Theatre set to re-open

Spy Kids, The Mexican first films this weekend

Moviegoers will have a place to go on the weekends other than the video store to get their Hollywood fix.

The Eagle Eye Cinema at Howe Sound Secondary School is set to re-open this Saturday (May 19) under new management with a long-term outlook.

Ahmad Tohidi, the new manager/owner of the theatre, said he wants to bring a real community feel to the theatre.

Tohidi, who owned a cinema in Vancouver and has an educational background in film production and exhibition, lived in Squamish in the early 1980s and still holds a place for the community in his heart.

"I was in the cinema business a few years ago and then I saw what happened in Squamish, I wanted to bring

back," Tohidi said. "This has taken a long time through negotiations with the school board, but we're finally here — movies can roll again."

"The school board has been trying very hard to be accommodating and it has been going well," said Tohidi.

"I really see this as something beneficial for the community. Because this is a community theatre, it's not possible to run seven days a week."

"I think by offering it on the weekends, the community can take full advantage of it." Tohidi said the cinema could be very similar to the one he tried last January by the operators of Whistler's Rainbow Theatre.

It will feature first-run movies in the 182-seat theatre in Squamish on Fridays,

Saturdays and Sundays.

Show times on Fridays and Saturdays will be at 7 and 9 p.m., with an occasional 5 p.m. showing on Saturdays and a 5 and 7 p.m. showing on Sundays.

The first two movies to hit the screen this weekend will be Spy Kids starring Antonio Banderas at 7 p.m. and The Mexican starring Brad Pitt and Julia Roberts at 9 p.m.

Admission prices will be \$6.50 for adults, \$6 for students and \$5 for seniors and children. To help usher in the opening weekend, a two-for-one special will be offered to moviegoers for the Sunday 7 p.m. showing.

A hotline number for information at the theatre is available at 892-3313.

"I don't want to talk too negatively about the previous ownership, but to me the biggest difference is going to be the person who is running it," Tohidi said. "Before we had long distance management in my


opinion. I don't think it's anyone's fault really that it didn't work the first time. All I know is that I'm going to put my heart and soul into this project and

I really want the community to see this cinema as their own. I want to know what type of movies people want and we'll do everything we can to deliver them."

Other things Tohidi wants to implement are promotional nights offering two for one admission or opening up the theatre to community groups for a night out at the movies.

"We'll rotate the movies on a consistent basis, but if they're popular, we'd run them longer," he said. "It's going to be first-run movies, but I'm also open to the idea of bringing in some older ones as well. If there is a big enough response, we'll try it."

"I'm really looking forward to opening night. I think this is good for Squamish and I hope people are ready for it too."

Police bust meth lab

Squamish men facing multiple charges

What started out as a routine break-in investigation last week ended as a major drug bust.

Two Squamish men have been charged after an incident with a handgun last Monday (May 7) led police to a methamphetamine lab.

The case started when police were called to a Valleycliffe home after a report of a break-in involving a gun.

Two suspects were caught at the scene and a gun was recovered by police.

Forty-two-year-old Michael Henry Swan was charged

with breaking and entering, while 42-year-old Rodderick Gordon Creelman was charged with one count of breaking and entering, one count of uttering threats and two weapons-related charges.

RCMP continued their investigation into Creelman and obtained a search warrant on May 8 for his home.

Upon police entry, they found what appeared to be a methamphetamine lab.

"The search was suspended until trained officers, including a chemist and the hazardous material team, could attend the residence," said Const. Daniela Czymoch.

Police recommenced their search later in the evening and found a marijuana growing operation consisting of more than 100 small plants as well as a meth lab.

The lab consisted of a sig-

nificant amount of methamphetamine as well as chemicals that could have been produced a quantity of the drug that would have had a street value of a quarter of a million dollars, Czymoch said.

Police also found various weapons in the home, including one prohibited weapon and a significant amount of ammunition.

Police also found various parts of a vehicle that they believe to be stolen.

The investigation into the case continues.

As a result of the find, Creelman is facing additional charges, including one count of possession of a controlled substance, two counts of production of a controlled substance and two counts of production of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking.

Upcoming issues for the May 15 council meeting set for 7 p.m. in council chambers at Municipal Hall:

Council will consider authorizing the annual operating agreement for Squamish Transit, on a budget of \$615,000, with a net municipal cost of approximately \$182,000.

Pacino takes Squamish by storm

Insomnia producers love the Squamish atmosphere

Squamish stood in for Nightmute, Alaska last week as shooting began on the new psychological-detective thriller *Insomnia*.


The movie features Al Pacino who plays a veteran detective sent to a small Alaska town to investigate the murder of a teenage girl.

After his partner is killed, a primary suspect in the murder, played by Robin Williams, forces Pacino's character into a game of psychological cat-and-mouse.

The stakes escalate as he contends with an idealistic detective, played by Hilary Swank, and finds his own stability dangerously threatened.

The ensemble cast includes veteran actor Martin Donovan, who plays Pacino's partner, Paul Dooley as the town's police chief, Nicki Kats of Boston Public fame and Jonathan Jackson, who many will recognize from the *Young and the Restless*.

"When you have people like Al Pacino, Robin Williams

and Hilary Swank in your movie, you have no problem filling the other roles," said executive producer Charles Schlissel. "We got lucky. With everything going on in Hollywood, we've been able to secure just a phenomenal cast."

With a budget of \$50 million, the film company is sparing no expense.

"We picked Squamish for a couple of reasons," he said. "Geologically it has a very similar and striking look to Alaska and it also has that soul and working, blue collar feel to it. It's a very beautiful area and we're just thrilled that we were able to come up here."

Film crews arrived in Squamish last weekend and began filming on May 7, shooting driving scenes down Loggers Lane, an apartment scene behind Hudson House, in the Hospital Hill area of Valleycliffe, at Squamish Terminals and at the Squamish Windsurfing Spit.

"We put down about 10,000 square feet of grass and tore up the surface that the windsurfers had there before," Schlissel said. "It works out

best for both of us. We got to shoot our cemetery scene out there and they get a nice soft place to put their equipment down that is much more eco-friendly that they can enjoy for years to come."

After shooting wrapped up Friday, crews headed to Port Alberni for three days and we'll be back in Squamish the week of May 20.

"Squamish has been absolutely wonderful," Schlissel said. "Everybody here has been so warm and friendly. We realize that it's been a kind of a negative impact in certain ways — we've shut the town down essentially this week."

"It's been a great host town for us and all our crews are having a great time staying here."

Besides the work at the Squamish spit, the film crews have generated more than \$50,000 a day just staying in the community.

"I'd estimate that we're looking at close to half a million dollars Canadian spent here when it's all said and done," he said. "We're trying to use as many local things as possible be it actors or car-

penters to help build our set. "We want Squamish to be as much a part of the film as possible."

Anyone worried about the health of Pacino can put those fears aside.

A Vancouver radio station reported that Pacino broke his ankle on Thursday, when in fact it was just a slight sprain.

"Al is a very method actor — he gets very focused and very much into character," Schlissel said. "We try to keep all outside interferences away from him so he can do his work. We don't even talk to him. The only one who does is our director."

"It's just amazing to watch him work. Al is one of the hardest working actors around."

The film is tentatively set for release in the middle of January of next year, but Schlissel cautions that could change.

"Things will change a bit now that the strikes are being resolved in Hollywood," Schlissel said. "There is going to be a lot of product ready to come out and we'll try to get the best possible release date for this movie."



Brackendale Secondary renamed

Newly-expanded school to be named for Don Ross

In April, Don Ross missed a board meeting for the first time since being re-elected as a school trustee.

The rest of Howe Sound School District's trustees took advantage of the opportunity and renamed a school in his honour.

The renaming of Brackendale Secondary School to Don Ross Secondary School will take place in September at the official opening of the renovated and expanded building.

However, Ross is concerned about the potential impact on the school's culture and in a letter to the trustees (printed on page A15) has asked it be given some more thought.

"It's quite an honour," he said Friday. "At first I was really shocked, but then I began to think how Myrtle Philip handled being in Myrtle Philip School."

"This is something the board has been talking about for a long time," board chairwoman Amy Shoup said Friday.

The board decided against naming the new elementary school in Whistler after Ross.

"We wanted it to be a school in Squamish, Don's hometown," Shoup said. "With the renovations and additions ... we just thought that would be appropriate."

Other than Myrtle Philip Community

School, Howe Sound's schools are all geographically identified.

However, BSS' new library will be named after longtime trustee Margaret Marchant.

The board did not go through a full consultative process, in order to keep Ross from hearing about the idea prematurely, she said, though they did speak to school administrators.

"The name is being changed," said BSS vice-principal Bev Oakley.

"We're looking at Don Ross Secondary, home of the Brackendale Eagles."

Ross started his educational career with the Langley School District in 1950, then joined the Howe Sound School District in 1953 as secretary-treasurer.

Enrollment then stood at 773. Today it exceeds 4,800 pupils.

Ross' 36-year tenure as secretary-treasurer is a provincial record.

He oversaw the construction of

Blackwater Creek, Brackendale, Garibaldi Highlands, Mamquam, Myrtle Philip, Signal Hill, Squamish and Valleycliffe elementary schools, as well as the first incarnation of Brackendale Secondary School.

So far, two of Ross' children and three of his grandchildren have attended BSS.

Prior to becoming a school trustee in 1996 he was a councillor for six years, and has been involved in a myriad of community groups.

"I was telling somebody it's nice to have this done now, rather than posthumously," Ross said.

Surgeries cancelled at Squamish General

Nurses vote June 5 on "final" offer

A four-hour escalation in the nurses' job action May 4 caused the cancellation of three surgeries at Squamish General Hospital.

B.C. nurses seek major improvements in their collective contract with health employers, citing the need to attract and retain nurses during a worldwide shortage.

Minor job action, such as refusing to do non-nursing duties, has been in place since April 9. The B.C. Nurses Union enacted an indefinite ban on overtime April 26, following several short-term bans.

Until now, SGH managed to cope.

However, a reduced activity day May 4 put it at essential service levels.

The province-wide RAD, which consisted of study and action sessions, followed an offer from the Health Employers Association of B.C. that the BCNU termed

"not even competitive."

"There was a study session involving the operating room staff and the special care unit," Gloria Healey, SGH health services co-ordinator, said May 8.

The four-hour job action resulted in three minor elective surgeries not going ahead, but did not affect the rest of the day.

"Other than that — cancelling the operating room — there hasn't been any impact on patient or resident care," said Healey.

On May 7, the HEABC tabled another offer, which

they said brings B.C. nurses in line with their Albertan counterparts.

The nurses will vote on the offer June 5, but have already expressed dissatisfaction.

They point to a number of differences from Alberta, such as higher seniority requirements for top wages or the lack of employer contributions to RRSPs, and say per-kilometre allowances for community nurses are unfairly small.

"While we welcome the attempt by HEABC and the provincial government to move wages and premiums to

the Alberta level in the second year, the way they have done it will cost B.C. what limited competitive edge we had," said BCNU president Debra McPherson.

In a release to media outlets Thursday, HEABC chief executive officer Gary Moser attacked the BCNU's perpetuation of job action before the vote.

"The continuing strike can have no effect on the bargaining process," he said. "There is no one at the bargaining table to pressure. There is no effective government to respond."


Candidates questioned on BC Rail

What will you do to make Crown corporations, such as BC Rail, more answerable to the communities in which they operate?

The first principle under which Crown corporations should be operating is that they are responsible to their shareholders, the people of British Columbia. In order to do so, they should be accountable not only for their financial bottom line, but also for their contribution to the well-being of the province as a whole and to the communities

in which they operate.

The relationship between BC Rail and Squamish has been a difficult one. Its actions or lack of action have cost the community good-paying jobs and potential development.


If elected, I would call upon the minister responsible to conduct a full review of BC Rail's activities in recent years with a view to developing new guidelines governing its actions in the communities it was designed to serve.

Because of its extensive land holdings and its key role in tourism, transportation and the environment of the corridor, it is essential that BC Rail participate as a responsible corporate entity in future plans for the Howe Sound area.

This would include recognition of its important role in multi-modal transportation plans, and participation as a partner with local govern-

Crown corporations must meet with citizens committees to solve differences/negotiate a mutually acceptable solution.

If issue(s) are not resolved in a set time frame, the problem(s) should go to referendum in all affected communities. The formulation of questions must be agreed to by consensus.

If this does not work, each side should be able to formulate the question(s) they would like answered by the public.


If the answers result in splitting the community down the middle, all parties must go back to the bargaining table until a more proportional and more representative picture of the community as a whole can be obtained.

The well-informed electorate can then take on the task of resolving issues with whatever gifts of intelligence and leadership it or she possesses.



All-candidates meeting quiet

Nebbeling main target of questioners

For all candidates, Thursday's all-candidates meeting was the four provincial candidates squared in front of an audience that barely reached 50.

Those in attendance seemed to have little doubt as to who would be sent to Victoria after the provincial election May 15. Almost half the questions were directed specifically to the incumbent MLA Ted Nebbeling on what he would do as MLA.

Forestry, health care, education and privatization were the topics of the evening.

This is a province that is showing in red ink that privatization is a bad idea. Nebbeling, who gave the opening statement.

We have to go in a new direction, and we need a new government.

You can vote, but the dictatorial always gets in. You can't but don't forget to pay your taxes," said Marijuana candidate Robert Adam. If you vote for the Green Party, I commend you. If you vote for the NDP, you know you're not going to get in," he

The Green Party would like to bring the environment to the table," said Peter Tatoff, making the point a healthy economy requires a healthy environment. "It's time to get British Columbians and ask your piece, or there isn't going to be anything left."

The thrust of our campaign this point is to try and make we elect an effective position," said Barrie MacLeod, who pointed to the Democrats' long record on social and environmental issues.

Despite the problems Squamish has been having economically, we have the lowest rate of unemployment we had in this province in the last 10 years."

The questions

Following is a sampling of some of the questions all candidates answered.

By a show of hands can you guarantee BC Hydro would remain a publicly owned corporation?

Adam, MacLeod, Nebbeling and Tatoff all raised their hands.)

How will you ensure adequate, predictable funding for public schools?

Adam: "If we spend more money on education there will be more money in the economy because more people will be making higher wages."

MacLeod: "We've increased funding for education every year. Part of the problem ... is a lot of the

money is targeted."

Nebbeling: "We have made the commitment we will give school board the autonomy to have three-year budget cycles [versus the current year-by-year system]."

Tatoff: "An immediate 10 per cent increase. If we want to attract a diverse economy and high tech, we've got to start spending on education."

Would you open ICBC up to competition on mandatory car insurance?

Tatoff: No. "A young driver in B.C. is paying \$1,600 a year. I believe in Ontario

[unregulated] it's \$5,000. I saw it on BCTV, the Liberals' TV station."

Nebbeling: Yes. "Competition does two things: it makes the existing monopoly more efficient ... and naturally with competition rates come down."

MacLeod: No. "When private companies come in they cream off the best drivers. [ICBC] is the leading highway safety institute in North America and we all benefit from that."

Adam: No. "ICBC has a good program in place, it just needs trimming a little."



University hires local

**Project office
now staffed
regularly**

The Sea to Sky University Project's local face will be that of the man with the shortest tenure as mayor in Squamish's history.

William Haworth started work Wednesday at the Municipal Hall office of the planned private university.

As a Grade 12 student at Howe Sound Secondary School, Haworth took up the position of mayor during Local Government Awareness Week last year.

"I applied just looking for a summer job, basically spur of the moment," Haworth said Friday.

"I think it will have a great impact on my future. Working with people like [university founder] Dr. Strangway and [project leader] Peter Ufford will give me great experience and allow me to make contacts I wouldn't otherwise

have been able to make."

His duties will include talking to members of the public who visit the office, setting up a filing and archiving system, co-ordinating communication for the project team and establishing the project's website.

"There were 13 applications, and of the 13 we brought it down to four whom we interviewed," said Eugene Evanetz, a member of the Howe Sound Educational Foundation's project team.

While the 13 Squamish university students were extremely capable, Evanetz said, Haworth's experience with the Internet and website design gave him an advantage.

"The filing is certainly taking up a lot of time at the moment," Haworth said.

A small room off the office is already strewn with papers dating back several years, with more boxes coming up all the time.

The office was set up in large part to give the public access to information about the university project;

Haworth will be the first point of contact.

"The public is invited in anytime during District of Squamish hours, which are 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.," said Evanetz. "Any input the public can make will be appreciated."

The university aims to host

monthly open houses, of which two have already been held.

The next should be in early June and there will likely be some significant announcements made, Evanetz said.



Senseless vandalism

Managers of Camp Squamish have had enough

It started with a minor theft, but has escalated into major acts of vandalism.

Bonnie Driver and her husband Michael are the managers at Easter Seal Camp Squamish and have seen someone take the camp they take care of for granted.

About two months ago, they had the Golden Lion, a symbol of the camp, stolen from the property.

The disabled children that use the camp have played around it for years — they love it, said Bonnie.

"We move it around quite frequently for picture opportunities and we thought it would just turn up," Bonnie

said. "When we finally realized that it was gone, we reported the theft to police."

But the story doesn't end with one incident.

Acts of vandalism at the camp started on the weekends and hasn't stopped, despite the best efforts of the Drivers.

"It started slow — we'd go out in the mornings and find three or four pieces of wood ripped off from our fence," she said. "We'd repair it, but as fast as we'd replace it, someone would rip it back down again."

This scenario went on for about three weeks, then stopped, only to see it start up again on the other side of the fence.

Michael also erected a no dog sign on the fence and it was stolen the same night that he put it up. A weed eater was also stolen.

"What these vandals, whoever they are, don't understand is that this camp is here primarily for the children,"

Bonnie said. "We are completely non-profit."

To make things even more personal, last weekend the camp played host to a number of mentally challenged youth with caregivers.

Six of the vehicles that they came in were broken into over night.

The cars were damaged, locks were broken, personal items inside the cars strewn about and tires were slashed.

"This is way worse then damaging the fence," she said. "Here we have a number of families that have come up to our camp to have a good time and a weekend away from things, and this happens to them. These families have seriously sick children and have their lives filled with stress and then someone goes and breaks into their cars. We're shocked that people would be so purposefully mean."

"People were so scared that they had to park their vehicles

behind the property so it wouldn't happen again. This group has been coming for 17 years — nothing like this has ever happened before.

"It makes me sick when I think of the damage that has been done."

The Drivers have made a number of complaints with the Squamish RCMP, but hope that by coming forward it will bring the situation out into the open.

"I just want to let the community know and the people of Brackendale know what is going on," she said.

"By saying nothing it's just going to continue to grow and get worse."

Squamish RCMP Sgt. Gary Brine said they are aware of the problems at the camp and are looking into the matter.



Two arrested after carjacking

Lions Bay man robbed of car at knifepoint

Two men are in custody following a carjacking near Lions Bay on Wednesday afternoon.

Just before 3 p.m., Squamish RCMP responded to a 911 call reporting a theft of a car involving a knife.

West Vancouver Police joined in the investigation and set up a roadblock on

Hwy. 99 near Horseshoe Bay to try and catch the suspects.

The stolen Honda initially stopped at the roadblock, but then sped off.

The car was found abandoned a short time later near the Caulfield Road exit in West Vancouver.

West Vancouver Police then set up roadblocks again and began a search of the area.

"Alert West Vancouver police officers found the two suspects in another car attempting to leave the area and they were subsequently arrested," said Const. Daniela Czymoch of the

Squamish RCMP. The two men, a 20-year-old of Vancouver and a 16-year-old from Calgary were taken to the detachment in Squamish and held for court on Thursday.

Antonio Bruno of Vancouver has been charged with robbery and failing to stop for police, while the Calgary man has been charged with robbery and assault with a weapon.

Both men have been taken to Vancouver for a bail hearing. The investigation by police indicates that all the parties were known to each other and this was not a random act, Czymoch added.

One of the victims did receive two small cuts during the robbery and was treated at the scene by paramedics.

A knife was recovered by police from the Honda.

Charges laid in grow op

Federal crown prosecutors have finally laid charges against a Squamish man following a police raid in Brackendale in March.

Lorne Thomas Badger, 55, has been charged with production of a controlled substance and production of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking.

Squamish RCMP executed a search warrant just after midnight on March 12 at a detached garage/workshop on Government Road in Brackendale.

Police searched inside and found a sophisticated three-room marijuana growing operation in place.

Police seized 93 marijuana plants that were two to three feet in height, 113 seedling

marijuana plants and a variety of hydroponic equipment.

Police later went to a Brackendale home and arrested Badger.

Badger will make his next court appearance later in June.

In the early morning hours of May 6, police were patrolling the downtown core and a vehicle was seen driving in an erratic manner.

The vehicle was pulled over and the investigation revealed that the 39-year-old Squamish driver was impaired by alcohol.

The man was taken to the detachment where he provided breath samples.

The samples indicated that his blood alcohol content was more than three times the legal limit. Impaired driving charges are being considered.




Capital projects make big 2001 budget

At \$31,202,846, the District of Squamish's 2001 budget is the largest for the next five years by almost \$5 million. However, most of that difference is due to capital projects and debt payments on capital projects, which will amount to \$15.23 million this year.

Under a five-year financial plan adopted by council Monday, the 2002 budget's capital expenditure would be

only \$5.86 million.

The \$31.2-million figure includes general operations, sewer, water and capital budgets.

Council also adopted on Monday the 2001 tax rates, which are up across the board.

The municipality will collect \$10.4 million in taxes this year, compared to \$9.39 million in 2000.

The largest increase was to residential properties, which are up 3.77 per cent. The major industrial rate grew

0.55 per cent, while all other classes had increases ranging from 2.56 to 3.62 per cent.

Most homeowners will actually see their tax bills go up beyond that, as the average assessed value grew 0.75 per cent in 2000.

The average single family home is now valued at \$175,303, up from \$173,991.

As a result, municipal taxes on that home will be \$918.07, up from \$879.64 last year.

Special assessments for the Squamish Public Library, the new playing fields, the hospi-

tal district and the Squamish-Lillooet Regional District will add another \$222.55.

Coun. Paul Lalli cast the only opposing vote on the tax schedule, which made up a drop in the major industrial category's value from other property classes.

"I didn't support the tax shift," he said Saturday.

"If you're going to shift, do a review to justify it."

The Chief learned on Friday that the board of trustees of School District No. 48 has decided to re-name Brackendale Secondary School to Don Ross Secondary School once the final addition and renovation of the school is complete.

The new facility will accommodate 600 students and all the portable classrooms will be gone come September.

Naming the school in Ross' honour is great news as it rewards the many and varied contributions that he has made both to education and to the community of Squamish.

Ross has been in the education system for more than fifty years and has been a school trustee in Squamish since 1996.

What does that say for our future?



Alarming campaigns

The threat of "79 Gordon Campbells in the legislature" is a great line, but the likelihood of it having much of an impact is questionable.

Premier Ujjal Dosanjh's concession of first place in the upcoming election to the Liberal Party is hardly unexpected; the only surprise is how long it took the New Democratic Party to accept the inevitable.

Now both the Green Party and the NDP are asking the public to elect a credible opposition — themselves.

The NDP claim experience, while the Greens claim a clean record.

The most probable result will be vote splitting, even if the public decides to vote strategically.

Liberal parties are the only ones to have ever swept an entire province. In fact they've already done it twice, in Prince Edward Island in 1935 and in New Brunswick in 1987.

Liberals subsequently formed government in those two provinces for 24 and 12 years respectively.

A 65 per cent vote for the B.C. Liberals could easily give them all 79 seats, leaving more than a

third of the populace without a voice in the legislature.

The media, being outside the workings of government, cannot form an effective unofficial Opposition.

The electorate would have to rely on Liberal backbenchers to act as the government's conscience and speak up publicly when they feel something is wrong.

Thus, the manner in which the Liberals have run their campaign raises some warning flags.

First-time candidates refuse to appear at all-candidates meetings, not once but multiple times. Others read off prepared notes and refuse to respond to questions they don't have a written answer for. (Those two particular stupidities might be the only way for the NDP to gain office.)

No Liberals attend an all-candidates meeting hosted by nurses last week. Gordon Campbell wears a wire, so party workers can ensure the Liberal leader isn't caught without an answer to the same question twice.

Campbell has promised free votes, open cabinet meetings at least once a month and active legislative committees to "give

all MLAs and citizens a better voice in government."

Of course, free does not mean secret. The spectre of party discipline would still loom as MLAs stand to be counted.

One open cabinet meeting a month leaves plenty of time for less publicity-friendly decisions.

Legislative committees only work so long as their members are willing to challenge the government line and force it to make its case; if they're all members of the government too, how well will that work?

Dosanjh asked during a radio debate with Campbell on Thursday how the Liberals can promise open government, when they can't run an open campaign.

Unless something truly shocking happens tomorrow, the people of this province are about to find out.

Bid News:

International Olympic Committee
awards and oversees the Games

The goal of the Vancouver Whistler 2010 Bid Corporation is to create a winning plan for the Olympic Winter Games and Paralympic Games that supports the long term community vision of and provides lasting benefits for Whistler, Vancouver, the Sea to Sky and Lower Mainland regions.

In order to win, the Bid Corporation must convince a majority of members of the International Olympic Committee (IOC) to award the 2010 Winter Games to Vancouver and Whistler.

French educator Baron Pierre de Coubertin, who was inspired to revive the Ancient Greek Olympic Games, founded the IOC in 1894.

The Committee currently has 127 active members (including four Canadians) and 20 honorary members. The IOC's pri-

mary responsibility is to award and supervise the organization of the Olympic Summer and Winter Games every two years.

Committee members are individuals who act as the IOC's representatives in their respective countries, not as delegates of their country within the IOC. The members meet once a year at an IOC Session.

After serving as president since 1980, Juan Antonio Samaranch of Spain will be stepping down with a new president to be elected on July 16, 2001.

Five candidates are in the running for the IOC presidency including Dick Pound of Canada who is originally from Ocean Falls, B.C. During a recent visit to Vancouver, Pound commented on the Vancouver Whistler 2010 Bid. "I urge that as much be done in advance of the final bid as is humanly possible," he said. "No candidate (for the Olympic Games) should ever forget that the primary interest of the IOC is to find the best city to host its event."

Some 30 work groups are currently examining every aspect of the Vancouver Whistler Bid, to ensure the final product is a winner.

Mental health clubhouse sought

Plans laid to improve mental health programs

Mental illness both isolates people and feeds on isolation, creating a vicious circle.

In Squamish, mental health service providers, clients and family are working to create a place where that circle can be broken.

The Dogwood Clubhouse would provide walk-in programs, vocational and life skills training and most importantly, a place for mental health clients to work their way back into society.

"We rent space from the Alano Club, but what we'd really like is our own space," said Laura Arason, the manager of adult mental health programs at Sea to Sky Community Services.

"Having our own space would mean we could offer more programs, on a more regular basis."

"There is a clubhouse in Powell River, there is a clubhouse in Sechelt, we feel it's time for one in Squamish," said Elsie Anderson, a family member of a client, and a member of Coast Garibaldi Health's mental health advisory committee.

"We're trying to bring forward recognition in the community. There is a need."

The plan is to rent or lease a space of about 100 square metres, and staff it through government funding.

Ideally, that would consist of \$130,000 to get two full-time staff members, but Arason said they'd be happy to get even a half-time position.

The start-up costs of equipping and furnishing the clubhouse, however, are estimated at \$11,000.

"If we have the start-up costs covered it would be easier to get the government [on board]," said Arason.

The current part-time clubhouse serves approximately 35 people, but that would likely grow as more programs are offered, said Amanda

Schell, the consumer representative on the CGH mental health advisory committee.

She pointed out CGH statistics show one in 10 suffer from some form of mental illness in their lives.

Even with just the three weekly programs they offer now, said Arason, the improvements are marked.





Library closed Saturdays

The Squamish Public Library Board announced Friday its decision to close the library on Saturdays.

The closure, effective June 9, is a result of a shortfall in funding.

The board made the move after learning last week that their budget for 2001 was cut by municipal council.

The board had asked for a proposed municipal grant of \$394,838 but council ended giving the board \$358,312.

"It's put us in a difficult position," said board chair Sonja Lebans. "The amount of money we received is 10 per cent less than required to maintain the current level of service."

"The board did not make its decision lightly."

Head librarian Maureen Painter identified rising costs as the problem.

"With salaries, maintenance and heating expenditures going up, our fixed costs have increased," Painter said. "Our hope this year was that we could maintain the status quo."

In addition to Saturdays, the library will be closing the

week of August 26 to September 2 and from December 24 to January 1.

Library programs will not be affected according to Painter.


"We'll probably move the Saturday programs to Sunday and staff will work to make the best of a bad situation," Painter said.

In addition to maintaining problems, the board has decided to continue with its current level of new book purchases.

However, the budget for purchasing new video and CD titles has been cut.

Painter said she was disappointed with the cutback given the level of use in the community.

The board pointed out that the Squamish Public Library level of municipal support is approximately \$26.52 per capita. This compares with \$28.63 in Gibsons, \$38.81 in Kitimat and \$48.91 in Vancouver.
