## Body of missing canoeist found

The search is over for a 17-year-old lost a month ago in the Squamish River after a body was found near the Squamish estuary Friday.

At about 10 a.m. Squamish RCMP received a call from International Forest Products Ltd., advising one of their employees operating a boom boat had spotted a human body floating between the windsurfing spit and Squamish Terminals.

The boom boat operator was able to secure the body and bring it to the dock at the terminals, where it was handed over to the B.C. Coroner's Service.

"The first we knew about it was when the police arrived in force and asked to use our berth," said Doug Hackett, information systems manager at Squamish Terminals.

Police say they are "pretty sure" the body is that of Dylan Wayne Rempel, who disappeared June 13 when the canoe he and two friends stole overturned in the river.

"The gentleman had quite extensive jewelry piercing, which matched up," said Cpl. Mike Byrne.

Height, weight and clothing also corresponded to Rempel's description.

"An autopsy has been ordered for Monday (July 16), which will absolutely lock it in," Byrne said, noting fingerprints will be taken at that time.

The location of the body adds to their belief.

"If he was pushed out [into Howe Sound] by the river, the wind and prevailing currents would push the body back into that position," he said.

Rempel's is the second body retrieved from the waters of Howe Sound in less than three weeks.

**Squamish Fire Rescue**, Squamish RCMP and BC Ambulance paramedics were called out to a serious single-vehicle accident on Paradise Valley Road late Saturday afternoon. The driver and his passenger, both Burnaby residents, left the roadway 2.5 kilometres north of the end of the paved road and flipped against a rock. Both were taken to Squamish General Hospital with serious injuries. The driver was transferred to Lions Gate Hospital in North Vancouver and was in stable condition as of Monday. Police say speed is believed to be a factor in the accident.

## Domestic incident nearly fatal

### Squamish senior attacked with metal pole

A blood-soaked pillow sitting on the lawn of a Valleycliffe home July 10 gave mute testimony to an attack that put an 87-year-old woman in hospital and left a 47-year-old woman facing charges.

Charanjit Kaur Kingra, of Squamish, appeared in Squamish provincial court Wednesday to face a charge of aggravated assault. She will make her next appearance today (July 17).

The charge of aggravated assault, which implies the vic-

tim's life was in danger, carries with it a possible sentence of up to 14 years in prison.

The incident occurred at a home on Chestnut Drive around 5 p.m.

"When police arrived it was learned that an 87-year-old woman had been brutally assaulted by a person known to her," Squamish RCMP Const. Daniela Czymoch said Wednesday. "The victim ... received numerous blows to her head and hands from a blunt metal instrument."

"The victim was taken to Squamish General Hospital and later transferred to Vancouver General Hospital

and is said to be presently in stable condition."

Brandon Thompson, Jaspreet Gill and Ross Pridham witnessed the aftermath of the incident.

They told The Chief the victim spoke with police through an interpreter.

"She said she got hit in the head with a metal pole," said Brandon Thompson. "She had a pillow wrapped around her head to stop it bleeding."

According to what they heard, the victim identified her assailant as her daughter-in-law.

However, neither the police nor Crown counsel would

comment on the relationship between the victim and assailant.

"It's before the courts and still under investigation, so I can't discuss the facts of the case," said Squamish Crown counsel Trevor Cockfield.

He did confirm Kingra was released on a number of conditions, including a no-go order that bars her from her Squamish residence.

RCMP alerted Squamish Search and Rescue to be prepared to conduct an evidence search the evening of the assault, but did not call them out.

The matter is still under investigation. Police are asking anyone with information to contact the Squamish RCMP at (604) 898-9611 or call Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477.

## On council's agenda this week:

Upcoming issues for the July 17 council meeting set for 7 p.m. in council chambers at Municipal Hall:

Council will consider permitting Kal Tire to retain a fascia sign exceeding the maximum one-metre height allowed by Squamish's sign bylaw that it has already installed.

Council will debate awarding a \$35,000 contract to Coral Engineering Ltd. for power-saving upgrades to the Brennan Park Recreation Centre.

Council will consider a request from W. Dowad Ltd. to allow a 15-metre-long metal and wood canopy to encroach by a metre over the east sidewalk on Cleveland Avenue, south of Winnipeg Street.

## School board limits sponsorships

### No back-room deals, board promises

Howe Sound School District will enforce old rules in the face of a new challenge — corporate sponsorship in schools.

The issue came up late last year over concerns students could be exploited by corporate sponsorships, such as long-term, exclusive contracts on pop machines or donations contingent on advertising in schools.

The board solicited stakeholder input, then had vice-chairwoman Betty Connell codify that into policy amendments to distinguish between corporate sponsorship and community partnership.

The board supports commu-

nity partnerships, where businesses give a product, service or money to a school without expecting commercial gain or recognition.

Corporate sponsorships, where a deal is struck for reasons of gain or recognition, face more restrictive rules.

In all cases a corporate sponsorship must be submitted to the superintendent of schools and secretary-treasurer, before going to trustees for ratification.

Contributions must be recognized in ways that do not exploit students, especially as they are essentially a captive audience. Any agreements are limited to three years, and are subject to annual review.

"We had the policies all the time, we just weren't enforcing them strictly enough," said trustee Constance Rulka.

"And perhaps the principals did not know of these policies," said board chairwoman

Amy Shoup.

Trustees voted to send the drafts out for impact assessment. They will be distributed to parents, staff and administrators by October, with replies expected by December.

"Is it kind of a free-for-all until December?" asked Sandra Bauer, representing the Squamish and District Labour Committee.

She noted the SDLC, despite having told the board it was interested in the issue, was not told the draft policies would be on the agenda.

"For people who have made it all the way up to Whistler to do a presentation, being notified when the issue is on the agenda would be appreciated," she said. Bauer also wondered about how agreements would be made public — some corporate contracts demand even the school board be kept in the dark.

"Everything has to come to the board of trustees for ratification, and those would be public meetings and not in camera," Shoup pledged.

In response to a question from Marjorie Reimer, president of the Howe Sound Teachers Association, superintendent Linda Rossler said teachers would decide what constitutes student exploitation.

## Twelve big donations for local charities

The Whistler Blackcomb Foundation announced July 10 \$115,000 in grants to a dozen Sea to Sky charities for its spring 2001 round of funding.

Local beneficiaries include the Howe Sound Women's Centre Society, which received \$4,300 for Pearl's Place Transition House, and the Camp Squamish Summer Camp pro-

gram for children with disabilities, via a \$1,500 pledge to the Whistler/Blackcomb Mountain employees team in the BC Lion's 24-hour Relay for Kids.

### Water search

Squamish RCMP and Squamish Search and Rescue (SAR) crews were called out to a report of cries for help on Monday morning.

Just after 10:30 a.m., a complainant reported hearing cries from a female along the dyke of the Squamish River behind the West Coast Railway Heritage Park.

A helicopter in the area on another matter flew over the site to investigate and found a canoe belonging to some squatters living in the area.

SAR put their water rescue team in the water to further investigate.

As of press time, no one had been found and the investigation was continuing.

### Woodfibre closure extended

The Woodfibre pulp mill will reopen July 31, almost a month later than originally planned.

Market conditions and low pulp prices caused the extended mill shutdown, Dave Ingram, mill manager at Western Pulp Ltd. Partnership, said.

The 250 mill employees have been idle since the beginning of June and originally had been slated to return to work July 3.

When the mill does reopen it will be to produce pulp to fill orders for the mill's regular customers, Ingram said.

Pulp prices likely will not increase nor does Ingram foresee an improvement in market condition.

# Expanding landfill an option

Squamish could make millions as corridor's dump site

The difficulty of developing land in the Cheekye fan could for once work in Squamish's favour as council considers the possibility of expanding the municipal landfill.

A major lateral expansion of the landfill onto adjoining Crown land could extend its life up to 63 years, Dr. Tony Sperling told councillors July 10. It could also generate up to \$6 million in revenue and cost savings, he said.

Hansen, president of Sperling Hansen Associates, attended the committee of the whole meeting to present a report on options for the future of the landfill.

Currently the Squamish-Lillooet Regional District's (SLRD) solid waste management plan calls for the Squamish and Whistler landfills to close in seven years.

"In 2008 it would be seen we would have to have some other method of disposing of our waste," Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said Friday. "To take solid waste out of the community to Cache Creek or Washington state ... would be quite costly."

It was the high price of shipping waste south of the border that prompted a decision to keep the Whistler and Squamish landfills open beyond 2000.

Both are running out of room, even though the amount of waste going into them is decreasing.

Primarily thanks to recycling, of

14,053 tonnes of waste dumped in 2000, only 9,875 tonnes actually ended up on the landfill, a 11 per cent drop from 1995.

Since opening in 1978, the landfill has received an estimated 227,841 tonnes.

Expanding vertically would be the simplest option, Sperling said, and would ensure optimal use of the existing site. Piling waste 15 to 20 metres above the current grade would give the landfill enough capacity to last 21 years.

The other option would be a lateral expansion from 6.4 hectares to 11.8 ha, by acquiring Crown land to the east.

"If Squamish only wanted to use the landfill ... we would be able to operate it for 63 years," Lonsdale said.

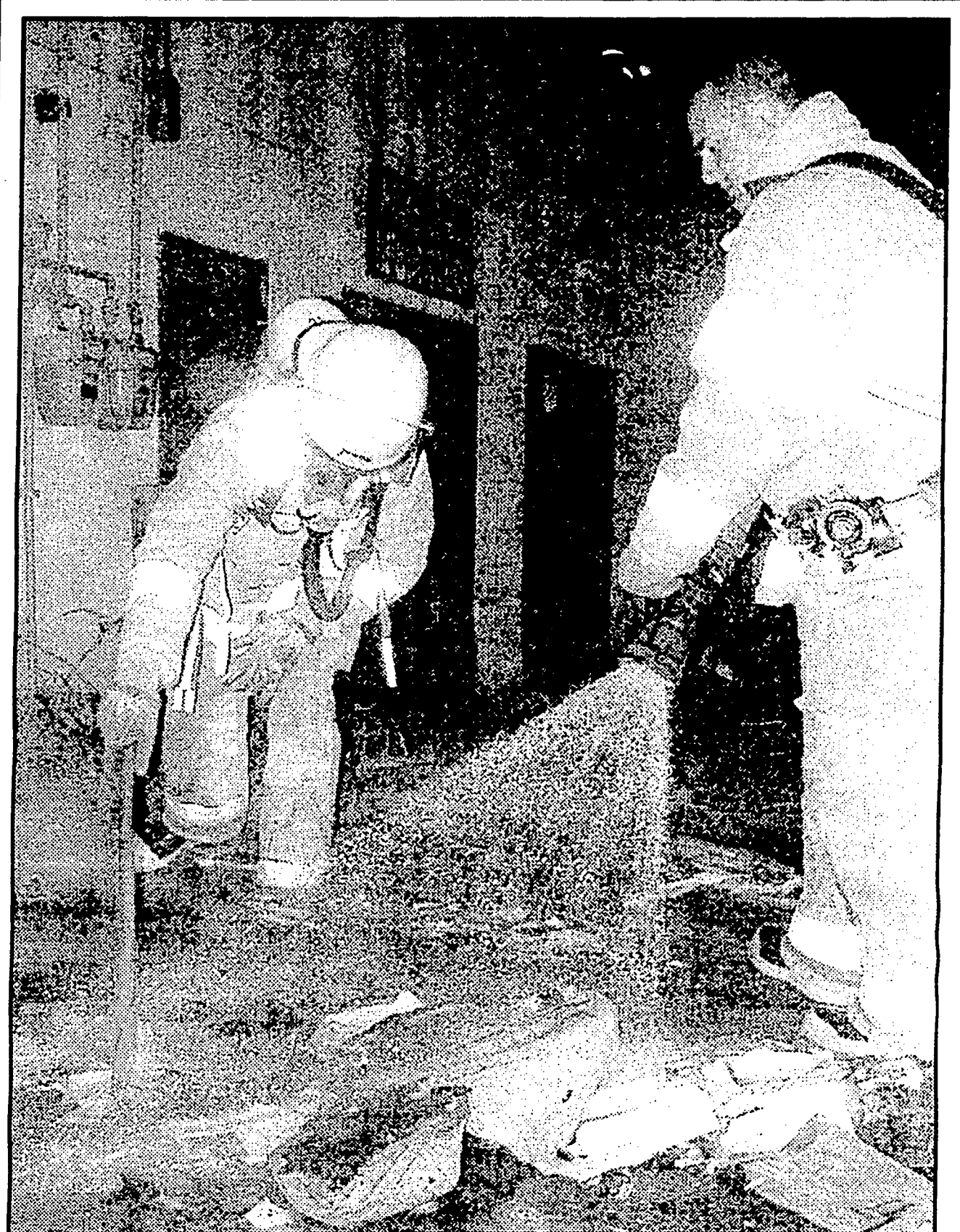

efficient.

The district's share of running a regional landfill would be \$60,000-\$80,000 a year less than operating on its own. Adding a \$10 per tonne surcharge for out-of-region users could generate another \$120,000 a year in revenue.

Lonsdale, however, made it clear the Sperling Hansen report was commissioned only to provide options.

The motion passed at the committee of the whole meeting was to optimize use of the landfill as identified in the report, and to begin the process to allow for continued use of the landfill, including an amendment to the SLRD solid waste management plan.

## Olympic bid kicks into high gear

How do you spell Winter Olympic hope? B-E-I-J-I-N-G.

An elated group of prominent Squamish community activists and business leaders met Friday for the breakfast announcement on the host of the 2008 Summer Olympics.

Beijing beat out Toronto on the second ballot for the 2008 bid, greatly improving the chances of Vancouver/Whistler hosting the 2010 Winter Olympics.

And now the real work begins.

Owen Carney said that construction of the women's downhill course will begin within the next few weeks as a indication of the 2010 bid's commitment.

Race courses also must be built on Blackcomb Mountain for the technical

events in skiing such as slalom and the GS races, Carney added.

Greg Gardner, chair of the task force for the Squamish Chamber of Commerce said reaction at the breakfast meeting initially was a bit flat because the announcement came quickly at around 7 a.m..

Mayor Corinne Lonsdale, who attended the meeting, said transportation is the single biggest hurdle to the Games coming to the Sea to Sky corridor.

"It's an obstacle that's really an opportunity," Lonsdale said.

A second route, whether it be through the Capilano watershed or the Seymour watershed or possibly even another, will be a necessity, she said.

The task force is compiling a list of supporters over the summer but work will begin in earnest in the fall.

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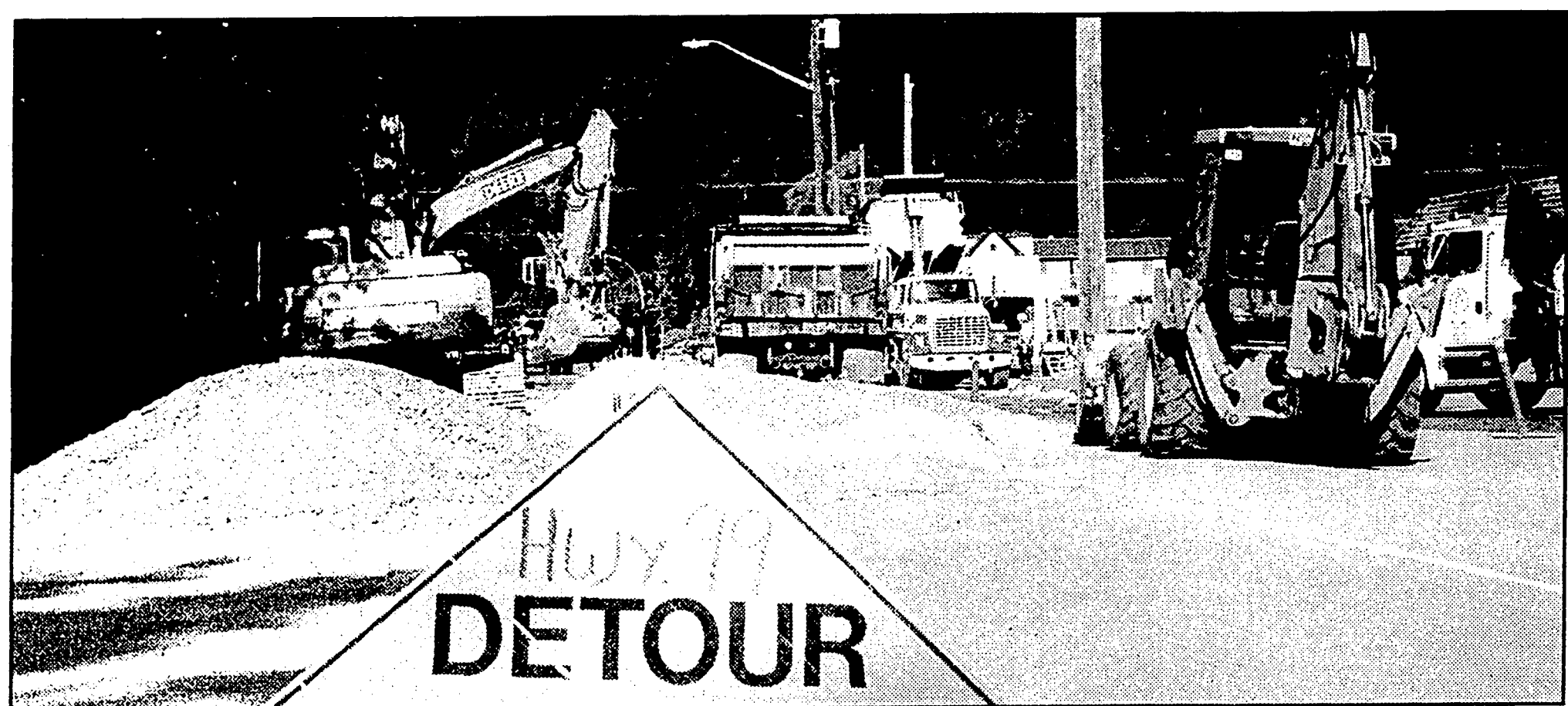

## CUPE, district settle contract

Both sides say  
labour  
atmosphere  
improving

Compromises on supervisor qualifications and wages have lifted the cloud of a potential strike from Municipal Hall.

The District of Squamish and the Canadian Union of Public Employees Local 2269 announced Thursday they had agreed to a new four-year contract.

The agreement is retroactive to Jan. 1, 2000, and expires Dec. 31, 2003.

District union employees will receive wage increases of one per cent in the first year, two per cent in the second, 2.5 per cent in the third and three per cent in the final year. This will increase the dis-

trict's union payroll from about \$3.9 million to \$4.2 million.

"We've managed to negotiate a number that can be squeezed into the existing budget," said administrator Kim Anema, the district's lead negotiator.

"As shown by the ratification numbers, this is a good collective agreement," said Bob Patterson, president of CUPE Local 2269. "The membership voted 94 per cent in favour of accepting the new deal."

On March 6, union members voted 78 per cent against a prior draft agreement. Ninety-six per cent voted to strike last October, but no strike notice was issued.

A main sticking point in negotiations was the weight of qualifications versus seniority when hiring supervisors.

The district wanted seniority to come into play only as a tiebreaker between the best-

qualified candidates, while the union preferred senior staff be hired as long as they met minimum qualifications.

"We've reached a good compromise in establishing a way of addressing supervisory issues," said Anema.

Seniority will still be the deciding factor for most supervisory positions, with some exceptions, he explained.

"The terms introduced into the collective agreement address our concerns for both management and the union membership to the benefit of our operation and the District of Squamish," he said.

"It's our desire to maintain a successful working relationship with the union and we are looking forward to accomplishing this."

Patterson echoed these comments, saying he looks forwards to working with the district under a more positive labour relations climate.

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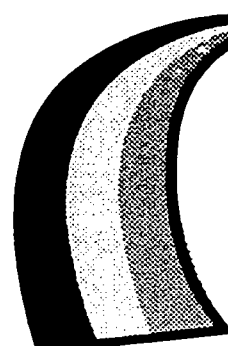

# Commercial committee backs downtown plan

Plans address development issues across the district

An economic development commission, an airport authority, consistent neighbourhood signage and adoption of the Squamish 2000 Plan were among two pages of recommendations council received July 10 from the select committee on commercial development (SCCD).

Council struck the committee March 6 to look into how to mitigate the impact of commercial development on existing businesses.

The group of business owners and developers included Wilf Dowad, Dave Fenn, Nancy McCartney, Jeff McKenzie, Don Patrick, Ted Prior, Wes Rafuse, Helmut Schuster, Ed Scott, Orest Semeniuk, Connie Spiers, Dave Stewart and Eivind Tornes.

Their terms of reference included specifically addressing Lot R, the downtown, downtown south, and the Business Park.

"Give me a wild bunch like that and you'll get all sorts of ideas," Stewart, the committee chair and a former mayor, said in presenting their report.

"We're not trying to make demands on council. We realize we come from one segment of the community, or it could be argued we do."

"We wouldn't want council to initiate all of these things today because we don't have any money, but there's grants and opportunities come along."

One of the most anticipated questions was the committee's view on development of a "big box" store in the Business Park.

"The Business Park and things like Wal-Mart are very controversial," said Stewart.

They recommended the Business

Park along Hwy. 99 be zoned for commercial use, with industrial retained along Queens Way.

Big box development, though the Business Park frontage is the best location, should be approached with caution, the SCCD said.

A big box would hurt competing small businesses in the Business Park and downtown, create traffic congestion and result in a net job loss, the group found.

"One of the other comments was let CDP get developed before you go charging into the next one," Stewart added.

The Canadian Destination

Properties highway mall project at Mamquam Road was the focus of a number of suggestions.

These included making Tantalus Road a two-way street and connecting it to Diamond Road, via the vacant property north of the CDP site, as well as rezoning residential properties north of the site to create a contiguous commercial area between Mamquam Road and Garibaldi Way.

However, the most prevalent item was swift adoption of the Squamish 2000 Plan for revitalizing the downtown.

The SCCD noted it covered items like moving the train tracks along Loggers Lane, promoting higher densities and mixed uses, and developing amenities.

They also noted the 2000 Plan called for industrial use along the Cattermole Slough south of Vancouver Street. Keeping the Nexen lands as port-oriented heavy industrial was recommended.

"We really have a good overview of the whole community [in the recommendations]," said Coun. Paul Lalli.

"I'm really impressed with the work the select committee turned out," said Mayor Corinne Lonsdale, who pro-

posed its creation.

"My feeling is that things in progress, like Tantalus Road ... we aren't waiting. I think we should move expeditiously on everything we can."

Councillors endorsed the recommendations in principle, and referred them to staff to create a status report on each item addressed.

With much of the land under discussion still owned by the district, the SCCD also recommended patience.

"If Whistler gets the Olympics, the value of land in Squamish could go up, so don't be in a hurry to give it away in a good deal," said Stewart.

### Grilled Hamburger with Fresh Tomato Salsa

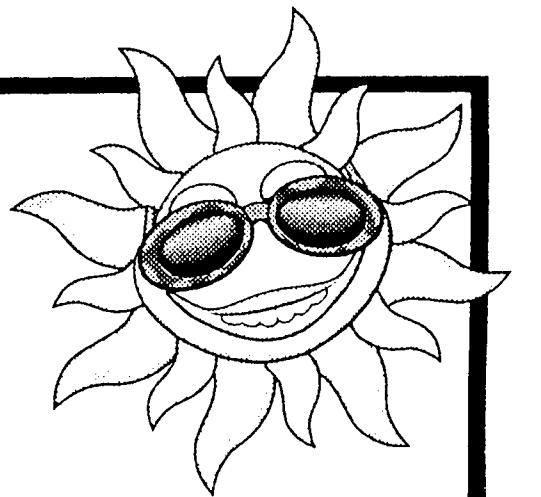
Salsa is great on burgers! Make the salsa at the last minute for the freshest possible taste.



Makes 4 servings  
3/4 cup diced tomato  
1/4 cup diced red onion  
1/4 cup minced fresh cilantro  
1 tablespoon fresh lime juice  
1 teaspoon minced deveined seeded jalapeno pepper (wear gloves to prevent irritation)  
1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper  
10 ounces extra-lean ground beef (10% or less fat)  
1/2 teaspoon ground cumin  
1/2 teaspoon onion powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1. Preheat outdoor barbecue grill according to manufacturer's directions, or preheat broiler and spray rack in broiler pan with nonstick cooking spray.  
2. To prepare salsa, in medium bowl, combine tomato, onion, cilantro, juice, jalapeno pepper and black pepper; set aside.  
3. In large bowl, combine beef, cumin, onion powder and salt; form into 4 equal patties. Grill patties over hot coals or place onto prepared rack in broiler pan and broil 4" from heat, turning once, 8 minutes, until beef is cooked through. Serve with salsa.

## Lyme disease detected

### Tick bite at Alice Lake leads to detection

A terrifying disease characterized by quirky symptoms, easy to misdiagnose, and difficult to treat, has struck in Squamish.

A Squamish woman has been diagnosed with Lyme Disease after being bit by a tick at Alice Lake nearly 10 days ago.

Dr. Laverne Kindree, a world-recognized leader in this devastating disease, confirmed that Sharon Berry has been struck by Lyme disease after she first noticed that a nasty rash had flared across her lower right leg.

Dr. Kindree, now retired, said he prescribed Berry fight the disease by taking massive amounts of antibiotics for a month.

Lyme disease is a marauder that roves through the body attacking any and all organs of the body.

One minute, the victim will feel nauseous, then their joints start to ache, Kindree said. The sufferer could even feel disoriented and mentally foggy.

There is no definitive test for Lyme disease. Sufferers can take a blood test but frequently people can test positive and actually be negative while people can also test negative but are actually infected with Lyme disease, Kindree said.

Berry said she first saw a doctor after she noticed a bite

and a rash on her calf. The next day she thought she was suffering from food poisoning and felt nauseous for about four hours. On the third day, she began to feel disoriented.

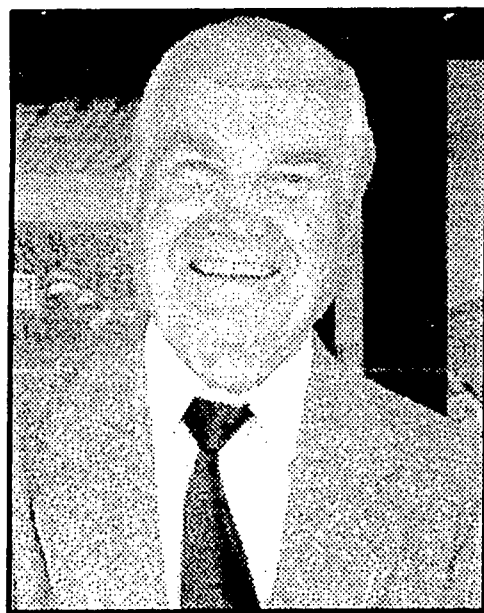
All the while she would feel a pins and needles sensation that would float to different areas of her skin, Berry said.

Kindree said he is not aware of anyone else being infected with Lyme disease in the Alice Lake area.

Berry said she does not even recall being bit by a tick.

Kindree estimates that up to 50 per cent of all people bitten by a tick never know that the insect has attacked them.

Ticks lurk around trees or cling to grass and transfer themselves to people if the host accidentally brushes against the tree. Ticks prefer the white-footed mouse as the host for the larval and

nymphal stages and the white-tailed deer for the adult.

Twelve cases of Lyme disease were reported in B.C. in 2000, Dr. Fred Rockwell, medical health officer for Central Vancouver Island, said Friday.

The figures for the Coast Garibaldi Health region were not available.

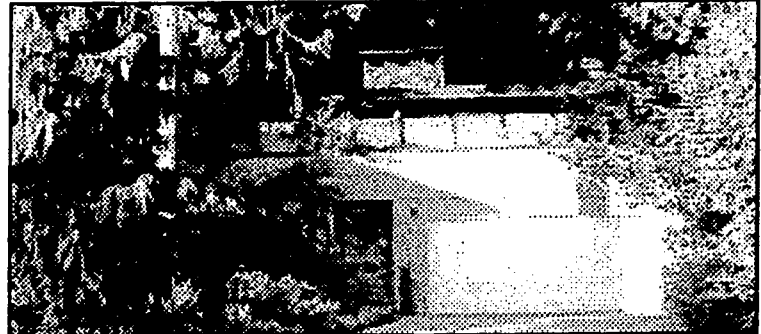

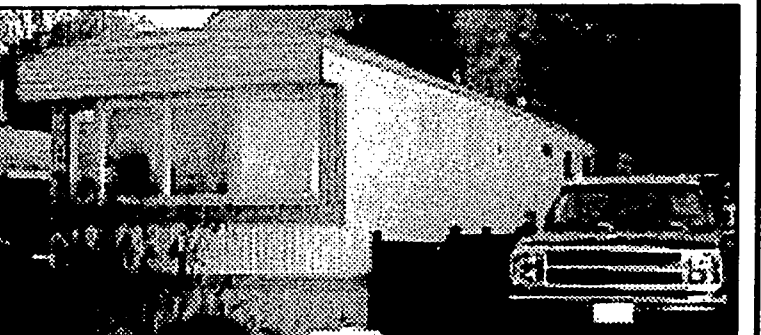

## Accidents on the rise near Windy Point

Extra police enforcement planned for stretch of Hwy. 99

Squamish RCMP is reminding the motoring public to be extra careful when travelling along Hwy. 99 at Windy Point 15.4 km south of Squamish.

In the last few weeks, several collisions have occurred on Hwy. 99 near Windy Point and RCMP plan to step up their enforcement in this area.

On July 6, a vehicle hit the rock face after crossing the double solid line.

Police investigation revealed that the driver of the vehicle was racing against another driver, and that driver failed to negotiate a curve and left the highway.

Police say the driver was travelling at 117 km/h at the time of impact.

On July 8, another accident occurred in the same area.

A single northbound vehicle failed to negotiate a clockwise curve and hit the rock face on the right hand side of the highway.

The male driver and his female passenger sustained minor injuries during the collision.

"The driver stated that he was trying to avoid a vehicle travelling southbound in his lane," said Const. Pat Cost. "However, our investigation revealed this to be false. The collision was probably caused by the driver's inattention or falling asleep."

Cost added that enforcement is going to be stepped up in an attempt to reduce collisions.

## BC Rail property vandalized

Police seeking public's help for information

Squamish RCMP and BC Rail Police are asking for the public's help after several vandalisms occurred on BC Rail property last week.

On two separate occasions, the fence behind the teacherage (Wilson Crescent) was damaged.

It appears that the reason the fence is being cut open is because it blocks a trail that goes from Wilson Crescent to the downtown area, said Const. Daniela Czymoch.

"The purpose of the fence was for public safety and it continues to be a concern for BC Rail," Czymoch said. "BC Rail police and the Squamish RCMP would like to remind the community of the dangers inherent to the railway tracks."

Anyone with information regarding these incidents, is asked to call Squamish RCMP at 898-9611.

Sometime between June 30 and July 4, three river rafts were vandalized at Mile 26 in the Upper Squamish.

The rafts appear to have been sliced with a sharp object.

The rafts are each worth \$10,000.

Police have no suspects or witnesses to the crime and are still investigating.

On July 4, a routine traffic check resulted in a one-pound seizure of marijuana.

A 15-year-old teenager from Britannia Beach is facing a charge of possession of a controlled substance.

He will appear in Squamish provincial court on Sept. 18 to face the charge.

On July 5, just before 11 p.m., police received a report of an erratic driver on Hwy. 99.

Police found the vehicle and took the driver, a 39-year-old woman from Pemberton, back to the detachment to provide breath samples.

The results indicated she was twice the legal limit.

Police are recommending charges of impaired driving and driving with a blood alcohol content over .08.

The suspect will appear in Squamish provincial court on Aug. 14.

On July 7 just after 10 p.m., RCMP received a report that 15-20 youths were vandalizing the Pavilion on Cleveland Avenue.

Police made their way to the scene, but the youths had already fled.

Police recovered a bike that is believed to belong to one of the youths involved.

"The bike is still at the detachment and the owner is invited to attend to claim their property," Czymoch said.

On July 9, around 10:15 p.m., police were called to the Hudson House after a noise complaint was reported.

A female was yelling and hitting windows. Police investigation revealed that a window had been broken.

The suspect, a 37-year-old Squamish woman, was arrested and charged with mischief.

She will appear in Squamish provincial court on Aug. 21 to face the charge.

In the course of its route the Royal Hudson travels twice through the Hunter's Place intersection, located at Squamish Station Mall and into the downtown area via Loggers Lane.

It has been brought to police attention that a number of drivers, cyclists and pedestrians are behaving in an unsafe and illegal manner (failing to stop for the train, failing to stop for the crossing gate and stopping vehicles on the railway tracks).

These activities are dangerous and can result in charges under the Motor Vehicle Act.

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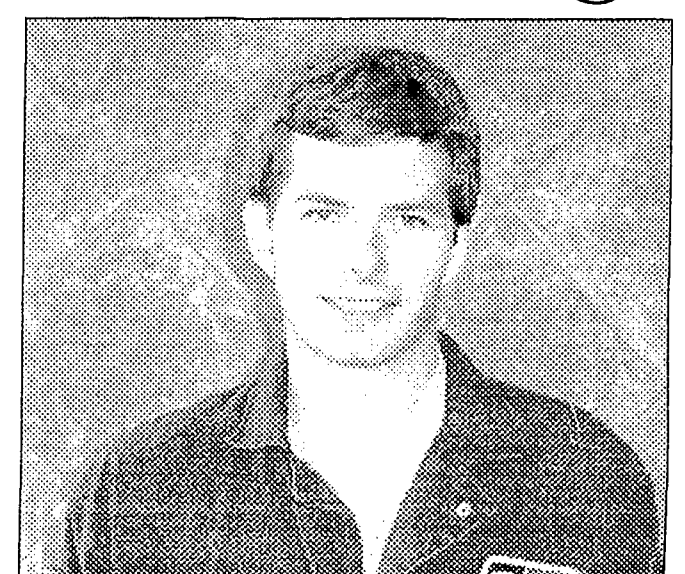

## Mining Museum teams up with UBC

The B.C. Museum of Mining has teamed up with the University of British Columbia (UBC) and the British Columbia Institute of Technology (BCIT) on two environmental research and education projects for the summer season.

UBC is soon expected to be at its Centre of Environmental Research in Minerals, Metals and Materials (UBC-CERM3) to develop a method of sealing

abandoned mines, named the "millennium plug."

This project will advance research into reducing pollution and contamination of the environment, according to a prepared statement from the museum.

The CERM3 Britannia Beach Research Field Station is located at the museum of mining.

Brennan Lang, of Squamish, is the primary researcher and is a leading expert in tunnel and shaft sealing.

UBC also will provide assistance to the museum to develop a future exhibit

about acid rock drainage.

BCIT and its Keyes Mining Field School has entered into a partnership with the museum to allow technology students to use Britannia's geological and mine features to gain field and research skills. Their work will include geological mapping, surveying and the preparation of a mock mine feasibility study. Major financial support for this program has come from the Cy and Emerald Keyes Charitable Foundation.

Cy Keyes worked in management at Britannia in the 1950s.

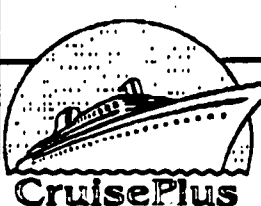

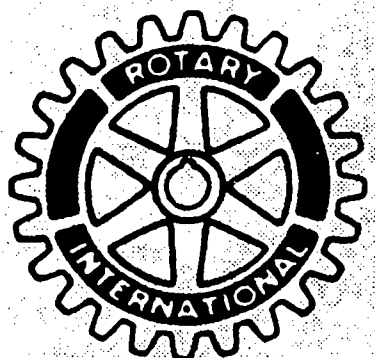

Pound for pound, whippets are the fastest dogs on earth.

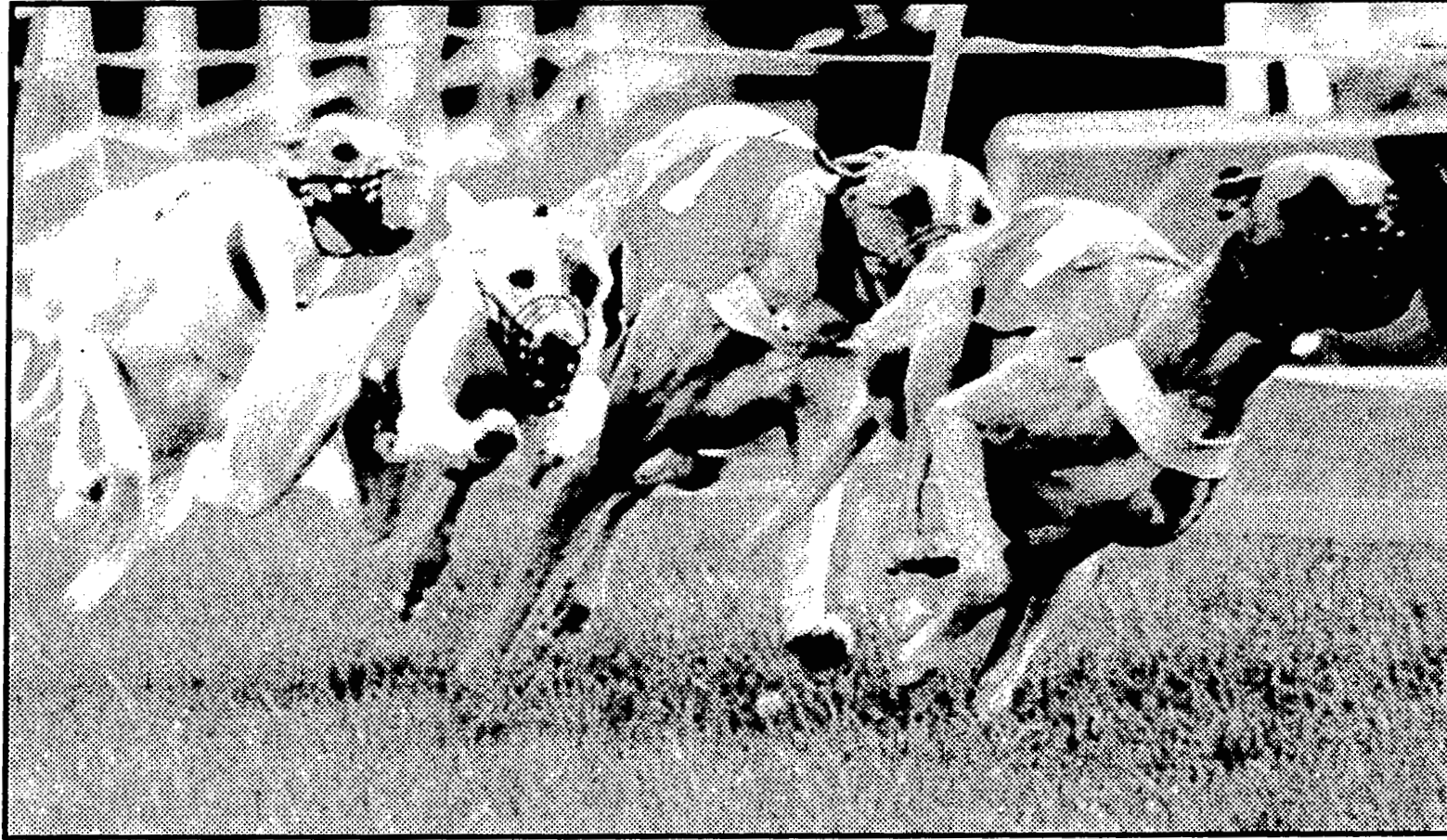
These 'greyhounds in miniature' can run at speeds in excess of 65 km/h.

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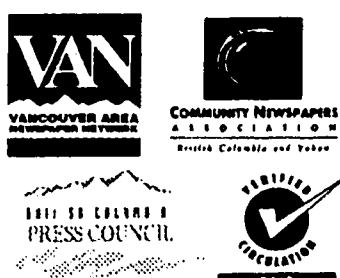

# Promising gathering

Cheers rang out across the province — following a short but polite sympathetic noise for Toronto by some — as Beijing captured the 2008 Summer Olympics on Friday.

We have to admit, nobody in The Chief's office was noticeably disappointed in the results of the International Olympic Committee's vote.

The Vancouver-Whistler bid for the 2010 Winter Games offers the possibility of economic opportunities, a major cash infusion into the region and meaningful investments into the overloaded transportation network.

Most business people you talk with in Squamish are also happy that Toronto was not selected.

A group gathered at the Howe Sound Inn and Brew Pub for a Chamber of Commerce breakfast to watch the bid announcement. And while the announcement brings with it hope for the Vancouver-Whistler bid, it also means a lot of hard work in the next two years.

A far quieter gathering July 9 brought easily the most prestigious group ever assembled together to tour our district, all drawn by the promise of a new academic venture and the friendship of its founder.

The Sea to Sky University Project's international advisory board spent the day being introduced to the community and the proposed site of the private secular university, in the lands east of the Garibaldi Highlands.

Yet the warm reception and warm weather they received in Squamish made a most positive impression, if the wrap-up dinner was anything to judge by.

In an interesting aside, it was a local future university student who orchestrated much of the group's in-depth introduction to the university project and the district.

Apart from his position as project information co-ordinator, William Haworth also bears the title of youngest participant, though he fit smoothly into the gathering.

While only 19 strong, a very brief summary of the group's titles and position fills four pages.

Among the titles: Wan Kyoo Cho, former Korean minister of education and president of Seoul National University; Michael Gibbons, Secretary-General of the Association of Commonwealth Universities; Nurjehan Mawani, one of Canada's three Public Service Commissioners; and Heitor de Souza, former minister of education and former president of two universities in Brazil.

"We are beyond asking 'Is it feasible?' and now are asking 'How do we make it happen?'" said Dr. David Strangway, the founder of the Sea to Sky University Project.

The consensus: vision, hard work, shrewd business planning academic innovation and community support.

The last is as important as any. Without Squamish — not just the district, but the people — getting behind the university its path may prove too difficult to tread.

And let us not forget, by the time the 2010 Olympics have come and gone, the Sea to Sky University will just be hitting its stride.

# The "-" in Vancouver-Whistler

You didn't have to be in B.C. to be happy when the announcement for the 2008 Summer Olympics came through Friday morning.

We were still in Edmonton, and you could see the grins on people's faces after the news hit that Beijing was in and Toronto was out.

Not that people didn't want the 2008 Summer Olympics to come to Canada; they just didn't want them to go to Toronto.

As Canadian comedian Lorne Elliot puts it, Toronto is the great unifying force in this country — no matter where you're from or what language you speak, everyone hates the place.

But as a B.C. resident, it was more than simple Toronto-phobia that brought on the smile Friday morning. The news means the chances for our own bid — the Vancouver-Whistler bid for the 2010 Winter Olympics, in case you've been under a rock or in Toronto — are suddenly much better.

The B.C. media has been making the proper attempts to convey that news without sounding too gleeful about it. The fact that the 2008 Games are going to China, a country whose medal count will be eclipsed by its execution stats, provides a handy scapegoat and keeps the smiles from getting a little too smug.

In fact, the Vancouver Sun, in its Saturday coverage of B.C.'s reaction to the bid announcement, did quite well. It even managed to quote some people from Squamish — well, one person, which is one more than we could have hoped for.

Owen Carney's comments about Squamish's potential to be another Canmore, the community between Calgary and Banff which hosted some of the Nordic events in the 1988 Winter Olympics, are very hopeful. No events are planned for Squamish at this time, but as the bid kicks into high gear, who knows what could happen?

At the very least, a benefit of the bid for Squamish should be some form of upgrade for Hwy. 99 — not for the right reasons, but at this point, we'll take it.

## Corporate agenda behind Britannia evictions

Once again the Fulbers are in the news, but they never seem to get the facts right. What bothers me most is that they don't even try!

Our case is not as complicated as it seems.

If an illegal activity is not a danger and doesn't put the interest of the landlord at risk, it cannot be the basis of an eviction. A few trays of young "starts" destined to be grown outdoors do not constitute a "grow-op."

Everything must be viewed in context to be understood.

We have fought for a long time to have our "landlords" held accountable for the pollution here in Britannia.

Few people realize how much money has been bled out of the old Anaconda holdings since the mine shut

down!

C.B.E. Ltd. never paid a dime for the property that they have sold off over the years for more than \$20 millions.

This month the government will announce a deal where a remediation fund has been created to clean up the mess. C.B.E. Ltd. will be required to contribute \$5 million to this fund that will essentially improve their real estate holdings. If they default who will hold them accountable?

The community has, with the help of the Fraser Basin Council, negotiated a land transfer to the tenants as part of this proposal.

The deal struck between government and private interest is to include a \$16 million public infrastructure grant.

PricewaterhouseCoopers, as

managing receivers of these properties, have mobilized their corporate legal department to evict us. They are interested in maintaining the status quo.

The community pays more than \$500,000 a year in rents. That income pays their management fees!

The criteria set out by the attorney general's guidelines to landlords on illegal activities under the Residential Tenancy Act is clear. An illegal activity must "seriously impair the lawful interest of the landlord."

Illegal activity is still a matter of our courts.

All we are asking for is our day in court.

The basis of our eviction is not a finding of fact.

The questions beg; Why are these corporate giants out to

"convict and evict" us through the media? What is their agenda?

What about the "illegal activities" of our landlords?

PricewaterhouseCoopers were granted an unprecedented immunity from liability by the courts.

This doesn't give them the right to develop without permits and engage in social engineering of our community.

Tim Drummond, president of C.B.E. Ltd., awaits his day in court on criminal charges without the media bias the Fulbers are being subjected to.

If we can't stop the daily flow of poison into Howe Sound, can we at least stop the flow in the press!

Squamish has just shifted into an exciting direction with the announcement of the 2008 Olympic Games going to Beijing. There is no doubt that having Beijing win the games will substantially increase the chances of the Vancouver-Whistler Bid winning the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Games. They had a very strong technical bid and their slogan "By Athletes For Athletes" helped bring Canada to the second spot ranking. That is something for all Canadians to be proud of.

The Vancouver-Whistler 2010 Olympic bid corporation has been quietly working in the shadows of the Toronto bid until this announcement. Now that the decision has been made, it is expected that the 2010 Bid Corporation will be pulling out all of the stops. The Squamish Chamber of Commerce will be there ready to represent the business community and do what we can to support the Bid Corporation to "Bring the Games Home."

The next public meeting dates are July 17 and Aug. 14 at Municipal Hall.

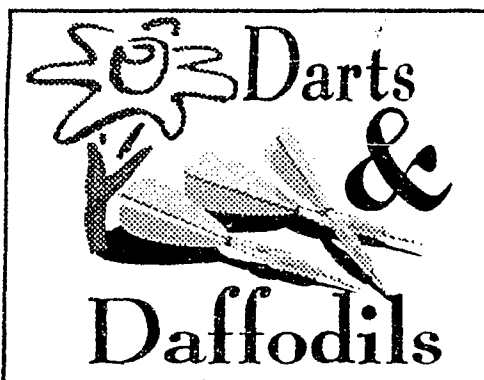

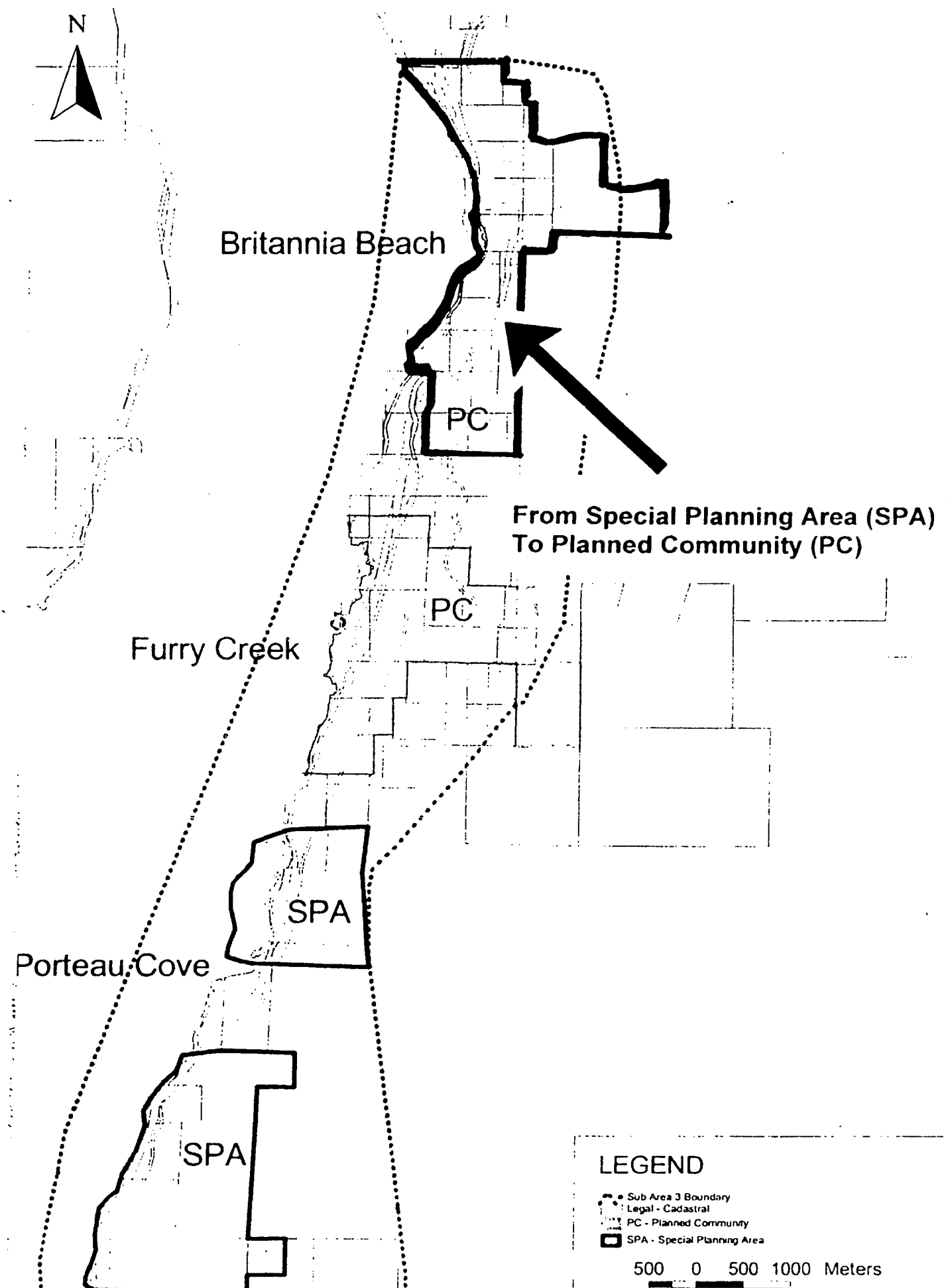
1. Electoral Area D Official Community Plan Amendment By-law No. 714, 2001:

The purpose of this plan amendment is to amend the Electoral Area D Official Community Plan No. 495 to incorporate land use policies and map designations for the Howe Sound East area consistent with the principles established in the Electoral Area D Official Community Plan. The Howe Sound East Sub-Area 3 Plan redesignates the Britannia Beach area from "Special Planning Area" to "Planned Community" as shown on the map below. The sub-area plan contains policies and land use designations for Britannia Beach, as well as general policies for Furry Creek and Porteau Cove.

The Plan's primary focus is on planning for the future of Britannia Beach, and includes provisions for future development of between 1650 and 2000 new housing units, policies to encourage retention of the historic Britannia Beach residential area, policies for provision of park land and community amenities, policies to promote tourist commercial business and business that serves the needs of the local community, and policies relating to industrial development, transportation, infrastructure servicing, environmentally sensitive areas, heritage resources, natural hazards and environmental contamination.

With respect to Furry Creek, the objective is to continue to recognize the Planned Community designation, and encourage adequate provision of community facilities and public open space as development proceeds. Regarding Porteau Cove, general policy statements relating to making provision for the development, either by First Nations or non-aboriginal developers, of a livable community compatible with other Howe Sound East developments are included in the plan.

The area covered by By-law 714 is outlined on the following map:



A copy of the proposed By-law and relevant background documents may be inspected at the Regional District Office, 1350 Aster Street, Pemberton, B.C. during office hours 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday to Friday (excepting Public Holidays) July 10, 11, 12, 13, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 23 and 24, 2001. A copy of the Notice and proposed by-law may also be viewed at the District of Squamish Municipal Office, 37955—2nd Avenue, Squamish, B.C.

The Public Hearing is to be chaired by Area D Director Pam Tattersfield as a delegate of the SLRD Regional Board. A copy of the Board resolution making the delegation is available for public inspection along with copies of the Electoral Area D Official Community Plan Amendment By-law No. 714, 2001 as set out in this notice.

All persons who believe that their interest in property is affected by the proposed By-laws shall be afforded a reasonable opportunity to be heard or to present written submissions respecting matters contained in the By-laws at the Public Hearing. # First Nations and CWY team up for exchange

Sixteen young people are in the middle of a unique cultural exchange between the American continents taking place this summer in Squamish and Mount Currie.

Eight First Nations youth from B.C. and eight Mayan youth from Guatemala arrived in June and will be in the two communities until September as part of an exchange under the Canada World Youth banner.

Squamish previously played host to several CWY exchanges, most recently one in early 2000 involving Estonia.

The current exchange, however, is the first one specifically targeting participants of a native origin.

"This is really about exchanging knowledge of culture between indigenous people," program supervisor Cheryl Matthew said Friday. "It's a little bit different from the regular Canada World Youth exchange."

The exchange is a pilot program between CWY and the First Nations Employment

and Enterprise Centre, which is providing about half the funding. The rest comes from CWY, which is partly funded by the Canadian International Development Agency, and fund-raising.

Beyond who the participants are, the use of two communities to play host is another departure from the standard CWY model.

The participants, who range in age from 18 to 25 years, are arranged in eight pairs, Guatemalan and Canadian.

Each pair is given a work placement within one of the two communities. Goals include building employment skills and more meaningful involvement in the community.

"Some of them [work placements] are cultural, others are working with the band offices on things like ethno-botany," said Matthew. "The opportunity to see another culture and have another way of life will have a huge impact on the rest of their lives. I'm speaking from experience; I was a participant in 1996 and did an exchange with Guatemala."

While the Guatemalan participants have handled the culture shock surprisingly well, Matthew said, it will be interesting to see how the Canadian youth handle the three and a half months in Quetzaltenango, Guatemala.

She hopes the Canadians will learn something from the Guatemalans' ability to maintain a rich cultural heritage, despite a weak economy.

The group will hold a fund-raising concert Aug. 18 in Mount Currie to pay for activities and participation fees.

The various bands and dance groups will include native blues artist George Leach.

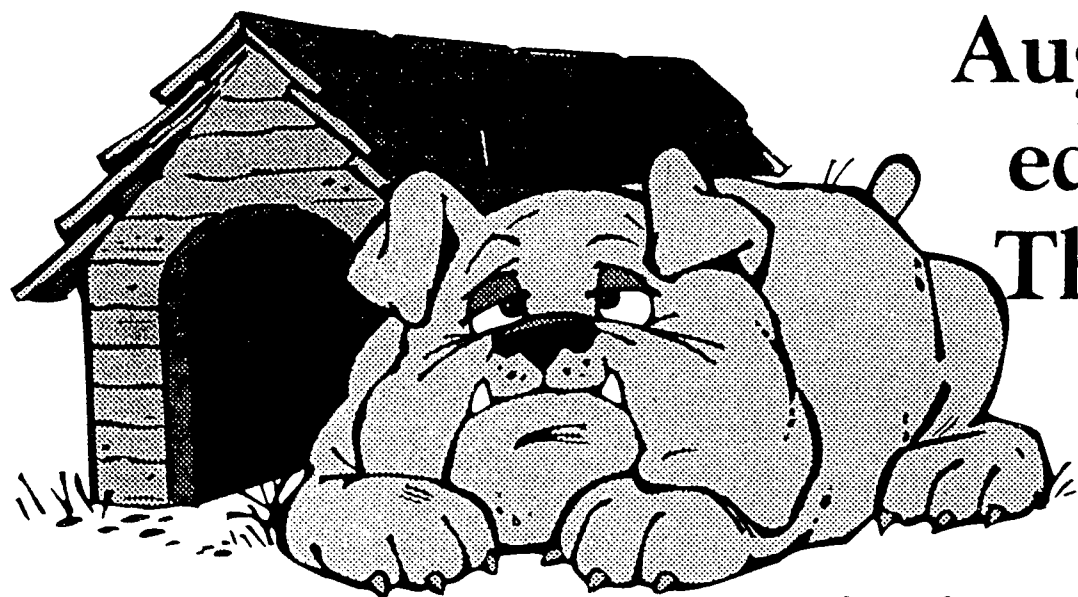

## Fourth Annual Squamish Triathlon continues to grow

From its inception four years ago, the Squamish Triathlon's goals were simple.

Create an event that would celebrate the memory of Bob McIntosh and grow the sport of triathlon in Squamish, making it a premier event on the B.C. triathlon calendar.

Event organizers have achieved those goals and now entering Sunday's fourth annual event, they are hoping to continue their reign of success.

"The sport is taking off, not just in Squamish, but around the world," said race director Peter Hotston. "There is no question that the Olympic spotlight that Simon Whitfield brought to the sport has helped, but people just want to find out what this sport is about. The kids triathlon that was organized by the Pirates swim club was unbelievably successful this year and it will just continue to grow."

"I didn't expect that our event would be so successful so quickly. I'm surprised that we've come so far, but it's a testament to Bob and everyone that makes our event possible."

This year's event gets started at 9 a.m. as competitors invade the chilly waters of Alice Lake for a 1,500 metre swim, followed by a 40 km bike ride

and a 10 km run, all finishing up at Brackendale Secondary School.

Last year marked the first year that the run course took a new route.

Part of it was on a new trail that parallels the westside of Hwy. 99 from Depot Road to the Squamish Valley Road, by the Alice Lake turn-off.

It is part of a trail network plan for Squamish (through the Squamish Trail Society and Squamish Trail Steering Committee).

The trail called the Cheeky Fan Trail, and the work extending the trail in time for Sunday's race has brought together many different people in a volunteer effort to accomplish the task.

Ray Peters is the driving force behind organizing and carrying out the work.

"It's amazing the work that Ray, the volunteers and all the businesses have done to get the trail to the point where it is now," Hotston said. "There is still going to be a bit of running on Hwy.

99, but for most of the course, it will all be on the trail. It's much safer, easier to manage and I think the competitors will really like it."

Other than the slight changes to the running course, the race is identical to the previous three.

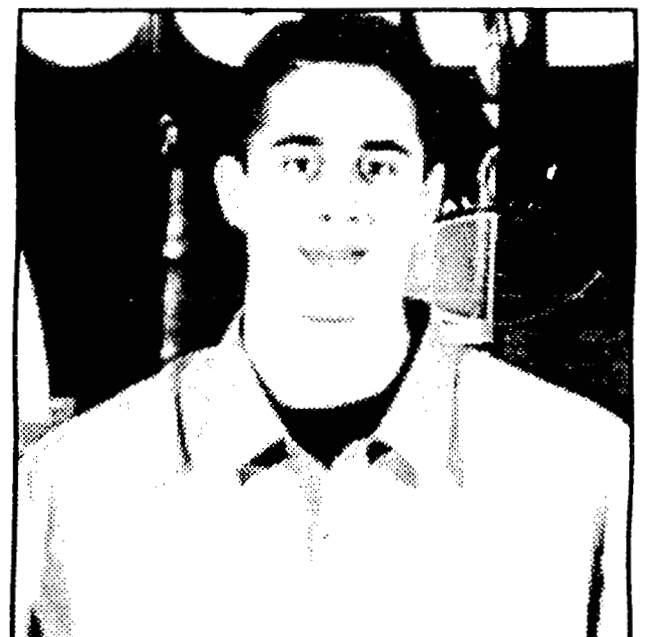

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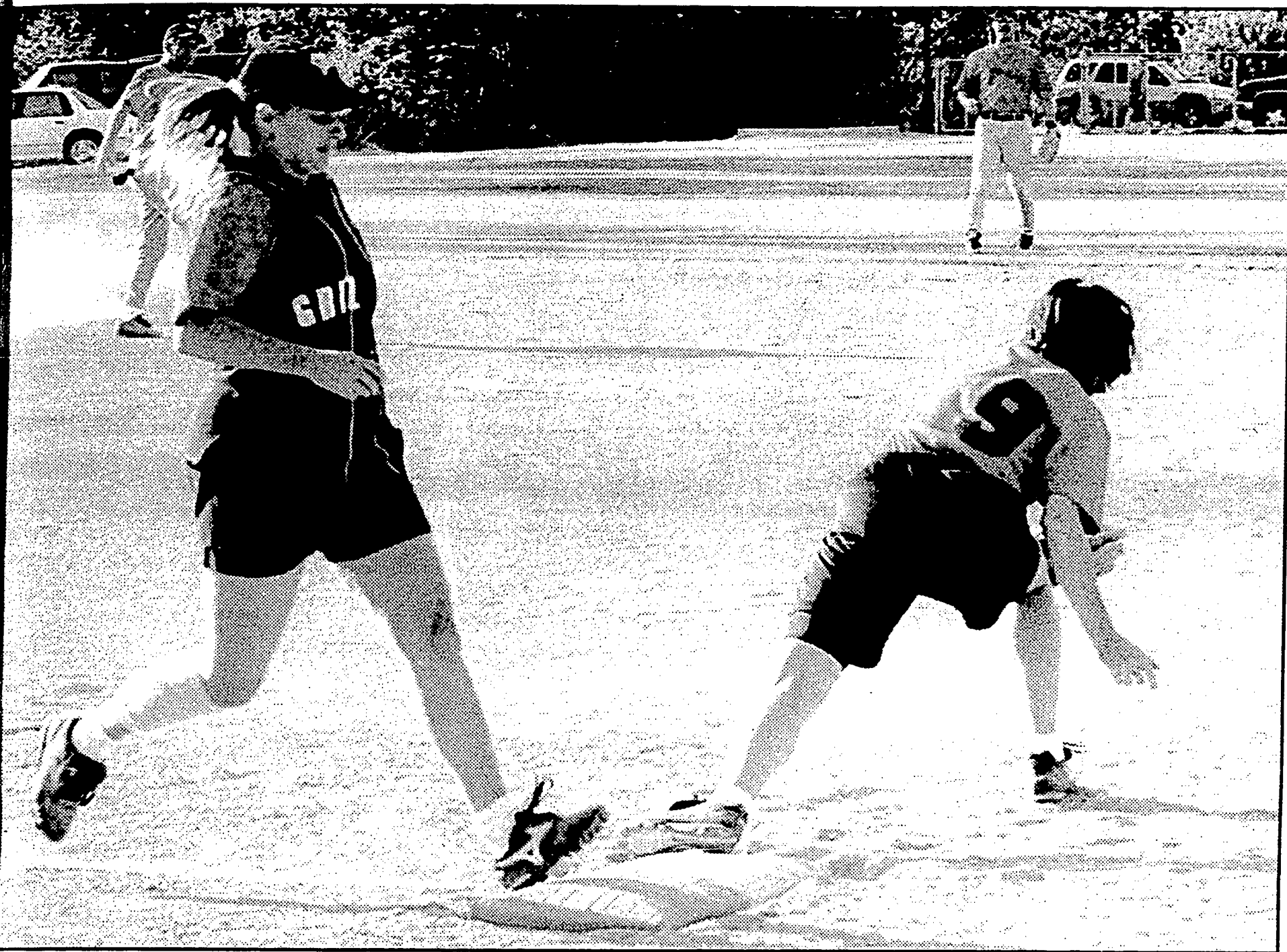

Squamish field users.

Currently user and admission fees recover 24 per cent of the ice arena's operating costs, and 32 per cent of the pool's.

"We don't want to go after youth," said Coun. Shelley Smith. "We should go after the commercial, for-profit groups. The question is the adults."

Councillors unanimously agreed youth teams would not be charged, but were less certain about the fees to apply to non-profit adult leagues.

"There's only one tournament I can think of that's a for-profit event," said Bruce Goldsworthy, manager of recreation services.

"The rest are hosted by groups that use them to raise money for their activities."

He noted the fields have also benefited from a great deal of volunteer work and donations over the years. He also noted too heavy a fee could make it

impossible to host tournaments to fund-raise money to keep leagues affordable.

"Those leagues, they may have to find a new way of fund-raising, not on the cost of the District of

Squamish fields," said Coun. Raj Kahlon.

"Regardless of what fee we charge, it's not going to pay to repair the fields."

Coun. Wendy Magee argued the fees would help encourage respect for a fields complex that is the envy of similar-size communities.

"When you give something away for free all the time, it

loses some of its value," she said.

"If we have a meeting with the users there isn't going to be a one of them who'll want a user's fee," said Mayor Corinne Lonsdale. "That's a given."

The district will advise field user groups the topic is under discussion, and notify them when Goldsworthy's report comes back to council.
