, but we still have a lot of work and a lot of money to raise."

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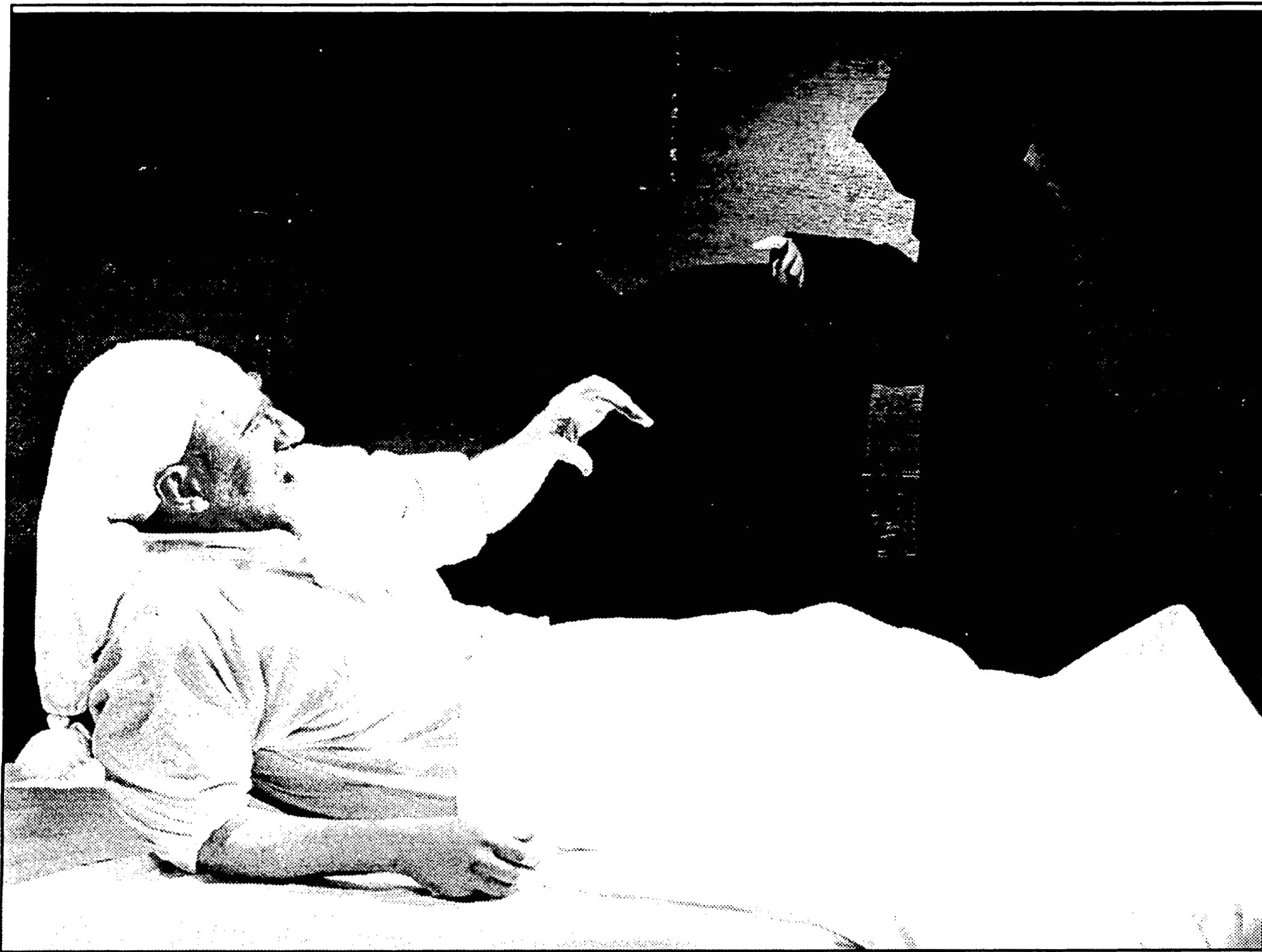

Scrooge comes to Squamish

Skai Stevenson is one busy doctor this month — and it's not because of flu season.

Fresh off of his outrageous performance as Dame Foxtrot in the Christmas pantomime *Hickory Dickory Dock*, Stevenson is back on stage this week as one of the most famous characters in history — Ebenezer Scrooge.

The group which brought an evening of Shakespeare to the Brackendale Art Gallery (BAG) last year are back with *An Evening With Dickens*, featuring Charles Dickens' best-known and best-loved tale, *A Christmas Carol*.

The play, which runs Wednesday through Friday (Dec. 20-22) at the BAG, is "an interactive Yule celebration" with 19th-century music, songs and an authentic Victorian dinner, right down to the plum pudding.

Playing the dour, cold-hearted Scrooge is, of course, a far cry from the over-the-top antics of pantomime. Stevenson says there's much more of Tobias, the character he played in *A Delicate Balance* earlier this spring than Dame Foxtrot.

"The difference is Scrooge does see the light," Stevenson says.

Stevenson's professional background also helped him build the character. He recalls attending a conference five years ago on experiential therapy, where patients worked through memories of emotional crises through dra-

matic re-enactments.

That winter he saw *A Christmas Carol* performed at the Eagle Eye Theatre in Squamish, with Mark McConchie as Scrooge, and had a revelation.

"It wasn't Virginia Satyr who came up with this [experiential therapy], it was Dickens in the 19th century," Stevenson says. "He's shown what his past life was, the consequences of his actions and he's given an opportunity to change his ways."

Therapeutic value aside, the message of *A Christmas*

Carol is timeless, says director David Cairns, who wrote the stage adaptation himself from Dickens' original novel.

On stage, Cairns portrays Dickens himself narrating the tale — as he did this summer and last winter portraying William Shakespeare.

"We wanted to do something with a Christmas theme, and it's a great message," says Cairns.

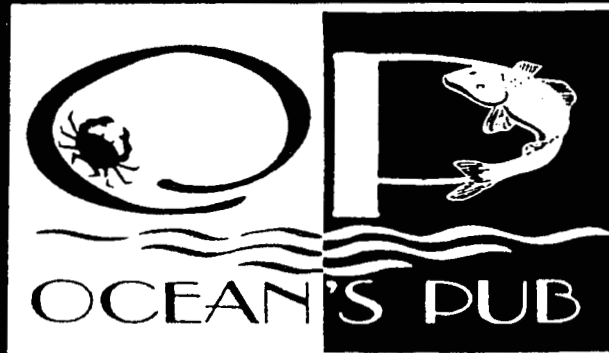
Local actors and musicians make up the rest of the company, with Magic Wanda, Manuel Schulte, Kiki Lightburn, Carla Fuhre, Lyra

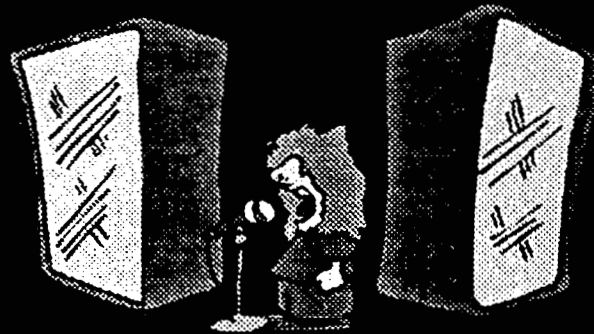

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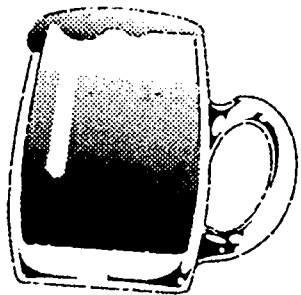

Riding the night shift

RCMP make the rounds during the holiday party season

When the Party Ends

It's a cold Friday night in Squamish and I'm riding shotgun next to one of the boys in blue.

Const. Dan Seward of the Squamish RCMP is at the wheel and we're cruising the streets looking for any signs of trouble.

With the Arctic-like conditions, the streets seem relatively quiet, although I'm instructed by Seward not to

think or even utter the "q" word.

"When Jack Frost comes out it's like having 10 extra police officers on the street," Seward said.

"The snow tends to keep people indoors and not out on the streets causing trouble."

Seward started at 3 p.m. and will be on till 3 a.m. this night, stopping briefly to grab a sip of coffee or a sandwich at his desk while going through mountains of paperwork.

Our first call of the night involves an alleged assault involving a couple and alcohol seems to be a factor.

Thanks to witness information, Seward locates the car, arrests the man and calls an ambulance for the female.

After Seward reads the suspect his rights, we head back to the detachment where the suspect is processed and put in the cells to sleep it off.

Before the assault case, there were three accident calls near Furry Creek a few traffic driving calls and another assault.

It's typical of a Friday night in Squamish to get 24 to 30 calls, but of course the weather is helping to keep the traffic light.

"At this time of year there is not more alcohol-involved calls because you have more parties and more people in the bars," Seward said.

"We have a good rapport with the bar staff at all the establishments and that helps a lot in keeping the problems down. I think the community is also starting to recognize that we have an increased presence on the roads and

that we're targeting the drinking and driving and the violence that can be associated with it."

At this time of year, members are out in much larger numbers with their Counter Attack road checks.

"Once the bars shut down and everyone comes pouring out into the streets you can't be at your desk doing paperwork, you have to be out on the road," he said as we patrolled through Brackendale.

"Our focus is on the drinking, violence and of course property crimes. At this time of the year the community

stays awake a lot longer and you have to be prepared for everything."

After a quick coffee break around 1 a.m. it's off to Squamish General Hospital to check in with

the staff there, then back out on the road patrolling the community.

It's getting close to closing time for the bars, so Seward and the other members start doing their walk throughs at the watering holes, checking with bar staff and making sure no one gets behind the wheel when they shouldn't be.

"The safe driving programs that a lot of the bars have in place are helping out a lot," Seward said. "You still see people who are willing to take the risk, but I think for the most part people are pretty responsible and choose a different option."

Leave the keys at home

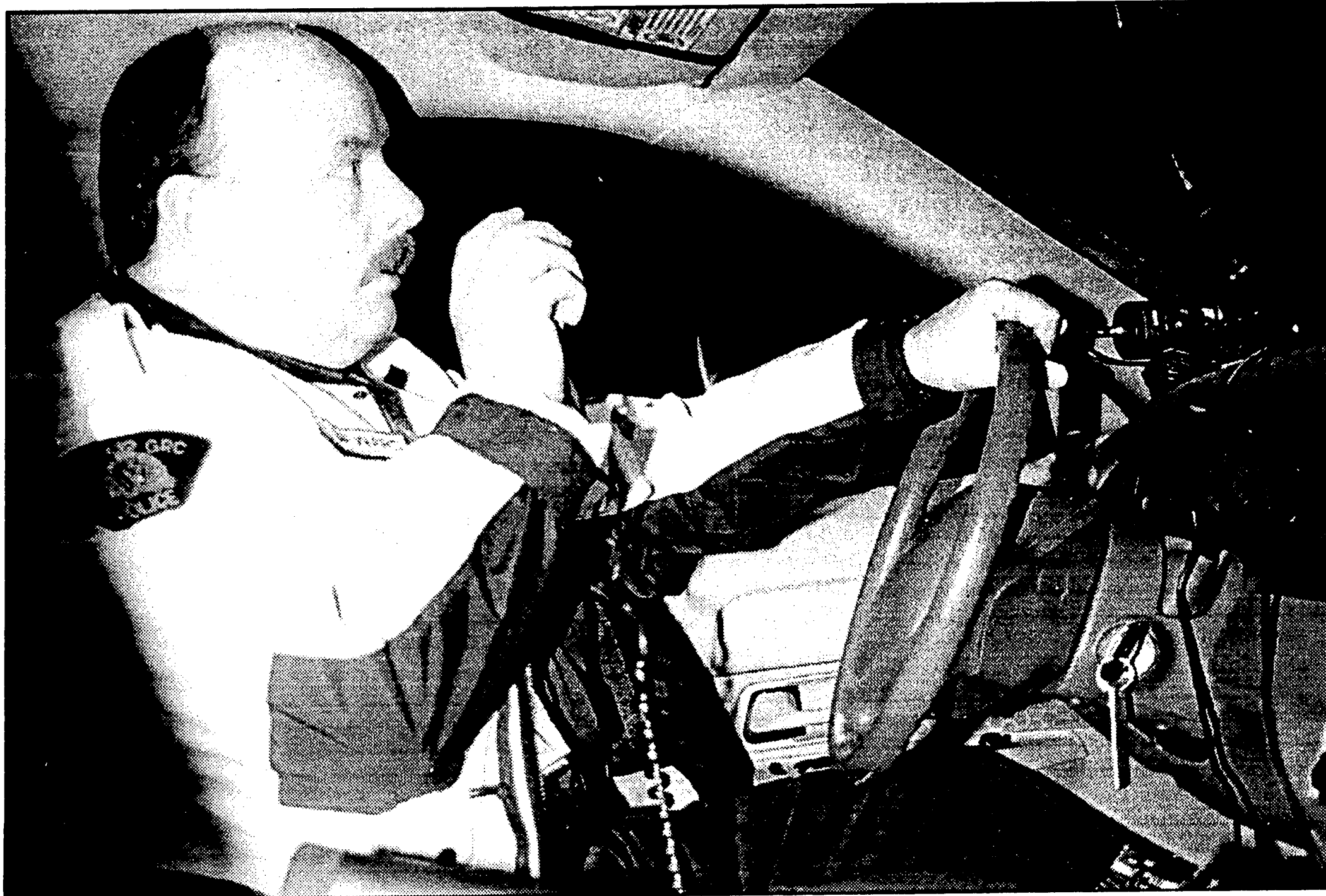

There will also be no service on New Year's Day, Jan. 1.

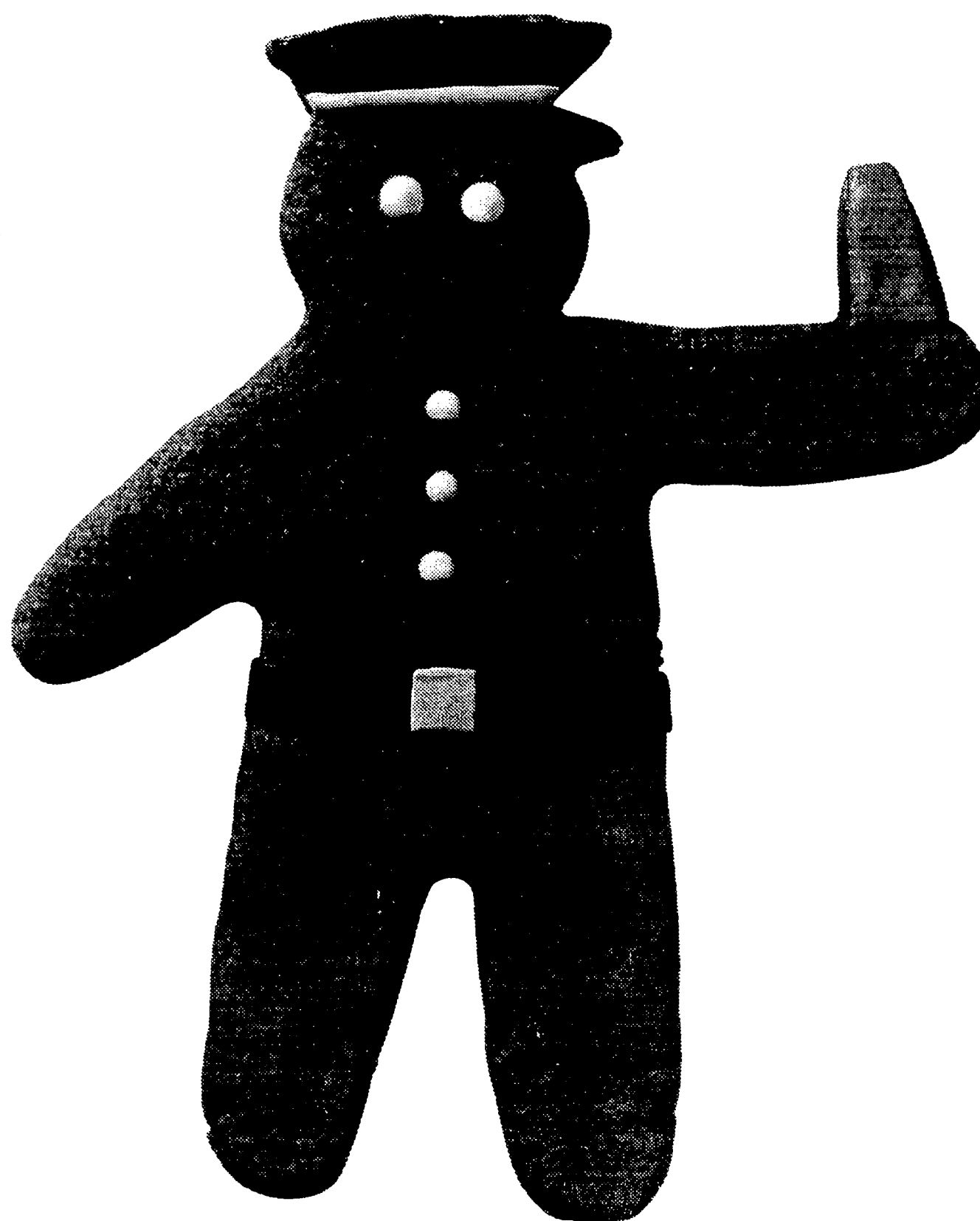

Seniors housing agreement changes

New deal gives Society longer to build on Block R downtown

The Squamish Senior Citizens Home Society will no longer have to construct new units on Block R downtown within three years or accept disabled people once those units are up.

Council approved the housing agreement with the society, as amended, by a 6-1 vote at its Dec. 5 meeting. Coun. Raj Kahlon was opposed.

The agreement sets out the terms for transferring a 1.5-hectare parcel in Block R from the District of Squamish to the Seniors Home Society.

It had included the disabled among those eligible for the low-cost housing, as an exception to the minimum age of 55. "We don't have the facilities or staff to care for people who are disabled," the society's Dan Sullivan told council. "If we did, by all means they're welcome."

The main concern was those with substantial difficulty in caring for themselves, he said. Cases are dealt with individually; a disability does not automatically make one ineligible.

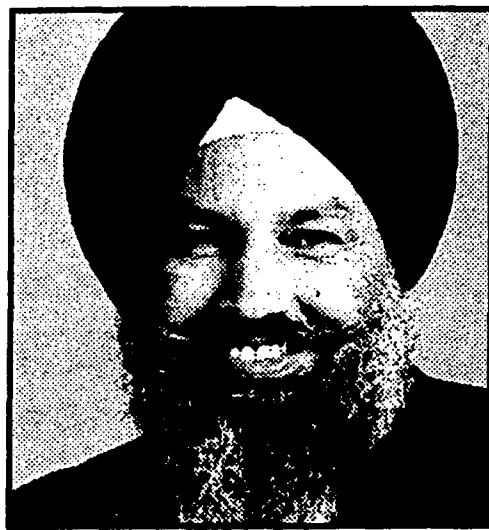
Kahlon wanted to keep the exception, citing young people who may not require special care but do need affordable housing.

"In Squamish right now we have no facilities for disabled people," he said. "Let's keep the options open."

"The way this is written means the Seniors Home Society would be bound to provide housing for people who are not seniors," replied Mayor Corinne Lonsdale, saying this would conflict with the purpose of the society. If that could be considered discrimination the matter will doubtless arise when the society applies for government loans, she added.

Kahlon also objected to dropping the three-year deadline between the signing of the agreement and occupancy of residential units. The removed clause would have returned the property to the district if the deadline was not met.

"First of all we need to get

the land in our name and then we can go looking for some money," said Sullivan. "There is a demand and there is money out there right now."

"I don't look at the housing society as a normal, fly-into-town-by-night-type developer," said Lonsdale, adding the transfer is a matter of providing for the future.

"Mr. Sullivan and the current directors are keen to build, but who knows what will happen in the future," said Coun. Shelley Smith.

Smith argued the deadline would ensure the matter came back to council if nothing was done within three years.

"If the society is not in a position to build senior's housing, maybe somebody else is," said Kahlon.

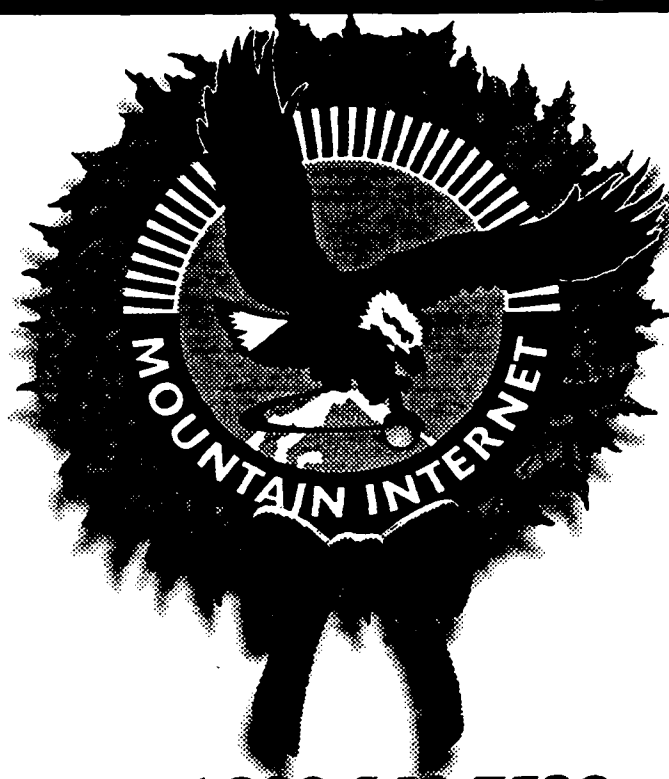

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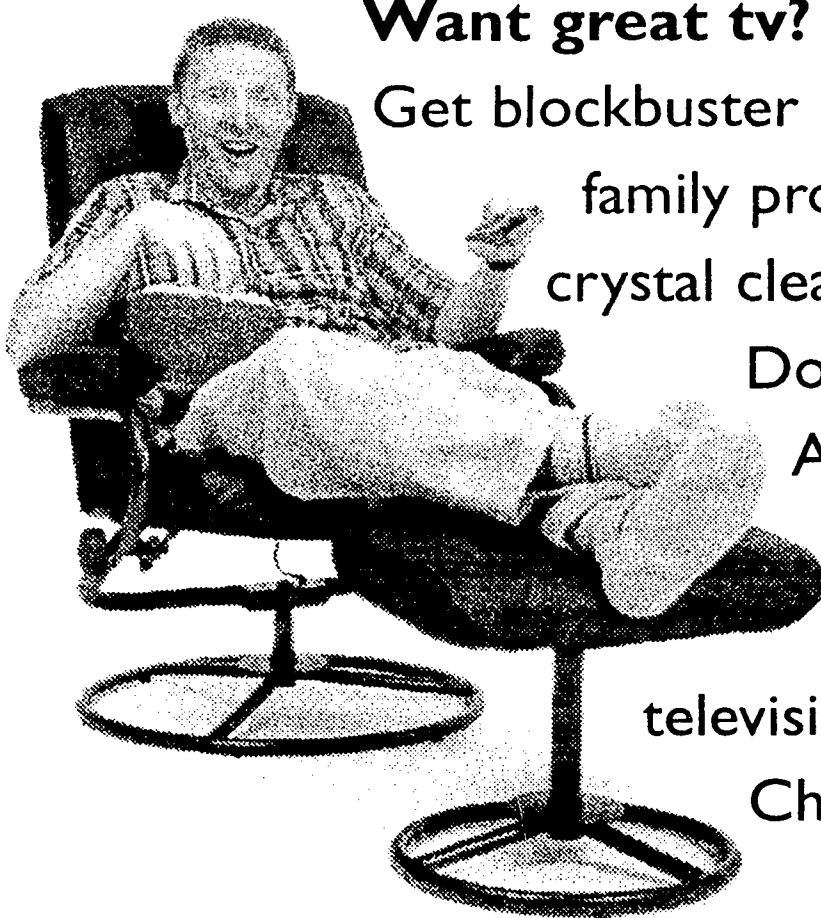

New child care for 2001

The approaching New Year will be a time of celebration for families and the child care community. B.C. is taking its first step towards a publicly funded child care system that will provide affordable, accessible, quality childcare for children in our province. The provincial government has made a significant commitment to providing a comprehensive child care system that meets the changing needs of working families.

The first phase of the Child Care BC program will begin Jan. 1, 2001. It will be offered in licensed out-of-school care programs and result in savings up to \$1,100 per child per year. Fees will be based on every school day each child is enrolled in eligible programs. Families will pay up to \$7/day for children in grade 1 to age 12. The fee will be \$14/day for children in kindergarten, with the fee remaining the same on school holidays and breaks. Currently, summer holidays are not included in the program. In addition, transportation costs, extended hours, meal programs, late fees and any NSF charges are not included.

Families with low or moderate income levels can still apply for the child care subsidy through the Ministry of Social Development and Economic Security and may

be able to benefit economically from both government programs. Families need not apply for the Child Care BC initiative.

Licensed group child care providers participating in the program will access the program for you.

In the future, the government plans to expand the new program to provide publicly funded child care to younger children. This will be dependent on the budget. However, the provincial government currently plans to spend \$188 million on child care annually.

The provincial government has listened and responded to the recommendations and changing needs of British Columbians.

The challenges and urgency of providing safe, quality care for our children has taken priority. Many parents have little choice but to send their children home alone after school until they get home from work. Parents across the province worry daily about the safety of their children. Now they will be able to access affordable, safe care, while maintaining economic independence. This is a step in the right direction.

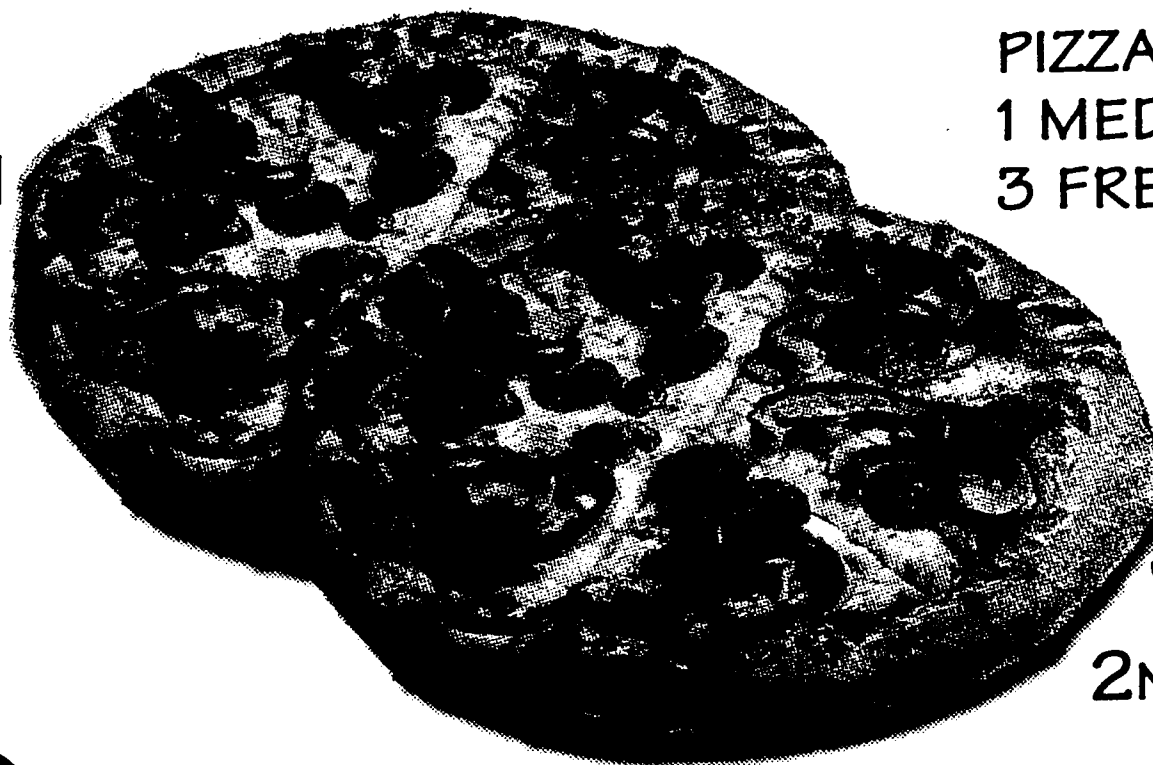
When he worked with us, he used to joke all the time that he should just skip the bar and go right to the bench. Now it's finally happening."

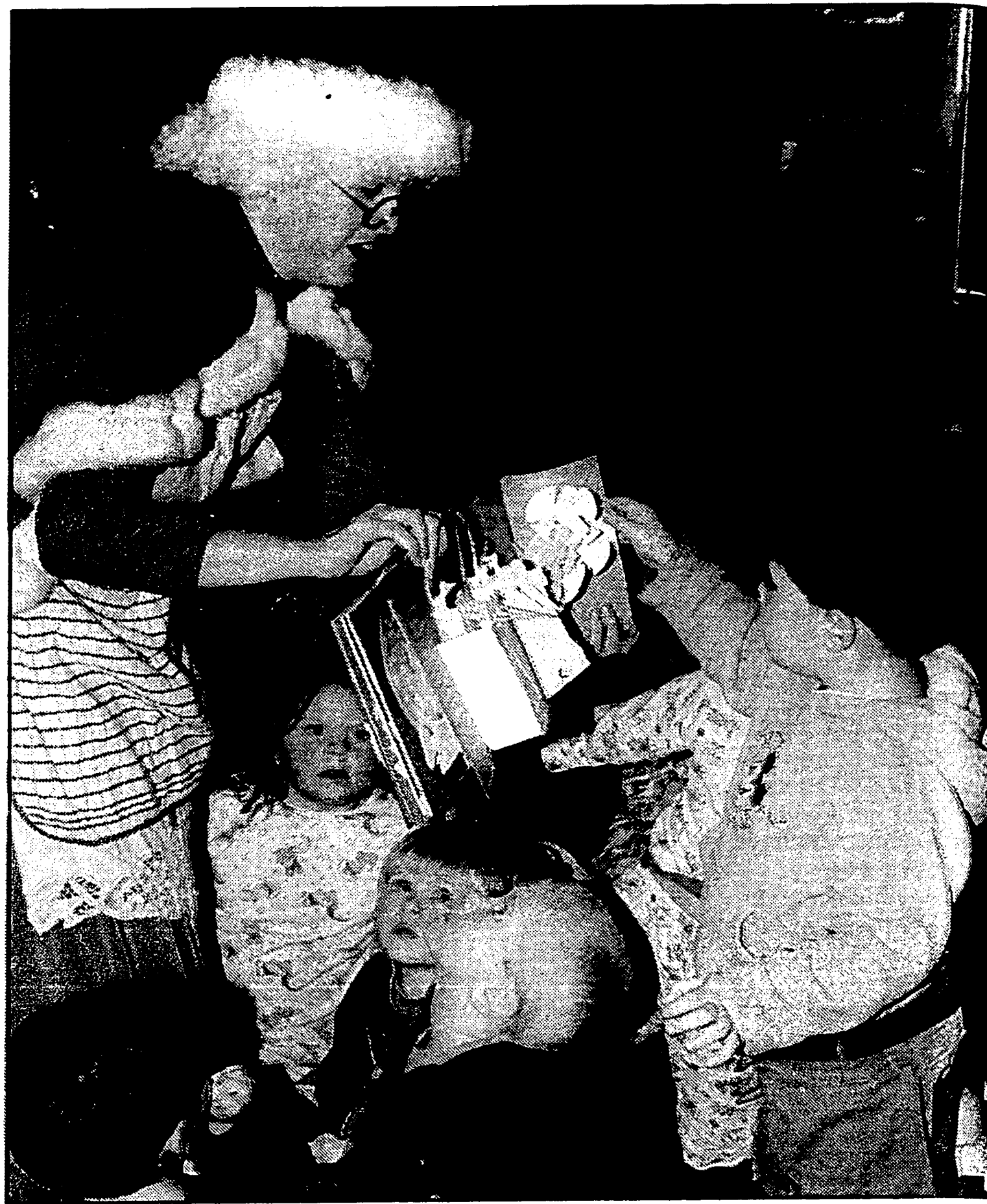

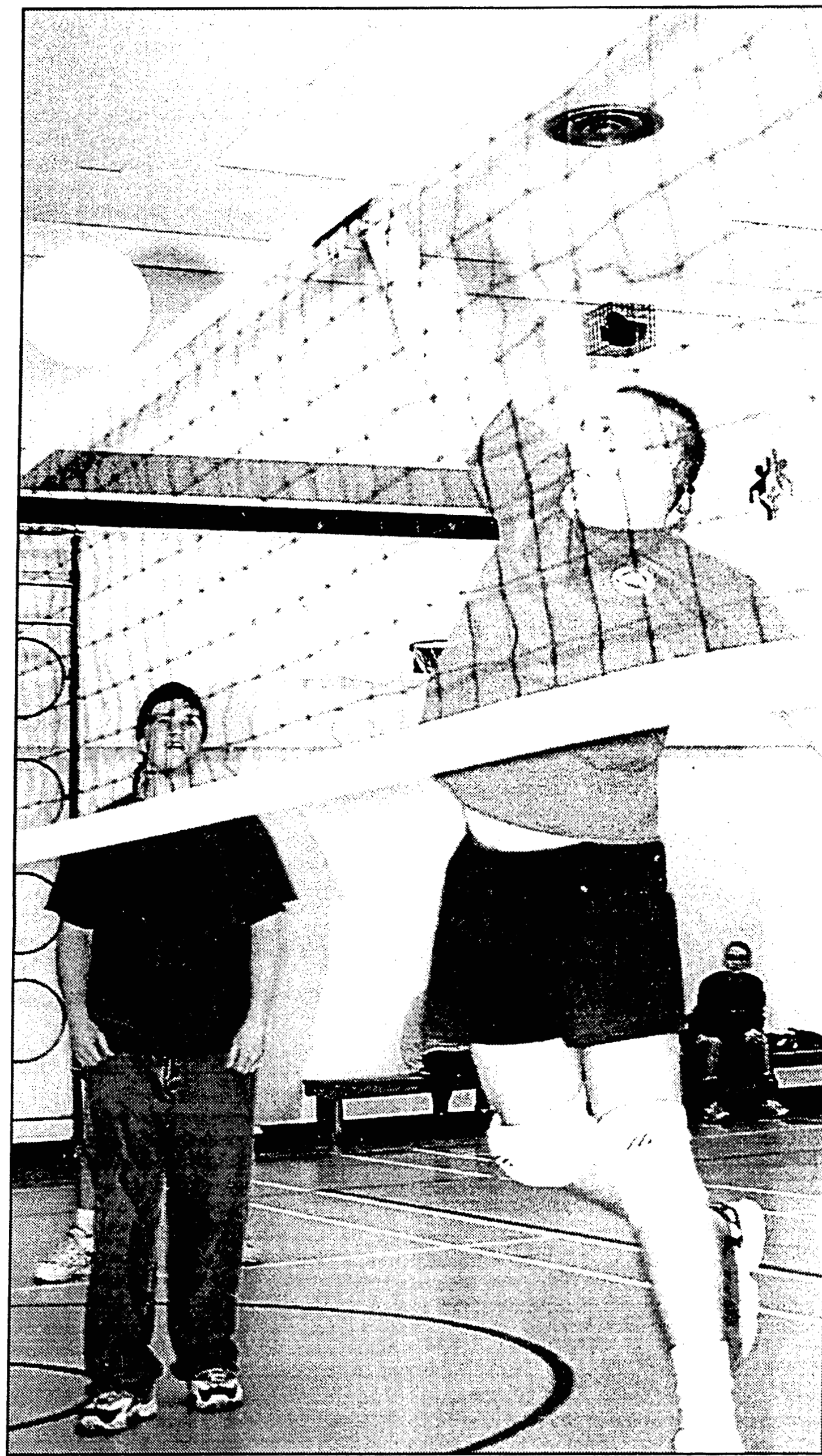
ers, coaches and parents, and the said coaches, parents and players in minor ball: thanks for your dedication to your chosen sport and showing us all what youth sports is about in this community.

SNOW AND ICE CONTROL - INFORMATION TO RESIDENTS

During winter snowstorm events sometimes our efforts are slowed by having to deal with situations that are time-consuming. We respectfully request that you the homeowner assist our effort by considering the following.

- Remove all vehicles from the street in front of your house as this makes passage of the snowplows and sanders much easier.
- Do not place garbage cans on the road- keep them on the sidewalk and remove them as soon as possible after they are emptied.
- When shoveling snow from sidewalks and driveways, place the snow on your lawn to the right of the driveway as this prevents the snowplows from plowing the snow back into your driveway.
- If you have a catch basin in front of your house at the curb, please shovel it out so that the melting snow will go into the basin and not into your driveway or house.
- Never push snow onto the street in hope that the snowplow will push it away. Snowplows always push to the right, so the snow would then be pushed back into your driveway. Also, any snow that you place back on the road is very dangerous to all motor vehicles.
- Do not attempt to stop the sanding and plow truck drivers, as they are working hard to keep your street in a safe driving condition. If you have any inquiries please contact the Engineering Department and they will be pleased to assist you.
- Clear the snow from your sidewalk as soon as possible, for it is to your

benefit to have a clear sidewalk.

- Advise the children to walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic, to prevent getting in the way of snowplows.
- Advise children against building snow structures in snow banks on the side of the streets as the streets will be widened out and children may be injured.
- Advise children against playing sports on the streets when the streets are to be plowed. This causes hazards for the operators and for other motorists, because stopping distances increase with poor road conditions.

Clearing of all the streets takes time and planning to get the most benefit out of our resources. If your street gets missed, please be patient.
We thank you in advance for your understanding and co-operation.

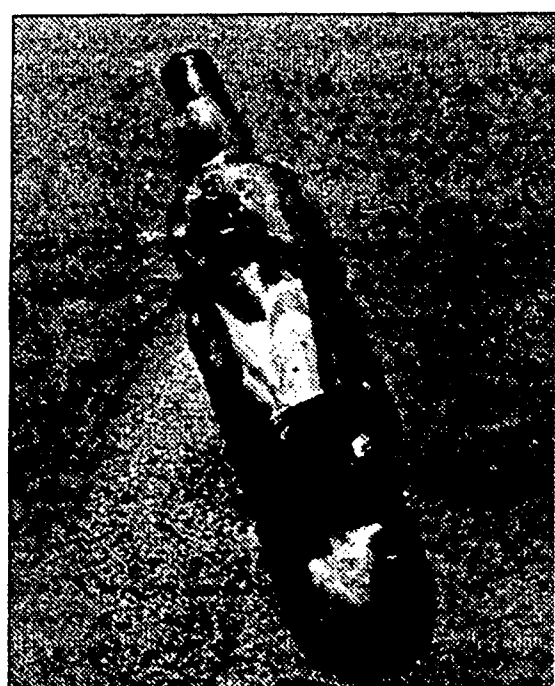
