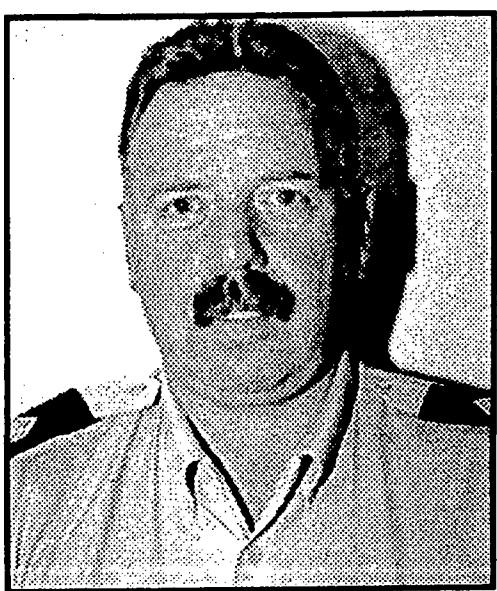

\$4.9 million for RCMP building

Site secured; Finch Drive spot likely

Under the gun to provide quarters for the RCMP detachment, Squamish council started the process to borrow \$4.9 million May 15 despite not having a site secured.

Unlike prior loans of this magnitude, council will not be borrowing bylaw to a referendum.

Instead, it will be submitted as a counter-petition process.

The counter-petition, signed by five per cent of eligible voters, would be required to trigger a referendum. The signatures would have to be collected and submitted within 30 days of notice being published in The Chief.

However, the district is still required to provide adequate quarters for the RCMP. Otherwise the federal government will do so and bill the municipality, an option it has used since February 1999.

The new detachment will most certainly be built on the northeast corner of Finch Ave and Hwy. 99.

That land, however, is not council property. The current fight is to include it in a land exchange with the province, though interested parties include the Squamish Chamber of Commerce and BCR Group of Companies.

Discussions are ongoing, Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said, but the ball is in the province's court.

Hopefully within the next few days we'll hear from them," she said.

Sgt. Cliff Doherty, the Squamish detachment commander, remembers moving to the current building in 1999.

It was almost too small then, he said, and the detachment has grown by 12 to 15 people since. In addition, the building

is sinking and walls are cracking.

"What we truly need is more room for 35 officers and 16 support staff to work in," he said. "This has been an ongoing process since 1989."

The detachment has 25 municipal and 10 provincial officers; the province pays the district rent to house the provincial officers.

The detachment needs 1,800 square metres of floor space; the current building is less than half that, despite the addition of two trailers in June 1998.

On April 1, 1999, the district committed, and the RCMP agreed, to a move-in date of April 2002.

Due to the various delays the project has encountered, the end of 2002 is attainable if work continues apace.

This presents another problem, as the district's bylaws only allow the trailers to remain in their current location until May 2002. Beyond that, the land would have to be rezoned. "I know it will be a very welcome announcement for members and staff of the Squamish detachment," Doherty said of the building loan bylaw.

Preliminary plans call for a two-storey building that would also accommodate the Squamish Emergency Response Program and act as a disaster response command centre.

Doherty said the \$4.9-million figure is a projection by the RCMP and the B.C. Building Corporation, but lacks specifics.

BC Rail gets new tenant

Up to 120 jobs to come from new business at car shop

BC Rail has secured an industrial tenant for the vacant car shop in its Squamish yard, with the potential for up to 120 jobs in a few years.

"It's a deal," Alan Dever, BCR Group of Companies director of communication, said Friday. "The subject-tos have been removed, so we have a lease."

Three days prior, Dever could only say the two parties were in final discussions.

The tenant will be an industrial user, but Dever said the Crown corporation wants to hold off on publicizing its name until certain govern-

ment-related issues are clarified.

Mayor Corinne Lonsdale, who first revealed the news at the Squamish Chamber of Commerce luncheon last Tuesday, said the tenant was coming from Washington state and the jobs would be similar in nature to BCR jobs.

"This building fits their needs to a tee," said Dever. "They've also had extremely good co-operation from BC Rail, believe me."

The tenant's business plan calls for a long-term lease. Initially they will employ a couple of dozen people, but aim to grow to a hundred in several years.

"We have been for years talking to a variety of tenants, looking for ways to use the facilities," Dever said. "The biggest thing for BC Rail and the community was to find a long-term industrial tenant."

The Crown corporation hired an industrial real estate

agent, with instructions to be aggressive.

"I believe they're going to be starting up in a couple of months," said Dever.

Chamber of Commerce president Jeff McKenzie said Thursday he hopes having one of the two empty buildings filled will create interest in the other.

The Chamber has been part of a task force on BC Rail formed in November after a series of layoffs at the Squamish rail yard.

The task force has been pushing BC Rail not only to retain jobs in Squamish, but also to fill the empty space.

The idea was to bring in industrial tenants who could employ some of the laid-off rail workers.

"It's just fantastic for the community because of the cumulative, upward spiral into the rest of the town," McKenzie said of the job creation.

The site itself, apart from the easy access to Hwy. 99, will be inexpensive to service and is not slated for other, revenue-generating development.

"Being positioned near the Brennan Park area is a good connection with the youth," Doherty said. "It's also central in the community."

"The plan is to nestle the building into the existing ter-

rain, the existing drainage of the area.

"We will only utilize the footprint necessary to put the building down and provide parking."

The building itself is

designed to accommodate five years worth of growth for the detachment.

"Whenever we [RCMP] build an office now we build so it's capable of being added onto," said Doherty.

Nebbeling gets his wish

MLA wins
Squamish one
vote at a time

For five years, Ted Nebbeling has wanted to win the hearts of Squamish's voters.

On Wednesday night, they gave him his wish — and the highlight of his re-election campaign.

After losing 21 of 24 polls to the NDP's Brenda Broughton in 1996, Nebbeling came back with a vengeance, nearly doubling his Squamish vote and taking every single local poll but one in last week's provincial election.

"The true height is that Squamish went solid with me," the Liberal MLA said in a post-campaign interview with The Chief Thursday morning. "That's something I'd hoped for, but we had to wait for it."

Nebbeling says his secret was to win Squamish over one voter at a time, particularly with Squamish's worker base in forestry and transportation.

"Over the last five years I've proven to the citizens in Squamish clearly I'm there for them," he said. "In 1996 I don't suppose they were sure of that, because I'm from Whistler but I've proven that now."

"A lot of people who had a problem with an agency or needed a question answered, they've always gotten the phone call returned. I think that's given people a lot of confidence."

Nebbeling also said he concentrated specifically on Squamish during the 28-day election campaign. "I clearly wanted people to see me working for their vote. Squamish is a working community and if people saw me taking their vote for granted, that wouldn't work. I went in the bush, I went in the mills to meet the workers to explain

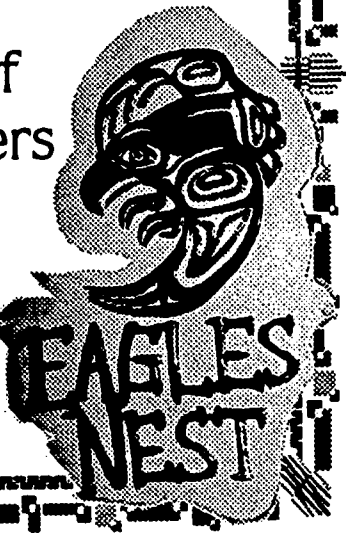

Shooting inquiry

Squamish RCMP have assigned a team of six officers to look into a house party shooting on May 6. Sgt. Gary Brine said the officers have been interviewing witnesses and are still collecting evidence from the scene. "We're waiting for forensic findings to come back and this investigation is a full commitment of this detachment. We're hopeful we can make some arrests as soon as we can."

Just before 5 a.m. on May 6, RCMP received a 911 report of a shooting at a house party. Several people were injured.

University OCP gets

hard reading

Councillors wasted little time in giving third reading amendments to the official community plan to accommodate the planned private university. The public hearing held May 15 drew two speakers: Annia Beall Patterson and John Erickson.

Patterson asserted the amendments couldn't be adopted, as it violates the CP and the Local Government Act on a variety of grounds.

Erickson said he couldn't speak to the amendment because he wasn't well informed, and asked for the detailed plans here. Blueprints and site-specific designs are part of the rezoning process, which is not yet begun.

Let tossed in jail

Local celebrities will be looking for their get-out-of-jail-free card at this week-end's trade fair.

For the second year in a row, Crime Stoppers will be holding its Jail-A-Thon and-raiser at their display booth on May 27 and 28.

Last year, students from Howe Sound Secondary were locked behind bars while people donating money either get them out or prolonging their stay.

This year the concept is the same, but celebrities from Mayor Corinne Lonsdale, business owners or even LA Ted Nebbeling may be asked to get into the slammer. All money raised will go towards supporting the Crime Stoppers program.

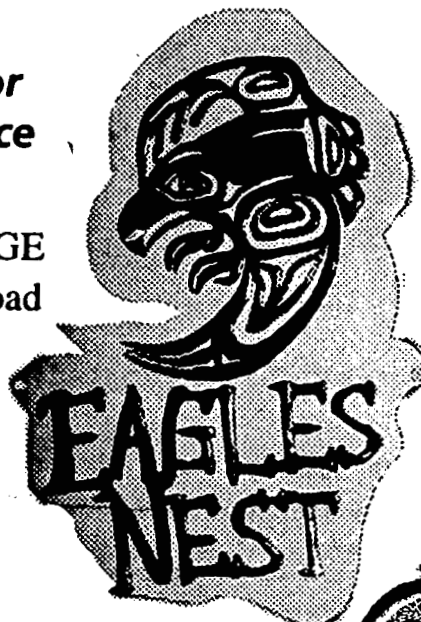

NDP strongest in Squamish

**Greens
overtake NDP
for second
place in riding**

NDP candidate Barrie MacLeod eked out a one-vote win in the only Squamish poll incumbent Liberal MLA Ted Nebbeling failed to capture in Wednesday's provincial election.

MacLeod's 13-12 victory at the Hilltop House ballot box was one of three such wins over Nebbeling, with the other two occurring at polls in Skookumchuck and Mount Currie.

However, it was the Green Party's Peter Tatoff who took second place over all, garnering 3,500 votes to MacLeod's 2,232, including one poll in Whistler.

Squamish was the only major community where the New Democrats came in second.

The Marijuana Party's Robert Adam earned a total of 718 votes. His 145 votes in

Whistler actually topped the New Democrats.

"We knew there was no chance of winning the seat," Tatoff said Thursday. "I knew we'd take the NDP."

"We're going to have some fun with the Liberals," he added. "When you've got a slate of inexperienced people dealing with these big problems, it'll be interesting."

"I knew the Greens were going to do well but I didn't expect them to get more votes than we did," said MacLeod.

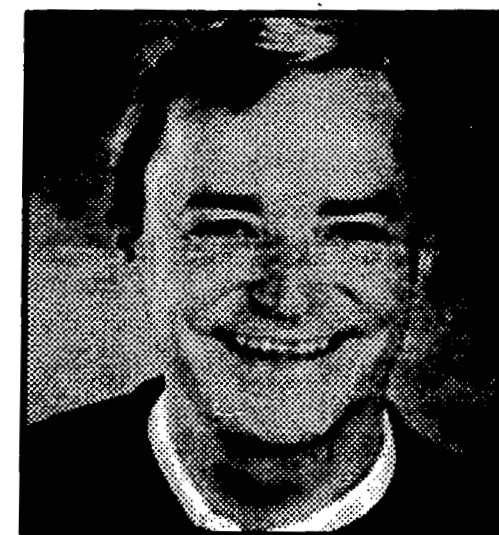
"It was a very good learning experience," said Adam. "I was happy to contribute to the political process and get some of my views out."

That the Liberals won 76 of 79 seats — 96 per cent — with only 57.5 per cent of the vote also drew some comments.

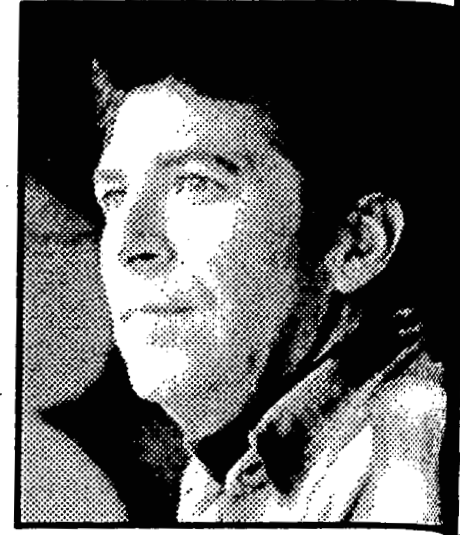
"We're going to ask all the parties to come on board for a provincial referendum on proportional representation," said Tatoff, noting the Greens picked up 12.4 per cent of the vote without winning a seat.

"That's probably something we'll be pursuing in the days ahead," said MacLeod.

"We need recovery time before we start on any new campaigns."

All three losing candidates also had a problem with missing signs, to varying degrees.

"It wasn't bad in Squamish," said MacLeod.

"In West Vancouver particularly there were areas where we were replacing them every day."

Adam avoided the problem by placing few signs, but "went through buttons like crazy."

A Green Party press release identified Squamish as the worst area for campaign vandalism, with West Vancouver close behind.

Tatoff was the only candidate who said he would seek the seat in the next election.

"I'm here for the long haul," he said. "We'll see whether we get the nomination."

MacLeod said he wanted to be part of the process as NDP maps out its future, hopes to find a younger, energetic candidate for the next election.

Adam said he hasn't decided if he'll be a part of the next Marijuana campaign.

"There's definitely a future for the party and we just need to try a little harder next time," he said.

Nebbeling is "anxiously awaiting" a government report on the highway due to be unveiled June 25 and will push for work on solutions, including improving capacity and safety on the Horseshoe Bay-Squamish side and improving the dangerous area between Culliton Creek and the Cheakamus Canyon.

"This has been promised for 10 years...as MLA I will do everything to make it happen," he said.

Nebbeling is also happy to see an NDP opposition — albeit a small one — facing the new government.

"It will be very helpful for me whenever they attack a minister on whatever issue to remind them that they were the people responsible for much of what has gone wrong," he said.

"We will be able to use their track record...it's almost a tool."

After five years in the legislature and several years in high-profile critic posts, including two years at municipal affairs, Nebbeling indicated he anticipates a cabinet post — despite comments by some pundits in the Vancouver media that Nebbeling is merely a long shot among the 76-member caucus for the cabinet.

"It is obviously up to Campbell, but reasoning that the [Vancouver] Province used that they pick eight [MLAs, including Nebbeling] is to a certain extent way I see it myself," said Nebbeling.

"Gordon will not have a lot of margin to experiment with his cabinet. He needs people who can do the job immediately who have the background and experience. At the end of the day he has 76 people to look at...his reasoning may be very well different."

In the end, Nebbeling's vote total 68.1% — an increase of 11% over 1997 — was 10th among other Liberal MLAs.

Quake study for safety building

Building safety already questionable

Visible cracks from February's mild earthquake have brought concerns about the stability of the public safety building to the fore again. On May 15, Squamish council approved a structural assessment be done, at a cost of \$2,873 from council's contingency funds.

"There is more cracking, the exterior walls for the most part, the cinderblock walls," Squamish Fire Rescue Chief Ray Saurette said Wednesday. The building was already

cracked due to a subsidence of about 10 centimetres. The earthquake, which went unnoticed by many in Squamish, created new cracks and enlarged existing ones.

"Given a certain type or certain size of natural disaster, we could see the building collapse," Saurette said.

This could cripple Squamish's ability to respond to that disaster, as the public safety building houses Squamish Fire Rescue and the RCMP, as well as the 911 dispatch centre.

The study will identify new structural problems caused by the earthquake, as well as the possible cost of upgrading the building.

Plans are in place to provide the RCMP with a stand-alone

detachment by 2002; whether the fire department would remain in the public safety building afterwards is uncertain.

"If we can make the building post-disaster built and we can make it last a number of years down the road, the fire department would be satisfied with that," Saurette said.

"We keep doing the studies and not spending the money to fix it," Coun. Raj Kahlon said May 15 in opposing the motion. "The building is unsafe. Do the study when you're willing to spend money to fix it."

Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said she was sure should the study show the building's occupants were in danger council would find the neces-

sary funds to do repairs.

A 1992 study identified the building's vulnerability to an earthquake.

In 1995, 73.4 per cent of voters rejected replacing the public safety building at a cost of \$6.42 million.

Inquest rules prisoner death was accidental

The death of a Port Coquitlam man who died while in police custody last year was ruled accidental at a public inquest last Monday in Squamish.

The inquest was held May 14 into the death of Ronald Wayne Solecki.

The 47-year-old died on Aug. 20, 2000 of apparent unnatural causes on Hwy. 99 near Britannia Beach, while members of the Squamish RCMP were attempting to physically restrain him.

The coroner looking into the case ruled

at the time that Solecki died of a drug overdose.

After seven witnesses gave their testimony at the inquest, the jury deliberated and ruled that the death was accidental.

"The ruling was consistent with the evidence that was heard," said Sgt. Gary

Brine, who was one of the witnesses at the inquest. "The forensic pathologist determined the cause of death last year, but the B.C. Coroners Act states that all deaths while in police custody must be resolved by way of a public inquest."

Brine said members of Solecki's family were at the inquest, and he hopes the ruling will help ease the family's pain.

"This was a sad event," he said. "Hopefully, this will bring some closure to the family."

Norm Leibel, the deputy chief coroner for the B.C. Coroners Service, conducted the inquest.

Toll-free zone may expand

CRTC reviews local calling

Squamish's toll-free zone may expand to include Britannia Beach and Furry Creek, but corridor-wide local calling is unlikely for some years.

Al Litynsky, Telus' project manager for local calling areas, spoke with councillors at a committee of the whole May 8.

Mayor Corinne Lonsdale wrote Litynsky in April, asking Telus to officially request the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) approve expansion of two-way toll-free calling from Squamish down to Furry Creek.

Currently, a call placed in Britannia Beach to Squamish is considered a local call, but

not vice-versa.

Lonsdale's letter cited emergency situations and Squamish's position as the service centre for the nearby communities.

"If the rules don't change, you're stuck with what you've got," Litynsky said.

He explained the current CRTC regulations limit the size of a local calling area to 40 miles, and require 60 per cent of each community's residents already call the other community every month.

A referendum is also required if the local calling expansion causes a rate increase.

Litynsky said a proposal for an exception to these rules on health and safety grounds is already in to the CRTC, adding he hoped approval would be granted within a few months.

The CRTC is examining whether those guidelines should be changed, and has

asked for public input.

Councillors voted to support the CRTC, supporting amendments to current regulations to facilitate local calling areas.

"I think it's far more important to have direct dialling between Squamish and Whistler than Squamish and Britannia," said Lonsdale, noting the heavy commuter traffic between Squamish and Whistler and the service Squamish provides the region.

Litynsky, however, said it was unlikely the CRTC would accept the Whistler extension, which doesn't have the same health and safety issues associated with Britannia Beach and Furry Creek.

Litynsky noted the CRTC recently approved a 10 per cent increase to the monthly local calling bill.

"Local rates are going to increase to the cost of a long distance call," he said. "Local calls in Squamish are paid at a side every month."

10-digit call warning delayed

People will have a little longer than expected to program equipment to handle 10-digit phone numbers, but those who handle high call volumes in town say callers should make the switch now.

As of Nov. 3, the region currently served by the 604 area code will have another area code — 778 — added for newly issued numbers.

Originally the region was going to get a six-month break-in period. As of May 26, people who dialed only seven numbers were going to hear a recorded message reminding them to

add the code, after which the call would be connected.

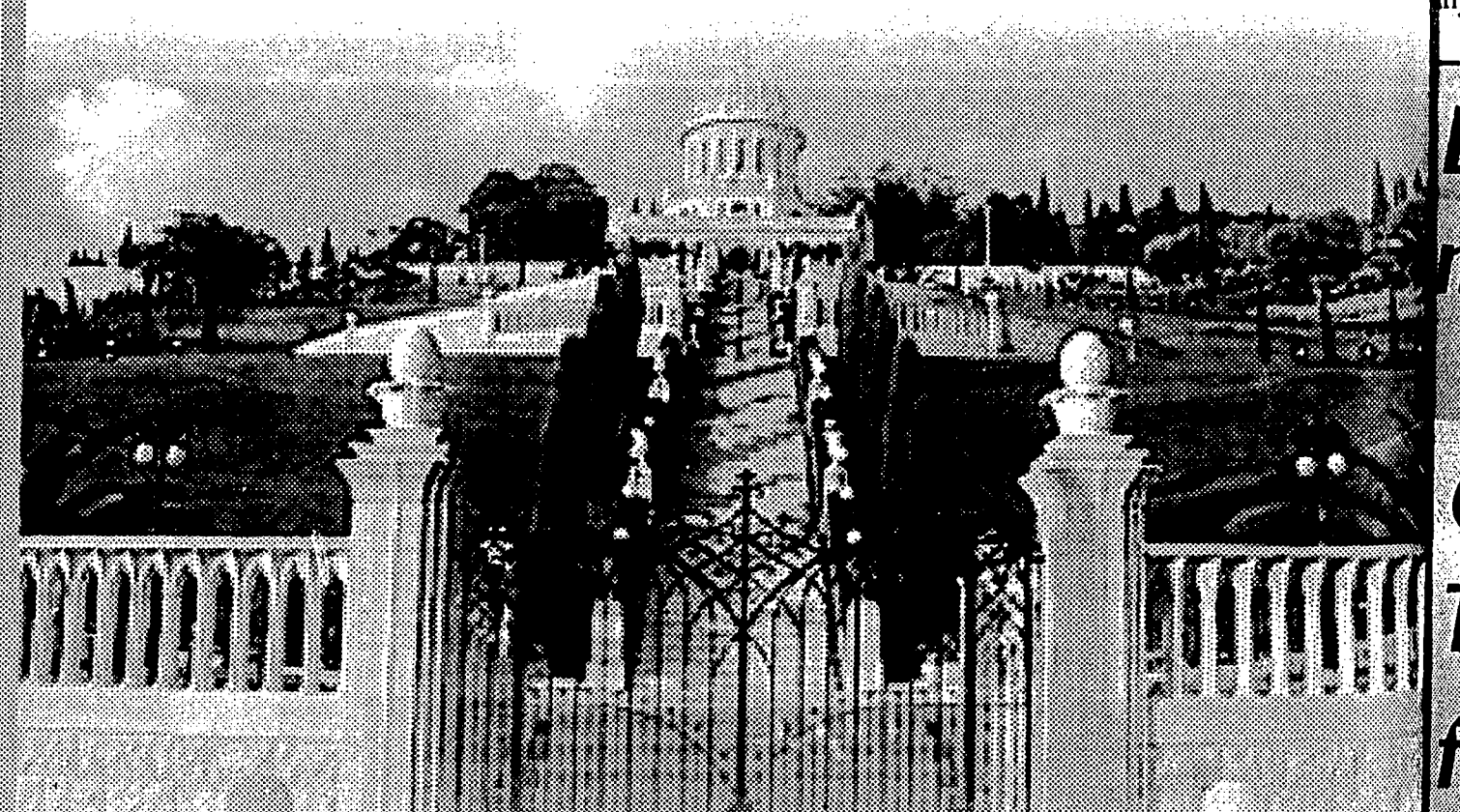
However, modems and fax machines would not be able to interpret the voice message and the connection would fail.

The Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) announced May 15 the recorded announcement will be delayed until Aug. 11.

Local businesses who rely heavily on phone calls to operate are already making the changes.

The other rider, from North Vancouver, was treated at SGH for minor injuries.

Police are still investigating.

Second steam engine out

Whether BC Rail's steam train excursions between North Vancouver and Squamish will actually have any steam this summer is unknown after the Port Coquitlam No. 3716 was taken out of service several weeks ago.

The 3716, a former cargo engine built in 1912, was pressed into service last year after the Royal Hudson No. 2860 was pulled off the line.

"A routine inspection discovered some damage in the fire box in the 3716," BCR spokesman Alan Dever said Friday.

Outside experts were brought in to evaluate the problem, but a report is not back yet.

BC Rail has a limited number of craftspeople qualified to work on steam engines, Dever said.

Currently they are occupied with restoring another Hudson, No. 2816, owned by CP Rail.

That project has taken longer than initially expected, and completion could be reached anywhere between July and September.

Work on the Royal Hudson will not begin until then.

However, the excursions along Howe Sound will continue, Dever promised.

The Port Coquitlam's backup last year was the CPR No. 4069, a streamlined diesel engine only 12 years newer than the 62-year-old Royal Hudson.

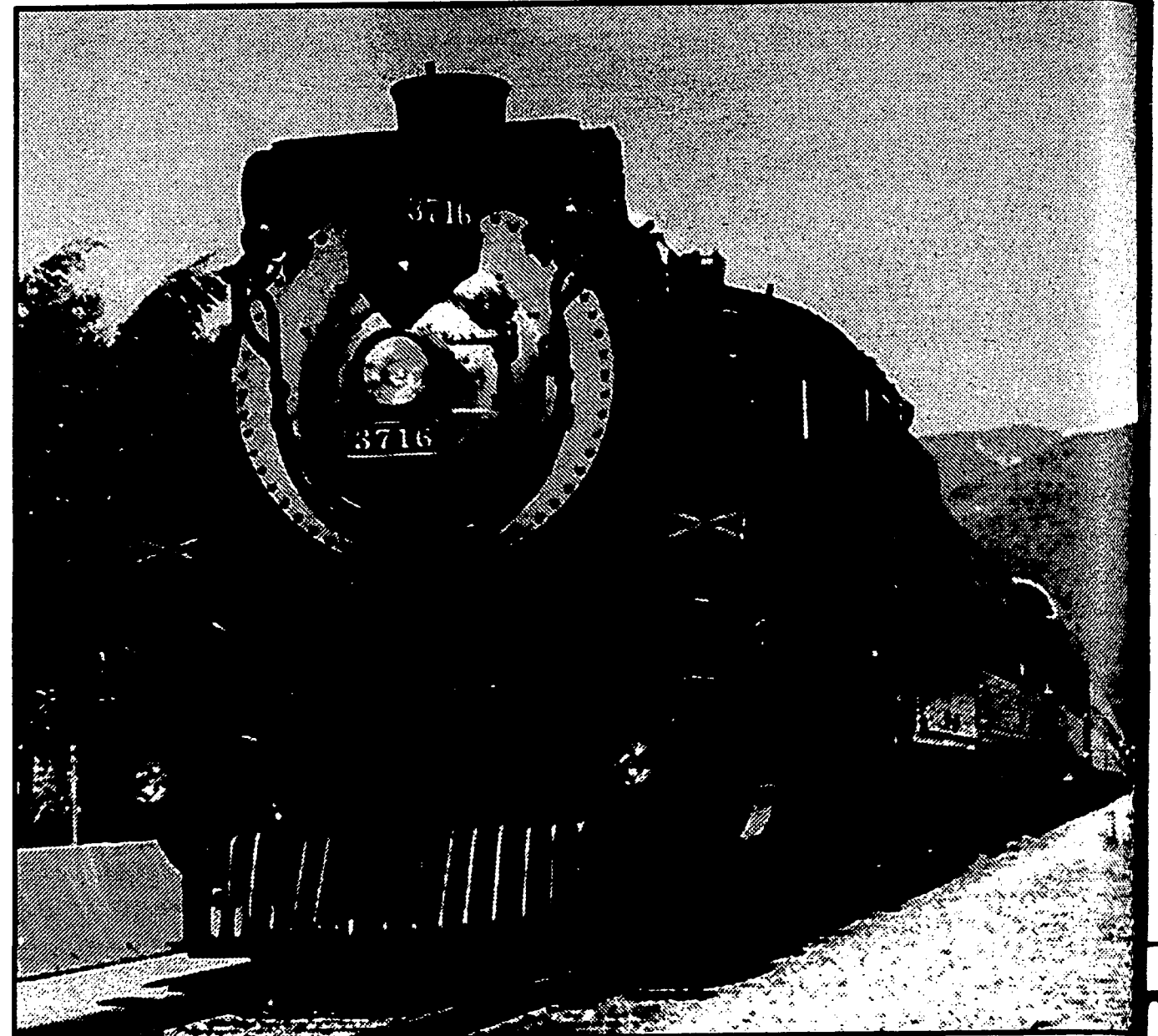

The 4069 was the original engine for the passenger cars that now make up the steam train excursion. BC Rail is leasing it from the West Coast Railway Heritage Park, where it was restored.

Dever pointed out the first scheduled

run isn't until June 2, which means Crown corporation has some time to decide what steps to take.

"I can't say at this moment what motive power we'll be using at the point."

Classic Chicken Paprikash

This is a variation of the classic dish, having lost nothing but fat. In traditional style, serve it with rice or noodles.

Makes 8 servings

2 teaspoons corn oil
one 3-pound chicken, skinned and cut into 8 pieces
1 cup sliced onions

2 tablespoons paprika (preferably Hungarian, mild or hot)

2 garlic cloves, minced

1/2 teaspoon dried thyme leaves

1/2 teaspoon black pepper

1/2 cup low sodium chicken broth

1/4 cup (2 fluid ounces) dry white wine

2 tablespoons white wine vinegar

1 tablespoon tomato puree

2 teaspoons all-purpose flour

1/2 cup non sour cream

1. In large skillet, heat oil; add chicken. Cook over medium-high heat 2 minutes on each side, until golden brown. Remove chicken from skillet; set aside.

2. To same skillet, add onions; cook, stirring frequently, 4-5 minutes, until onions are lightly browned. Reduce heat to low; add paprika and garlic. Cook, stirring constantly, 3 minutes. Stir in thyme, salt and pepper.

3. In small bowl, with wire whisk, combine broth, wine, vinegar, tomato puree and flour, blending until flour is dissolved; strain and add to onion mixture. Continuing to stir with whisk, bring liquid to a boil over high heat; add reserved chicken. Reduce heat to low; simmer 20 minutes, basting chicken occasionally with pan juices, until chicken is cooking through and thigh juices run clear when pierced with a fork.

4. Transfer chicken to serving platter. With wire whisk, blend sour cream into pan juices; pour over chicken.

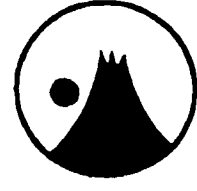

"For me to pick up my phone at home to call my daughter and have to dial 10 digits is going to seem very foreign," she said. "It's a pain in the derriere to begin with, but once we get used to it it'll be OK."

Small businesses should remember to reprogram their fax machine and auto-dialing services, while house alarms and emergency phones in elevators are the more easily forgotten items to change.

Sarah Ramus, the office manager at Mountain Internet, noted the change to a 10-digit number can be made now, as such calls already go through.

"Once the recording comes on you probably won't be able to [connect]," Ramus said, with a seven-digit number.

Instructions on making the

change are available on Mountain Internet's website but the real challenge will be customers who don't change their programming by August 11, then need to be talked through it on the phone.

"It's going to be fun," Ramus said. "We're going to be flooded with calls, so we really need them to change their number. If it works now, we should do it now."

Emergency calls to 911 and calls for information (411) and similar services will require area codes. Long distance calls will continue to be dialed the same way.

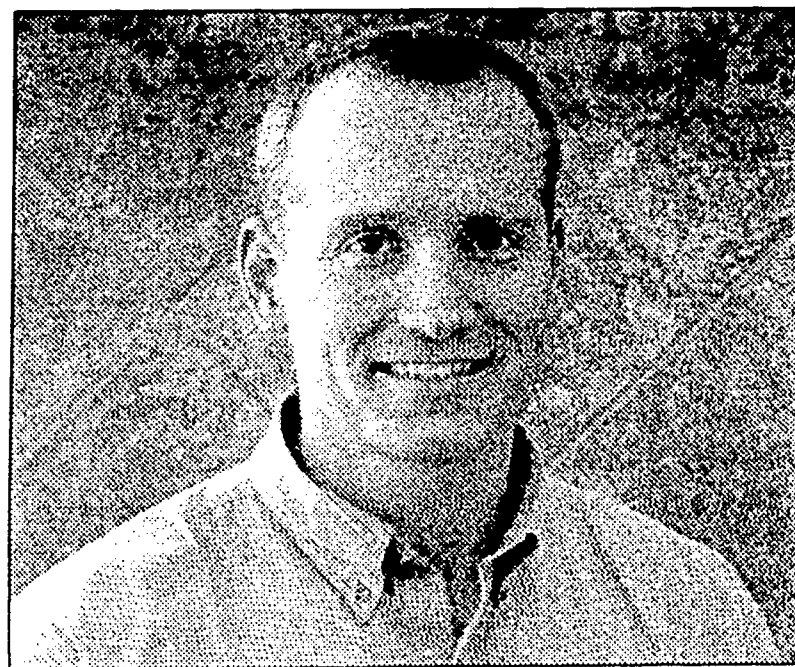

Gov't Road bike path approved

Students will no longer have to cross Government Road twice while riding to school after the third phase of a bike path is installed this summer. The \$25,896 project will be half-funded by the B.C. Transportation Authority (BCTFA) cycling network program.

It will involve widening Government Road by 1.5 metres for 100 metres north of Depot Road, then another 150 metres separated from the road by power poles.

At its northern end the asphalt path will meet up with an existing path at Axen Road, which runs north to Ross Road.

Currently, school children have to cross Government Road at Depot Way and then back again at Axen Road, or else trespass on the BC Rail train tracks.

"We have completed two sections of the project, this would be the third," Mick Bottardi, district director of community development, told council May 15.

Phase one of the bike path was completed in 1998, stretching from Eagle Run Drive to Judd Road. The Judd Road to Wain Place section was completed in 2000.

Both received funding from the BCTFA.

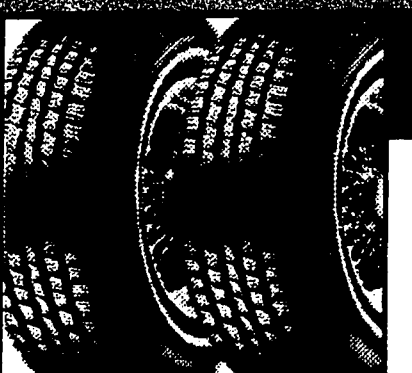
The fourth phase would connect Wain Place to Depot Road, with the grant to be applied for in 2002.

The four-phase project, when complete, will provide a continuous cycling network on both sides of Government Road from Eagle Run Drive to Mackendale Elementary.

Council adopted a cycling network plan in 1995.

EDITORIAL

Great expectations

Enjoy the honeymoon while it lasts. That's the best advice we can offer Gordon Campbell and his new government of 76 — possibly 77, depending on the recounts — B.C. Liberals who swept to power in Wednesday's provincial election.

While the scope of Campbell's victory is every bit as breathtaking as was expected, the expectations that come with it are just as staggering.

Within 12 hours of the staggering victory by the B.C. Liberals in Wednesday's provincial election, newsrooms started getting reams of reaction from business, industry and labour groups — all calling for Gordon Campbell to live up to whichever promises in the Liberal platform they've grown attached to.

There are great expectations for this government. To those who are given much, much more is expected, and the Liberals have been given the moon. Such a huge mandate is a double-edged sword.

One would think that a government following one so horrendously unpopular as the New Democrats of the past 10 years might have it easy: just avoid tax-and-spend government, fudge-it budgets, failed megaprojects and scandals and you're doing better than your predecessors, right?

We think it's the opposite. The ineptitude of the past 10 years has made voters hungry for change — hence the huge vote. But it's also made them impatient for good government. The Liberals, elected with such a huge majority of the popular vote, have only one way to go in popularity — down. And once they start governing, that's exactly what will happen.

The test, then, of the new government of British Columbia is not what they do when they're this popular, but how they'll do when they come back to reality.

And the reality is that despite getting one of the largest vote totals in this province's history, the Liberals are not the most popular party ever to grace this province. They were, on election day, the most credible alternative to one of the most hated governments this province has ever seen.

Of course, if you're a Squamish voter, you've seen this happen before — fairly recently, in fact. The men and women on today's District of Squamish council know the pressures and expectations of a government brought in when another government is voted out en masse.

In November 1999, voters threw out a majority of councillors and installed a new group that was going to put the town "back in business."

Now, halfway into that mandate, the enthusiasm that swept them into office seems light years away. Squamish's business climate has not miraculously transformed itself into an economic juggernaut — in fact, council has spent a great deal of its time, energy and possibly credibility on a project that never saw the light of day. The expectations of 18 months ago have been swallowed up by the pressures of reality.

In other words, our councillors were human after all. And so are the 76 (or 77) men and women who make up our brand new provincial government.

Good representation

Congratulations of a different manner are in order for our own MLA, Ted Nebbeling, who rode to victory in West Vancouver-Garibaldi for a second term.

Some MLAs in Nebbeling's position might not have worked so hard for Squamish — as a candidate or, more importantly, as an MLA. With the West Vancouver and Whistler votes locked down, Nebbeling could easily have thumbed his nose at Squamish and still have won re-election.

Instead, he's worked hard to represent all facets of his riding — not just in the last four weeks, but in the last five years. His work for Squamish, which rejected him in large measure in 1996, has been about more than gaining votes, but about true representation.

On Wednesday, Squamish rewarded him with victory — a bigger victory, we should add, than his home town of Whistler.

Whether he makes the cabinet or not — and we think he makes great Municipal Affairs material, by the way, Mr. Campbell — Squamish and the Sea to Sky corridor can be assured of four more years of strong representation in Victoria.

The shrinking surplus

On May 17, the Minister of Finance issued an economic update. Rather than providing Canadians with the historically entrenched and comprehensive spring budget, the federal government has decided they will do things differently from now on and forget about tabling budgets. The economic update is no substitute for the fine print of a budget, but I guess it works if you want to keep economic information which may be negative away from Canadians.

One thing the Finance Minister did admit was the fact that the surplus had shrunk from \$20 billion to \$15 billion, due to unbudgeted spending, which was up by 8.1 per cent in fiscal year 2000/2001. It seems the government, which so often has told Canadians to tighten their collective belts, suffers from the "money burning a hole in your pocket syndrome."

And rather than provide Canadians with a five-year plan taxes and spending, the wily Liberals are now only providing two-year plans. Most economists will say that a five-year budget plan is the best way to provide for unforeseen problems down the road. Could it be that the government senses some financial setbacks or difficulties five years from now?

Our economy is facing downturn due to the economic conditions in the United States and it is critical Canadians have some assurance that unnecessary spending will not jeopardize the surpluses won on the backs of hard working Canadians. The surplus belongs to Canadians, not to the Liberal government who would set out to squander it on a whim. And speaking of squandering, just this week we hear about performance bonuses paid to certain senior ranking employees of certain government departments.

Allow me to elaborate. This week we learned that the Canadian Human Rights Commission was a mess. An internal report characterized the Commission as imploding with problems. Guess what? One hundred per cent of the executives at the Canadian Human Rights Commission received performance bonuses. And would you believe that 92 per cent of executives in the Department of Human Resource Development, the department which can't keep track of grants, got a performance bonus as well. At Health Canada, 94 per cent of executive staff were paid bonuses. Is that the same department where some senior staff booked a cruise last year at taxpayer's expense? At

the Canada Labour Relations Board, the former home of Ted Weatherill, the individual with the healthy expense account, six of six executives got bonuses. At the National Parole Board, eight of eight got the bonus, and 16 of 16 at the Canada Information Office, the Liberal governments propaganda machine, got a bonus. To round it out a bit more, 96 of 97 Agriculture Canada executives got the performance pay, 80 of 82 at Heritage Canada were deemed worthy, 71 of 73 at the Privy Council achieved this status, 35 of 35 at the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency qualified, 79 of 81 at Immigration Canada were rewarded, and 184 of 190 at Industry Canada made the grade.

I have no problem with senior executives receiving performance pay if they truly deserve it. But doesn't it bother you that some of the departments I just mentioned have been known for waste and mismanagement?

In the past 12 months, Bid Corporation representatives have participated in more than 100 presentations and meetings involving local governments, business, community and service groups. These sessions have reached an estimated 5,000 people.

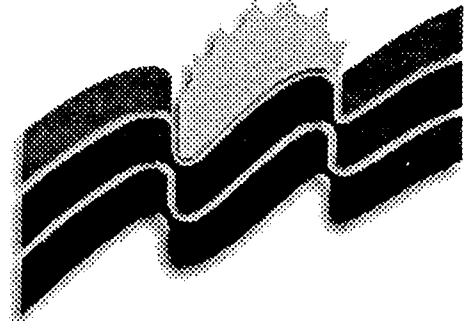

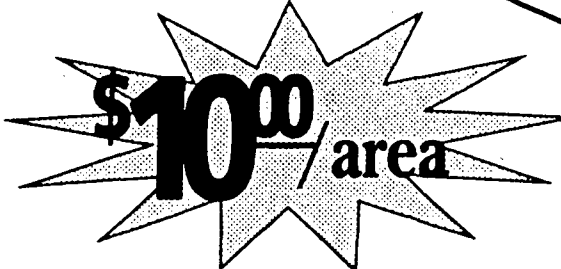

New VP for GHE

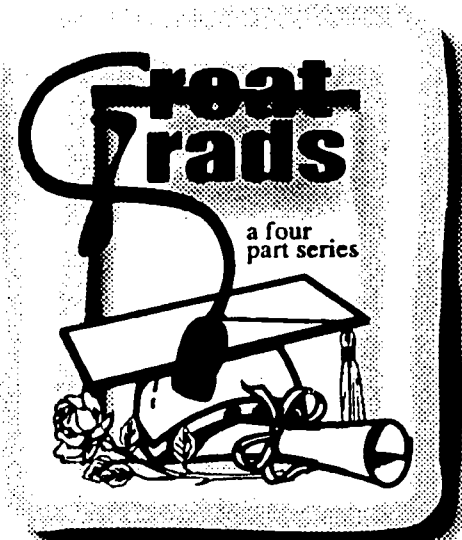
After four years as acting vice-principal at Garibaldi Highlands Elementary School Gerri Galloway will have the appointment permanently as of Aug. 1.

Grad takes a hands-on approach

Nolan MacIntosh likes to get down and dirty.

Whether it's racing at breakneck speeds in the mud on his dirt bike or tearing apart and re-building an engine, MacIntosh is happy when he's working with his hands.

The Grade 12 student at Howe Sound Secondary School is using the apprenticeship program to help foster his career aspirations.

MacIntosh starts in September at the British Columbia Institute of Technology (BCIT) to pursue his trade, which encompasses all aspects of reinforcing steel fabrication work with the aim of becoming a rodman.

"It's in my blood, I guess," MacIntosh said. "I've lived around it all my life working on engines, taking things apart and I have a basic knowledge in a lot of different fields."

Through the apprenticeship

program, MacIntosh completed a two-month work experience session at Nova Reinforcing Inc. where he worked on all aspects of re-bar reinforcing.

"The program allows someone to get right out into the work force and get the basic knowledge of what the job is," he said. "It was an excellent experience for me. I got to jump right in and do all the work."

"I've always loved working in this area. Whether it's in the metal shop or in mechanics working on engines — it's just what I want to do."

MacIntosh is in his second year at HSSS. He spent Grade 8-10 at Brackendale Secondary School.

He's looking forward to graduation and getting out into the work force.

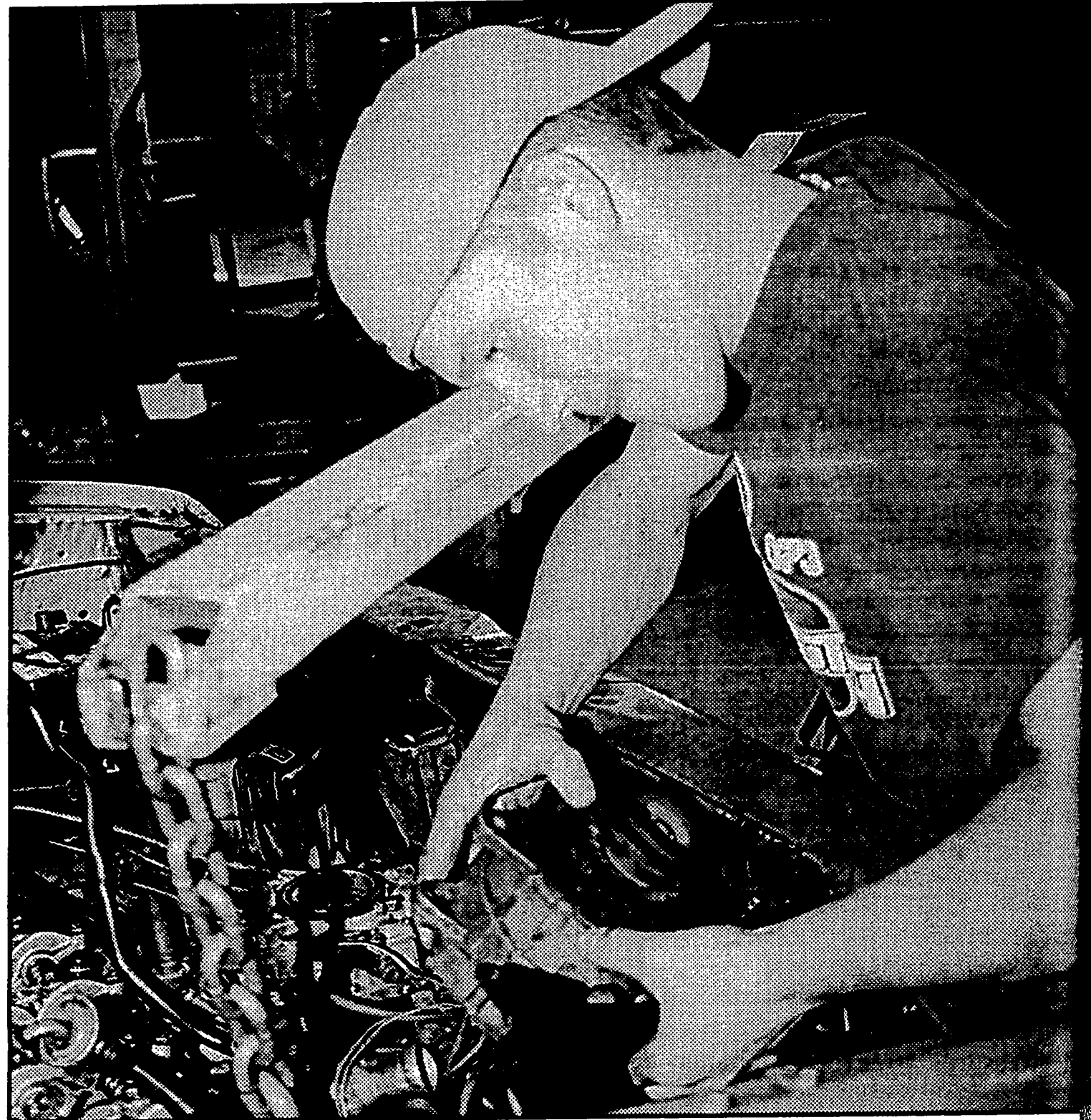
"As far as programs and things go here, it's been all right," he said.

"Everything here is poorly funded, so you just have to try and make the best of it. I've been very active in metal work and mechanics. I like sports and I've even gotten a bit into acting here at the school. It's been a good mix, but it's now time to pursue other things."

The mechanics program at HSSS is a successful one, as it's produced quality students over the years.

Grant Prothero, who teaches the course, sees big things in MacIntosh's future.

"Since I've come back to teaching at the school, I've only had a few opportunities to see Nolan's work, but he's a solid worker," Prothero said.

"The majority of mechanics in Squamish went through this program here at the school. We give the students a chance to work on everything and anything. You get a real broad experience, but the work ethic has to be there and it is with Nolan."

The course at BCIT is six months and once he completes that, MacIntosh wants to get right into the work-force.

"Most people can't work as

a rodman because it's so physically and mentally demanding," he said.

"It's one of those types of professions that has to be perfect every time and perfect the first time around. There is no going back if you screw up."

"You can work up to 14-hour days and it's very trying."

All the hard work aside, MacIntosh relishes the opportunity.

"To me it's not work — fun," he said. "The need for qualified rodmen is very high right now."

"To put things in perspective, a new parking garage in Las Vegas, for instance, needs something like 400 rodmen for the job."

"I want to work for a year or two and then become a journeyman and then after that I'll be able to probably work wherever I want," said MacIntosh.

Fight disease with immunization

Health officials stress importance of immunization

For school aged children, the idea of sitting at school and waiting for a needle from a nurse is not a trip most want to take, but it's an important precaution.

Health officials in the Sea to Sky Corridor want to stress the importance of getting immunization shots to combat unwanted flu.

National Immunization Awareness week was last week (May 13-19), but it's still not too late to get informed.

Marilyn McIvor, public health nurse manager for the Sea to Sky region insists immunization is safe, effective and that B.C. has "one of the best immunization programs in the world." She stresses that it is also accessible, as more and more immunization programs are being funded by the public purse.

"If you have any questions at all, call your public health nurses," McIvor said. "We're experts."

Dr. Paul Martiquet, the medical health officer for the

Coast Garibaldi Health Region, said he is more concerned that immunization has been too successful.

"My concern with immunization is complacency...I don't want to be a victim of our own success with our immunization story. The more successful you are the more people will forget these diseases used to kill and not take their kid in to be immunized," said Martiquet.

Concerns over immunization range from religious or philosophical or objections against government interference with personal choice, concerns that it's not natural and that vaccinations are even

responsible for harmful side effects.

Martiquet said medical practitioners have to take these concerns seriously and start an open dialogue about vaccinations. He admits that the side effects of old vaccine strains were occasionally uncomfortable for some individuals (soreness or swelling in the shot area, influenza type symptoms, or allergic reactions), but said newly developed vaccines are safer than ever.

Site search on for log book park

Work has begun on one-of-a-kind exhibits for a museum about Squamish's history, even as the district tries to figure out where to put it.

The log book park concept is based on transformation of four-metre tall tree trunks, stood on end and split in half to resemble an open book. The "pages" would be carved with scenes reflective of Squamish and its history.

The carving is being undertaken by Glen Greensides, an internationally-known artist whose chainsaw carvings can be seen at the top of Grouse Mountain as well as in Municipal Hall.

Council has allotted the log book park \$100,000 in the 2001 budget.

"Several months ago, when the opportunity came to us we determined it would be an exciting project for Squamish," Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said May 15. "That log book park is a museum in its own right."

The carvings on the pages of the 14 log books would progress through time from the prehistoric forest to the ice age to the modern era.

Various businesses have made donations, including \$12,000 in wood from International Forest Products Ltd., said Coun. Wendy Magee.

Greensides will do the carving in a studio the district paid \$10,000 to set up in the Logger Sports grounds.

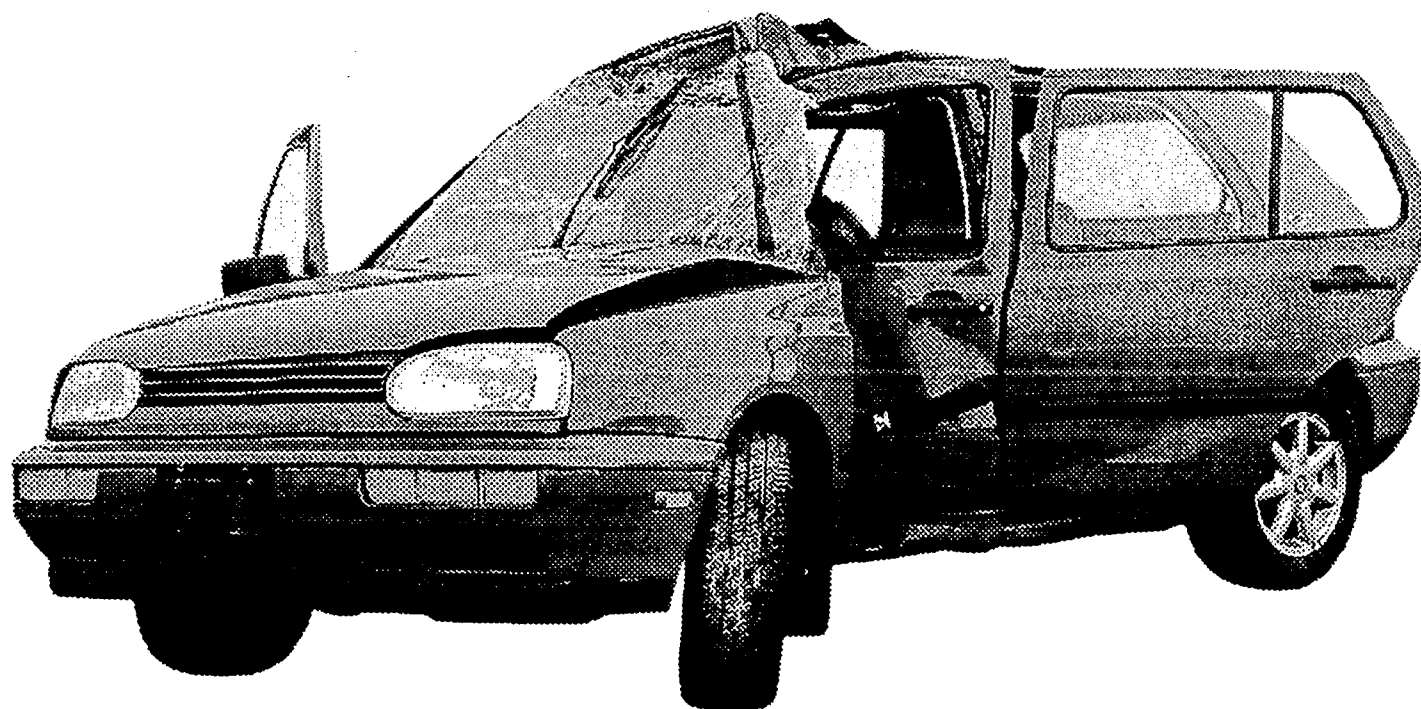
"It'll be one of a kind," said Magee.

She has pushed for this project since it was introduced, citing prior Greensides projects that could have been Squamish's.

Greensides' contract calls for the log books to be complete by January 2003.

In the meantime, Magee said, the district is working with a number of personalities in the business and forestry sectors to secure land. The site eventually chosen could be municipally or privately owned.

Good bugs, bad bugs: know the difference

It's census time so it seems appropriate to add a census of garden insects in Sea to Sky. In no particular order, here is a partial list of the good, the bad and the ugly.

As gardeners, we are most likely to notice the pest insects in our yards. However, entomologists estimate that more than 90 per cent of all insects are beneficial. Wild and domestic bees pollinate crops, which is essential for many fruits and

vegetables grown for seed.

If you have good healthy soil in your garden, you will be blessed with an abundance of worms. They aerate the soil and add nutrients.

Ladybugs feed on aphids and soft-bodied pests. They are the most important insect for natural biological control as they will eat up to 12 times their weight in aphids daily. The ladybug larvae is very ugly so be careful you don't arbitrarily kill it because it is so unappealing.

Ground beetles, often thought of as pests, eat slugs, cutworms and other pests that have a soil-dwelling stage.

Centipedes and millipedes are also beneficial bugs.

The Sea to Sky garden has an abundance of bad insects with slugs and snails heading the list. Slugs and snails feast on any tender plant or shrub and often demolish seedlings.

Control slugs and snails with wood ashes, diatomaceous earth or beer traps.

Aphids are next on the nasty list, doing damage to most fruits, vegetables, ornamental trees and roses. Aphids suck plant sap and leave plants misshapen and stunted.

Whitefly, a recent addition to my outdoor garden but long a foe indoors, also suck juices from young plants, but these creatures secrete a sticky substance called honeydew which attracts sooty mold and other viral diseases. Spit bugs damage plants in

the same manner. Stink bugs do the same but be careful, they do stink when you kill them.

Cutworms and cabbage worms feed on the stems of vegetable and flower seedlings near the soil line, often severing them.

The best way to attract insects to your garden is to avoid the use of toxic sprays in the garden. Even insecticidal soaps will kill a beneficial insect so apply only when necessary.

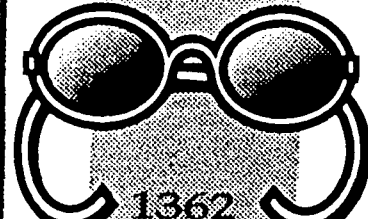

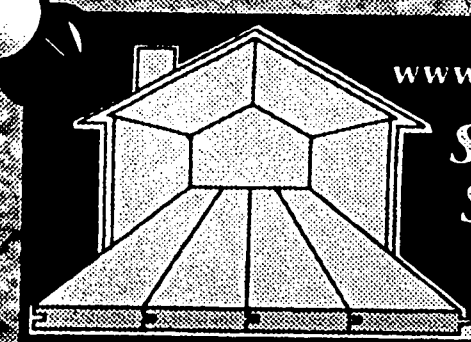

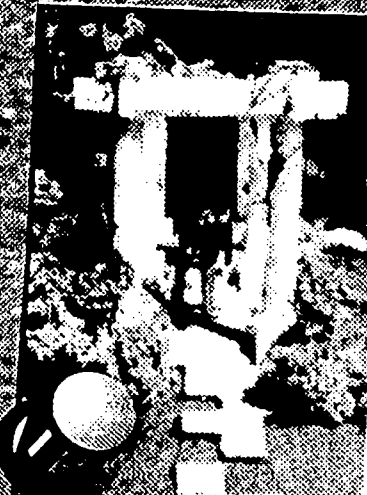

Since the tournament's inception in 1997, more than \$160,000 has been raised towards health care capital needs at SGH.

Tournament administrator Bill McNeney said that plans are well underway for this year's event.

He said the tournament committee will be making an announcement shortly on what's in store for this year.
